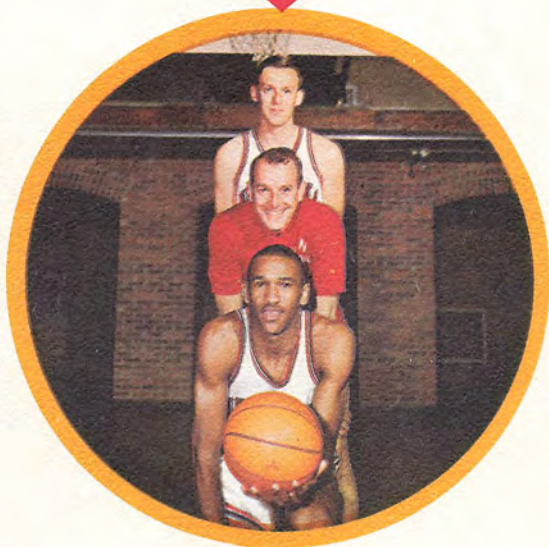

## AN OUTLOOK FOR 67-68

Hampered by the unfamiliar role as favorite in the Big Eight title race, Nebraska's 1966-67 team fell short of the title that was awarded them before the season began. And graduation of three top seniors should keep Nebraska off of the pre-season form charts for the title this year.

Gone are Nate Branch, Willie Campbell and Frank Empkey. Branch finished his career as the second highest scorer in Husker history. Campbell was the Husker's strongest (and zippiest) post man and Empkey could be counted on for extra rebounds. So a lack of a strong and experienced center is Nebraska's biggest deficit.

But Nebraska should have one of the more potent scoring attacks of the Big Eight with the addition of sophomores Tom Scantlebury, Bob Gratopp, and Sam Martin to the varsity lineup. Scantlebury averaged 28.2 points per game as a frosh, the best in Nebraska history.

Veterans Tom Baack and Stuart Lantz, either of which is almost certain to break the all-time Nebraska scoring record, will form the backbone of the 67-68 squad, along with five other returning lettermen. Lantz will move over to the forward position, vacating his guard spot to any of the many top guards listed on the Big Red roster. Roger Leitner, 6-6 junior from McCook, Neb., is another top forward prospect. Included in the multitude of fast, agile guards are senior two-year lettermen Ron Simmons and Jim Damm. And Fred Hare, Omaha Tech's fabulous product, will return this year after a year's absence.

Hare, a Husker letterman as a sophomore and junior, had to sit out last season for a couple of knee operations. And there was apprehension about his being able to resume his cage career. But the former Omaha Tech ace worked all summer to build up the knee and now is coming fast.

The Nebraska coaching staff has installed a half-court press to go along with the already famous Nebraska full-court press which has bothered many an opponents offense. The new press is designed to give Nebraska some alternative if it appears the full press is not immediately effective.

But the major defensive problem will be rebounding. This has always been a problem for the Huskers, who do not feature one extremely tall center to rely on for rebounds. There are enough scrappy players to fight for rebounds.

One thing is certain about the Huskers this year: Coach Joe Cipriano knew about any problems they may have long before the pre-season practice began. A special tour of Mexico, sponsored by the Mexican Federation of Basketball, enabled the Nebraskans to play as a unit for six weeks this summer.

# ROBERT S. DEVANEY

## Athletic Director and Head Football Coach

Bob Devaney, the nation's winningest football coach, took on the added duties of Athletic Director when he moved into his sixth season at the Cornhusker helm.

Devaney, who has a lifetime coaching mark of 88-22-5, with a fantastic 51-9 regular season record and five straight bowl bids to his Nebraska credit, was named last spring to succeed Tipy Dye as athletic director. Dye moved to a similar position at Northwestern University.



The genial and extremely humorous Devaney has averaged nine wins a season since coming to Nebraska. In succession his teams have reeled off marks of 8-2, 9-1, 9-1, 10-0, 9-1 and 6-4, as well as playing twice in the Orange Bowl and once in

the Gotham, Cotton and Sugar Bowls.

