Media Credentials: All requests for press, broadcast, photo and parking credentials for Nebraska basketball home games should be directed to Nick Joos, Assistant Sports Information Director, 116 South Stadium, Lincoln, Neb., 68588-0123. Requests must be made in writing on appropriate letterhead at least one week prior to the game. Requests via fax are acceptable (see fax information below). As a general rule, working space is allocated on the following basis: (1) daily newspaper and wire-service writers covering for next-day publication; (2) radio and television personnel for broadcast origination; (3) sports editors of Nebraska daily newspapers; (4) official school student daily newspaper, one seat only; (5) approved special coverage.

Media Will Call: Media passes which are not mailed may be picked up at the will-call window, located under the south ramp of the Bob Devaney Sports Center. The will-call window opens 90 minutes before tipoff. Identification is required to pick up credentials or tickets.

Media Parking: Parking for the media is located adjacent to the Bob Devaney Sports Center on the south side. The south street lot is accessible from Court Street, between 14th and 17th Streets.

Devaney Center Directions: The Bob Devaney Sports Center is located on the west edge of the Nebraska State Fairgrounds. To reach it from the Lincoln Municipal Airport, turn right on Northwest 12th Street as you drive out of the airport. Northwest 12th Street becomes Cornhusker highway, which intersects with 14th Street. Exit south on 14th Street off Cornhusker Highway. Travel to Court

Street, turn left, and go two blocks east to the arena, which is on the north side of Court Street. From Omaha's Eppley Airfield, follow the signs to downtown Omaha and I-480. Take I-480 west to I-80, then take I-80 west approximately 60 miles to I-180. Exit South on I-180, then exit east to Cornhusker Highway and follow the instructions above.

Player Interviews: All media requests for interviews with Nebraska basketball players should be directed to Assistant SID Nick Joos (office phone: 402-472-2263; home phone: 402-474-1856) at least one day in advance. Players are usually available



for telephone interviews early afternoons and evenings, except game days. The best time for in-season interviews is after practice at the Bob Devaney Sports Center. With advance notice, interviews can be arranged for other hours.

Nee Interview Time: The best time to reach Coach Danny Nee for an interview is weekdays from 11:30 a.m. to noon, Central time. Interviews with Coach Nee should be scheduled through the Sports Information Office. Coach Nee's office telephone number is 402-472-2265. During the season, Nee will host a weekly press conference at the Bob Devaney Sports Center on the following dates--Nov. 24, 29; Dec. 8, 15; Jan. 10, 17, 26; Feb. 2, 7, 16, 21, 28; March 7 and 14. Nee will also participate in the weekly Big Eight Conference telephonic press conferences at 11:35 a.m. (Central), beginning Nov. 29. Contact the Big Eight Service Bureau, 816-471-5088, for more information.

Postgame Interviews: The Nebraska postgame locker room is closed to the media. For home games, Nebraska's post-game news conference will be held following a brief cooling off period in the "ready" room, located adjacent to the Huskers' locker room in the Bob Devaney Sports Center. The "ready" room can be reached off the hallway at the southwest corner of the playing floor. The visiting team is usually headquartered in the central locker room, located off the hallway at the northeast corner of the playing floor. On the road, after the cooling off period, Nee will be available outside the Huskers' locker room.

Press Row Location: Press row for Nebraska basketball games is located on the south sideline of the playing floor, opposite the team benches. The old press box, located above section C-12 on the south side of the arena, is used as an overflow area. The camera deck is located at the top of the arena, directly behind the old press box. Television crews broadcasting live may shoot from either floor level or the camera deck, but they may not occupy space in the C-12 press area. The press room is located off the hallway at the southeast corner of the playing floor.

Media Services: Pregame notes (including statistics), programs and media guides will be provided prior to each game. Play-by-play sheets, final statistics, coach and player quotes from each locker room will be distributed. Starting one-and-onehalf hours before tipoff, refreshments will be served in the press room. A Sports Information Office representative will be in the Press Room until all writers have filed.

Radio/Television Broadcast Space: Requests for live radio and television broadcast space and credentials should be made to Nick Joos, Assistant Sports Information Director, 116 South Stadium, University of Nebraska, Lincoln, Neb., 68588-0123, telephone 402-472-2263. If statisticians are needed, please contact the Sports Information Office at least three days in advance.

Broadcast Rights: The University of Nebraska-Lincoln and the Nebraska Sports Network own exclusive radio broadcast rights to all of the University's men's basketball games played in the Bob Devaney Sports Center. Other than the Nebraska Sports Network and the University of Nebraska student station (KRNU), the only stations or networks which will be allowed to broadcast Nebraska games from the Devaney Center are those which have rights to broadcast games played by the opposing team. All radio stations and networks broadcasting from the Bob Devaney Sports Center must sign a contract with the University and are subject to a rights fee. Any representative of a radio station or network that has not purchased such rights shall not air live game action or description of any game while it is in progress, nor shall such representatives air tape-recorded or live commentary of Nebraska coaches or players for one hour before or after a game. Only stations which have purchased broadcast rights may install telephones on press row, or use telephones on press row for reporting on games. By accepting media credentials, representatives of stations and networks which have not purchased broadcast rights signify their agreement to the above stipulations.

Telephones: Nebraska provides four modular telephones in the Bob Devaney Sports Center Press Room. All long distance calls must be credit card, collect or billed to a third number. Any media source wishing to place a telephone on press row should contact University of Nebraska Telecommunications (402-472-2000) at least two weeks prior to the game.

Broadcast Telephone Lines: Visiting radio stations are welcome to have their own telephone lines installed on press row and may do so by contacting University of Nebraska Telecommunications (402-472-2000). However, the Nebraska Sports Network installs additional telephone lines for visiting official broadcasts and charges a fee for the use of those lines for nonconference games (Big Eight official stations receive the use of the lines free of charge as part of a cooperative). Stations interested in using the lines should contact Kent Pavelka at flagship station KFAB (402-556-8000).

Photographers: All working photographers in the Bob Devaney Sports Center must shoot from the photographers' boxes located at each end of the playing floor and MUST clearly display their working credentials. No photographers will be allowed to shoot from between the end lines. As a general rule, photo space will be assigned on the following basis: (1) television cameras for live telecasts; (2) photographers for daily newspapers for next-day publication or television stations shooting for same-day news broadcasts; (3) official school student daily newspaper, one pass only; (4) approved special coverage.

Coaches' Scouting Passes: Scouting pass requests made by head coaches should be made to Assistant SID Nick Joos and must conform to Big Eight Conference and NCAA regulations.

Pro Scouting Passes: Per Big Eight Conference rules, the University of Nebraska does not provide press row access or media credentials for scouts of professional basketball teams. Scouts may arrange through the Sports Information Office (402-472-2263) to purchase tickets for Nebraska home games. The tickets may be picked up at the will-call window.

Sports Information Office: The University of Nebraska Sports Information Office is located in Room 116 of the South Stadium Building, which is located at the south end of Memorial Stadium at 10th and T Streets. The South Stadium Building is approximately one mile from the Devaney Center.

Fax Access: The Nebraska Sports Information Office has an automatic facsimile machine which can transmit or receive documents. The phone number for the fax is 402-472-2005. A facsimile machine is available in the Bob Devaney Sports Center following the game, and Sports Information Office personnel will send box scores free of charge as time permits. This season, Nebraska and all Big Eight Conference schools are participating in a conference-wide fax-back system, where interested parties may call directly and have releases, notes and statistics faxed to their machine. There will be no charge to the receiver, other than the normal cost of the long distance call. Please contact the Nebraska Sports Information Office (402-472-2263) or the Big Eight Conference (816-471-5088) for more information.

The Nebraska Sports Network will be on the air for the 11th

season in 1993-94 with a total of 22 stations, including flagship station KFAB in Omaha. KFAB began broadcasting Cornhusker football in 1926 and has held the exclusive broadcast rights to University of Nebraska football and men's basketball games since 1983. KFAB was awarded a new three-year contract in the fall of 1992.

KFAB's Kent Pavelka returns as the playby-place voice of Nebraska basketball. A 1971 Nebraska graduate, Pavelka called Husker basketball play-by-play for 15 years from 1975 through 1989, then rejoined the Network last season. Pavelka, sports director and operations manager at KFAB, has been a part of UNL football broadcasts for 20 seasons, and has been the play-by-play voice of the Cornhuskers for the last 10 years. He is a six-time Nebraska Sportscaster-of-the-Year winner.

1993-94 NCAA RULE CHANGES

- 1-16/Voted to allow an exception to the commercial logo rule that will permit commercial logos or names on the floor when the corporate sponsor is associated with the name of any tournament.
- 2-12/Eliminated mandatory lag time for errors by the timer. Officials now shall correct for actual time when they have definite information relative to the time involved.
- 2-13/Reduced the shot clock to 35 seconds.
- 3-5 (a)/Voted to permit a single color plain black or white patch to be worn on the shoulder or sleeve of the game jersey to honor the memory of a deceased person.
- 3-5 (d)/Voted to require that numbers be centered on the game jersey. Uniform jerseys must be in compliance by the beginning of the 1996-97 season.
- 4-14 (f)/Expanded the definition of an intentional foul to say that a foul shall be ruled intentional if, when playing the ball, a player causes excessive contact (hard foul) with an opponent.
- 3-4, 5-10, 2-2/Voted to stop the game clock after successful field goals in the last two minutes of the game and the last minute of the game and the last minute of any overtime period with no substitution allowed.
- 2-13 (c)/Designated that the shot clock will not be reset when a defensive player causes a held ball and the possession arrow favors the offensive team.
- 9-13 (b)/Eliminated the five-second dribbling violation when closely guarded.
- 10-9 (c)/Expanded the rule concerning the use of profanity to include abusive and obscene language in an effort to curtail verbal misconduct by players and coaches.
- 10-11/Determined that an individual who participates in a fight during his team's final game of the season will be suspended from participating in the team's next regular season game for which that individual would be eligible.

Note: Rule 5-10 (b) has been expanded to include the rule that when a player incurs a wound that causes bleeding, the official must stop the game at the earliest possible time and instruct the player to leave the game to have the uniform evaluated by medical personnel. This rule was in effect for the 1992-93 season but was not in the rules book.

Men's Approved Experimentation

Rules experimentation for regular-season play only, not NCAA championship play, was approved by the rules committee. Permission for a conference to use any or all experimentation must be granted by the chair of the research sub-committee, William Scanlon, Union College. Following are the experimental rules for the 1993-94 season:

- 1. Granting a player a sixth foul in an overtime period of a game if the player had not fouled out of the game in regulation.
- 2. Widening the lane two feet on each side.
- 3. Moving the 3-point line to a distance of 20 feet, 6 inches.
- 4. A combination of widening the lane two feet on each side and moving the 3-point line to a distance of 20 feet, 6 inches.



Nebraska Basketball From A to Z ...

A

ABC-TV-Nebraska is scheduled for one network appearance this season at Kansas (Feb. 6); Academic All-Big Eighters-NU has had 23 first-team picks, which ranks third behind Kansas and Kansas State, who have both had a league-leading 24 selections; Academic All-Americans-The Huskers have produced four; All-Americans-Nebraska has had eight; Ameritas-Title sponsor for the Huskers' seventh-annual four-team tournament, Dec. 3-4, that features Ohio, Portland and Navy; Armory-Home of Husker basketball until the NU Coliseum opened its doors in the mid-1920s; Attendance-Nebraska has broken the Devaney Center total attendance record in each of the last three seasons, including a 1992-93 mark of 213,715.

B

Baack, Tom-Ranks sixth on school's all-time scoring list with 1,299 points and later served as an assistant coach under Moe Iba; Big Eight-The nation's toughest basketball conference comprised of Nebraska, Kansas, Kansas State, Iowa State, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Missouri and Colorado; Black-The color of jersey NU has donned five times. The Huskers first wore their special uniforms in a 65-57 win at Iowa State in 1990-91, then in a 91-71 loss at Missouri and again in an 87-83 win over Kansas in semifinals of the 1991 Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament. In 1992-93, NU wore black in an 82-67 victory at Colorado, in an 80-59 victory at Kansas State and in the 93-79 loss to New Mexico State; Branch, Nate-Went on to fame with the Harlem Globetrotters; Browne, William-Guided Huskers to 1937 Big Six title; Buchanan, Jim-First Cornhusker player to be drafted by an NBA team; Bush, Jerry-Known as the "Big Bear of the Coliseum," this popular Husker coach guided NU from 1955-63, and directed two of the greatest upsets ever—a 43-41 victory over top-ranked Kansas and Wilt Chamberlain and a 55-48 victory over No. 4 Kansas State and Olympian Bob Boozer during the 1957-58 campaign; Byrne, Bill-NU's new athletic director who took over for Bob Devaney on Jan. 4, 1993.

C

Carr, Brian-Standout point guard for NU from 1984 through 1987 who ranks as school's all-time assists leader (682); Carrier, Sam-First Husker cager to earn All-America honors (1913); Chalk, Leroy-NU's all-time leading rebounder with 782 caroms; Cipriano, Joe-Winningest coach in school history with all-time mark of 253-197 from 1964 through 1980; Coliseum-Home of Nebraska basketball from 1926-27 season through 1975-76 campaign; Cornhuskers-School nickname; Cox, Larry-Holds Big Eight career record for field-goal percentage (.625); Crete-Nebraska's 74-point win at Crete (82-8) in 1906-07 still rates as the largest victory margin in school history.

D

Day, Bernard-Ranks as highest scoring junior college transfer in school history with 802 points from 1985-86 season through 1986-87; Devaney, Bob-NU's athletic director emeritus; Devaney Center-NU homecourt that opened its doors for the 1976-77 season and bears the name of Huskers' long-time football coach and athletic director; Doane-Nebraska's first intercollegiate opponent in 1898-99 season.

E

Ekwall, Rex-Standout for NU in mid-1950s whose 10.4 career rebound average still ranks as school record; Enrollment-Nebraska's is 24,000; ESPN-NU is scheduled for three appearances on the cable network's "Big Monday" series this season—at Iowa State, Jan. 3, vs. Missouri in Lincoln, Jan. 24, and at Oklahoma, Feb. 14; Exhibitions-The Huskers own an all-time mark of 17-3 in exhibition play.

F

Fort, Jerry-First three-time first-team All-Big Eight selection in school history who finished his career with 1,882 points; Fox-Nickname of NU's longtime Sports Information Director and current Associate Athletic Director of Public Relations, Don Bryant.

G

Good, Harry-Served as NU head coach from 1947 through 1954 and guided Huskers to shares of 1949 and 1950 Big Seven titles. He was enshrined into the Citizens Savings College Basketball Hall of Fame in 1975.

H

Hammond Hustlers-Nickname given to Hammond, Ind., natives Brian Banks and Carl McPipe, who finished their careers with 1,150 and 1,300 points, respectively; Hare, Fred-His follow-up basket at the buzzer with no time left gave Nebraska a 74-73 upset of No. 1 Michigan and Cazzie Russell in Lincoln during the 1964-65 season; Herbie Husker-Nebraska mascot; Hokuf, Steve-Standout all-around athlete who earned first-team all-conference honors in football, won the Big Six javelin title and earned All-America and all-conference honors in basketball; Hoppen, Dave-NU's all-time leading scorer with 2,167 points who was the second three-time first-team All-Big Eight pick in school history and the first player in school history to have his jersey number (42) retired.

I

Iba, Moe-The son of the late legendary coach Henry P. Iba, Moe posted 106 wins on Husker bench from 1981 through 1986 and guided the school to its first "offical" NCAA Tournament berth in 1986; **Ingersoll, A.E.-**Only letterman whose last name begins with an I, lettered in 1909 and 1910; **International-**The NCAA allows schools to take a foreign trip once every four years, and under Coach Danny Nee, the Huskers have made treks to Australia (1988) and Europe (1992).

Johnson, **Bill-**Grabbed school single-game record 26 rebounds against Iowa State, Jan. 4, 1954; **Jura**, **Chuck-**Earned first-team All-Big Eight honors on the court and in the classroom as a senior in 1972.

K

Kansas-The Jayhawks and Cornhuskers first met on the court on March 2, 1900, a game that was the first matching present-day Big Eight opponents; KFAB-Flagship station of Nebraska Sports Network; Kemper Arena-Site of Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament each March in Kansas City, Mo.; King, Rich-Became first

first-round NBA draft pick in school history when the Seattle SuperSonics selected him with the 14th selection of the 1991 draft; **Kubacki, Jim-**Hit game-winning jumper to beat No. 1 Kansas and Wilt Chamberlain, 43-41, during 1957-58 season.

