





Located on the State Fairgrounds, the structure, originally a \$12 million project, but increased to \$13 million by interest on bonds, houses facilities for basketball, indoor track, swimming, wrestling and gymnastics, as well as State Fair functions and a host of other activities.

The basketball arena is above and the athletic offices are located under the south stands along with basketball locker areas. Dressing areas for track, wrestling, swimming and gymnastics as well as a practice area for wrestling are situated under the west stands at the left end of the arena.

Who'll Play for the Huskers? Rubic's Cube Might be Simpler

All during the offseason, second-year Nebraska head basketball coach Moe Iba was telling anyone who would listen that his biggest problem in 1981-82 was going to be how to blend a squad made up of seven returning veterans and seven recruits, four of whom were junior college transfers and had to be counted on to provide immediate help.

"That's the biggest problem we have," he said, referring to the makeup of the squad. "We're concerned with the unity of the team in terms of getting people to play well together. It'll be very interesting to see how we can come together as a team early—and IF we're able to."

After practice started Oct. 15 and as the season neared, Iba said he had to be impressed with the effort put forward by the team, and was even a little pleased with the way the players executed the offense. A not altogether unforeseen problem which developed, though, was, who was going to play with whom. Rubic's Cube might have been an easier puzzle to solve.

As late as a week before the Huskers' season opener at Wyoming, Nov. 27, Iba and his staff were still looking at nine players to fill five spots.

The area where the lineup was the most settled was the backcourt, where only three players, senior lettermen Jack Moore and Ray Collins, and sophomore junior college transfer Handy Johnson, were battling for two positions.

Up front, things were a little more tangled. At center, a pair of 6-6 junior college transfers, Terry Smith and Lenard Johnson, were vying for the right to replace departed Big Eight most-valuable-player Andre Smith. At one forward, senior letterman Claude Renfro and junior letterman Greg Downing were waging a close fight, and at the other forward, it was senior letterman Jerry Shoecraft and junior letterman Kenny Walton who were competing for playing time.

The players with the biggest shoes to fill, obviously, are Terry Smith and Lenard Johnson. In Andre Smith (no relation to Terry), the Huskers lost their No. 2 all-time scorer (1,717 points), and the person who was the catalyst in two Big Eight runner-up finishes while earning back-to-back all-conference honors and player-of-

the-year plaudits from both major wire services in 1981. Both Terry Smith (who will wear Andre's old No. 40 jersey) and Johnson had fine juco years last year, Smith scoring 20.8 points and grabbing 11.0 rebounds per game at Moberly, Mo., Junior College, and Johnson getting 16.1 points and 10.1 rebounds per game at rival Jefferson, Mo., College. Johnson also had 84 blocked shots and 66 assists. Another juco transfer who could provide depth is 6-10 Victor Chacon (Southeastern Iowa).

Iba's forwards for 1981-82 are basically the same players who manned the spots on last year's 15-12 team. Walton, 6-5, is the No. 2 returning scorer at 8.3 points per game and is the top returning rebounder at 4.9 per game. His main competition, the 6-5 Shoecraft, was a starter most of his sophomore year in 1979-80, but lost his job to Walton early last year and finished with 3.1 points and 2.9 rebounds per game.

On the other side of center, the 6-2 Downing figures to be a factor, despite his lack of height. As a sophomore last year, he moved into the starting lineup the last six games when Collins (playing forward then) went down with a broken foot. Downing finished the year with 4.7 and 3.5 scoring and rebounding averages, and shot an excellent .870 from the free throw line—but must improve .397 field goal shooting. If the 6-6 Renfro can improve somewhat defensively, he could be a fine all-around player. Appearing in 21 games last year, he averaged 3.0 points and 1.9 rebound.

Two other people who have to be kept in mind up front are 6-6 freshmen John Matzke and Trent Scarlett. In early practices, Husker coaches were impressed with both players' ability to pick up the difficult Nebraska system.

The Huskers figure to be stronger in the backcourt than anywhere else, despite the loss of starter Mike Naderer. The playmaking Moore returns for his third year as a starter with only 139 points separating him from becoming Nebraska's 10th career 1,000-point scorer. The 5-9 hustler is also the best free throw shooter in Nebraska and Big Eight history. After a junior season that saw him finish second in the nation with a .922 percentage, he has a career mark of .887—the sixth-best in NCAA history and just .022 below the NCAA record.

Like Moore, the 6-3 Collins is a three-year letterman, and he seems not to be bothered by last year's injury which put a premature end to a season that saw him average 7.1 points and 2.4 rebounds per game. At the time he went down at Colorado, Feb. 11, the Huskers were in the process of winning their sixth-straight game and were hanging on to the Big Eight lead with a 7-2 mark.

