## THE OUTLOOK

**The outlook for Nebraska** is good this year and the Huskers have been tabbed as the team to beat in the Big Eight conference.

Speed and quickness are Nebraska's greatest assets returning this year, followed closely by experience. Joe Cipriano will have four returning starters to begin where Nebraska left off last year—knocking on the conference championship door.

Nebraska will have four of the top five scorers and the top four rebounders from last year's team return: Tom Baack, Nate Branch, Stuart Lantz and Willie Campbell.

On the deficit side—Cipriano must find a team leader to replace Grant Simmons. The run-run offense, depending on the fast break, and the press defense, both used consistently by Nebraska, need a sharp leader to make them work.

Also, with Fred Hare sitting the year out because of knee surgery, and the graduation of Coley Webb, it will be necessary for Cipriano to find his bench strength.

**But the Huskers** will gain the services of three top men from the freshman team: Roger Leitner (he averaged 19.1 ppg), Bob Wagner, and Dan Shaver. All three have molded to the Cipriano-style quite well.

Frank Empkey (6-8) and Charles Stone (6-9) have gained polish and are expected to see more action this year, giving Nebraska much-needed height. Ernie Strasil, red-shirted last year, will see action this year.

Last year Cipriano was most worried about the lack of height and subsequently, the lack of rebounds. But Lantz and Branch proved to battle for the rebounds, even out-jumping the best and tallest of them.

"We're in the same situation because we lack a big, strong center for offense and rebounding," says Cipriano. "But we'll depend on our quickness and our speed to pull us through the season."

Also helping the Huskers is a pre-conference schedule that includes five home games (only one road game) and the Vanderbilt Invitational which will give Nebraska a taste of tournament pressure before heading to Kansas City for the Big Eight Tournament.

A contest with the University of Prague basketball team precedes regular conference play.

Nebraska's balance and its versatility will make it the tough team that is expected.

## COACH CIPRIANO ON THE 1966 - 67 CORNHUSKERS

"We're going to miss Grant Simmons, both offensively and defensively, but we do have some alternatives for filling his spot. Hopefully, Jim Damm or Ron Simmons will over there.

"However, if Leitner or Empkey would develop at forward, that would free Branch for guard.

"We are fortunate that we do have that are versatile enough to play a number of positions. Again this year, we will depend on speed.

"We have four sophomores who lettered last year and we can't help but think that we are going to be improved. We do lack bench strength.

"We feel we can have a better team, but our opponents are going to be better, too."

## COACH CIPRIANO ON THE CONFERENCE RACE

"This is the first year since I've been at Nebraska that I feel there are six teams able to win the conference race.

"Kansas has a lot of good returning people and they are going to surprise. Iowa State, Colorado, Oklahoma, Kansas State are all going to be better.

"Perhaps Oklahoma State is a year away from being a challenger, but they should be improved. And Missouri is an unknown because of so many Junior College transfers.

"I think it is going to be tough to tumble the champ out of this year's conference."

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**EMPHASIS ON YOUTH . . .** that, in a nutshell, is a summation of the University of Nebraska basketball staff.

Headed by Joe Cipriano, 35, Nebraska basketball uses the modern approach to the sport utilizing the fast break and the press-defense as major weapons.

Ed Stevens, 26, and Glenn Potter, 28, assist Cipriano this year.

Joel Kortus, 22, will again help Potter with the Husker yearlings. Kortus played for Nebraska in 1964-65.

## TIPPY DYE



**Tippy Dye**, Nebraska's athletic director whose leadership has made the University a national powerhouse, has an illustrious basketball background.

Before coming to Nebraska in 1961, Dye was athletic director at Wichita State for three years where he built a powerful basketball program.

Dye was head basketball coach at the University of Washington for nine years. His teams won the northern division of the Pacific Coast Conference six times, won two championships and won the western NCAA Regional in 1953.

**Among the notables** that he coached at WU was Joe Cipriano.

Dye was a three sport athlete at Ohio State. He was all conference quarterback, all conference and All America basketball player despite the fact he was only 5-7 and weighed 140 lbs.

After a brief period with the AFL, Dye moved to the college ranks as basketball coach and assistant football coach at Brown. He returned to Ohio State in 1942.

After serving in the Navy he returned to Ohio State until 1950, when his Buckeyes recorded a 22-4 season, winning the Big Ten and making it to the NCAA playoffs.

The 51-year-old director and his wife Mary have two children: Stephanie and Tippy, Jr.

# NEBRASKA COACHES

## JOE CIPRIANO

**Nebraska basketball** coach Joe Cipriano has a reputation for getting the job done—something's he's proved both as a player and a coach.

Cipriano came to Nebraska in 1963 when Cornhusker cage fortunes were at a low-ebb. Nebraska Athletic Director Tippy Dye, who had coached "Slippery Joe" during his fabulous career at the University of Washington, gave Cipriano the rebuilding task.