I

Lantz, Stuart-Two-time first-team All-Big Eight pick in 1967 and 1968 who went on to eight-year NBA career and had his jersey number (24) retired in 1989; Lehmer, Frank-First basketball coach in school history (1897-99), finished career with 7-3 record; Lincoln-All-America home of the Cornhuskers and Nebraska's state capital.

M

Maclay, Don-Earned All-America honors in 1931; Moore, Jack-One of the most popular Cornhuskers ever, he earned the 1982 Naismith Award as the nation's top player under 6-feet. Nebraska's most valuable player award is named in honor of Moore, who was killed in the crash of a light plane in 1984; Madison Square Garden-NU has played four NIT games in this famed arena; Matzke, John and Stan-Stan lettered from 1952 through 1955, while his son John was a second-team Academic All-America pick in 1984.

N

National Basketball Association-Eighteen Huskers have been drafted by NBA teams over the years; Nee-Braska-Coach Danny Nee heads into his eighth season on the Cornhusker bench with a 126-93 record; National Invitation Tournament-Nebraska has made a Big Eight-leading eight appearances in the nation's oldest postseason tournament; NCAA Tournament-The Huskers have earned four bids to the "Show," including bids in each of the last three years.

0

One-hundred-Nebraska is 26-1 when it scores 100 or more points in a game; **Overtime-**The Huskers are 40-26 all-time in overtime games, including 8-1 under Coach Danny Nee.

P

Parsons, Robert-Two-time first-team All-Big Six performer who earned All-America honors in 1937; Pavelka, Kent-Play-by-play voice of Husker basketball for the Nebraska Sports Network; Phillips 66—Title sponsor for Big Eight tournament at Kansas City, Mo.; Postseason-Nebraska has made 11 postseason appearances; Prime Sports-NU is scheduled for three appearances on the Big Eight's mid-week Prime package this season.

Q

Quadruple-Nebraska and Alabama-Birmingham played four overtimes on Dec. 22, 1979, before the Huskers scored a 92-84 victory over the Blazers in the school's longest game ever.

R

Rankings-Nebraska finished with its highest national rankings ever in 1990-91, No. 9 in UPI and No. 11 in AP; Raycom—Holds the television rights to all Big Eight games; Rebounder's Club-Boster organization for NU basketball prgram; Retherford, Claude-Leading scorer on NU's 1949 Big Seven championship team and a two-time first-team all-conference selection; Reid, Beau-Was two-time third-team Academic All-America pick who had a knack for hitting game-winning jumpers, as he provided

NU's winning points on four different occasions, including upsets of eventual NCAA champion Kansas in 1987-88 and No. 5 Michigan State in 1990-91.

S

Sauer, George—The only Husker football All-American to earn a basketball letter, he was an All-America fullback in 1933 and lettered on the hardwood in 1932 and 1933; Simmons, Grant-First-team All-Big Eight pick in 1966 and school's first first-team academic All-Big Eight selection; Smith, Andre-1981 Big Eight Player-of-the-Year, the only Husker ever to win the award; Spanier, Graham-Nebraska's Chancellor; Stewart, Marvin—The only player in school history to reach the 1,000-point plateau in fewer than 70 career games; Stiehm, E.O.-First full-time basketball coach in school's history (1912-15) and the only man in conference history to win league titles in football (1912, 1913, 1914) and basketball (1912, 1913, 1914) in the same year.

T

Tax-A state-wide cigarette tax provided the money to build the 14,302-seat Bob Devaney Sports Center; Treys—Nebraska hit a school-record 183 3-pointers during the 1991-92 campaign, and Chris Cresswell accounted for a school single-season record 59 of those. Brian Carr hit the first trey in school history in a game at Cal-Irvine during the 1986-87 season; Titles-Nebraska has won or shared seven league titles, none though since the 1949-50 campaign; Turner, Herschell-First player in school history to score 1,000 career points.

U

Upset-Nebraska has knocked off three No. 1 teams before, handing Kansas a 43-41 loss in 1958, Michigan a 74-73 loss in 1964-65 and Missouri a 67-51 loss at Columbia during the 1981-82 campaign.

V

van Poelgeest, Richard-Born in The Netherlands, van Poelgeest was a four-year letterwinner for Coach Danny Nee's team from 1987 through 1990; Volz, "Mutt"-First-team All-Missouri Valley Conference guard in 1925.

W

Wahlquist, George-All-America guard on NU's 1936 Big Six championship team; Walsh, W.W.-Was first first-team all-conference performer in school history (1909); Whitehead, Bus-Two-time first-team All-Big Seven pick and the catalyst of the Huskers' 1949 and 1950 league championship teams; Wins-Nebraska heads into the 1993-94 season with 1,073 wins under its belt in 96 seasons of intercollegiate competition.

X

Xavier-Ended Nebraska's most-successful basketball season ever by handing the No. 3 seed Huskers an 89-84 loss in the first round of the 1991 NCAA Tournament at Minneapolis, Minn.

Y

YMCA-Nebraska's first basketball game was played against a team from the Lincoln YMCA, Feb. 1, 1897.



NATIONAL COVERAGE...NEBRASKA IN THE SPOTLIGHT



m With the resurgence of the Nebraska basketball program under Coach Danny Nee, media attention for the Cornhuskers is at an all-time high. Nebraska is scheduled to make 13 national or regional television appearances during the 1993-94 season, including three appearances on ESPN's "Big Monday" package.

This is the third season the Big Eight has been a part of "Big Monday," ESPN's most-watched two-hour block during the college basketball season. The Huskers' Jan. 3 game at Iowa State, their Jan. 24 home game against Missouri and their Feb. 14 game at Oklahoma will be played before the ESPN cameras. In addition, NU's Feb. 6 game at Kansas will be televised by ABC and three more games will be shown by Prime Sports.

The media attention isn't limited to television broadcasts as the Huskers are consistently covered by national print publications such as Sports Illustrated, USA Today and The Sporting News, as well as hundreds of regional media outlets. The state's two largest papers, The Omaha World-Herald and the Lincoln Journal-Star, cover Nebraska basketball on a daily basis. Nebraska has been ranked at least once in the wire service polls in each of the last three seasons for the first time ever, and three years ago, finished with its highest national rankings ever at No. 9 in the UPI poll and No. 11 in AP.


Husker basketball can be heard throughout the Midwest on the 22-station Nebraska Sports Network, which boasts a pair of 50,000-watt AM stations in Omaha's KFAB and Lexington's KRVN.




The 14,302 seat Bob Devaney Sports Center has been the home of Husker basketball since 1976.



The 14,302-seat Bob Devaney Sports Center is one of the most beautiful arenas in the Big Eight Conference. Opened in the fall of 1976, the Big Eight's second-largest arena is located on the Nebraska State Fairgrounds. The building, a \$13 million project, houses the Huskers' basketball, track, swimming, wrestling and gymnastics teams. A host of other activities, including concerts and commencements are held in the arena.

Since the building became the home of Husker basketball, over 2.8 million fans have flocked to the Devaney Center. In 1993-94, the 3-millionth Nebraska basketball fan is expected to pass through the doors, a tribute to the program and the facility, that is named after Bob Devaney, Nebraska's highly successful football coach and athletic director (1962-93).

Nebraska owns a 17-year record of 205-55 in the building, including a 14-2 mark a year ago, and a 42-5 record over the last three seasons.

Nebraska's weight training program is a pioneer in the development of strength and conditioning and Coach Danny Nee believes it is a vital part of the Huskers' on-court success. The strength complex at Nebraska was expanded to 30,000 square feet in 1989, making it the largest on any college campus in the nation. In addition, the basketball team utilizes a weight room at the Bob Devaney Sports Center.

Husker strength and conditioning coach Boyd Epley, heads a staff of six full-time strength coaches who utilize their knowledge along with a wide array of equipment and tests to provide one of the nation's top strength training programs. Evaluation, goal-oriented programs, supervision and state-of-the-art facilities help Nebraska athletes become bigger, faster, stronger and more flexible.

The medical facilities at Nebraska are a high-priority item, too. The Huskers' locker room and training room facilities are located in the Bob Devaney Sports Center and rank among the nation's best equipped. Head trainer and physical therapist George Sullivan heads a team of five full-time trainers, including three registered physical therapists and a physician's assistant. Six doctors are also available to treat Cornhusker athletes and to prevent injuries.

NU's facilities have helped the Cornhusker athletic teams dominate the Big Eight. Last season, UNL won seven conference championships, more than twice the number by any other conference school, and won its 14th straight league all-sports crown.

THE HEWIT & BOEKEL CENTERS...LEARNING TO EXCEL

Nebraska's academic facilities are among the finest in the nation. In fact, College Athletic Management Magazine recently voted Nebraska No. 1 for its student-athlete academic support program. Located in the west stadium, the Hewit Center and Boekel Academic Center allow Nebraska's student-athletes access to the latest academic support services.

The \$2.3 million academic area originated in 1983 and was expanded in 1989 to nearly 30,000 square feet in size. Initial funding came from the Nebraska football teams' appearance in the inaugural Kickoff Classic in 1983. The money from that game, combined with generous donations from the Boekel and Hewit families, enable Nebraska student-athletes to enjoy the best academic support center in the country. The Academic Experience: Three Steps to Success

With an enrollment of nearly 24,000 students, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln offers an environment rich in academic tradition. Faculty members at Nebraska have long been recognized for serving students with excellence, distinction, and a level of expertise matched by few.

There are nine academic colleges at the University of Nebraska, and each offers a variety of disciplines for students to select. The colleges are: Agriculture, Architecture, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Engineering and Technology, General Studies, Home Economics, Journalism, and Teachers College.

From the day a student-athlete decides the University of Nebraska is the right place to be, the athletic academic counseling unit provides personal support, academic support and professional development to ensure that they will get the most out of their years as a Cornhusker.

In each of these areas, there are several programs designed to assist each student-athlete to achieve his/her highest level of personal and academic excellence.

Professional Development Counseling at Nebraska

1. Career Exploration--Knowing that less than one percent of all collegiate athletes advance to professional sports, Nebraska's Athletic Counseling Unit in 1988 pioneered a complete career counseling program for student-athletes.

The career exploration phase has programs designed to help with career selection and clarification. These programs include: interest inventories, DISCOVER (a computerized career guidance and planning program aimed at helping students discover relevant majors and career goals), monthly career nights, career fairs, shadowing experiences, internships and cooperative education.

- 2. Career Planning -- An important aspect of preparing for a career is the teaching of job-development skills. At Nebraska, methods are taught to improve these skills, including resume development, cover-letter writing, job search strategies, interviewing skills, and graduate, law and professional school placement assistance.
- 3. Career Placement--Assistance is provided in securing full-time employment upon graduation.
- 4. Degree Audit Program--Nebraska's Athletic Academic Counseling Unit has a tracking system in place to ensure accurate course selection and provide monitoring of each student-athletes' progress toward a degree in his/her chosen field. Nebraska boasts an 81% graduation rate of those who complete their collegiate eligibility at Nebraska.



ACADEMIC AND PERSONAL SUPPORT...ALWAYS AVAILABLE

Academic Support

1. Tutorial Support: One of Nebraska's largest and perhaps most beneficial support services for studentathletes is the Tutorial Program. The program strives to accomplish several goals and has three basic components designed to help reach these goals. They are: Academic Profile, Subject Tutoring and Mentoring.

2. Supplemental Instruction: Supplemental instruction helps student-athletes ease their transition from the high school classroom to the college classroom.

3. Academic Supervision: An important part of the academic process for student-athletes is the monitoring of their short-term and long-term academic success. Three programs designed to help the student-athlete are: Study Hall, Grade Reports and Class Attendance.

4. Computer Resources: First-class computer instruction is available and designed to enhance studentathletes' efficiency and performance in the classroom by utilizing a state-of-the-art computer lab, with over 25

computers.

5. Reading and Writing Lab: The newest program available to Nebraska's student-athletes helps them improve the skills which are imperative for success regardless of the student's academic abilities. The goal of this lab is to enhance reading and writing skills while reducing student anxiety through student-centered activities focused on current coursework.

Personal Support

1. Orientation: The Academic Athletic Counseling Department coordinates a New Student-Athlete Orientation program which is aimed at helping studentathletes make the delicate transition from high school to

2. Personal Counseling: This program is designed to provide the student-athlete with a supportive, caring environment. There are four major areas covered in this program. They are transitional issues, stress management, academic focus, and personal crisis intervention.

3. Multi-Cultural Support: This program is designed to enhance cultural awareness for all student-athletes to help build a supportive, caring environment in which to learn and compete. Support programs have been developed to help student-athletes address concerns within campus life, athletics and society in general.

4. Husker Outreach Program: University of Nebraska student-athletes are encouraged to participate in community-wide programs which help make them become better citizens and better role models for children in Lincoln and throughout Nebraska. There are four programs available to Cornhusker student-athletes through the Husker Outreach Program. The programs allow participants to come in contact with an estimated 50,000 prepsters annually.

5. Drug Education and Continuing Support Program: Evaluation and support systems designed to educate and support student-athletes for a drug-free life are the hallmark of this unique program. Among the services available are: Assessment, Education, Personal Devel-


opment and Support.

The success of Nebraska athletes is not limited to only the athletic arena. More Cornhusker student-athletes have been selected to the GTE Academic All-America team than any other school in the country and more Huskers have earned academic All-Big Eight honors than any other conference school.

In addition, no school has had more athletes receive the NCAA's highest award, Today's Top Six, than the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. In addition, Cornhusker athletes have been awarded the third-highest number of NCAA post-graduate scholarships to help further their educations.

NCAA Today's Top Six Award

The most prestigious honor a student-athlete at an NCAA member institution can win is the Today's Top Six Award. The University of Nebraska-Lincoln has produced a nation-leading nine Today's Top Six winners.

Beginning with football standout Randy Schleusener, nine Cornhusker student-athletes, seven men and two women, have been selected as Today's Top Six winners including: Schleusener, 1980; Dave Rimington, Football, 1981; Mark Traynowicz, Football, 1985; Tom Schlesinger, Gymnastics, 1989; Virginia Stahr, Volleyball, 1990; Jake Young, Football, 1990; Patrick Kirksey, Gymnastics, 1991; Patrick Tyrance, Football, 1991; and Janet Kruse, Volleyball, 1992.

GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-America Teams

Since 1952, sports information directors have selected Academic All-America teams from qualified student-athletes representing eight different sports.

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln has had more male and female student-athletes selected as Academic All-Americans than any other school in either the University or College Divisions.

As of August, 1993, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln has seen a total of 107 student-athletes receive the awards, 38 more than second-place Illinois Wesleyan (71). Nebraska also leads the nation in first-team GTE Academic All-Americans with 65. The basketball program has produced four Academic All-America performers.

Academic All-Big Eight Conference

Nebraska has established itself as the dominant school in the Big Eight for academic excellence, consistently placing more athletes than any other conference school on that list.

The University of Nebraska...The Place to Be

The University of Nebraska was chartered by the Legislature in 1869 as the state's public university and land-grant institution. Founded in Lincoln, the University of Nebraska was expanded in 1968 into a state educational system now comprising four campuses under the guidance of a Board of Regents and a central administration.

The university's flagship campus, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, includes the agricultural components organized within the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources. UNL is Nebraska's only land-grant university and its major comprehensive institution of higher education. For its 24,000 students from all parts of the world, UNL offers a wide range of undergraduate, professional, and graduate programs including those leading to the doctorate.

As UNL carries out its three-part mission of teaching, research and service, the overall impact of its efforts in each area is greater than the sum of its separate parts, ensuring that the quality of all of its institutional programs is consistent with the expectations and needs of Nebraskans. UNL is continuously designing new academic frameworks to provide students with the mental skills and broad perspectives of educated citizens.




UNL receives more than \$50 million annually in grants and contracts from outside sources for research, instruction, public service, administration and student aid. UNL receives special funds through an innovative program initiated by the state government for research in areas with potential impact on the state's economic development.

The campus is home to the nationally renowned Sheldon Memorial Art Gallery and Sculpture Garden, the Christlieb Collection of Western Art and the Lied Center for Performing Arts. The University of Nebraska State Museum boasts a world-class fossil collection and helped develop Ashfall Fossil Beds State Park, which opened in the summer of 1991.