After his injury, Nebraska lost three out of five, finished in a tie for second, and was eliminated from the conference's post-season tournament in the first round.

Despite the accomplishments of Moore and Collins, though, neither was a sure bet to start ahead of the talented Handy Johnson. Johnson, 6-1, averaged 19.0 points and 6.0 assists per game at Southeastern Iowa CC last year, while hitting 80 percent from the free throw line. Iba calls him one of the best long-range shooters the Huskers have ever brought in. Another guard who doesn't yet fit in with the first three, but could be a valuable player off the bench is 6-1 freshman Brett Hughes.

All-in-all, the Huskers have their share of pluses—talented guards, experienced forwards, and some promising recruits. But Iba, a two-time Big Eight coach-of-the-year, also faces some problems—lack of height, inexperience at center, and the task of melding his seven old players and seven new players into a single, efficient unit. There's nothing he can do this season about the first problem, and little he can do about the second. How well the third problem is solved during the 12-game non-conference schedule should be a good barometer about the Huskers' Big Eight prospects in January and February.



Two-time Big Eight Coach-of-the-Year

MOE IBA Head Coach

Moe Iba enters his full first season as Nebraska's head basketball coach in 1981-82 after serving nearly all of the last two years as either assistant or acting head coach. His two years in "limbo" were anything but unproductive, however, as he guided the Huskers to two second-place ties in the Big Eight and twice earned United Press International's Big Eight Coach-of-the-Year honors—sharing it, and the Associated Press award, with his late predecessor, Joe Cipriano, in 1980.

Iba, in effect, took the Husker's reins prior to the 1979-80 season when it was learned that Cipriano had cancer, and that year guided a team which had been picked for sixth place in the Big Eight to an 18-13 overall finish (8-6 in the conference) and a National Invitation Tournament berth. Last year, he coached a small, underrated team to a break-even record (6-6) through a rugged non-conference schedule that included six eventual NCAA Tournament entries, then took the Huskers to a 9-5 Big Eight mark before a loss to Colorado in the first round of the league tournament ended a 15-12 season.

Before becoming acting head coach last fall, Iba spent 10 years as a Cipriano assistant. Prior to joining the Huskers in 1971-72, he was the head coach at Memphis State for four years, where he compiled a 37-65 record, and took the 1966-67 Tigers to the NIT.

The son of famed former Oklahoma State and U.S. Olympic Team Coach Henry P. Iba, Moe started at guard for his father at OSU for three years and developed a reputation as the best long-range shooter in the Big Eight. After his graduation in 1962, he spent four years as an assistant to Don Haskins at Texas Western (now Texas-El Paso) where his freshman teams went 64-9, and the players he helped develop won the NCAA title in 1966.

Moe is married to the former Cindy Jones and they have three sons, Brett and Greg, who attend Nebraska, and Blake.

TOM BAACK
Assistant Coach

Tom Baack, former Nebraska basketball standout under Joe Cipriano from 1965-68, begins his fifth year on the Huskers' staff and his fourth year as an assistant coach.

A three-year, 6-5 starting forward at Nebraska, Baack was the Huskers' all time leading scorer with 1,293 points, until Jerry Fort (1972-76) broke that mark with 1,882 points. He now ranks fourth behind Fort, Andre Smith and Carl McPipe.

Born in North Platte, Neb., Baack worked for the National Bank of Commerce in Lincoln for four years following his graduation from the University in 1968. He then was a graduate assistant (1972-74) at Brigham Young University, under Glenn Potter, who was an assistant coach under Cipriano from 1963-70. From 1974-77, Baack was assistant basketball and head track coach at Green Mountain High School in Lakewood, Colo.

Baack is married to the former Paula Morris. They have a son, Paul.



CHARLIE SPOONHOUR
Assistant Coach

A new addition to head coach Moe Iba's staff is Charlie Spoonhour, who joined the Huskers last spring after six highly successful seasons at Southeastern Community College in West Burlington, Iowa. At SECC, three of Spoonhour's teams went to the NJCAA Tournament—1976 (29-5 and a fifth-place finish), 1979 (31 wins, eighth place), and 1981 (26-8, 12th place)—and he three times was named regional coach-of-the-year.

A 1961 graduate of the College of the Ozarks, Spoonhour is no stranger to the Big Eight, having assisted Joe Ramsey at Oklahoma in 1974-75 before going on to SECC.

Spoonhour started his coaching career with seven years at Missouri high schools before going to Southwest Missouri State as an assistant from 1968-72, where he helped produce one team which finished second in the NCAA's Division II. From 1972-74, he was head coach at Moberly, Mo., Junior College, where his 1973-74 squad finished third in the NJCAA tourney and he was named regional coach-of-the year.