Last year the busy Irishman took the favored Huskers to nine straight wins before Oklahoma upset them, 10-9, in the final seconds. With a fourth straight Big 8 title sacked up, the Cornhuskers accepted an invitation to again meet Alabama in the Sugar Bowl. There the No. 6-ranked Huskers were socked, 34-7, by the high-flying unbeaten Crimson Tide.

Devaney came to Nebraska as a successor to Bill Jennings early in 1962 and promptly proceeded to set a football-wacky state—even during the lean years—on its ear. The enthusiasm created by the Devaney football has mushroomed throughout Nebraska—the fans wear red, follow the Huskers on the road in droves and clamor so loudly for tickets that Memorial Stadium was expanded for the third time in 1966 to boost Nebraska's seating capacity to more than 64,000, tops in the Big 8.

In addition to his coaching genius—and Devaney is quick to award sincere credit to his veteran staff of assistants—the Nebraska coach is a highly-sought after-dinner speaker, clinic lecturer and off-the-cuff humorist.

Prior to becoming head coach at Wyoming, Devaney was an assistant to Biggie Munn and Duffy Daugherty at Michigan State, following a great career as a Michigan prep coach.

Bob and his wife, Phyllis, have two children—Mike and Patricia—both 1966 graduates of the University of Nebraska.

# NEBRASKA COACHES

## JOE CIPRIANO

Nebraska basketball coach Joe Cipriano has a reputation for getting the job done—something he's proved both as a player and a coach.

Cipriano came to Nebraska in 1963 when Cornhusker cage fortunes were at a low-ebb. Nebraska Athletic Director Tippy Dye, who had coached "Slippery Joe" during his fabulous career at the University of Washington, gave Cipriano the rebuilding task.



Three years later Cipriano had built the team that Nebraska fans had been waiting for. For in the 1965-66 cage season the Huskers finished their best in 45 years.

Cipriano came to Nebraska from Idaho where his teams posted a rebuilding trail much like Nebraska's: 10-16, 13-13 and 20-6 records. With his four year record at Nebraska (7-18, 10-15, 20-5 and 16-9) Cipriano's won-lost record broke in the winning percentage with 96 victories and 82 defeats.

Playing for Dye at Washington, Cipriano led the Huskies to three straight Pacific Coast division titles and one loop crown. Later he served as player-coach of the AAU Buchan Bakers which toured Europe, Hawaii, and the Far East. After a short term at high school coaching Cipriano returned to Washington as freshman coach on Dye's staff.

Cipriano is married to his high school and college sweetheart, the former Arleen Johnson, and they have three children, Randy, Tamsen, Janice.

## GLENN POTTER

Glenn Potter came to Nebraska with head coach Joe Cipriano in 1963. He is now serving as freshman coach and helps coach the varsity.



His 1966-67 freshman team was one of the best in Nebraska history. The 6-2 record was highlighted by a high-scoring offensive machine.

Potter and Cipriano were associated at the University of Idaho when Cipriano was head coach there. Potter served as Cipriano's assist-



ant during the 1960-61 season while working on his Masters Degree in secondary education.

Potter played basketball at Idaho, graduating in 1960. After completing his eligibility, he coached one season of freshman basketball at Idaho. Dave Strack, now head coach at the University of Michigan, was then coach at Idaho.

For two years Potter served in the U. S. Army. There he coached the 1962-63 Ft. Hood (Tex.) team to an outstanding 56-10 season.

Potter is also in charge of eligibility and of tutoring for University of Nebraska athletes.

He is married to the former Mary Beckstead and they have three children: Lori, Steven and Jennifer.

## BILL HARRELL

One of the outstanding high school coaches in the nation is the new assistant basketball coach at the University of Nebraska.



Bill D. Harrell, former athletic director and head basketball coach at Shelby County High School in Shelbyville, Ky., fills the post vacated by Ed Stevens, who resigned to become head coach at Augustana College.