Huskers Shoot for Return Trip to Big Dance

In each of the last three seasons, a record number of fans have viewed Nebraska's games in the Devaney Center, and with the return of four starters from last year's NCAA Tournament team, there's no reason to believe the pace will slow in 1993-94.

Nebraska, which hasn't earned a share of the conference title since the 1949-50 season (when the Big Eight was known as the Big Seven), is coming off its most successful three-year run in the sport's 97-year history at the school. Three straight NCAA Tournament appearances, the Big Eight's third-best record over that stretch at 65-29 and three consecutive record-breaking years at the box office (more than 600,000 have passed through the Devaney Center turnstiles) have heightened expectations for Coach Danny Nee's eighth Husker squad.

The Cornhuskers' hopes for a fourth-straight NCAA Tournament bid will rest on the shoulders of seniors Eric Piatkowski, Jamar Johnson, Bruce Chubick and Tom Best. Piatkowski, Johnson and Chubick drew a combined 92 starts a year ago, while sophomore Terrance Badgett started the last 13 games at forward. In all, Nebraska returns nine letterwinners from last year's squad.

"We judge everything on the nucleus of returning people," Nee said. "I have a lot of confidence in that nucleus of four seniors. Then add in the three freshman from last year in Jaron Boone, Erick Strickland and Terrance Badgett, and check the quality minutes all those guys played. I have seven players who have played in big games in the Big Eight.

"Experience usually means maturity. And my definition of maturity is how you handle adversity. I feel experienced players like we have, can handle the difficulties that pop up during the season, whether it's sickness, streaks of poor shooting or bad calls," Nee added.


The Huskers lost three letterwinners from last year's team that finished 8-6 in the Big Eight, good for a second-place tie with Iowa State and Oklahoma State, and the school's best league finish in some 12 seasons. Center Derrick Chandler graduated, while center Amos Gregory and guard Andre Woolridge elected not to return.

Chandler was a vital cog in the Cornhuskers' attack the last two seasons. He was NU's second-leading scorer a year ago at 11.2 points per game and was the squad's top rebounder with an 8.1 average. Chandler also blocked 144 shots over the last two seasons, the second-highest total in school history. Gregory averaged 5.2 points and 3.1 rebounds in 26 appearances, while Woolridge was a member of the Big Eight's All-Freshman team after averaging 4.9 points per outing.

After six seasons of having a center standing 6-11 or taller, Chandler's departure will force Nee to make some changes in his attack. The 6-11 Chandler was NU's man in the paint the last two years, while 7-2 Rich King occupied the pivot from 1988 through 1991.

"Everyone is concerned about us not having a center," Nee said. "On some nights that is going to be a negative and on some nights it will be a plus. I believe over the course of the season we can take playing without a center and make it a positive, by our style of play, the rotation of players and the offenses and defenses we employ.

"We're going to run our shotgun offense and defense. Meaning we're going to be wide open at both ends of the floor with no post player," Nee added.

The Veterans

Nebraska's eight returnees produced 79.9 percent of the offense and 74.5 percent of the rebounding a year ago. Five of the top six scorers from last year's squad return, as do three of the club's top four rebounders.

The go-to man again figures to be 6-7 Piatkowski, who earned first-team All-Big Eight honors a year ago after turning in one of the finest all-around seasons in school history. He's hoping to become the eighth player in school history, and the first since Dave Hoppen in 1986, to earn first-team All-Big Eight honors in consecutive seasons. The first player in the Nee-era to earn first-team all-conference honors, Piatkowski's 16.7 scoring average rates fifth-best among 1993-94 Big Eight returnees. He heads into his senior season with 1,288 points, good for eighth on the NU career chart.

"We expect a total player," Nee said of Piatkowski. "He's been on a five-year blueprint for success since he got here and has gotten better each year. The guy can play, and I expect him to have a great year."

One of 25 players on the United States Basketball Writers Association's 1994 player-of-the-year preseason watch list, Piatkowski spent the summer playing on the U.S. entry in the World University games at Buffalo, N.Y. Only the second NU player ever to appear in the Games, Piatkowski averaged 9.7 points for the gold-medal winning team.


Piatkowski's play at the World University Games and down the stretch a year ago have put him in position to make a run at All-America honors as a senior. He averaged 18.2 points and 5.5 rebounds over NU's last 13 games a year ago, including a careerhigh 29-point outburst in the Huskers' NCAA Tournament loss to New Mexico State. He also hit 50.9 percent of his field goals and 82.1 percent of his free throws in the stretch. For the season, he connected on a team-high 37.2 percent of his 3-point attempts.

"Eric Piatkowski earned All-Big Eight," Nee said. "It wasn't given to him. Then to make the World Games team over the summer and have success there shows he is a class player--a premier player in this conference.

"I don't want Pike to be judged just as a jump shooter," Nee added. "He's an all-around player. I believe he'll be the cornerstone of this team."

Johnson, meanwhile, has been a key component on the Cornhuskers' last two NCAA Tournament teams. He's the only "true" point guard on the Nebraska roster and is shooting to become the first player in school history to lead the team in both assists and steals for three straight seasons. As a junior, the 5-11 1/2 Johnson averaged 9.8 points per game and dished out a teamhigh 102 assists while picking up 52 steals.

"All the focus on the freshmen last year and people telling him he was going to lose his job, wore Jamar down, "Nee said. "Now he is refocused. I believe you'll see him poised, confident and acting as a driving force on this team."

"Jamar has done everything we have asked of him. I believe he knows what it takes to win."

As a sophomore, Johnson was NU's second-leading scorer at 11.2 points per game and earned second-team All-Big Eight honors. Two years ago, as the only "true" point guard on the team, he averaged a team-

high 30.7 minutes per game, but Nee doesn't believe Johnson will be forced to play massive minutes this season.

"Jamar is our leader on the floor, but we feel Piatkowski and Boone can play the point. And, with the types of offenses we run, we don't have a primary ballhandler. All of our people on the perimeter handle the ball."

One of just two players to start all 31 games a year ago, the 6-71/2 Chubick teamed with Johnson as a co-captain on last year's team. An outstanding student, Chubick is hoping to become the third three-time first-team academic All-Big Eight pick in school history. He averaged 8.4 points per game a year ago and was the squad's second-leading rebounder, along with Piatkowski, at 5.7 per game.

"Every year Bruce has been in the program, he's improved, and I believe he'll have a good season," Nee said. "I think you'll see a stronger, smarter player. He's the type of experienced and hard-working player we need."

Chubick hit a team-high 52.0 percent of his field goals, and with Chandler's departure, figures to see some time in the low post.


The second-tallest player on the Nebraska roster is Best, who stands 6-9. He appeared in 28 games last season and contributed 4.7 points and had the team's fourth-best rebound average at 4.8 per game off the bench. As a sophomore at Toledo, Best led the Mid-American Conference in rebounding, and Nee is hoping Best can provide help on the boards and at the defensive end as a senior. Best, who had back surgery after the 1991-92 season, missed three games because of a sore back a year ago, played just three minutes against New Mexico State in the NCAA Tournament before going down with a groin pull. He was then slowed in the off-season by a disk problem unrelated to previous surgery.

"If he stays healthy, he's definitely good enough to be a contributor," Nee said. "During his redshirt year with us, he practiced at a high quality level. He knows and I know he's a much better player then he has shown. And I think he's out to prove that. He's a determined man."

"Those four guys have to have a good year if Nebraska is going to have a good season," Nee said. They are the focal point of this team and there is no reason they shouldn't have good seasons."

One of four returning starters from last year's team, the 6-6 Badgett started 15 games and was easily the biggest surprise of last year's team. One of four Nebraska players named to the Big Eight's All-Freshman team a year ago, Badgett was slowed for much of fall conditioning by a stress fracture in his left foot, but Nee is counting on him to be in the lineup from the outset of the 1993-94 campaign.

"He's an explosive player," Nee said. "He gives us multiple looks because he can play so many different positions and do so many different things. His best basketball is still ahead of him. The key though, is staying healthy."

Badgett, who is expected to be full speed when practice opens Nov. 1, averaged 6.7 points and 3.5 rebounds per game. He hit 49.7 percent of his field goals. It was Badgett's steal and driving dunk at the buzzer that preserved NU's 68-64 homecourt upset of then-No. 3 Kansas.

The spotlight also shined on Strickland and Boone as rookies. Strickland, who turned heads with his hard-nosed defensive style of play, was tabbed the Big Eight's Freshman-of-the-Year by the Associated Press and the league coaches. The first Husker ever to win the award, the 6-3 1/2 Strickland averaged 7.8 points, hit 36.4 percent of his 3-point attempts and had an NU freshman record 45 steals. He also earned honorable-mention All-Big Eight honors and was a member of the league's all-freshman and all-defensive teams.

"I really feel he that he's a player with unlimited potential," Nee said. He's a magnificent defensive player and now with a year's experience, I believe he know's what is going on with Big Eight basketball and that should make him a better player."

Strickland, who spent his second-straight summer playing in the Florida Marlins minor league system, scored an NU freshman record 28 points in the Huskers' homecourt win over Missouri and came up with a key steal that sealed NU's home victory over Iowa State in late February.

Boone, who stands 6-6 and is the son of former American Basketball Association standout Ron Boone, began making a name for himself as a rookie, too. Like Badgett and Strickland, Boone was named to the league's all-freshman team. He averaged 6.9 points per outing and dished out a school freshman record 87 assists on the season. He started eight games, had at

least one assist in 29 of 31 games, and connected on a team-high 82.1 percent of his free throws. The Huskers posted a 9-1 record when he dished out four or more assists in a game, and were 12-1 when he shot 50 percent or better from the field.

"Jaron may be the sleeper of the bunch," Nee said. "I believe he's another freshman who got a lot of experience a year ago and who is focused on developing his skills and setting himself up to have very strong junior and senior seasons."

After sitting out the 1992-93 season as a redshirt, 6-5 **Jason Glock** figures to be in the hunt for playing time. He averaged 1.3 points and 1.2 rebounds in limited action as a freshman. A 3.8 student in biology, Glock could contend for academic All-Big Eight honors and Nee is expecting Glock to make a major contribution because of his heady play.

"After one year of the learning process, I expect them to come back and be major contributors," Nee said. "They have to be. They have to play well and I think they will. These guys know what is going on and what the program is about. They are our future. They will be our stars as juniors and seniors."

The Newcomers

Nee and his staff signed a pair of players during the spring signing period, 6-8 junior college transfer **Melvin Brooks** and 6-11 freshman **Mikki Moore**. Both players are being counted upon to make a contribution in their first season at Nebraska.

Brooks, the only junior on the NU roster, averaged 15.2 points and 7.2 rebounds a year ago at Chowan (N.C.) College. As a freshman at Chowan, he was a starter on the school's 26-5 team that advanced to the National Junior College Athletic Association Tournament. Brooks, who signed with East Tennessee State out of high school, figures to challenge for the open spot in the starting unit.

Moore, meanwhile, is the tallest player on the NU roster at 6-11 and is the only freshman on the squad. When he signed with Nebraska last spring, Nee was hopeful of redshirting Moore this season. But, with the Huskers' lack of depth at center, Moore will be thrown into the fire immediately. He averaged 15 points, 13.5 rebounds and 5.0 blocked shots as a senior at Gaffney's (S.C.) Blacksburg High School.

This is the third time in Nee's eight seasons that he's had a senior-dominated team to put on the floor, and he's hopeful the results are as good this time around. In his rookie season on the Husker sideline, he guided a senior dominated team to a 21-12 record and a third-place NIT finish, then watched four seniors form the nucleus of a 26-8 squad in 1990-91.

"We might have our most-athletic team we've ever had here," Nee said. "We should be good in all phases of the game, but an area that we must be good at, is rebounding. I believe defense and rebounding are going to be the keys. And, we have to stay healthy. I think we'll score a lot of points. I'd like to see us develop some consistency at both ends of the court."

"We want to be a contender for the Big Eight championship and we want to try and to win the Big Eight Tournament," Nee added. "Ultimately, we want to go the NCAAs again. But, being in the tournament is no longer the goal. The goal is to get to the tournament and win and advance."

1993-94 Cornhusker Notes

1992-93 In Review: Nebraska, a team that rallied from an 0-3 league start to finish in a second-place tie with Iowa State and Oklahoma State in the Big Eight standings at 8-6, earned its thirdstraight NCAA Tournament invitation. The Huskers, who posted a 20-11 record, hit the 20-win plateau with a 94-83 homecourt win over Oklahoma, March 7, but closed the season with consecutive losses to Kansas State, 47-45, in the Big Eight Tournament, and New Mexico State, 93-79, in the NCAA Tournament. Nebraska, which won 20 games for the seventh time in its 97-year basketball history, reeled off seven straight wins to open the season and climbed to 17th in the Dec. 20 Associated Press poll and 16th in that week's CNN/USA Today coaches poll, then lost six of its next 11, before a late-season surge produced wins in eight of 13 games. It was the first time NU had been ranked in three straight seasons. As noted above, NU opened Big Eight play 0-3, but rallied to win eight of its last 11 league games to finish at 8-6. The second-place tie was the Huskers' best league finish since the 1980-81 season and marked the third straight year they had finished .500 or better in conference play. Ten of Nebraska's 11 losses were to 1993 postseason tournament teams, and all 11 were to teams that finished with .500 or better records. All 29 losses the Cornhuskers have sustained over the last three seasons have been to teams that finished with .500 or better records.

The Leader: Husker mentor Danny Nee owns a 13-year collegiate coaching record of 233-160 and a seven-year NU mark of 126-93. The only coach in school history to take three Husker squads to the NCAA Tournament, Nee's 126 wins rank second on NU's all-time victory list behind Joe Cipriano's 253 victories in 17 seasons. The first coach in Nebraska history to have three 20-game winners on his NU resume, Nee's Cornhuskers were 61-64 in his first four seasons on the sideline, but have gone 65-29 since.

Preseason Honors for Piatkowski: Husker senior guard/for-

ward Eric Piatkowski, who averaged 16.7 points a year ago en route to first-team All-Big Eight honors, is one of 25 players on the United States Basketball Writers Association preseason player-of-the-year list. A member of the United States' gold-medal winning World University games team, Piatkowski was a seventh-team preseason All-America pick by Basketball Weekly. He was rated as the nation's eighth-best small forward by the 1993-94 NCAA Preview magazine and the Sporting News' Pro Basketball Yearbook listed him as the sixth-best shooting guard available for the 1994 NBA Draft.

Nineteen and Fourteen: Nebraska is one of 19 teams that has earned an NCAA Tournament invite in each of the last three seasons. Here's a look at the other 17 schools that have appeared in three straight NCAAs heading into the 1993-94 season with the number of consecutive appearances in parenthesis: Arizona (9), Arkansas (6), Brigham Young (4), Duke (10), Florida State (3), Indiana (8), Iowa (3), Kansas (4), Louisiana State (10), New Mexico State (4), North Carolina (19), Oklahoma State (3), St. John's (4), Seton Hall (3), Temple (4), UCLA (5) and Wake Forest (3). In addition, Nebraska was one of 14 Division I teams that placed both its men's and women's teams in the 1993 NCAA Tournament. It was the first time in school history that both the Husker men's and women's teams made NCAA Tournament appearances in the same season.

Box Office Hit: For the third straight season, Nebraska broke its season Devaney Center attendance record and for the second time in the last three years, also set a per-game average mark. For 16 home games, NU drew 213,715 fans, 5,675 better than last year's record of 207,950, while its per-game average of 13,357 broke the mark of 13,307 set in 1990-91. NU ranked third in the Big Eight and 23rd nationally in per-game attendance average last season. Since the start of the 1990-91 season, 621,270 fans, or an average of 13,219 per outing, have come through the Devaney Center doors to see the Cornhusker men's basketball team. Nebraska drew a season-high crowd of 14,679 for its 68-64 upset of No. 3-ranked Kansas.

Two-Sport Star: Nebraska sophomore Erick Strickland, the Big Eight's 1993 Freshman-of-the-Year, spent his summer playing in the outfield for the Florida Marlins Class A entry at Elmira, N.Y. He hit .263 in 59 games, with 36 RBI and four home runs. He also clubbed 12 doubles and three triples, while stealing eight bases. Strickland, a middle-round draft pick by the Marlins two years ago, is believed to be the first athlete in Nebraska history to turn professional in one sport while retaining collegiate eligibility in another sport.