RANDY CIPRIANO
Assistant Coach

The newest member of the Nebraska coaching staff carries one of the best-known names in Husker basketball history. Randy Cipriano, son of the late Joe Cipriano, who coached the Huskers for 17 years before his death in November 1980, joined Coach Moe Iba's staff as a part-time assistant last summer after one year as head coach at Ogallala, Neb., High School.

The young Cipriano was a standout guard for Coach Wally McNaught at Lincoln Southeast High School before going on to an excellent career under Coach Jerry Hueser at Kearney State College.

In four years as KSC, the last three as a starter, Cipriano scored 1,039 points and set Antelope season and career assist marks of 150 and 329. As a senior in 1978-79, he was team captain, second-team All-NAIA District 11, first-team Omaha World-Herald and Lincoln Journal-Star all-state college, and first-team All-Central States Conference. The crowning achievement of his career, though, was probably in the 1978 NAIA Tournament when he led the Antelopes to the finals and won the Hustle Award, as well as all-tourney honors.

After an outstanding four-year career as a guard for the Huskers, Mike Naderer will remain with Coach Moe Iba as a graduate assistant in 1981-82.

In his four years at Nebraska, Naderer played in 113 of a possible 115 games (starting 87), and ended up with 797 career points for a 7.1 per-game average. A consistent outside shooter, he hit 273 of 576 career field goal attempts for a .474 percentage, and was an outstanding free throw shooter with an .820 career mark. A good ball-handler, he also passed out 214 career assists.

Naderer came to Nebraska from Arcadia High School in Scottsdale Ariz., where he was all-city (Phoenix) three times, all-state twice, and as a senior was named Arizona player-of-the-year.



1981-82—Once again figures to play both guard and small forward for the Huskers.

1980-81—Played in all 27 Husker games, starting two in the non-conference season, then starting the final six when Ray Collins broke his foot at Colorado. Averaged 4.7 points and 3.5 rebounds for the season while hitting .870 from the free throw line (20 of 23), but was just .397 from the field (54 of 136). Equalled his career best of 10 points in NU's 79-59 win over Northwest Missouri State, Dec. 20. Has played in all 58 games since coming to Nebraska.

1979-80—Greg averaged 3.1 points and 2.3 rebounds in an alternate role. He did start two of 31 games and played 471 minutes. His bests were 10 points against California-Bakersfield on Dec. 13 and against Oklahoma on Jan. 30, both in Lincoln. In Big Eight action, Greg averaged 3.6 points and 3.1 rebounds.

At Central High School

1976-79—For his efforts at Central he was named Co-Mr. Basketball for the state of Minnesota following the 1979 season. The Hertz Corporation also named him the No. 1 Athlete in the state of Minnesota. As a senior, he averaged 24 points and 10 rebounds a game, while leading Central to the Minnesota State Class AA large school championship. He scored a school record 1,336 points in a career. During his three years at Central under coach Jim Hastings the school was 64-6.

At Nebraska

1981-82—Has played both guard and forward during his career, and figures to do so again as a senior.

1980-81—Started the Huskers' first 21 games before breaking a bone in his foot in Nebraska's 57-56 win at Colorado, Feb. 11. Before the injury, he had averaged 7.1 points and 2.3 rebounds per game, while hitting .429 from the field and .708 from the line. He had game highs of 15 points in NU's 69-46 win over Montana, Dec. 23, and six rebounds in a 62-54 win over Oklahoma State, Feb. 7, that drew a Sports Center record crowd of 15,038. Scored in double figures five times, three of those against NCAA Tournament teams—13 vs. Wyoming and Idaho, 12 vs. Utah. Huskers were 7-2 and leading Big Eight, and had won six in a row when he was injured.

1979-80—Ray averaged 5.3 points (sixth best on the team) and 1.7 rebounds. He started 15 of 30 games (most at forward) and played 625 minutes. He was hampered for much of the season with an injured foot. He scored a career-high 16 points against Missouri, Jan. 12, in Lincoln and had four rebounds on six occasions. In 14 Big Eight games, he averaged 4.1 points and 1.2 rebounds.

1978-79—As a freshman reserve, Collins played in 16 games overall and averaged 1.4 points a game, while also participating in seven league games, and getting 1.1 points a game. His bests for the season were against Cal State-Sacramento, Dec. 13, in Lincoln (NU 91-CS 56), when he got eight points and three rebounds.