Three years later Cipriano had built the team that Nebraska fans had been waiting for. For in the 1965-66 cage season the Huskers finished their best in 45 years.

**Cipriano came to Nebraska** from Idaho where his teams posted a rebuilding trail much like Nebraska's: 10-16, 13-13 and 20-6 records. With his three year record at Nebraska (7-18, 10-15, 20-5) Cipriano's won-lost record broke in the winning percentage with 80 victories and 73 defeats.

Playing for Dye at Washington, Cipriano led the Huskies to three straight Pacific Coast division titles and one loop crown. Later he served as player-coach of the AAU Buchan Bakers which toured Europe, Hawaii, and the Far East. After a short term at high school coaching Cipriano returned to Washington as freshman coach on Dye's staff.

Cipriano is married to his high school and college sweetheart, the former Arlene Johnson, and they have three children, Randy, Tamsen, Janice.

## GLENN POTTER

Glenn Potter came to Nebraska with head coach Joe Cipriano in 1963. He is now serving as freshman coach and helps coach the varsity.

Potter and Cipriano were associated at the University of Idaho when Cipriano was head coach there. Potter served as Cipriano's assistant during the 1960-61 season while working on his Masters Degree in secondary education.

Potter played basketball at Idaho, graduating in 1960. After completing his eligibility, he coached one season of freshman basketball at Idaho. Dave Strack, now head coach at the University of Michigan, was then coach at Idaho.

For two years Potter served in the U. S. Army. There he coached the 1962-63 Ft. Hood (Tex.) team to an outstanding 56-10 season.

Potter is also in charge of eligibility and of tutoring for University of Nebraska athletes.

He is married to the former Mary Beckstead and they have three children: Lori, Steven and Jennifer.

## ED STEVENS

New to the Husker basketball staff this year is Ed Stevens, who replaces Bob Gates—athletic director at Pershing College in Beatrice.

Stevens was a graduate assistant on the Husker staff last year which continued his record of being connected with teams that have won 20 or more games in the last eight years.

A star player at Nebraska Wesleyan—he lettered three years in basketball and one in track—the Plainsman posted records of 20-8 and 23-4 during his junior and senior years. While in high school at Upton, Wyoming, he played on teams that won 20 or more games three straight years.

Following his graduation from Wesleyan he coached at Eagle-Alvo, near Lincoln, where his team had a 20-2 mark and was the highest scoring team in the state (83 ppg) during the 1963-64 season. The following year he skippered Madison to the runner-up spot in the State Class "B" Tournament with a 21-3 record.

Stevens is presently working on his doctorate degree in educational psychology. In addition to his coaching duties he helped to establish a chapter of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes at Nebraska, is executive director of the Extra Point Club and serves as freshman baseball coach.

Stevens is married to the former Linda Loewenstein of Shelton, Nebraska.



## HUSKERS 65-66 REVISITED

**Nebraska** opened the 1965-66 season by blasting Wisconsin 101-88 at Madison. The output for the Huskers set a new school scoring record. The Huskers returned to Lincoln to open the home season and tripped Oregon State, who later won the AAWU conference, 75-63. And fans were watching the best basketball team in 45 years at Nebraska develop.

California handed Nebraska its first loss of the season 87-71 with 70 per cent shooting from the field. The following night the Huskers avenged that loss with a 70-68 victory. Nebraska's record stood at 3-1.

Texas, South Dakota and Stanford fell at home to the Huskers before they headed for Kansas City to the 1965 Big Eight pre-season Tournament.

Missouri forced the Huskers into overtime in the first round but the Huskers squeezed a 69-67 victory. Nebraska bombed Oklahoma 92-79 and made it to the finals of the tournament for the first time in its twenty-year-history. But Kansas forced the Huskers to play their game and Nebraska lost 71-61.

**However the Huskers** showed their potential and for the first time in recent history were considered to be in the thick of the Big Eight race.

The Huskers opened the regular conference by edging Iowa State 76-74 in Ames. At home the Huskers trounced Missouri 82-60, the largest margin of victory of a Cipriano-coached Nebraska team.

The stiffest test for the Huskers was to be Kansas State, highly rated in some pre-season polls, but the Huskers ran up a twenty point lead at half-time and won 82-71. Kansas came to Lincoln, also undefeated in the Big Eight, but the Huskers scored their biggest victory of the season by downing the Jayhawks 83-75.

**Nebraska** moved into the national ratings for the first time in its basketball history.

Oklahoma and Oklahoma State succumbed to the Huskers in the first two games of a three game journey through Oklahoma. Oklahoma City piled a fifteen point advantage on the Huskers midway in the second half but Nebraska fought back, only to lose in overtime, 85-81. Iowa State, Missouri and Colorado were just stepping stones to the Big game of the year—Nebraska at Kansas. The Jayhawks needed this victory to stay in the race. And whether Nebraska lost by one or a hundred, the worst they would be is tied for first place. The Huskers were completely out of the contest and lost 110-73.