Home-Grown Talent: The 1993-94 Nebraska roster features six players with in-state ties. Four players on the roster were born in Nebraska, while two spent at least part of their childhood in the Cornhusker state. Nebraska natives include Omaha's Terrance Badget , Bellevue's Erick Strickland, Atkinson's Bruce Chubick and Wahoo's Jason Glock. Eric Piatkowski spent eight years in Scottsbluff before moving to Rapid City, S.D., and Jaron Boone lived in Omaha while his father, Ron, played for the Kansas City-Omaha Kings.

Homecourt Advantage: The big crowds have translated into wins on the court for NU, as the Huskers have fashioned a 42-5 homecourt record over the last three seasons, including a 14-2


mark last season. The Cornhuskers dropped games to Kansas State and Oklahoma State in Lincoln last season, but take a threegame homecourt win string into the 1993-94 season. Nebraska takes a 29-game homecourt win string vs. nonconference opponents into the season. The Huskers are 205-55 in 17 seasons of play at the Devaney Center.

Ameritas Champs Again: For the fifth-straight year, Nebraska won its own Ameritas Classic, handing Kent an 85-61 loss in the title game. Eric Piatkowski was the Classic's MVP, while Derrick Chandler was named to the all-tournament team.

On the Tube: Nebraska is scheduled for at least 13 television appearances in 1993-94, six on the Big Eight's weekly Raycom package, three on both ESPN and Prime Sports, and one on ABC-TV. The Huskers' ESPN dates are Jan. 3 at Iowa State, Jan. 24 vs. Missouri in Lincoln and Feb. 14 at Oklahoma State, while their Feb. 6 game at Kansas will be on ABC.

Tough Competition: Fifteen of NU's 27 games are against 1993 postseason tournament teams, with 12 of those 15 games against 1993 NCAA Tournament entrants. The Huskers will face 1993 NCAA participants Kansas, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Iowa State, Missouri and Kansas State and NIT entrants Oklahoma and Michigan State.

Notebook: Nebraska was 5-2 in the Big Eight at home, 3-4 on the road...the three league road wins equaled the most for a Danny Nee-coached Nebraska team (the 1990-91 team also won three league road games)...Nebraska owns a 24-18 record in Big Eight play over the last three seasons, 10-11 over the first half and 14-7 the second time through...NU blocked 131 shots on the season, the third-best total in school history...the Huskers have averaged 80 or more points for four straight years, including last year's 80.5 average...NU is 49-7 since the start of the 1990-91 season when scoring 80-plus points...the 116 points the Huskers racked up against Texas-Arlington equaled the second-highest single-game output in school history...in 21 of its last 29 losses, NU failed to score 80 points...NU averaged 86.8 points at home...all 10 scholarship players on last year's roster produced at least one doublefigure scoring game a year ago...Nebraska's bench outscored its opponents reserves in 26 of 31 outings...eight of 10 Huskers hit 60 percent or better at the line for the season.




ger contribution this season...at 6-9, Best is the second-tallest player on the Cornhuskers' roster, behind 6-11 freshman Mikki Moore, and Nee is hoping Best can help on the boards, and with interior defense...for his size, he's an excellent perimeter shooter, and he will be aiming to improve on his 36.4 percent effort from 3-point range a year ago.

1992-93 (Junior): After sitting out the 1991-92 season as a transfer from the University of Toledo, Best appeared in 28 games off the bench and averaged 4.7 points and 4.8 rebounds per game...he ranked fourth on the squad in rebound average...hit 44.9 percent from the field, 36.4 percent from 3-point range...his 36.4 percent effort from 3-point range equaled the secondhighest mark on the team, however, he attempted just 22 treys...came off the bench to score six points and grab an NU career-high 10 rebounds against Oklahoma, March 7, arguably his best performance of the season...also had a pair of assists, two blocked shots and a steal against the Sooners in a season-high 25 minutes...he played just three minutes of the Huskers' NCAA Tournament loss to New Mexico State before pulling his groin while going up for a rebound in the first half...averaged 5.3 rebounds over the last six games, and pulled down five or more rebounds in 15 of 28 appearances...missed three games in late January and early February with a sore back...had a Big Eight career-high nine points at Oklahoma State...was four-of-four from the field against the Cowboys at Stillwater...came off the bench to score an NU career-high 11 points at Missouri-Kansas City...against UMKC, he was five-of-seven from the field, and grabbed four rebounds before fouling out in 19 minutes...scored five or more points 13 times...his five steals vs. The Citadel were an individual high for an NU player...for the season, his 20 steals ranked fifth, along with Bruce Chubick, on the team...he was also fifth on the team in blocked shots with nine.

1991-92: Transferred to Nebraska and sat out the season, but was able to practice with the team...had back surgery in March of 1992.

1990-91 (Toledo, Sophomore): Led the Mid-American Conference in rebounding (8.9 rpg), ranked 16th in scoring (13.3 ppg) and eighth in steals (49) for a 17-16 Rocket team which finished seventh in the conference and second in the league's season-ending tournament...scored in double figures 25 times, including four 20-point-or-better efforts (Rockets were 4-0 when Best notched 20-or-more points)...netted a career-high 23 points against Miami (Ohio) in the first round of the 1991 MAC Tournament...had 12 double-figure rebound games, including a career-high 17 boards against Chicago State...turned in 11 double-doubles (double figures in both points and rebounds), and pulled down five or more rebounds in 29 of 33 games...started 23 games...hit 44.9 percent from the field, 31.3 percent from 3-point range and 60.4 percent at the free-throw line in his final campaign with the Rockets...had team-high 49 steals, including season-high six




against Prairie View A&M...against Nebraska in Lincoln, he netted 11 points, grabbed four rebounds and had three steals.

1989-90 (Toledo, Freshman): Appeared in 24 of 28 games and drew six starts...averaged 3.7 points and 3.5 rebounds per game for a Toledo squad which finished 12-16...averaged 6.8 points and 5.2 rebounds over the final six games...netted a season-high 10 points against Eastern Michigan and had 11 rebounds against Iowa State.







In 1993-94: One of just two Huskers to start all 31 games a year ago and one of four returning starters, Chubick



hopes to become just the third three-time first-team Academic All-Big Eight pick in school history, along with Jack Moore and John Matzke...Chubick owns a 3.19 cumulative grade point average in history...heads into his senior season with 46 career blocked shots, which is good for eighth on NU's all-time chart...a career 56.0 percent field goal shooter, he's also in position to make a run at one of the top two spots on that chart...he and teammate Eric Piatkowski are the only players in Nebraska history who have played on three-straight NCAA Tournament teams...owns team's best vertical jump at 32 inches, and posted the second-highest performance index score in fall strength and conditioning testing with 1,859 points...since arriving at NU in the fall of 1989, he's added 32 pounds to his 6-7 1/2 frame.

1992-93 (Junior): For the second-straight season, Chubick was a first-team Phillips 66 Academic All-Big Eight pick and a member of the Big Eight's all-sports academic honor roll, and in the process, became just the seventh Husker player to win at least two first-team certificates...his selection to the league's all-brain team marked the 10th straight year Nebraska had at least one first-team selection...he and fellow co-captain Jamar Johnson were the only Huskers to start all 31 games...was fourth on the team in scoring with an 8.4 average, and his 5.7 rebound average tied for second on the team, along with Piatkowski...his averages in conference play were slightly higher at 8.7 points and 5.8 rebounds...led team in field goal percentage with a .520 mark, a mark that would have ranked sixth in the Big Eight had he met the minimum of four field goals made per game played...hit 50.0 percent or better from the field in 21 games...netted a career-hightying 15 points and eight rebounds against Oklahoma in 19 minutes, as he went five-of-five from the field...scored in double figures 10 times, including 15-point efforts against both Sacramento State and Colgate...was second on the team in blocked shots (18), fifth in free throw percentage (.679)...grabbed a season-high 12 rebounds, one off his career-high, against Eastern Illinois...had a pair of double-doubles to his credit...grabbed five or more rebounds 21 times, including four double-figure board games...shared Ironman Award, given for team's top effort in the weight room, with teammate Jason Glock.

1991-92 (Sophomore): Broke his left foot in a preseason drill in September, and was sidelined until a week before the Huskers' Nov. 23 season opener against Sam Houston State...the layoff didn't bother Chubick, as he posted then-career-highs of 10 points and nine rebounds against the Bearkats, then bettered his scoring high with a 15-point effort two nights later against Southern Cal...first-team Phillips 66 Academic All-Big Eight pick and a member of Big Eight's all-sports academic honor roll...named to 1992 Big Eight's most-improved team...led team in field goal shooting at 59.6 percent, including 64.8 percent in Big Eight play...would have ranked third in the Big Eight in field goal percentage, but he didn't meet the minimum of five attempts per game...had only seven sub-.500 shooting games in 29 appearances...was second on team in blocked shots (23, tied for

seventh on NU's single-season list), fourth in rebounding (5.7), fifth in free throw shooting (.598) and tied for sixth in scoring (7.1)...averaged 6.6 rebounds in conference play (helped by a career-high 13 at Iowa State), which tied for seventh in league with teammate Carl Hayes...against Kansas in Lincoln, he blocked Alonzo Jamison's dunk attempt with one second left that would have won the game for Kansas, but instead sent the game into overtime (Nebraska went on to win in overtime)...had nine double-figure scoring games...grabbed five or more rebounds 19 times...made first career start against No. 3 Kansas at Lincoln...missed NU's eight-game European tour because he broke his left foot for the second time in seven months in a pickup game after the season.

1990-91 (Redshirt Freshman): A key reserve on NU's record-setting 26-8 team, Chubick saw action in 29 of 34 games, averaging 2.2 points and 1.9 rebounds in 7.1 minutes per game...came off the bench to score a then-career-high nine points and pull down four rebounds in nine minutes against Oklahoma at Lincoln...hit 63.2 percent from the field on the year, 90.9 percent (10-of-11) in Big Eight play...attempted just 38 field goals on the season...grabbed a then-career-high seven rebounds against Tennessee Tech, one of five games in which he grabbed five or more boards...longest playing stint of the season was 16 minutes against Tennessee Tech...played for Missouri Coach Norm Stewart's 1991 Big Eight Select Team which toured Italy, averaging 4.4 points per game while the team finished 4-2.

1989-90 (Freshman): After signing with the Cornhuskers in the fall of 1988, he elected to take a redshirt year along with fellow freshman Eric Piatkowski...he put the year to good use, gaining 15 pounds in the Huskers' strength and conditioning program... sustained an injury to his left shoulder in a July 1990 summer pickup game and underwent surgery to repair the damage, but recovered by the start of the 1990-91 season.

High School: Atkinson West Holt High School in Atkinson, Neb., 1989...in his final two seasons at West Holt, Chubick was regarded as the top player in the state of Nebraska and led the Huskies to 45 straight victories over that stretch...as a senior, he averaged 33.2 points and 16.7 rebounds per game en route to Nebraska Gatorade Player-of-the-Year honors, and helped the Huskies to a 21-1 record...two-time USA Today Nebraska Player-of-the-Year selection...dislocated his right shoulder in the Huskies' final 1989 regular-season game, underwent surgery following the season and was sidelined until June...ended his prep career with a 73-game double-figure scoring streak...the string included a career-high 61-point outburst against Omaha Flanagan as a senior...scored 40 or more points nine times, and was a three-




In 1993-94: A driving force on the Cornhuskers' last two NCAA Tournament teams, Jamar Johnson ranks as one of



the Big Eight's best playmakers...and for the second time in three seasons, he finds himself in the familiar position of being the only "true" point guard on the Nebraska roster...he heads into his senior campaign with 619 career points, and would have to average 14.1 points over the course of a 27-game schedule to become Nebraska's 17th 1,000-point career scorer...his 232 career assists rank eighth on NU's all-time list, eight behind No. 7 Eric Piatkowski...the top spot on the Husker assist chart is well out of reach, but No. 2 Jack Moore's second-place total of 382 is attainable if Johnson can average 5.6 assists per game... JJ is tied for fifth on the Huskers' all-time 3-point goals made list (67), is fifth on the 3-point attempts chart (187) and ninth on the steals chart (88)...after earning second-team All-Big Eight honors two seasons ago, Johnson could challenge for first-team recognition in his final campaign...he's started all 59 games that he's played in during his two-year career and he's trying to become the first player in Nebraska history to lead the team in both assists and steals for three consecutive seasons...no one has ever led the Huskers in steals for three straight seasons and only two players, Brian Carr and Jack Moore, have led the squad in assists for three consecutive years...racked up 1,121 points to rank third in NU's preseason strength index.

1992-93 (Junior): Johnson and teammate Bruce Chubick were the only Huskers to start all 31 games, as the duo teammed as co-captains...averaged 9.8 points, 2.9 rebounds and a team-high 3.3 assists per game for the season, 9.9 points, 2.6 rebounds and 3.1 assists in league play...led the team in assists (102) and steals (52) for the second-straight season, was second in minutes (863) and third in free throw percentage (.738)...hit 46.3 percent from the field in league play, compared to 43.4 percent marksmanship for the season...scored in double figures 14 times, including a 10-point effort against New Mexico State in the first round of the NCAA Tournament...netted 19 points in Nebraska's homecourt win over Oklahoma...had 18 points at Kansas, aided by an eight-of-10 effort from the field...his biggest play of the season, though, was a steal of a Missouri inbound pass with five seconds left which led to his game-winning free throw against the Tigers in Columbia...hit one-of-two free throws with two seconds left to break a 75-all tie and give NU a one-point win at Columbia, its first win there in seven tries under Coach Danny Nee...tallied a career-high 26 points, grabbed six rebounds and dished out four assists against Appalachian State and was named the Phillips 66 Big Eight Player-of-the-Week for his performance...also had 20 points in a loss at Oklahoma...had a season-high eight assists against The Citadel...Nebraska is 21-1 all-time when he's had five or more assists in a game, 7-1 in 1992-93...has collected at least one assist in 58 of 59 games he's played in at NU...his 52 steals ranked as the sixth-highest single-season total in school history...his 1.6 steals per game in conference play ranked eighth among league performers.

1991-92 (Sophomore): One of the most-heralded recruits in Nebraska history, Johnson more than lived up to that billing by

earning team MVP honors, the first NU soph ever to win the award...was a second-team Associated Press All-Big Eight pick and a member of the league's all-newcomer team (nonfreshman)...finished second to Kansas' Rex Walters in voting for Big Eight Newcomer-of-the-Year honors...was named Big Eight Player-of-the-Week after averaging 12.7 points, four assists and 3.7 rebounds in three games from Feb. 17-22...was at his best in Nebraska's two biggest wins—over Big Eight champion Kansas and No. 2 Oklahoma State...his 3-pointer at the buzzer in overtime gave Nebraska an 81-79 victory over then-No. 3 Kansas at Lincoln, Feb. 19th...scored career-high 25 points in the Huskers' upset of then-No. 2 (20-0) Oklahoma State, 85-69, at Lincoln on Feb. 5...scored in double figures 14 times, including four 20-orbetter games...led the team in 3-point percentage (.411), free throw percentage (.841), assists (130) and steals (36), was second in minutes (860)...ranked second in the Big Eight in free throw percentage, fifth in 3-point percentage, sixth in assists per game (4.6)...his 130 assists ranked as the eighth-best single-season mark in school history and his free throw percentage equaled the eighth-best mark...NU was 14-0 when JJ dished out five or more assists...led or shared the team lead in assists 16 times...dished out career-high nine assists against Missouri-Kansas City and at Southern Utah...had at least one assist in every game...played 30-plus minutes 17 times in 28 starts...averaged 17.3 points and 3.6 rebounds on NU's eight-game European tour...hit 57.4 percent from the field on the tour, including a sizzling 53.6 percent from 3-point range, and had a team-high 39 assists.

Concord lost to Bailey's Bedford North Lawrence team in the 1990 championship game, 63-60, before a national high school record crowd of 41,046 at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis...Bailey outscored Johnson, 30-20, in the title game...Concord was the state's top-ranked team over the last five weeks of the season and captured the Northern Lakes Conference title...Johnson scored a career-high 35 points in a 98-67 rout of then-No. 1-ranked Warsaw in his final prep season...played in the Indiana-Kentucky All-Star game following his final high school season...his 1,456 career points rank second on Concord's all-time scoring chart behind former teammate and Seattle SuperSonics standout Shawn Kemp...team MVP as a junior and senior and a three-time first-team all-conference pick...averaged 22.3 points and 6.0 assists as a junior for an 18-4 Minuteman squad and earned second-team all-state honors...as a sophomore, with Kemp in the lineup, Johnson averaged 14.0 points, 4.0 rebounds and 5.0 assists for a team that finished 28-1 and second in the state...his high school coach, Jim Hahn, is the brother of Billy Hahn, who was an assistant coach on Danny Nee's Ohio U. staff.