At Mendel Catholic High School

1974-78—As a prepster under Coach Mike Flaherty, Collins led the Chicago Catholic League in scoring his senior season with a 22 point average, while also garnering 10 rebounds a game. As a senior, he earned first-team all area and all-state. Led

At Nebraska

1981-82—Moore returns for his senior year (his third as a starter), as the sixth-best free-thrower in NCAA history and with an eye on breaking the school and Big Eight career free throw percentage records, and becoming the Huskers' 10th career 1,000-point scorer. In his first three years, he made 323 of 364 free throw attempts for an .887 percentage, well ahead of the NU and conference record of .836 set by Tom Baack (now a Husker assistant coach) from 1965-68. He also enters his final year with 861 career points, which rank him 13th on Nebraska's all-time scoring chart.

1980-81—He averaged 12.6 points per game (second on the team behind the departed Andre Smith), while hitting .502 from the field and setting a school record by connecting on 118 of 128 free throws for a .922 percentage. That ranked him second in the nation in free-throw percentage behind Portland State's Dave Hildahl (.927) and broke the Huskers' single-season record of .870 which he had set the previous season. He also led the team in assists for the second-straight year with 108 (4.0 per game), made 36 steals, committed only 1.8 turnovers per game while doing the bulk of the ball handling—and even blocked four shots. Jack was perfect from the free throw line in 14 of Nebraska's 27 games last year, including 14-of-14 vs. Wyoming, 8-of-8 vs. Colorado, and 6-of-6 vs. Creighton, Loyola-Marymount, Colorado State and Missouri. He led the Huskers in scoring on six occasions, and each time, Nebraska either won or lost to an NCAA Tournament team—18 vs. Wyoming, 18 vs. Creighton, 21 vs. Penn State, 16 vs. Utah, 25 vs. Oklahoma (one short of his career high vs. Alabama-Birmingham in 1979-80), and 16 vs. Missouri. He scored in double figures 17 times, including a 20-point performance in a 66-53 homecourt win over Big Eight champ Missouri.

1979-80—Jack was the Huskers' No. 2 scorer (14.8) and was credited with a total of 145 assists and 42 steals. He started 30 of 31 games and played 1,143 minutes, tops

on the team. His bests were a career-high 26 points against Alabama-Birmingham on Dec. 22 in Lincoln and six rebounds against Kansas State in Lincoln on Feb. 20. In the NCAA, he was the country's 16th best free throw shooter (184-211, .872). In the Big Eight, he averaged 14.1 points and was credited with 53 assists and 16 steals. Overall, in the league, he was the No. 8 scorer (14.8), No. 1 free throw shooter (.872) and No. 4 in assists (4.7) and steals (1.4). In the Big Eight for 14 conference games, he was the No. 10 scorer (14.1), No. 9 free throw shooter (.826), No. 6 in assists (3.8) and No. 7 in steals (1.1). Scored over 20 points on six occasions—26, Alabama-Birmingham; 22, Wisconsin; 21, South Dakota State, Oklahoma and Kansas State; and 20, Louisville. For his efforts he was an AP honorable mention All American, Basketball Weekly honorable mention All-Midwest, UPI second team All Big Eight and AP honorable mention All-Big Eight. Also in the league, he was a first team Academic performer (3.14—accounting), a first-team All-Big Eight Postseason Tourney performer (21 points, one rebound, two assists, one blocked shot and one steal in 40 minutes against Kansas State) and the Big Eight player-of-the-week for his 18 points and four assists against Oklahoma on Jan. 30, and 16 points against Missouri on Feb. 2.

1978-79—Used as a reserve, Jack played in 20 games overall and averaged 3.2 points and one assist. He also appeared in eight league games and averaged 0.4 points. His highs were 14 points against Arkansas Tech on Nov. 25 in Lincoln (NU 70-AT 59) and getting three rebounds on three different occasions.

At Muncie Central High School

1974-78—During his senior season at Muncie Central, Moore was 'Mr. Everything' as he and teammate Jerry Shoecraft led Central to the Indiana State Championship. During his senior campaign, Moore averaged 22 points, five assists and three steals a game. He was named the state tournament's Most Valuable Player and was tied for sixth on Indiana's All Tournament scoring chart with Oscar Robertson. Also awarded prestigious Trester Award following state tourney play. In his last year, he earned first team All Conference, All Sectional, All Regional and All State honors, and was also named by the Hertz Corporation as Indiana's No. 1 Athlete of the Year. After high school, he played on Indiana's All Star prep team that beat Kentucky's twice, as Moore scored 24 and 18 points, respectively. As a junior, he averaged 24 points and four assists a game and again earned first team All Conference, All Sectional, All Regional and All State honors. In his sophomore year, he got 14 points and three assists a contest, and as a starting freshman, he averaged 10 points a game. Prepped under Bill Harrell, a former NU assistant coach with Joe Cipriano. Also a fine prep baseball player.