The Huskers rebounded the following week to beat K-State 79-69 before 8,333 wildly screaming fans. It was the first time Nebraska beat the Wildcats in both season games since 1935-36.

Colorado ruined Nebraska's chances of tying Kansas for the Big Eight title by beating the Huskers 95-88 in Boulder. But Nebraska's Cinderella team closed the season at home to trounce Oklahoma State 85-64, the most points ever scored against an Oklahoma State team.

Thomas is a solid all-around performer, and is particularly tough on defense and the boards. Best of the new-comers is 6-2 sophomore guard Rick Abrahamson, who figures to start with Jones at guard.

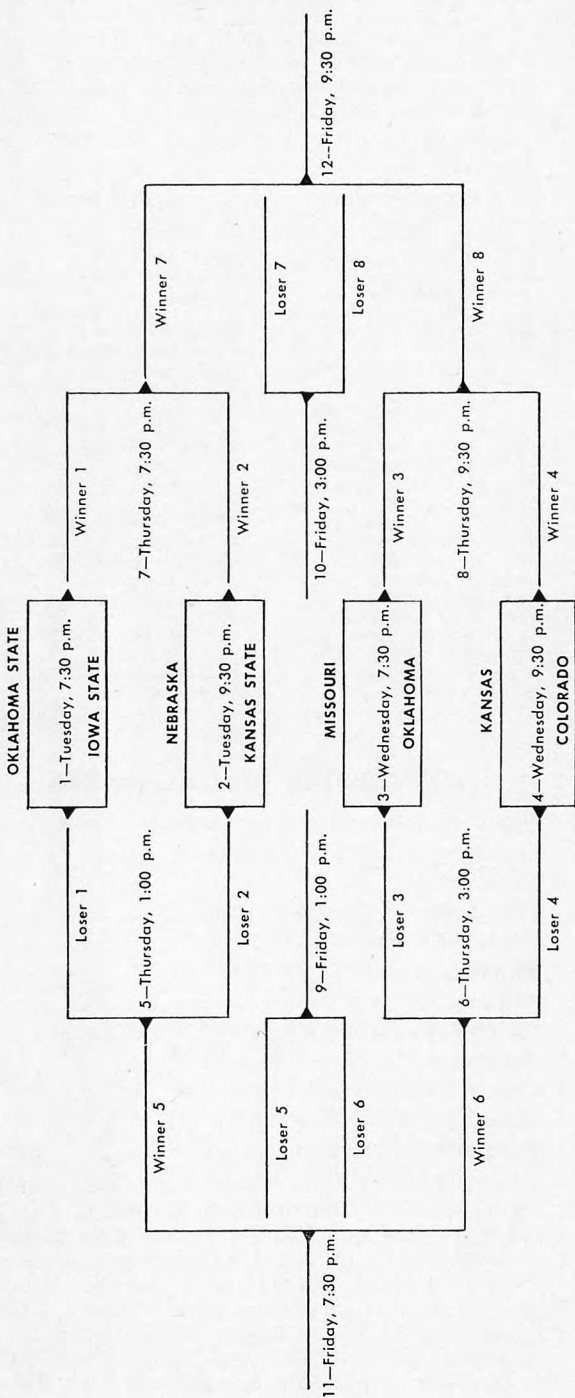

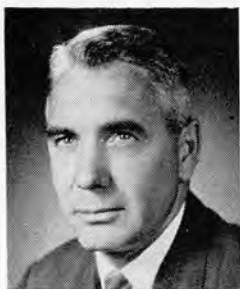

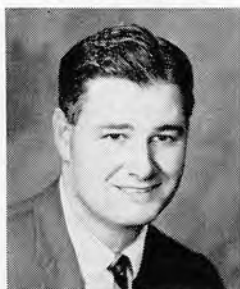

And unusual for a freshman team Nebraska will have some experience returning. Tom Line, who played the second semester of the 1965-66 season, returns to play for a semester of frosh ball before going Varsity.

**Last year's varsity** success enabled the Nebraska coaching staff to assemble the best freshman team in years for the Huskers, but Potter points out the aim of the freshman program:

"I think one thing should be kept in mind when trying to evaluate our freshman program—it isn't how many games we win or lose but how many players will be able to contribute to the varsity program in the future."

Founded in 1869 under terms of the Morrill Land-Grant Act, the University opened its doors in 1871 to 20 students and a faculty of seven.

In 1966 the University's enrollment skyrocketed to over 17,000 and a staff of nearly a thousand.

The University is composed of three campuses: the City and East Campuses in Lincoln and the Medical College Campus in Omaha.

Meeting the needs of the student population, the Board of Regents, the governing body of the University elected by the citizens of Nebraska, has authorized the expansion of the University with a massive building program.

New dormitories, classroom buildings, and additions to existing structures have sprouted on all three campuses. More are scheduled for the immediate future.

The University of Nebraska is building for the future, but for the present, the University continues to be a Midlands leader in the field of Education.