Eric Piatkowski

6-7 215 Senior Guard/Forward Rapid City, S.D. (Stevens)

In 1993-94: After turning in one of the finest all-around seasons in school history, Eric Piatkowski hopes to become the eighth player in NU history to earn first-team All-Big Eight recognition in consecutive seasons...fueled by an outstanding performance at the World University games last summer in Buffalo, N.Y., Piatkowski is also taking aim at All-America honors and the Wooden Award...one of 25 players on the United States Basketball Writers Association preseason player-of-the year list and a seventh-team preseason All-America pick by Basketball Weekly...rated as the nation's eighth-best small forward by the 1994 NCAA Preview Magazine...the Sporting News' Pro Basketball Yearbook listed Piatkowski as the sixth-best shooting guard prospect for the 1994 NBA Draft...the Cornhuskers' all-time leader in 3-point goals made (139) and attempted (392), he begins his senior season at No. 7 on NU's all-time scoring chart with 1,288 points... Hoppen's 2,167 points in a stellar career appears to be out of reach for the "Polish




Rifle," but No. 2 Jerry Fort's total of 1,882 is 594 points away for Piatkowski (an average of 22.0 points per



game)...Piatkowski is also seventh on the school's all-time assist chart (240), and ninth on the career rejection list (44)...his 16.7 scoring average rates fifth-best among Big Eight returnees.

1992-93 (Junior): Piatkowski was a first-team All-Big Eight pick by the Associated Press, the Big Eight coaches and the conference players, the first NU player honored since Hoppen earned the last of three-straight such awards during the 1985-86 season, and the first NU guard to be so honored since Jack Moore in 1982...also was a member of the USBWA District V all-star squad and was a second-team NABC District 12 pick...was named the CBS/ Chevrolet Nebraska Player-of-the-Game after pouring in a career-high 29 points in the Huskers' first round NCAA Tournament loss to New Mexico State...was 10-of-14 from the field vs. the Aggies, including three-of-five from 3-point range and sixof-eight at the line...the John R. Wooden Award candidate netted 24 points against Iowa State, including the game-winning basket with 11 seconds to play...only the fourth player in school history to reach the 1,000-point mark before the end of his junior season, joining Hoppen, Fort and Andre Smith...tallied 502 points, the ninth-best single-season effort in school history...led the Huskers and ranked fifth in the Big Eight in scoring with a 16.7 average...earned Jack Moore Award as Husker team MVP...scored in double figures 25 times, including eight 20-or-better efforts...led or shared the team lead in scoring 21 times...also led Nebraska in minutes played (894) and 3-point (.372) percentage, was second in free throw percentage (.760), tied for second with Chubick in rebounding (5.7), third in steals (33) and assists (75), fourth in field goal percentage (.485) and sixth in blocked shots (eight)...was eighth in the Big Eight in 3-point percentage, ninth in free throw percentage and tied for eighth in 3-pointers made per game (1.6)...in conference games only, he was sixth in scoring (16.6 ppg), eighth in field goal percentage (.482), fourth in free throw percentage (.827), fifth in 3-point percentage (.397) and seventh in 3-pointers made per game (1.8)...his 48 3-point goals equaled the fourth-best single-season effort in school history, while his percentage ranked as the ninthbest in school history...passed out a season-high five assists seven times...was named the Ameritas Classic MVP and the Phillips 66 Big Eight Player-of-the-Week after leading Nebraska to its fifth consecutive title by averaging 24 points and 12.5 rebounds in two games...had 23 points and a career-high 16 rebounds in the championship game win over Kent...over the summer, he played on the United States' World University Games team...only the second Nebraska men's basketball player ever to play in the Games, Piatkowski averaged 9.7 points and 3.1 rebounds per game...hit 56.0 percent of his field goals for the gold-medal winning team and 50.0 percent from 3-point range...scored a team-high 19 points in the United States' 103-73 victory over Italy and was in double-digits in two other games.

1991-92 (Sophomore): Earned honorable-mention All-Big Eight honors for the second-straight season...led the Cornhuskers and ranked 11th in the Big Eight in scoring with a 14.3 average...his



14.7 average in conference play ranked as the league's ninth-best mark...scored in double figures 24 times, including six 20-pointor-better outings...netted then-career-high 28 points in Huskers' 106-101 win at Southern Utah...hit for a Big Eight career-high 25 points at Oklahoma...was third on the team and eighth in the Big Eight in rebounding at 6.3 per game...pulled down five or more rebounds 21 times, including 15 boards against Eastern Washington...led team in minutes (873), was second in free throw percentage (.725) and assists (97)...hit 76.1 percent from the free throw line in conference play...NU was 13-0 when he shot 50 percent or better from the field...had five or more assists nine times...started 28 of 29 games...ranked ninth in the Big Eight in 3-point shooting for league games only at 38.7 percent...led NU backcourt players in blocked shots (18)...named to the Ameritas Classic All-Tournament Team...on Nebraska's 1992 European tour, he averaged a team-high 19.3 points per game.

1990-91 (Redshirt Freshman): A member of the Big Eight's allfreshman team, captain of UPI's all-bench team and an honorable-mention All-Big Eight pick by UPI... averaged 10.9 points and 3.7 rebounds per game overall, 11.4 points and 3.1 rebounds in Big Eight play...scored a then-career-high 22 points against Missouri at Lincoln, an effort aided by a then-school-record six 3-point goals (nine attempts)...appeared in all 34 games during the Huskers' record-setting 26-8 season, which tied the school record and broke the NU mark for freshman appearances...also set NU freshman records for 3-point goals made (44) and attempted (127)...led the Cornhuskers and ranked third in the Big Eight in free throw shooting at 83.7 percent...his effort at the free throw line was the best ever by a Nebraska freshman and the 10th-best single-season effort in school history...he hit 81.8 percent at the free throw line in conference play, the fourth-best mark in the league...tallied 372 points for the season, the thirdhighest total ever recorded by a Husker freshman, behind Dave Hoppen's 445 in 1982-83 and Jerry Fort's 376 in 1972-73...his 10.9 scoring average was the third-best mark among Big Eight freshmen, behind Oklahoma's Jeff Webster (18.3 ppg) and Missouri's Jevon Crudup (12.0 ppg)...a double-figure scorer 19 times...grabbed five or more rebounds 11 times with a high of nine vs. Oklahoma in the Big Eight Tournament...played for Minnesota Coach Clem Haskins' 4-0 gold-medal winning North team at the 1991 U.S. Olympic Festival at Los Angeles...he was the North's second-leading scorer at 11.8 points per game.

1989-90 (Freshman): Signed with NU in fall of 1988 and took a voluntary redshirt season along with teammate Bruce Chubick.

High School: Stevens High School, Rapid City, S.D., 1989...earned South Dakota's 1989 Mr. Basketball honor after leading Stevens to an 18-4 record and the state Class AA title...averaged 25.6


In 1993-94: Erick Strickland turned in one of the finest allaround seasons ever by a Nebraska freshman and this



multi-talented athlete is set to take his game to a new level as a sophomore...the first athlete in Nebraska history to turn professional in one sport and retain his collegiate eligibility in another, Strickland has spent the last two summers playing in the Florida Marlins' minor league system...like last year, Cornhusker coaches are counting on Strickland for help at the defensive end of the court, and he should be able to swing between the off- and point guard positions...had the Huskers' best performance index score of fall conditioning, as he tallied 2,022 points.

HEAD COACH DANNY NEE

233-160 Overall (13 years) 126-93 at Nebraska (seven years)

Just four seasons removed from a 10-18 record and back-toback seventh-place league finishes, Coach Danny Nee continues his amazing turnaround of Nebraska's basketball fortunes.

Consider that since the 1989-90 season, the Cornhuskers own the Big Eight's third-best record at 65-29 (.691) and have earned three-straight NCAA Tournament invitations. NU's record over the last three seasons is the best three-year run in school history.

Only the third Nebraska coach since 1963, following the late, long-time skipper Joe Cipriano (1963-80), and Moe Iba (1981-86), Nee was tabbed as Nebraska's 24th head coach on March 27, 1986. He owns a 13-year head coaching record of 233-149, and a

seven-year NU mark of 126-93. The only coach in school history to win 20 games in three different seasons and take three Nebraska teams to the NCAA Tournament, Nee's 126 wins rank second only to Cipriano's school-record 253 victories. He's only the fifth coach in school history to be at the helm eight or more seasons, and he's taken five of his first seven squads to postseason play.


The 1992-93 campaign was another history-maker for Nee and his rags to riches program, as NU landed a spot in the NCAA Tournament for an unprecedented third consecutive season. In addition, the Cornhuskers won 20 games (against 11 losses) for the third time in Nee's tenure. Nebraska tied for second in the Big Eight with an 8-6 record, its best league finish in 12 seasons.

The 1992-93 season may well have been the most-anticipated Nebraska basketball campaign ever. Fueled by arguably the best recruiting class in school history, rave reviews from national publications, and the return of four starters, Nebraska raced to a 7-0 record and climbed to 17th in the Associated Press poll. However, the Cornhuskers dropped six of their next 11 games, started league play 0-3 for the first time since the 1989-90 season, and hopes for another NCAA trip were dented.

But, while some were labling Nee's seventh team as one of the nation's most-disappointing squads at the midway point in the season, Nee rallied his troops to wins in eight of their final 12 games and a share of second place in the Big Eight. Nee's team dumped No. 3 Kansas in Lincoln for the third-straight season, swept Big Eight Tournament champion Missouri for the first time since 1973-74 and scored its most-lopsided conference road win in 60 years with an 80-59 victory at Kansas State. The Cornhuskers, who headed into the final week of league play with an outside shot at their first Big Eight title in some 53 seasons, also produced their first All-Big Eight performer of the Nee-era in guard Eric Piatkowski.

For the third consecutive season, Nebraska set a new total attendance mark as the Huskers' drew 213,715 fans for 16 home dates. The year prior to Nee's arrival, NU averaged 9,741 fans per outing, and last year the Huskers averaged a record 13,357, an

increase of 3,616 fans per game in seven seasons. In the last three years alone, some 621,270 fans have attended Nebraska home basketball games, which accounts for 21.8 percent of the





When he came to Nebraska from Ohio University after the Huskers' first-ever NCAA appearance in March 1986, he inherited a senior-dominated, but inexperienced squad. The team gelled late in the 1986-87 season, finished 21-12 and was third in the National Invitation Tournament (NIT).

Nee's Huskers stood 12-8 overall and 2-5 in the league at the halfway point in the 1987 Big Eight campaign. However, NU won five of its last seven conference games, advanced to the NIT Final Four at Madison Square Garden and missed the school record for victories by one. Along the way, a then-school-record 197,395 fans packed the Devaney Center for 17 home games.

With those seniors gone, however, the difficult rebuilding process began just as the Big Eight became one of the nation's dominant basketball conferences. Nee's second year at the Husker helm saw three league teams reach the final eight of the NCAA Tourney, with Kansas beating Oklahoma in an all-Big Eight final.

The result in 1987-88 was Nebraska's first losing season in 15 years (13-18), but there were enough moments of youthful

brilliance to give hope for the future, including a 70-68 comefrom-behind homecourt win over eventual national champion Kansas.

The Nebraska roster was still freshman- and sophomore-dominated for Nee's third season in 1988-89, but the Huskers climbed back over the .500 mark, finished 17-16, returned to post-season play with an NIT bid and advanced to the second round before being eliminated at Ohio State. Nee's fourth Husker team finished 10-18 in 1989-90, when the Huskers missed the school record for season losses by one. However, four of the losses came to No. 1-ranked teams in a season that saw the Big Eight's Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma trade the top national ranking back-and-forth.

Operation Turnaround

The 1990-91 season promised to be a pivotal year in Nee's rebuilding program. For the first time in four years, Nee had a solid nucleus of seniors to build upon. But the presence of Rich King, Clifford Scales, Beau Reid and Keith Moody did little to impress the Big Eight-area media, who picked Nebraska to finish a distant last in the league's preseason poll.

That voting prompted the best-remembered question at the annual preseason Big Eight Basketball Media Day at Kansas City, Mo., and it came from Nee at the start of his interview session: "Why did you guys pick us last?"

There was silence from the assembled writers then, and some embarrassment later when the Huskers roared out to a 16-1 start, helped by a school-record-tying 14-game win string, got into the wire service rankings for the first time in 13 seasons, and went on to NU's highest final rankings ever at No. 9 in the UPI poll and No. 11 in the AP listing.


And, instead of finishing last in the Big Eight, the Huskers ended up third at 9-5, one game back of co-champs Oklahoma State and Kansas. NU then advanced to the finals of the Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament for the first time in school history, but dropped a 90-82 decision to Missouri, and finished the year with a disappointing 89-84 loss to Xavier in the first round of the NCAA Midwest Regional.

For his efforts, Nee was named the 1991 Big Eight Coach-ofthe-Year by both the Associated Press and United Press International, District V Coach-of-the-Year by the U.S. Basketball Writers Association, and finished fourth in AP's National Coach-ofthe-Year balloting.

With the loss of more than 60 percent of its scoring and rebounding punch from the 1991 squad, the 1991-92 season figured to be a transition year for Nebraska and Nee.

However, Nee developed a blend of veteran players, rookies and pleasant surprises into a unit which shot out to a 12-1 record and finished 19-10 overall. The Huskers were 7-7 (fifth) in the nation's toughest league—the Big Eight, and earned a second-straight NCAA Tournament bid.

Along the way, the Huskers pulled off two of the biggest upsets in the 1991-92 college basketball season. In consecutive home games in February, Nebraska thumped second-ranked, 20-0, Oklahoma State (85-69), then beat third-ranked Kansas (81-79) when Jamar Johnson hit a 3-pointer from the corner on an



inbounds pass from Carl Hayes with one second left in overtime. The win over the Big Eight Champion Jayhawks propelled the Huskers into the AP rankings at No. 25 the following week, marking the first time NU had ever been ranked in consecutive seasons.

Nee also picked up his 200th career victory (86-67 over Wisconsin) and his 100th Nebraska win (74-71 over Missouri-Kansas City).

Bobcat Tracks

Rebuilding, though, is nothing new for the 48-year-old Brooklyn native. In his six years at Ohio, his teams won 107 and lost 67, including an 87-33 record the last four years and he twice was named Mid-American Conference Coach-of-the-Year—but it was far from easy. He took over a struggling program at the Athens, Ohio, school in 1980-81, started his head-coaching career with an 11-game losing streak and suffered through a 7-20 season. His second Bobcat team improved to 13-14, though, and was followed by four consecutive 20-game winners.

--Cotton Fitzsimmons, Phoenix Suns General Manager In 1982-83, Nee's squad won an OU-record number of games in a 23-9 campaign, captured the MAC title, and he was rewarded with conference and Ohio Coach-of-the-Year honors. The Bobcats went to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in nine years, beat Illinois State (51-49) in the first round of the Mideast Regional before losing to Kentucky in the second round, 57-40.


The Bobcats finished 20-8 in 1983-84, but did not earn a postseason bid. A year later, Ohio U. went 22-8, again captured

the MAC title and advanced to the NCAA Tournament, where it dropped a 49-38 first-round decision to Kansas.

In 1985-86, the Bobcats finished 22-8 for the second-straight season, but were second in the MAC behind Miami (Ohio). Ohio U. received an NIT bid, but lost a first-round game to eventual tournament champion Ohio State, 65-62.

Wake Up the Echos

Nee went to Ohio after four years as an assistant coach under Richard "Digger" Phelps at Notre Dame. During that time, the Fighting Irish were 91-27 and went to the NCAA Tournament all four years, including a Final Four appearance in 1978 and an appearance in the Mideast Regional final in 1979. He recruited and coached 10 current and former NBA players at Notre Dame.

Nee Roots

Nee played high school basketball at Power Memorial High School in New York, where one of his teammates was Kareem Abdul-Jabbar (then known as Lew Alcindor).