CORNHUSKER BASKETBALL SCHOOL

More than 10,000 grade school, junior high, and high school athletes have attended the Cornhusker basketball school since it was started in June of 1964 by the late Nebraska basketball coach Joe Cipriano.

All participants are housed on the Nebraska campus and the school will run for five weeks, including five one week sessions. This year's camps are as follows: Boys (May 31-June 5); Boys Team Camp (June 7-12, June 14-19); Boys Elementary and Junior High Day Camp (June 21-26); and Girls (June 28-July 3).

Each day of camp consists of three two-hour sessions, designed to give each camper instructions in basic fundamentals, conditioning, and actual playing experience.

During each week of camp there will be one on one and three on three tournaments, along with free throw and shooting contests.

Nebraska was the first school in the Big Eight to begin a clinic of this type and former Husker standouts Sam Martin, Bob Gratopp, Chuck Jura, Jerry Fort and Bob Siegel were all part of the Cornhusker basketball school serving as instructors or participants.

The school is under the supervision of the Nebraska coaching staff, various high school coaches from around the state and senior graduates from the previous year Nebraska team.

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

Ronald W. Roskens, Ph.D.

Dr. Roskens has served as President of the University of Nebraska since April, 1977. Prior to that, he was Chancellor of the University of Nebraska at Omaha, a position he assumed on July 1, 1972.

He was born and raised on a farm near Spencer, Ia., and attended a one-room elementary school. Dr. Roskens earned both B.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of Northern Iowa at Cedar Falls, Iowa, and a Ph.D. from the University of Iowa. He received an LL.D. from Creighton University in 1978.

Among the many additional awards received by Dr. Roskens are the Outstanding Alumnus Award from the University of Northern Iowa, the Brotherhood Award from the National Conference of Christians and Jews and a National 4-H Alumnus Award. Listed in "Who's Who in America," Dr. Roskens, in October of 1978, was among the 100 persons selected as "Young Leaders of the Academy" by Change Magazine. Presently he serves on the Business-Higher Education Forum of the American Council on Education.

He and his wife, Lois, are parents of four children.

NEBRASKA'S CHANCELLOR & VICE PRESIDENT

Dr. Martin A. Massengale



Dr. Martin A. Massengale, 47, became Chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln on June 1, 1981.

Dr. Massengale came to Nebraska in 1976 from the University of Arizona. He joined the Arizona faculty in 1958 as assistant professor of agronomy. He was named head of the Department of Agronomy in 1966 and was named Associate Dean of the College of Agriculture and Associate Director of the Agriculture Experiment Station in 1974. He also served on the staff of the University of Wisconsin and Western Kentucky University.

A native of Monticello, Ky., Dr. Massengale holds a B.S. degree from Western Kentucky University and M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Wisconsin. He and his wife, Ruth, have two children—Jennifer, 12 and Alan, 15.

Dr. Massengale is recognized nationally and internationally as an agronomist and consultant on crops research, teaching, and administration. He has served as a consultant in the United States, Brazil, Mexico, Saudi Arabia, Indonesia, and the Soviet Union.

He is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the American Society of Agronomy. He is past president of the Crop Science Society of America. Dr. Massengale was named one of the Outstanding Educators of America, professor of the year in the College of Agriculture at the University of Arizona, and received several awards from the Future Farmers of America.

The author or co-author of more than 70 technical articles and co-author of two books, his research emphasis is in the area of water use efficiency, photosynthate production, and cutting management for forage plants.

He is a member of Sigma Xi, Phi Kappa Phi, Alpha Zeta, Gamma Sigma Delta, Phi Sigma, and Gamma Alpha honor societies; the Nebraska Academy of Science, Arizona Academy of Science, National Association of Colleges and Teachers of Agriculture, American Society of Plant Physiology, and is a past president of the Western Society of Crop Science. He is a certified professional crop scientist and a certified professional agronomist.

Big Eight Faculty Representative

DR. KEITH L. BROMAN

Dr. Keith L. Broman is in his 10th year as the Big Eight Faculty Representative for the University of Nebraska. He is the Big Eight faculty representative to the College Football Association serving as secretary of that group. He is the 1980-81 secretary of the Big Eight faculty representatives.

After graduating from South Bend, Indiana, Central in June of 1940, Dr. Broman attended Indiana University for three years, and received Navy V-12 training at Berea in 1943-1944. He entered the Harvard Graduate School of Business and served as Assistant Supply Officer, NAS Coco Solo, from 1945 to 1946.

He returned to Harvard following this tour of duty with the Navy and received the MBA from Harvard in 1947. From 1947 to 1951, he was instructor at Ohio University, then he came to Lincoln where he served on the Nebraska faculty until 1954. The next year was spent as an assistant professor at the University of Wisconsin.