Harrell's 11-year coaching record shows 244 victories and 82 losses. During the past four years his teams have won 106 and lost only 16 games. The 38-year-old graduate of Kentucky Wesleyan has produced 23 championship teams, including the Kentucky State title in 1966, the Louisville Invitational in 1956, four regional and six district titles.

Harrell, who has a Master's Degree from the University of Kentucky, twice has won Kentucky Coach of the Year honors—in 1965 and 1966—awarded by the prep coaches association.

He won the National Pepsi Coach of the Year title in 1966, and has won Associated Press and United Press International Coach of the Year honors in 1965 and 1966. The Louisville Courier Journal also named him Coach of the Year in both 1965 and 1966.

Harrell coached the United States All Stars in the Dapper Dan Classic in 1966, winning the game, 114-106.

The new Cornhusker coach is married to the former Gloria Seale, and has a 12-year-old daughter, Peggy Lynn.

Cal State Fullerton Titans are entering their 8th season of basketball competition, as is their veteran coach Alex Omalev. Omalev's record is 90-99, which is excellent considering he started from scratch and experienced a horrendous 1-25 season back in 1964-1965.

Counting his Fullerton Junior College coaching record, Omalev is 351-176 career-wise and has experienced only three losing seasons out of 18.

Last year's mark was 9-16 and this year the Titans have only two returning

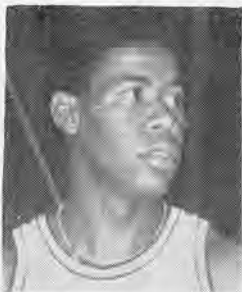
lettermen, center Dick Holiday (6-5 senior) and forward Ed Palmquist (6-4 senior). Missing from last year's squad is guard Roland Owens, who re-wrote many of the Titan scoring records with a 20-point average over two seasons.

JC transfers may make or break the club as Omalev greeted 10, two of whom were starters last year. They were, Steve Howe (6-7 forward) from Cerritos and Joe Ware (6-5 forward) from Long Beach CC.

Up from the frosh squad is a promising giant, 6-11 John Christian, a native Fullerton lad who is being groomed for center.

This will be the Titans first year in league, having joined the California Collegiate Athletic Association (CAA).

Cal State's greatest season was 1962-1963 when Omalev guided the Titans to the NAIA quarter final in Kansas City. For the year, CSF was 24-7.

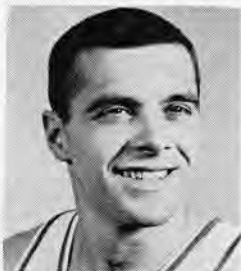

Michigan State figures to be down from surprising 1966-67 club which came off a slow start in December to play well in the Big Ten and claim a conference co-championship with Indiana.

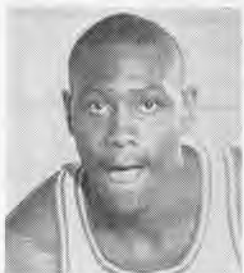
Ace center Matthew Aitch, regular forward Art Baylor and key reserve guard Shannon Reading are lost plus three other letterwinners.

The Sooners' defense badly needs revamping. In the last five years, they have ranked eighth and last in the Big Eight Conference in defense four times. The fifth they rated seventh. The fourth, but twice the Sooners finished last in the conference never fell below standings and once they were sixth.

Oklahoma's 1967-68 rebuilding program begins with Don Sidle, the Sooners' first All-American in 20 years. A slick 6-8 center, Sidle has quickness, speed, a good tip shot and a fine outside shot from around the key. He led the defensive-minded Big Eight in scoring with a 24.9-point average and ranked second in rebounding last season. But even Sidle must improve greatly, MacLeod thinks.

## Basketball Wrap-Up for 66-67

Although the Nebraska Cornhuskers fell short of the pre-season ratings that were given them, they nevertheless provided fans and foes alike with enough excitement, and in the end, enough victories to generate another winning season. Thus Nebraska has posted back-to-back victorious campaigns for the first time since the late 1940's.