A member of Al McGuire's first recruiting class at Marquette University, Nee captained the Warriors' freshman team for frosh coach Hank Raymonds before a two-year tour of duty in the United States Marine Corps. A Vietnam veteran, he received Combat Air Insignia Medals and an honorable discharge in 1968.

He returned to college at St. Mary of the Plains College in Dodge City, Kan., and received a bachelor's degree in English and physical education in 1971. At St. Mary, he was on the Dean's List, was listed in Who's Who Among American Colleges and Universities, and was president of the student body as a senior. He played two years of basketball there before launching his coaching career as a student assistant for the Cavaliers in 1970-71. Nee, who will be inducted into the Ohio University Hall of Fame in 1994, received a master's degree in health, physical education and recreation from Kansas State in 1972.

Nee coached the junior varsity basketball team at Red Bank, N.J., Regional High School to a 14-6 record in 1972-73. He then became head coach at Brick Township, N.J., High School, where he compiled a 38-35 record in three years before going on to Notre Dame. His Brick Township teams were 32-15 the last two years, winning a school-record 16 games each season.

He is married to the former Janet Scheib of Pittsburgh, Pa., and is the father of three children, Patrick, 16, Nora, 8, and Kevin, 6.



GARY BARGEN

Assistant Coach, Eighth Season



Gary Bargen is the dean of Coach Danny Nee's coaching staff, having joined the program in the spring of 1986 after eight years as head coach at Hutchinson (Kan.) Community College.



During his tenure at Hutchinson, his Dragon teams compiled a 199-56 (.780) record, including a 31-7 mark and a third-place finish in the NJCAA Tournament in 1985-86. A two-time Region VI Coach-of-the-Year selection, Bargen's Dragon teams won 22 or more games every season, won or shared six Jayhawk Conference titles and twice captured Region VI crowns.

Before going to Hutchinson, Bargen spent nine years as coach and athletic director at Southeast (Neb.) Community College-Fairbury (then known as Fairbury Junior College). He compiled a 140-68 (.673) record at Fairbury, where one of his players was present-day Kansas State Head Coach Dana Altman, and his teams twice captured conference titles. He also earned a pair of Nebraska Community College Conference Coach-of-the-Year awards.



Assistant Coach, Second Season



Jimmy Williams, the newest member of Coach Danny Nee's coaching staff, enters his second season with the Cornhuskers and his 21st as a Division I assistant coach.

Williams, who joined the

Nebraska staff in August of 1992, came to Lincoln after spending three seasons on Coach Jim Brandenburg's San Diego State staff. Before joining the Aztec staff, Williams served one season (1988-89) as an assistant at the University of Tulsa under Coach J.D. Barnett. He helped the Golden Hurricane to a 17-11 record and a second-place finish in the Missouri Valley Conference.

Prior to his stints at San Diego State and Tulsa, Williams was an assistant at the University of Minnesota from the 1971-72 season through the 1985-86 campaign, first under Bill Musselman and later Jim Dutcher. During his 15-year tenure with the Golden Gophers, Minnesota won a pair of Big Ten titles, finished in the upper division of the rugged Big Ten nine times, made eight postseason tournament appearances and had a .500 or better overall record 12 times.

As an assistant at UM, Williams, 45, recruited and coached 18 student-athletes who went on to play in the National Basketball Association, nine of whom remain active today. Golden Gopher and NBA standouts who Williams personally recruited include Mychal Thompson, Ray Williams, Jim Petersen and Randy Breuer. While at Minnesota, Basketball Times rated him as one of the nation's top 15 recruiters.

A native of Havana, Fla., Williams graduated from Ashland (Ohio) College in 1969 with a bachelor of arts degree in education. He was a college division All-America basketball player for the Eagles and helped the school to the 1969 college division national title.

He spent a year and a half teaching and coaching in high schools in Ohio and Washington D.C., then joined the Golden Gopher staff in 1971 as an assistant coach/head freshman coach.

Williams has a nine-year-old daughter, Christina Marie.




Jeff Smith



CHANCELLOR

Graham Spanier became the 17th Chancellor of the

University of Nebraska-Lincoln on November 1, 1991. He holds academic appointments as Professor of Human Development and the Family and Professor of Family Practice at the University of Nebraska Medical Center.

He came to this post after serving as Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs at Oregon State University. His previous administrative posts included an appointment as Vice Provost for Undergraduate Studies at the State University of New York at Stony Brook and service in three administrative positions at The Pennsylvania State University.

He is a family sociologist, demographer and marriage and family therapist. He received his Ph.D. in Sociology from Northwestern University, where he was a Woodrow Wilson Fellow. He earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from Iowa State University, where he was named an outstanding alumnus.

The quality and stability of marriage has been the focus of his teaching, research and writing. He is an active writer and researcher with more than 100 scholarly publications, including 10 books. He has served as a consultant to the U.S. Bureau of the Census, the National Science Foundation, the National Academy of Sciences, and the National Institute of Mental Health. He was the founding editor of the Journal of Family Issues and has served as a reviewer on the editorial boards of 25 other journals.

He has been president of the National Council on Family Relations, has served as chairman of the American Sociological Association Family Section, is a clinical member and fellow of the American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy, and serves on the Board of Directors of the Christian Children's Fund. He received the James Moran Award for "significant contributions to knowledge of family relations and child development" from the American Home Economics Association.

His other interests include aviation and magic. He has a commercial pilot's license with an instrument rating, and he occasionally does magic shows for children. Spanier also hosts a bi-weekly call-in show on Lincoln radio station KFOR.

He is married to Sandra Whipple Spanier, an English professor and author specializing in 20th century American literature. They have a 12-year-old son, Brian, and a nine-year-old daughter, Hadley.

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BILL BYRNE

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

A new chapter in the Cornhuskers' rich athletic tradition began on June 26, 1992, when Bill Byrne was introduced as the person to succeed longtime Husker athletic director Bob Devaney. Byrne became the 10th athletic director in the history of Nebraska athletics, and just the third since 1962.

Byrne, an energetic 48-year-old, came to Nebraska from the University of Oregon where he was athletic director for eight years. Recently named to the College Football Association's Board of Directors, this is Byrne's second basketball season as the Huskers' athletic director.

He arrived in Lincoln on Nov. 1, 1992, took the reins of the athletic department on Jan. 4, 1993, and has been a tireless worker every step of the way. During his first year on the job, Byrne traveled with almost every Husker team on at least one road trip and traveled the state of Nebraska too, visiting with boosters and learning the needs and concerns of Husker fans everywhere.

During the transition year under Byrne, the athletic department never missed a beat. In fact, during the 1992-93 season, Nebraska:

- ✓ Won its 14th straight Big Eight Conference all-sports championship;
- ✓ Won seven conference championships (football, wrestling, men's gymnastics, men's swimming, women's indoor and outdoor track and volleyball);
- ✓ Finished in the upper division of the conference standings in 15 of 21 sports.

In addition to maintaining a high standard of excellence in the athletic arena, Byrne has successfully reorganized the department for the 21st century. Stressing more efficient use of resources, Byrne is in the process of completing a one-stop shopping type of organization so that the needs

of student-athletes, fans and contributors can be met as promptly as possible.

A member of the NCAA committee for athletic certification, Byrne is making an aggressive effort, along with other Big Eight Conference athletic directors, to place Nebraska and other conference officials on NCAA committees in an effort to better represent the views of Big Eight member institutions.

His plans for the future could lead to even more success for the Huskers. He has already announced plans to add a women's soccer team for the 1994-95 academic year, which will bump the Cornhuskers' league-leading sport sponsorship total to 22. An innovator in intercollegiate athletics, Byrne also plans to install new sound systems and scoreboards in virtually all of the Husker athletic facilities. Among his future plans is the possibility of renovating Memorial Stadium with a new press box, sky boxes, more concessions and comfortable facilities for disabled fans.

In conjunction with the rest of the UNL administration, Byrne has arranged to use the Husker football and basketball radio networks to promote causes and concerns which are important to the entire University community, including the University's increased role in research.

The continued success of the overall Nebraska program should come as no surprise considering Byrne's previous accomplishments. He went to Oregon in 1982 as associate athletic director and the top administrator for the Duck Athletic Fund. He immediately established fundraising offices in Portland and Southern Oregon and established a full-time marketing and promotions operation, which blossomed to encompass the Oregon Sports Network for in-house production of the Ducks' athletic contests on radio and television on a state-wide basis.

He assumed the duties of director of athletics in late summer of 1984 as one of the youngest directors in Division I athletics. He served in that role from 1984 to November of 1992. During his eight-year tenure as athletic director, Oregon qualified for postseason competition in football, men's and women's basketball, volleyball, wrestling, softball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's track and field, and men's golf. Meanwhile, the Ducks' overall budget soared to \$12.5 million in 1992 from \$5 million in 1984.

One of Byrne's most noted accomplishments at Oregon was the three-year construction project to build the \$11 million Casanova Athletic Center, the home of the Ducks' football team and athletic department offices. The \$19 million project, which

was completed in 1992, also included a new press box, sky suites, and a complete renovation of Autzen Stadium. The facility was financed through skybox and skysuite revenues, sale of sponsor seats and cash and gift-in-kind donations.

Respected by his peers, Byrne served as president of the National Association of Athletic Directors (NACDA) in the 1991-92 academic year and is in his fourth year on that organization's executive committee. He was also chairman of the Pacific-10 Conference executive committee and



was named national fund-raiser of the year by the National Athletic Fund-Raisers Association.

Born in Boston, Byrne grew up in Idaho and attended Idaho State University, where he served as student body president. He received his bachelor's and master's degrees in business at the Pocatello school in 1967 and 1971, respectively. Before going to Oregon in 1982, he was assistant athletic director at San Diego State University (1980-82), executive director for the University of New Mexico Lobo Club (1976-79) and director of alumni relations at Idaho State (1971-76).

Byrne, described by his peers as persistent, optimistic, enthusiastic and diligent, said his first priority at Nebraska would be to get to know Husker supporters both in and out of Nebraska. His goal as athletic director is, "to continue the high level of performance that Nebraska has enjoyed, while preparing the athletic program for the challenges of the 21st century."

A professional educator, Byrne's wife Marilyn served as a middle school principal in Oregon. She is completing coursework for a Ph.D. and is teaching at UNL. The Byrnes have two sons, Bill, who is employed by Visa in San Francisco, and Greg, a senior at Arizona State University.



BOB DEVANEY

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR EMERITUS

When one talks about the success the University of Nebraska has enjoyed in intercollegiate athletics over the years, one name tops the list of persons responsible-Bob Devaney. On Jan. 4, 1993, Devaney stepped down as athletic director and turned the reins over to Bill Byrne. Now in his 32nd year with the athletic department, Devaney serves in the role of Athletic Director Emeritus and fund-raiser.

He arrived in 1962, charged with the mission of building a successful football program, and he succeeded far beyond anyone's expectations. During an 11-year stint as Husker football coach, Devaney's

teams won 101, lost only 20 and tied two for a winning percentage of .829. His career mark of 136-30-7 for .806 ranked him as the nation's winningest coach at the time of his retirement in 1973. Devaney's teams won eight Big Eight titles and two national championships during the 1962-72 span, with his teams going to nine bowl games. He twice won four consecutive Big Eight titles.

Devaney's 1971 team, which posted a 13-0 record and twice played for the national championship (beating Oklahoma, 35-31, in the "Game of Century," and Alabama, 38-6, in the Orange Bowl), has been hailed as the best college team of all time. Bob was inducted into the National Football Foundation's Hall of Fame in 1981.

He took over as the Huskers' athletic director in 1967, and brought the same success he enjoyed as football coach to the overall Cornhusker athletic program. Under his leadership, Nebraska annually set the pace in the Big Eight all-sports race with solid entries in all men's and women's sports.

Under Devaney's guidance, Memorial Stadium was enlarged, artificial turf has been installed and replaced four times, a stadium office building was constructed and sports facilities such as the Cook Pavillion indoor workout facility, Otto and Gladys Baumann Baseball Complex, Buck Beltzer Stadium, Ed Weir Track and the women's softball stadium have come into being.

It was Devaney's leadership, working in conjunction with the Nebraska Legislature, that resulted in the passage of a special cigarette tax to provide funds for a new athletic complex, the beautiful basketball arena-indoor track-swimming and sports building which opened on the State Fair Grounds in 1976. University of Nebraska Regents recognized Devaney's contributions to that four-and-a-half acre structure by naming it the Bob Devaney Sports Center in 1978.

Devaney received many other honors during his coaching career. He was named coach-of-the-year by the Walter Camp Foundation, the Football Writers of America, Football News and the Washington Touchdown Club in 1971, and he was tabbed to coach in numerous all-star games such as the Hula Bowl, Coaches All-America, Blue-Gray and Shrine Bowl East-West games. He also coached the College All-Stars against the Dallas Cowboys in the 1972 Chicago game.

A 1939 graduate of Alma (Mich.) College, Devaney served as a high school coach at Big Beever, Keego Harbor, Saginaw and Alpena in Michigan before joining Biggie Munn and Duffy Daugherty at Michigan State. In 1957, he became head coach at Wyoming where his teams posted a 35-10-5 five-year record.

Devaney is married to the former Phyllis Wiley. They have a son, Mike, and a daughter, Pat, both graduates of the University of Michigan. Bob and Phyllis also have two grandchildren.



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BIG EIGHT BASKETBALL: THE NATION'S BEST

Every player wants the chance to play the best and when it comes to college basketball, the Big Eight Conference is the Big Time. From the lights of ESPN's Big Monday through March Madness otherwise known as the NCAA Tournament, the Big Eight commands the nation's respect.

Long recognized as one of the nation's top all-around intercollegiate athletic conferences, the last decade has seen the Big Eight grow into one of the nation's most powerful and respected basketball leagues. Consider that ...

✓ Two Big Eight teams were ranked in the final Associated Press Top 25 last season--Kansas was No. 9 and Oklahoma State was No. 23. Nebraska, Kansas State, Iowa State and Missouri received votes.

✓ For the second-consecutive season, the Big Eight landed a league-record six teams in the NCAA Tournament. Nebraska, Kansas, Iowa State, Kansas State, Missouri and Oklahoma State earned NCAA invites, while Oklahoma landed an NIT berth. The six NCAA qualifiers were matched only by the Atlantic Coast Conference for the high among conferences, and the Big Eight was the only conference to have all but one of its members in postseason play. The 1992-93 campaign marked the ninth-straight season that the Big Eight sent at least five teams into postseason play. The Big Eight ranks fourth among all Division I conferences in both NCAA Tournament victories and Final Four appearances.

✓ The seven Big Eight teams which earned postseason tournament invites all posted .500 or better records, while six were above .625. In league action, six teams posted records of .500 or better. It was only the third time in 35 seasons since the league expanded to eight teams that six schools had 7-7 or better conference records. Five of those seven teams won 20 or more games, including Nebraska.

✓ The Big Eight has produced 22 first-round NBA draft picks since 1980, 15 of which have come in the last five seasons. Nebraska's Rich King was one of five 1991 Big Eight first-rounders, as the Seattle SuperSonics took him with the 14th pick of the draft. In 1988, the Big Eight's entire first-team all-conference unit was tabbed in the first round of the NBA draft.

✓ Some 12 million fans flocked through Big Eight arena turnstiles in the 1980s and the pace hasn't slowed down much since then. In 1992-93, the Big Eight had its third-best year ever

at the gate, as 1,345,278 fans attended league games, for an average of 10,677 per game. It was the fifth-consecutive year that the Big Eight drew at least 1.3 million. The Big Eight ranked third nationally in per-game average and four schools, including Nebraska, ranked in the top 24 in per-game attendance average. NU was 23rd with its record-average of 13,357.


✓ The Big Eight is one of three conferences to have had two of its teams meet in the NCAA championship game. In 1988, Kansas and Oklahoma played for the national title at Kansas City, Mo., the home of the conference office, and the Jayhawks scored an 83-79 victory.

But, success in hoops is nothing new to the Big Eight, as its list of basketball alumni reads like a who's who of the sport. Dr. James Naismith, the game's inventor, once coached at Kansas, and players like Wilt Chamberlain, Jo Jo White, Scott Wedman, Alvan Adams, Steve Stipanovich, Jeff Hornacek, Danny Manning, Wayman Tisdale, Harvey Grant, Jeff Grayer, Mitch Richmond and the Huskers' Dave Hoppen and Rich King, all called the Big Eight home.