He received the Ph.D. from Nebraska in 1955 and returned to the NU faculty as an Associate Professor of Business Organization until he advanced to the status of full professor in 1963. In 1968, he was named Chairman of the Department of Finance at NU, retiring from this position in 1978. In 1979 he was recognized by receiving a distinguished teaching award from UNL.

Dr. Broman is a member of the First Presbyterian Church which he serves as a member of the Foundation Board and Elder. In the past, he has been a Clerk of Session, Deacon and member of the Board of Trustees. Dr. Broman is also a member of the American Finance Association, American Accounting Association, Midwest Business Administration, Beta Gamma Sigma and Delta Sigma Pi. He is a retired Commander of the Supply Corps, U.S. Naval Reserves, and serves as a consultant for Investment Education & Practice.

Dr. Broman and his wife, Ruth, formerly Ruth Jane DuBois, have been married since 1944. They have two daughters, Rebecca Ann Cross, and Lisa Marie, who is a law student at Nebraska. He has two granddaughters, Katy and Kelly.



FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA

A Brief History—

The University of Nebraska, now an institution of three major components—the University of Nebraska $\frac{3}{4}$ Lincoln, the University of Nebraska at Omaha and University of Nebraska Medical Center, Omaha—and a collection of agricultural experiment stations and related offices across the state, was chartered by the Nebraska Legislature in 1869 and held its first classes in 1871 in a 3-story brick building on the outskirts of Lincoln.

At its chartering, the University was committed to instruct in agriculture, the “mechanic arts,” and military tactics by the terms of the Land-Grant College Act of 1862 to which the Legislature subscribed. These special endeavors, however, were made parts of the total University program with the result that Nebraska, unlike some of its neighbors, has had but one major institution of higher education.

The early years were fraught with internal ideological conflicts, with financial problems and with shortages of collegiate students. The University not only survived without interruption, it managed to establish the first program of graduate education west of the Mississippi in the mid-1880s. By 1909 it had attained membership in the select Association of American Universities, a tribute to the high quality of its faculty and scholastic programs.

The University of Nebraska $\frac{3}{4}$ Lincoln now has eight Colleges, plus four Schools and many other programs. Thirty-nine doctoral level, 61 masters, 110 undergraduate and 15 pre-professional areas of study are offered.

Lack of financial support forced the University in 1888 to close the Medical College it had opened in Lincoln five years earlier. In 1902, the University reentered the field of medical education, taking over the Omaha Medical College. This became the University of Nebraska Medical Center in Omaha.

Since the adoption of the Nebraska constitution in 1875, the University has been governed by an elected Board of Regents. In 1968, pursuant to legislative action and a city-wide election in Omaha, the Board of Regents was made responsible for governance of the former municipal University of Omaha, renamed the University of Nebraska at Omaha. In 1970, the number of regents was increased from six to eight. This number was increased again in 1974, when a representative of the student body from each of the three campuses became a non-voting member.

In 1971, the chief executive officer of the University was given the title of President. The executive heads of the three components, the University of Nebraska $\frac{3}{4}$ Lincoln, the University of Nebraska at Omaha, and the University of Nebraska Medical Center, were accorded the titles of chancellor and Vice President.

Points of Interest on Campus—

Museum—The University of Nebraska State Museum has an outstanding collection of fossil mammals and is world renowned for its Elephant Hall. There are galleries of health science, Nebraska wildlife, zoology, geology and anthropology. In addition to its exhibits on three floors of Morrill Hall at 14th and U, the museum has extensive research collections in Nebraska Hall.

Art—The Sheldon Memorial Art Gallery has one of the finest collections on a university campus. Its sculpture garden is also one of the finest in the nation.

Music—School of Music students and faculty perform regularly in Kimball Recital Hall and throughout the state. There is an active schedule of concerts by

University choral and instrumental groups, musical theatre productions and a wide range of musical and dance events by visiting artists.

Theatre—During the school year there are periodic performances by University companies in Howell Memorial and Studio Theatres. A repertory group performs throughout the summer months.

Nebraska Unions—The social centers on each campus provide a variety of food service facilities and relaxation areas for students and visitors, house the placement center and offices for student organizations, book stores, bowling alleys, game rooms, TV rooms, record rooms, study rooms, and rooms for large meetings and social events.

Carillon Tower—Built in 1948, the gift of alumnus Ralph S. Mueller, the tower has become a symbol of the NU Lincoln campus. It houses a 2½ octave electronic English bells carillon, played on ceremonial occasions from a keyboard.

Historical Museum—The State Historical Society has its museum and library on the campus. It features Nebraska lore dating from early Indian relics.