Non-conference foes were the early victims of the Huskers. Oregon, Washington State and Pacific (a team which won all of its games after losing to the Huskers and finished the season in the NCAA District finals pressing undefeated and future national champion UCLA) fell at the Coliseum. Wyoming, Nebraska's only early season road game, was the first to break open the famed full court press employed by Cipriano and the Huskers fell by four points, 102-98.

The tournament schedule for the Huskers proved to be anything but satisfactory as an inspired LaSalle club whipped the Big Red in the opening round of the Vanderbilt Invitational, 99-76. The Huskers regained enough composure to edge Portland 71-69 the following night.

Still regarded as the conference favorite, Nebraska headed for the conference tournament in Kansas City with title aspirations. But Kansas State put a different outlook on the upcoming conference season by trouncing Nebraska 99-81 in the opening game of the tournament. A victory over Oklahoma State put Nebraska against Colorado in the consolation finals. But the Buffs overcame a second half Nebraska lead and eventually beat them by seven points.

By this time the Big Red looked a little pink.

But somewhere between the last game of the tournament and the first game of the conference season, Nebraska found itself. (Maybe it was the 25-point victory over the Swedish Internationals in the Coliseum exhibition game.)

Nebraska's quest for the Big Eight title began with a trip to Oklahoma. Oklahoma State tried its slowdown version of the game to beat the Huskers, but it didn't work—Nebraska won 67-57. But Oklahoma proved that the best way to beat the Huskers is to use their own techniques: run with the ball and put it through the hoop. The Sooners took one from Nebraska that proved to be costly by winning 99-87.

However, a three game stand at the Coliseum oiled the Nebraska machine as Big Eight opponents were handled in a mechanical fashion. Colorado, although stubborn, finally succumbed 84-80. Oklahoma felt the revenge of the Big Red as the Sooners were obliterated 97-98. Missouri felt the sting of a potent offense and Nebraska rolled past the Tigers 99-82.

These three victories gave Nebraska enough momentum to beat Kansas State at Manhattan for the third straight year. The Huskers were always in control of the game and won 67-59. But Kansas broke the victory string by pounding Nebraska 84-58.

Iowa State fell to Nebraska twice on successive weekends. The Cyclones, finishing second to Kansas in the Big Eight tourney, could only be regarded as spoilers in the conference race after falling 94-82 and 76-65 to the Big Red.

Kansas State invaded the Coliseum still in the race but left as losers again. Thus the Wildcats were tamed for another year, 79-71.

Missouri, at home, almost proved their ability to upset anyone, by piling a ten point advantage on the Huskers, but the Nebraskans pulled away in the second half and won 80-73.

The game of the year was still to be played—Kansas at the Coliseum. Gov. Norbert Tiemann proclaimed it “jar the Jayhawks Day”; it was a special Centennial Game to help celebrate Nebraska's birthday. But Kansas won 64-57 after Nebraska battled to stay in the game until the closing minute.

It now seemed evident that Nebraska would fall short of the title that was so easily handed to them in the pre-season ratings, but not without a long and grueling effort.

Nebraska beat Oklahoma State for the third time by scoring the most points ever on a Cowboy team. The score was 88-71.

Second place in the conference was to be shared by Nebraska and Colorado after the Buffs squeaked by the Huskers 64-57 in a game much like the Kansas affair, to end the regular season.

Yet Nebraska had one thing that other Big Eight teams didn't have: a bid to the National Invitational Tournament in New York City. But this didn't exactly close the season with a flourish either. Marshall University entered the Nebraska record book by scoring the most points on a Husker team, 119 to be exact. But the game helped to establish some records for the Huskers themselves. And the season ended with a 16-9 record. Not a complete success as far as the Big Eight title was concerned; but still an exciting season for fans to remember.

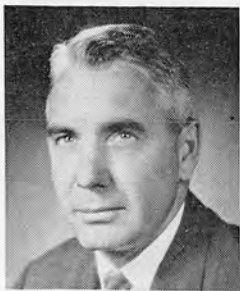