The Big Eight Conference, America's oldest such organization composed solely of state institutions, is headed by 13-year Commissioner Carl James, and his staff includes some of the finest professionals in intercollegiate athletics today. Dr. Prentice

Gautt is in his 15th year with the conference and was elevated to associate commissioner in 1983.

Tim Allen, service bureau director from 1983-89, was promoted to assistant commissioner in 1990, replacing veteran conference staff member Bill Hancock, who moved on to the NCAA as director of the men's Division I basketball tournament. Former Wisconsin basketball coach John Erickson, in his sixth year with the league, is assistant commissioner in charge of basketball operations. Jeff Bollig serves as the league's service bureau director and he is assisted by Chris Thiesen and Michelle Strang.





✓ Nebraska has won 12 of the last 14 meetings between the teams to take a 56-55 series lead. Nebraska has won 11 straight from the Buffs in Lincoln.

✓ Nebraska handed Kansas State 36-point setback in series' initial game at Manhattan during 1905-06 season.

✔ Huskers' 21-point win at Kansas State last season was their largest over the 'Cats since 1905-06 campaign, biggest margin of victory in league road contest since 1932-33 season.

✓ Nebraska beat Kansas State, 66-62, for first and only Big Eight Holiday Tournament title in 1967.

✓ After upsetting Kansas in 1958 at Lincoln, Huskers upset Kansas State and Omaha product Bob Boozer in their next outing, 55-48. Despite the loss, Kansas State was No. 1 in the Associated Press poll when the new ranking came out the day after the game and 'Cats went on to finish fourth in NCAA Tournament.



Huskers Win 20, Make Third-Straight NCAA Trip

Without question, the 1992-93 Nebraska basketball season was one of the most-anticipated campaigns in school history, and Coach Danny Nee's Cornhuskers responded to the pressure by:

✓ Earning a third-straight NCAA Tournament bid. The Huskers are one of three Big Eight teams which have earned an NCAA Tournament invite in each of the last three seasons. It was just the school's fourth NCAA bid in the 55-year history of the tournament. As an institution, Nebraska was one of 14 Division I schools to have both its men's and women's teams earn NCAA Tournament bids

✓ Winning 20 games (against 11 losses) for the second time in the last three seasons and for the third time in seven campaigns under Nee. NU's record over the last three seasons, 65-29, is the best three-year run the school has ever produced and rates as the Big Eight's third-best mark


behind Kansas and Oklahoma State over that stretch. It marked just the seventh time in 97 seasons of basketball that the Cornhuskers had reached the 20-win plateau.

✓ Nebraska also tied for second (with Iowa State and Oklahoma State) in the Big Eight at 8-6. It was NU's highest league finish since the 1980-81 season, and the eight league wins gave the Huskers' three-straight .500 or better records in conference play.

"All the accomplishments of the teams that get into the tournament go out the window, and you are judged solely on the tournament. That's just how it is, and we'll have to deal with it," Nee said following the Huskers' 93-79 loss to New Mexico State in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

"But this program, seven years ago wouldn't think about playing in three NCAAs in a row. The thinking then was NIT or just a winning season."

Nebraska opened the season with lofty expections, and were ranked 25th in the first two Associated Press polls before being dropped the week of its first game. NU, though, responded by winning its

fifth-straight Ameritas Classic title by downing Colgate, 108-76, in the opener. Swingman Eric Piatkowski had a gamehigh 25 points to lead the Cornhuskers, while forward Bruce Chubick had a career-high-tying 15 points and guard Jaron Boone had 14.

Less than 24 hours later, NU handed Kent an 85-61 loss in the Ameritas Classic title game. Piatkowski had a game-high 23 points and grabbed a career-high 16 rebounds. He was named the Ameritas Classic MVP, and was joined on the all-tourney team by center Derrick Chandler.

Those two wins were good enough to move Nebraska back into the Top 25 at No. 25 in the Dec. 7 AP listing and Piatkowski's performance earned him Phillips 66 Big Eight Conference Player-of-the-Week honors for his efforts in the Ameritas Classic.

The Citadel visited the Devaney Center next and the Huskers' tagged their Southern Conference opponent with an 86-46 setback. It was Nebraska's best defensive effort of the season, but it was a costly one, as Chandler went down with a sprained left foot. Boone came off the bench to lead the NU attack with a career-high 15 points.

With Chandler slowed by a sore left foot, the Cornhuskers responded by handing intrastate rival Creighton a 100-83 loss.

Nebraska bolted to a 16-6 lead in the opening seven minutes en route to its first 100-point outing ever against its intrastate rival. The Huskers held a 42-33 half-time lead, then built the advantage to 26, 76-50, with 9:14 remaining. Piatkowski again led the NU attack with 21 points.

"We played a good team real hard," CU Coach Rick Johnson said. "They're very talented individually, well coached and they play hard. They have a national ranking and they're very deserving."

The win was NU's thirdstriaght over the Bluejays for the first time since a six-game win string from 1981-82 through 1985-86 and marked CU's ninth consecutive Devaney Center loss.

With four-straight home wins, NU took to the road for the first time and handed Wichita State a 71-64 loss. Piatkowski had 19 points and Jamar Johnson added 15 as the Cornhuskers improved to 5-0 for the first time since the


1984-85 campaign.

After a week off for final exams, No. 20 Nebraska handed Appalachian State a 93-83 setback. Johnson led the way with a career-high 26 points and six rebounds, while a healthy Chandler added 24 points and 13 rebounds. Johnson was named the Big Eight's Player-of-the-Week for his efforts against the Mountaineers. The game also marked the debut of center Amos Gregory, who missed NU's first five games.

High-scoring Texas-Arlington was next up for the 16th-(USA Today/CNN) and 17th-(AP) ranked Cornhuskers, and NU responded with a 116-95 thumping of the Mavericks. Six players, led by Terrance Badgett's career-high 17 points, were in double figures as NU moved to 7-0 for the first time since the 1984-85 season.

The Huskers then hit the road for a trip to Southern Cal and Hawaii's Rainbow Classic. NU shot a season-low 31.7 percent from the field in a 74-64 setback to Southern Cal, a loss that dropped NU's record to 7-1.

Things didn't get much better in Hawaii, as defending NCAA runner-up Michigan beat the No. 20 Cornhuskers in the first round of the Rainbow Classic, 88-73. Southwestern Louisiana sent NU to its third-straight loss, 109-80.



Piatkowski averaged a team-high 16.7 points per game as a junior en route to first-team All-Big Eight honors.

Nebraska handed Fordham a 79-55 setback in its last Rainbow Classic game, and headed home with an 8-3 record. The Huskers then dispatched of Eastern Illinois, Southern Utah and Missouri-Kansas City to take an 11-3 mark into its Big Eight schedule.

The Cornhuskers opened league play with a tough two-game swing through Oklahoma. No. 25 (USA Today/CNN) NU began its trip with a 102-89 setback at ninth-(USA Today/CNN) and 10th-(AP) ranked Oklahoma, as the Sooners forced the Huskers into a season-high 28 turnovers. Piatkowski, playing with the flu, was held to season-low six points, but Johnson picked up the slack with 20 points.

Game two of this opening road trip sent the Cornhuskers to Stillwater, where Bryant Reeves and Company were waiting. NU turned in one of its guttiest efforts of the season, but the Cowboys came away with a 78-73 victory. The game was played a day after OSU's legendary coach, Herny Iba, passed away.

Nebraska returned home and dumped Sacramento State, 86-70, to move its record to 12-5 overall.

Kansas State invaded the Devaney Center and handed Nebraska its third-straight Big Eight loss, 66-64.

In search of win No. 1 in Big Eight play, the Huskers headed to Boulder, Colo., and an ESPN Big Monday test against the Buffaloes. Nebraska broke outs its black road uniforms and fell behind by a 60-56 count with 5:16 to play, before using a 26-7 spree to secure an 82-67 victory.

With its conference record at 1-3, Mis-

souri invaded the Devaney Center looking to run its league record to 4-0. Instead, the Tigers watched as Husker rookie Erick Strickland scored a school freshman record 28 points in the Huskers' 88-87 overtime win over the Tigers.

"It was an extraordinary performance," Nee said. "I'm pleased he did it when he did because we needed every one of his baskets.

"A lot of guys on our team have the ability to score 28 points, I'm just glad Erick chose today to do it."

NU hit the road hoping to square its Big Eight record at 3-3, but Iowa State shot 54.6 percent from the field in ending the Huskers' two-game win streak at the Hilton.

Next up was No. 3 Kansas in Lincoln and a visit from ABC's Dick Vitale. The Huskers trailed the Jayhawks by 12 early in the second half, but a 13-0 second-half run coupled with a defensive effort that held the Jayhawks to 28.0 percent shooting in the final half, spelled "W" for the Huskers, 68-64. Chandler hit two free throws with 28 seconds left to give NU a 66-64 lead, then batted a Rex Walters' pass into Husker Terrance Badgett's hand with the clock winding down and Badgett went coast-to-coast for a dunk at the gun.

"It's a big, big, big win," Nee said. "It gives us national credibility in that we can earn a spot in the NCAAs. Our kids gave a super-human effort in the second half and never quit or got down. It wasn't pretty, but I really feel Nebraska earned it the hard way."

NU then hit the road, where it handed No. 23 Kansas State an 80-59 setback. The win, NU's biggest on the road in league play in some 60 seasons, was sparked by defense. The Huskers held K-State to 26.8 percent shooting from the field for the game, including 8.7 percent from 3-point range.

"It was probably our best overall team win in a long time," Nee said. There was not one player for Nebraska who didn't contribute."

Nebraska returned home for another Big Monday test, as Oklahoma State came calling. The Cowboys overcame a sevenpoint halftime deficit to hand the Huskers a 73-63 loss and ended NU's two-game win streak.

Nee's Huskers rebounded from the OSU loss to hand Missouri a 76-75 win at Columbia and give NU's seventh-year mentor his first win in seven tries at Hearnes Center. Johnson stole the Tigers' inbounds pass with 5.2 seconds to go, then hit one of two free throws with one second left to break a 75-all tie and give NU its first season sweep of Mizzou since the 1973-74 campaign.


Nebraska returned home and handed Colorado a 76-67 setback, then rallied for a 91-87 win over Iowa State. With the scored tied at 87-all against the Cyclones and 15 seconds to play, Piatkowski drove the lane and nailed the go-ahead shot with 11 seconds left. After an ISU timeout, Strickland knocked the ball from the Cyclones' Julius Michalik, and drove the floor for the clinching layin with one second to play.

"It felt good as soon as I let it go," said Piatkowski, who finished with 24 points and would go on to become NU's first first-team All-Big Eight performer since Dave Hoppen.

With three-straight wins, NU headed into the final week of the regular season with a chance at its first Big Eight title in some 40 seasons. However, Kansas dashed the Huskers' title hopes with a 94-83 victory at Allen Fieldhouse.

NU returned home and picked up win No. 20 with a 94-83 win over Oklahoma in the final home game for Chandler. A 20-7 second-half run was the difference for NU, as Johnson and Piatkowski each netted 19 points.

With win No. 20 in the bank, the season ended on a sour note for Nebraska. Kansas State handed the Huskers a 47-45 loss in the first round of the Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament. Forty-eight hours after the Kansas State loss, Nebraska earned its third-straight NCAA Tournament bid as the No. 10 seed in the East. New Mexico State, the No. 7 seed, was NU's first-round foe, and the Aggies dealt the Cornhuskers a 93-79 setback. Piatkowski had a careerhigh 29-points, but it wasn't enough to offset a balanced NMSU attack.



PIATKOWSKI WINS JACK MOORE AWARD

Eric Piatkowski, who became the first Nebraska player to earn first-team All-Big Eight honors since Dave Hoppen in 1985-86, received the Jack Moore Award, given annually to NU's outstanding men's basketball player. Piatkowski received the award at the team's annual awards banquet last spring.

Piatkowski, who earned first-team all-conference honors from Associated Press, the con-

ference coaches and the Big Eight players, led Nebraska in scoring (16.7 ppg) and 3-point percentage (37.2). He hit 48.5 percent from the field, 76.0 percent from the free-throw line and averaged 5.7 rebounds per game. He scored a career-high 29 points in the Huskers' NCAA Tournament loss to New Mexico State.

A member of the United States' gold-medal team at the World University Games last summer in Buffalo, N.Y., Piatkowski was named the Big Eight's Player-of-the-Week on Dec. 7. He averaged 24 points and 12.5 rebounds in leading Nebraska to its fifthstraight Ameritas Classic title and was the Classic's MVP. He had 25 points and nine rebounds against Colgate in the first round, then had 23 points and a career-high 16 rebounds in the Huskers' championship game win over Kent.

The award is named for late Husker guard Jack Moore, a 5-9 playmaker who set 17 school records in a career that ended in 1982 and culminated with the 1982 Francis Pomeroy-Naismith Award as the nation's best collegiate player under six feet tall. A consensus All-Big Eight performer in 1982, Moore was killed in the crash of a light plane in March of 1984.





Ninety-Seven Years of Husker Basketball Hoopla

As near as anyone can determine, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln was first represented by a men's basketball team on Feb. 1, 1897, just six years after Dr. James A. Naismith invented the game.

A team from the Lincoln YMCA was its opponent, and NU posted an 8-1 victory at home

The two teams played again at the university gym three weeks later with a similar result, as Nebraska posted a 23-14 victory.

This time, however, Nebraska had to rally. The Hesperian, a student newspaper, reported, "At the end of the first half the score stood 9 to 6 in favor of the visitors but during the second half our boys took a brace and some excellent work was done."

Such was the modest beginning of a program that probably enjoyed its greatest success over the last three season, with a 65-29 record and three-straight NCAA Tournament bids.

Nebraska doubled its schedule in 1898, losing twice to the Lincoln YMCA and splitting two games with the Omaha YMCA.

Ā 16-12 loss against the Omaha YMCA provided evidence as to why Nebraska finished 1-3 that winter.

According to The Hesperian account, "The great difficulty of the University team was mere recklessness. Our boys have been playing with a loose interpretation in regard to fouls. The Omaha boys, on the other hand, have been playing under the strictest possible interpretation of the rules. The officials were strict and of course the resulting advantage was in favor of Omaha."

Then as now, overly agressive play has its drawbacks.

Nebraska played teams from other universities for the first time in 1899, winning two games against Nebraska Wesleyan and one against Doane en route to the unoffical state championship.

The next season, Nebraska played an out-of-state opponent for the first time, defeating the University of Kansas, 48-8, at Lincoln. That game still ranks as the worst loss ever for a Jayhawk team, and was the first for either school against a present-day NCAA Division I school and the first matching present-day Big Eight Conference institutions.

The Kansas team was coached by Dr. Naismith. Sombrero, the Nebraska student yearbook, wrote, "A closely contested game was looked for. The Jayhawkers were, however, completely outclassed, the score being 48 to 8."


Based on the victory against Kansas and four other similarly decisive victories, "the basketball team for this year was undoubtedly superior to any in the west," the Sombrero concluded.

It would be several years before such a claim could be made again.

NU hired its first full-time basketball coach in 1911, E.O. "Jumbo" Stiehm, who also coached the football team.

Stiehm's first team won 14 of 15 games, its only loss coming at Minnesota, 40-15. The student newspaper, The Daily Nebraskan, blamed the loss on Nebraska's inability to adjust to the Gophers' "100-foot floor."

A Daily Nebraskan account of Nebraska's 29-28 season-ending victory against Kansas in Lincoln provides evidence that the behavior of some fans hasn't

changed much over the years, "The game as a whole was entirely unsatisfactory, being marred by rough tactics of the visitors, incompetent work on the part of the referee and interruptions by the audience, which were in part justifiable."

Nebraska shared the Missouri Valley Conference championship with Kansas in 1912 and 1914, under Stiehm's leadership, then won its first outright conference title in 1916, after Sam Waugh replaced Stiehm as the Cornhuskers' coach for one season.

In 1913, guard Sam Carrier became Nebraska's first All-America basketball player. He and Carl Underwood led the Cornhuskers to 17 victories in 19 games. Underwood was the Missouri Valley Conference scoring leader with 66 points in 10 conference games.

Nebraska was 22-2 in 1919-20 and 11-3 in 1920-21 under Coach P.J. Schissler, but the remainder of the Roaring 20s was, for the most part, undistingushed. Basketball was rough and tumble back then. There was a center jump after every basket and no requirement to cross mid-court in 10

seconds or less. The ball was a lot different, too, more like a medicine ball, which contributed to some dull games.