Center for Continuing Education—Conference and hotel facilities at 33rd and Holdrege provide a site for hundreds of adult and youth meetings each year. Continuing education programs are planned by a professional staff. The Center was financed through a grant from the Kellogg Foundation and by public subscription.

Planetarium—Public sky shows are presented daily during the summer and on weekends during the school year. Special shows are also given to University classes and visiting school groups.

NEBRASKA ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATION

BOB DEVANEY

**Athletic Director
University of Nebraska**



One of the greatest coaches in the history of American football and a 1981 inductee into the College Football Hall of Fame, Bob Devaney is now devoting his vast energies toward supervision of the entire athletic program at the University of Nebraska. Devaney heads both the men's and women's athletic programs.

Nebraska has one of the finest athletic plants in the nation, thanks to Devaney's inspiration and leadership during the past 17 years.

Since Devaney became Athletic Director in 1967, Nebraska's Memorial Stadium has an enlarged to a capacity of 73,650—largest in the Big Eight—as well as an AstroTurf field, huge press box and scoreboard.

Since 1967, the Cornhuskers have a multi-purpose office building at the south end of Memorial Stadium, and they have an outdoor track facility (Ed Weir Stadium) and a new baseball park (Buck Beltzer Field) with an AstroTurf infield and grandstands.

Devaney also spear-headed a drive for the new multi-purpose complex that resulted in the Nebraska Legislature voting a cigarette tax to finance a 15,000-seat basketball arena, with adjacent swimming complex and indoor track plant. The result of his efforts was the Nebraska Sports Complex, which opened its doors in the fall of 1976. Besides the basketball arena, the NU Sports Complex, located on the Nebraska State Fairgrounds, houses a 220-yard synthetic track with seating for 4,500, a 25 meter x 25 yard swimming pool, and practice areas for the wrestling and gymnastics teams. In 1978, the Complex was renamed—by a vote of the Board of Regents—the Bob Devaney Sports Center.

Few coaches ever achieved the success Devaney did as headmaster of the Nebraska Cornhuskers from 1962 to 1972. During most of that span he was the "winningest coach in the nation," based on percentage of victories. He wound up with three straight Orange Bowl wins to go with his amazing record of nine bowl trips in 11 years, eight Big 8 titles, two national championships, two Outland Trophy winners, a Lombardi Trophy winner, a Heisman Trophy winner and numerous Coach of the Year and similar honors. Twice his teams won four straight Big Eight titles—1963-1966 and 1969-1972.

In his final season, Devaney's 1972 Huskers went 9-2-1 with a 40-6 win over Notre Dame in the Orange Bowl, and Bob led the nation's active coaches with a lifetime record of 136-30-7 for an .806 winning percentage. That year, too, Johnny

Rodgers won the Heisman Trophy and Rich Glover swept the Outland and Lombardi Trophies.

Devaney was named Coach of the Year by the Walter Camp Foundation, the Washington Touchdown Club and the Football Writers Association after Nebraska's Cornhuskers were undefeated in 13 games in 1971, sweeping to the national championship after winning the Game of the Century against Oklahoma, 35-31.

It was the second-straight national championship for Nebraska. The 1970 team was also undefeated (11-0-1), and during the span of 1969 to 1972, the Huskers went 32 games without a defeat. After Nebraska defeated LSU in the 1971 Orange Bowl game to win its first national title, former President Richard Nixon came to Lincoln to bestow a presidential plaque upon Devaney and co-captains Dan Schneiss and Jerry Murtaugh.

The Devaney Huskers reaped countless honors during those two years—AP and UPI trophies, the Grantland Rice Trophy, the MacArthur Bowl, Big 8 and Orange Bowl trophies and Coach of the Year by the Football News.

All Star games were old hat for Devaney who coached in many post-season classics such as the Hula Bowl, the Coaches All America, the All America Bowl, the Blue-Gray and the Shrine East-West. He also coached the College All Stars against the NFL Champion Dallas Cowboys in the 1972 Chicago game.

At Nebraska, Devaney's teams won 101, lost 20 and tied two in 11 years, following his 35-10-5 record at Wyoming. He never had a losing season at Nebraska and he directed three undefeated teams—in 1965, 1970 and 1971. In 11 years Devaney's teams went to nine post-season games, winning six and losing three. The Huskers played in the Gotham Bowl, Cotton Bowl, Sugar Bowl, Sun Bowl and four times in the Orange Bowl with Devaney at the helm.

Under Devaney's outstanding leadership, too, the Cornhuskers produced 22 All America players and 72 All Big Eight selections.

Devaney played football as an end at Alma College in Michigan, graduating with a B.S. in 1939.

DON BRYANT, Assistant Athletic Director and Sports Information Director

Don Bryant is serving his 19th year on the staff of the University of Nebraska Athletic Department.



Bryant serves as Assistant Athletic Director and Sports Information Director for the Cornhuskers. He served as President of the College Sports Information Directors of America in 1979. He is also serving on the Board of Directors of two other national organizations, the Football Writers Association of America and the United States Basketball Writers Association. A member of the NCAA Public Relations Committee, he became the chairman in September.

"Fox" is a native of Lincoln and a graduate of the University of Nebraska. He twice served in the U.S. Marine Corps and worked in the sports and news department of The Lincoln Star before becoming Sports Editor of the Star in 1954. He was named Nebraska Sportswriter of the Year in 1961 and 1962 by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association.

The Nebraska Broadcasters Association awarded its 1978 "Friend of Nebraska Broadcasters Award," to Bryant at its annual convention in Kearney. Previous winners were U.S. Senators Roman H. Hruska and Carl Curtis and Nebraska Governor J.J. Exon.

Named to the College Sports Information Directors America Hall of Fame in 1975, Bryant has served two terms as president of the Nebraska Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association. He also serves as secretary of the Nebraska Chapter of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame and is a member of the national council of the NFFHF.

Active in civic affairs, Bryant serves on the Cornhusker Council of the Boy Scouts of America executive committee and has served as a scoutmaster and as the Adult Advisor to the Golden Sun Lodge of the Order of the Arrow. He is a member of the Christ Methodist Church Choir and is active in the American Legion, the 40 and 8, Lions Club, National AAU and many other groups.

Bryant is married to the former Joan (Pedie) Peden of Oakland, Neb., they have two married sons, Bill and Jeff, and became grandparents last summer.

TOM OSBORNE, Assistant Athletic Director and Head Football Coach

Tom Osborne is in his ninth season as the Husker head football coach in 1981 after another very successful year. During the winter of 1978, Osborne was named a Nebraska Assistant Athletic Director.



In 1980, Osborne guided the Huskers to a 10-2 overall record, a second place finish in the Big Eight, a berth in the Sun Bowl Classic, and a final national ranking of seventh in both wire service polls.

In 1979, Osborne was named District VI Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association and Kodak. He was a finalist for the Kodak National Coach of the Year.

Not only has Osborne won better than 75 percent of his games at Nebraska over the last nine years, but has also skipped the Huskers to nine top 10 finishes, nine postseason bowl appearances, and five bowl victories.

In 1978, Osborne was named the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year (presented by the Atlanta Quarterback Club and Delta Airlines towards the advancement of higher and more notable aspects of college coaching.) He was the District VI Coach of the Year selected by the American Football Coaches Association, and named Big Eight Coach of the Year by both Associated Press and United Press International.

Osborne, who graduated from Hastings College before logging pro time with the Washington Redskins and San Francisco 49ers, joined Devaney as an assistant in 1962. In 1965 he received his Ph.D. in Educational Psychology, then elected football coaching as a career. He coached the Husker receivers and helped build the NU offense into one of the most potent in the nation during the 1970 and 1971 national championship years.

An outstanding high school athlete at Hastings High School in the mid 1950s' Osborne was named Nebraska prep Athlete of the Year. Passing up major college offers, Osborne became the star quarterback and basketball player for Hastings College where both his father and grandfather had matriculated. In 1959 he was named State College Athlete of the Year—the first athlete in Nebraska history to win both the high school and college honor.

Married to the former Nancy Tederman, Osborne is the father of a son, Mike and daughters, Ann and Susie.



DR. JUNE B. DAVIS, Assistant Athletic Director, Women's Athletics Director

Heading up the women's athletic program at Nebraska since 1977 is Dr. June B. Davis, a native of Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada.

JERRY FORT

NEBRASKA'S ALL TIME LEADING SCORER

On Dec. 27, 1972, when Nebraska met Iowa State during the first round of the Big Eight Preseason Tournament in Kansas City, then freshman guard Jerry Fort started his first game as a Husker. And what was about to follow would keep Cornhusker basketball fans cheering for the next three years.

Fort ended his Nebraska career in March of 1976 as the Huskers' all-time leading scorer with 1,882 points. He was also the Cornhuskers' only three-time All-Big Eight performer.

He holds every freshman, sophomore and junior scoring record. The senior mark of 556 points, or a 21.4 average, was set by Marvin Stewart in 1970-71.

His other major scoring record is the most points scored in one game by a Nebraska player. On Feb. 22, 1975, in Lincoln when Nebraska beat Missouri, 80-77, Fort scored 40 points and broke the old mark of 38 points, set by Tom Russell vs. Kansas on Feb. 21, 1962.