The most significant event during the 1920s was the building of the Coliseum, which was dedicated in March of 1926. The Coliseum, built at a cost of \$445,000, seated 8,000 for basketball.

Prior to that, Nebraska played most of its home games in the Armory, which seated about a fourth as many fans and was located just to the north of where the Sheldon Art Gallery now stands.

Nebraska ended the decade with an 11-5 season under C.T. Black in 1928-29. In the next 19 seasons, the Cornhuskers had just two winning records, back-to-back under Coach W.H. Browne in 1935-36 and 1936-37. The 1937 team tied Kansas for the Big Six championship, after finishing second to the Jayhawks in 1936.

The 1930s produced four more Conrnhusker All-Americans—center Don Maclay in 1931, guard Steve Hokuf in 1933, guard George Wahlquist in 1936 and guard Robert Parsons in 1937. Maclay was the Big Six scoring leader in 1930, scoring 112 points in 10 league games.

Harry Good was hired as head coach in 1946, and after two losing seasons, turned Nebraska's fortunes around.

In 1948-49, Good's Cornhuskers went 16-10, tied Oklahoma for the Big Seven regular-season championship and defeated the Sooners, 57-56, in a conference playoff to qualify for an NCAA playoff game.

The NCAA Tournament was structured differently then, and the Cornhuskers needed to win that playoff to advance into the NCAA field. They lost to Oklahoma A&M, the Missouri Valley Conference champion, 52-35, at Kansas City, Mo. Coach Henry P. Iba's Aggies went on to finish second to Kentucky, coached by Adolph Rupp, in the NCAA Tournament.

In 1949-50, Nebraska again won 16 games and shared the Big Seven crown with Kansas and Kansas State.

"We were King in our day," Claude Retherford once told a newspaper reporter. "They were firing football coaches left and right, but we packed'em in. Oh, people were interested in football, but basketball was THE game on the Nebraska campus when we played."

Retherford earned All-Big Seven recognition in 1949 after leading the conference in scoring with a 12.4 average.

The Cornhuskers had another first-team All-Big Seven performer in 1949, Milton "Bus" Whitehead. The 6-foot-10 center from Scottsbluff, Neb., also earned all-conference honors in 1950 when he averaged a then school-record 15.7 points per game. Whitehead was named to the District V All-America team by Collier's Magazine

Whitehead was also the first Cornhusker selected to play in the East-West All-Star game in New York City's Madison Square Garden. When he graduated, Whitehead held nine school scoring records.

Nebraska basketball experienced another drought beginning in 1950-51 with 15-straight losing seasons.

Despite playing for a team that finished last in the Big Seven in 1952, Cornhusker guard Jim Buchanan earned All-America and all-conference recognition. And even though the late Jerry Bush, dubbed the "Big Bear of the Coliseum," never produced a winning team in his nine seasons as head coach at Nebraska, his colorful personality and uncanny ability to fashion upsets kept Cornhusker fans entertained

The most dramatic upset during Bush's tenure came on Feb. 22, 1958, against Kansas. The Jayhawks featured 7-foot center Wilt Chamberlain and were ranked fourth in the nation when they came to Lincoln. Earlier in the season, the Jayhawks had decked the Huskers, 102-46, at Lawrence.

The Cornhuskers scored a 43-41 victory when 5-9 guard Jim Kubacki hit a 15-foot jump shot with two seconds remaining.

But that's only part of the drama.

Kubacki, a senior from Toledo, Ohio, spent all but the final 6:53 of the game sitting on the bench in street clothes, forced there by a knee injury and the kind of fate from which legends are built.

When the Cornhuskers' Gary Reimers left the game with leg cramps, Kubacki convinced Bush to let him suit up. Four minutes and seven seconds later, Kubacki went into the game. Two minutes and 44 seconds after that, he hit the winning shot.

Bush also had the distinction of coaching the school's first 1,000-point career scorer, guard Herschell Turner. Turner earned All-Big Eight honors in 1960 and ended his career with 1,056 points.

Following the 1962-63 season, Bush was replaced as head coach by Joe Cipriano, who brought the nickname "Slippery Joe" and up-tempo basketball to the Coliseum. His teams pressed full-court and ran a fast-break offense, which led the Big Eight in scoring in 1966, 1967 and 1968.

Cipriano's first two teams had a combined record of 17-33.

But his third team, in 1965-66, was one of the most successful in school history,

finishing 20-5 and second to Kansas in the Big Eight. All-Big Eight guard Grant Simmons, the first Cornhusker to earn Academic All-Big Eight honors, was the team's leader.

The 1966-67 team finished 16-9 and made the school's first appearance in the 16-team National Invitation Tournament, played at New York City's Madision Square Garden. Guard Stuart Lantz was a two-time All-Big Eight pick and led the Cornhuskers in scoring and rebounding in both 1966-67 and 1967-68.

Guard Marvin Stewart and center Chuck Jura earned All-Big Eight honors for Cipriano in 1971 and 1972, respectively. Guard Jerry Fort, who finished his career with a then-school record 1,882 points, was the first Nebraska player to be chosen first-team all-conference three times, from 1974 through 1976. With Fort's leadership, NU began a string of 14-straight winning seasons.

In the fall of 1976, Cornhusker basketball moved out of the Coliseum and into the state-of-art Bob Devaney Sports Center arena. Located on the State Fairgrounds, the \$13 million dollar athletic complex was financed by a special cigarette tax.

Cipraino coached Nebraska to another 20-win season in 1977-78. The Cornhuskers, led by All-Big Eight guard Brian Banks, finished with a 22-8 record and advanced to the second round of the NIT.

Despite failing health — a battle against cancer that he finally lost, Cipriano shared coaching duties with his assistant, Moe Iba in 1979-80, and took Nebraska to the NIT again. For their efforts, the duo shared United Press International Big Eight Coach-of-the-Year honors.

Cipriano brought Nebraska into the modern era, coaching 17 seasons and 450 games. His record was 253-197, and those 253 victories represent one-fourth of Nebraska's all-time total.

Following Cipriano's death, Iba was named head coach, and he continued Cip's winning ways. In Iba's six seasons on the bench, NU was 106-71, and advanced to post-season play four times.

Center Andre Smith was the 1981 Big Eight MVP and twice earned All-Big Eight honors. However, it was the late Jack Moore, a 5-10 playmaker from Muncie, Ind., that captured the hearts of Nebraska fans from 1980 through 1982. Moore earned All-Big Eight honors in 1982 when he won the Naismith Award, given annually to the nation's top player under six-feet tall. The first three-time academic All-Big Eight pick in NU history, Moore scored 1,204 points and hit .901 from the free-throw line during his career.

The cornerstone of Iba's teams from 1983 through 1986 was Omaha, Neb., native Dave Hoppen, a three-time All-Big Eight center and the first Nebraska basketball player to have his jersey number (42) retired by the school. In 1982-83, Hoppen's freshman season, the Cornhuskers were 22-10 and won three games in the NIT before losing to DePaul in the semifinals at Madison Square Garden.

The Cornhuskers returned to the NIT each of the next two seasons, advancing to the second round both times.

Hoppen's college career, though, was ended by a knee injury he sustained in a game at Colorado, Feb. 1, 1986. He finished his career as the school's all-time scoring leader with 2,167 points and broke or tied 19 school records during his four-year stay. After Hoppen's injury, Iba's team regrouped and went on to earn the school's first-ever "official" NCAA Tournament berth. NU lost to Western Kentucky in the first round of the Southeast Regional, 67-59, and following the game, Iba announced his resignation.

On March 27, 1986, Danny Nee was officially introduced as Nebraska's 24th basketball coach. During a news conference to announce his hiring, Nee said a "new era" in Cornhusker basketball was beginning

"I understand I have to win, but I believe we have to play a style people will come to see. Basketball was made to be played up and down the floor. I think the people will enjoy it."

Nee's seven teams have appeared in postseason play five times, and have topped the 20-win mark three times. In Nee's rookie season, NU was 21-12 and finished third in the NIT, then after a 13-18 season in year two, got back over the .500 mark with a 17-16 record in 1989 and advanced to the second-round of the NIT.

After missing the school record for losses by one in 1990 (10-18), a year later, Nebraska won a school-record 26 games (against eight losses), advanced to the NCAA Tournament, losing to Xavier, 89-85, in the first round at Minneapolis, Minn., and played in the Big Eight Tournament title game for the first time ever.

Since the record-setting 1990-91 campaign, the Huskers have made NCAA Tournament appearances in each of the last two seasons, and won 20 games in 1992-93.

1. Dave Hoppen, C, Omaha, Neb. (Benson)



Three-time All-Big Eight center Dave Hoppen finished his career as Nebraska's all-time leading scorer with 2,167 points. Hoppen, whose four-year collegiate career was cut short by a knee injury in a game at Colorado, Feb. 1, 1986, broke or tied 19 Nebraska records and five Big Eight marks during his standout career. A native of Omaha, Neb., Hoppen was

the first player in Husker basketball history to have his jersey (42) retired. Originally drafted by the National Basketball Association's Atlanta Hawks in the third-round of the 1986 draft, he signed a free agent contract with the San Antonio Spurs last summer, and spent most of last year in the CBA.

2. Jerry Fort, G, Chicago, Ill. (Franciscan)



The first Husker basketball player to earn All-Big Eight honors for three-straight seasons, Jerry Fort finished his career with 1,182 points—a record that stood for nine seasons, until Dave Hoppen broke it, Dec. 15, 1985. Fort, whose name is found on most of the Huskers' single-season and career charts, is a native of Chicago, Ill., and was a third-round

draft pick of the Boston Celtics following his senior season. He scored a school-record 40 points against Missouri as a junior. Fort was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1991.

3. Andre Smith, C/F, Chicago, Ill. (Kennedy)



Andre Smith closed his brilliant four-year career in 1980-81 when he led the Big Eight Conference in scoring with a 19.5 average in conference games only. Smith was named the league's player-of-the-year for his efforts—the last time a Husker cager earned the honor, and was a two-time all-conference selection. He scored 1,717 points and grabbed 753 re-

bounds during his career and was chosen in the seventh round of the 1981 NBA Draft by the Cleveland Cavaliers.

The tallest player in Nebraska history at 7-2, Rich King finished his career with 1,475 points, and school records for blocked shots, 183, and games played, 124. King had a big hand in the Huskers' record-breaking 26-8, 1990-91 campaign, as he led the team in scoring (15.5 ppg) and rebounding (8.1 rpg) en route to honorable-mention All-America honors from both

AP and UPI. King, who was a first-round draft pick by the Seattle SuperSonics in the 1991 NBA Draft, tied Jerry Fort's school single-game scoring record with a 40-point outburst against Northern Illinois, Feb. 18, 1991.



9. Chuck Jura, Center, Schuyler, Neb.



One of the top all-around centers in Nebraska history, Chuck Jura's 1,255 points rank eighth on the school's all-time list, and trail Stuart Lantz's career total by 14 points. Jura earned All-Big Eight honors as a senior and was an academic All-Big Eight choice, too. One of only four players in school history to average more than 20 points in a

season (21.2), Jura ranks fifth on the all-time rebounding chart (740) and his 305 rebounds in his final season still stand as the NU single-season record. Like Lantz, Jura was a charter member of the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame. A third-round NBA draft pick by the Chicago Bulls, Jura played professional basketball in Europe for several seasons.

10. Jack Moore, Guard, Muncie, Ind. (Central)



Jack Moore will long be remembered by Husker faithful for his gutty play on the basketball court. He was honored with the 1982 Naismith Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top player under sixfeet tall. During his four-year career, Moore scored 1,204 points, and shot .901 from the free-throw line—the second-best career mark

in NCAA Division I history. Moore's .901 free-throw percentage broke the Big Eight record for career marksmanship, which had been held by his coach, Moe Iba. A consensus All-Big Eight selection as a senior, Moore was the first Husker cager to earn first-team academic All-Big Eight honors for three-straight seasons and his 382 career assists stand second on NU's all-time chart. Nebraska's MVP Award is named in honor of Moore, who was killed in a March 1984 plane crash. Moore was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame last year.

11. Brian Carr, G, Muncie, Ind. (Burris)



Brian Carr is the only player in Nebraska history and one of just five in Big Eight Conference history to score 1,000 points and collect over 600 assists in a career. Carr, who finished his four-year career with 14 Nebraska school records, scored 1,182 points and collected 682 assists. The 682 assists rank as the second-best total in Big Eight history, only two off the

record of 684 held by former Kansas guard Cedric Hunter. A second-team All-Big Eight selection as a senior (UPI), Carr was a two-time first-team academic All-Big Eight performer.

Marvin Stewart finished his three-year career with 1,138 points, and is remembered by Husker fans as one of the finest fast-breaking guards in school history. In his senior season, Stewart averaged 21.4 points, the second-best season average in school history, and earned first-team All-Big Eight honors. Stewart owns the distinction of being the only 1,000-point

club member to top the mark in fewer than 70 games, as he appeared in 66. Stewart was a second-round draft selection of the NBA's Chicago Bulls in 1971.

An honorable-mention All-Big Eight pick as a senior and a member of UPI's All-Big Eight Defensive team, Scales' 177 career steals rank as the most ever by a Cornhusker cager. One of five

double-figure scorers on the 1990-91 NU team at 10.2 points per game, Scales hit a school-record 45.6 percent from 3-point range as a senior. He co-captained the Huskers' record-setting 26-8 1990-91 squad.

The first Husker cager to top the 1,000-point mark, Herschell Turner finished his career with 1,056 points. Turner teamed with Al Maxey to provide a strong offensive punch for Coach Jerry Bush's teams in the late 1950s. A first-team All-Big Eight selection as a senior, Turner was a strong rebounder and held NU's

single-season rebounding record for 10 seasons (244), until Leroy Chalk grabbed 257 rebounds in 1969. Turner finished his three-year career with 626 rebounds, which ranks eighth on NU's all-time chart, and was a sixth-round draft choice of the NBA's Syracuse Nationals. He was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1990.



NU Basketball Hall of Fame to Honor Four

The sixth class of the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame will be honored at half-time of the Jan. 29, 1994, Oklahoma game. An alumni basketball game will be held prior to the Battle of the Big Eight's Big Reds at 5 p.m., and the new inductees and alumni game participants will be honored at a postgame reception.

Bob Cerv, a standout on the Cornhuskers' 1949 and 1950 Big Sevenchampionship teams, is one of four players being honored. Cerv, who went on to a standout professional baseball career with the New York Yankees, lettered for NU from 1947 through 1950. He averaged 6.9 points as a junior in 1949 and 5.8 as a senior in 1950. He is the fifth member of the Huskers' 1950 Big Seven championship team to be inducted into the Hall of Fame.

A star for Coach Jerry Bush in the early 1960s was **Tom Russell**, who is also being inducted this year. Russell poured in a then-school-record 38 points against Kansas during the 1961-62 season. That record stood until Jerry Fort poured in 40 points against Missouri during the 1974-75 season. Russell led NU in scoring (12.5 ppg) and rebounding (9.7 rpg) as a junior, then paced the team in both departments (16.5 ppg, 8.0 rpg) as a senior. He ranked seventh nationally in field-goal percentage

as a senior with a .560 mark. He still ranks 36th on NU's all-time scoring chart with 712 points and has the third-highest total among two-year Cornhusker players. Russell's 8.8 career rebound average still stands as the fifth-best mark in school history.

Nate Branch, who starred for Coach Joe Cipriano in the late 1960s is also being inducted. Branch, who went on to fame with the Harlem Globetrotters, had averaged 10.3 points as a sophomore in 1965, 13.5 as a junior and 15.6 as a senior in 1967. He hit 42.1 percent from the field, 70.0 percent from the free-throw line and pulled down 470 rebounds. NU posted a 46-29 three-year record during Branch's career. He still ranks 19th on the Huskers' all-time scoring chart with 958 points.

The fourth player being honored in 1994 is Andre Smith, the 1981 Big Eight Player-of-the-Year. Smith, a two-time first-team All-Big Eight pick, scored 1,717 points and grabbed 753 rebounds in his standout career. He led the Big Eight Conference in scoring with a 19.5 average in conference games only as a senior and went on to become a seventh-round draft pick of the Cleveland Cavaliers. He ranks third on NU's career scoring chart, fourth on the all-time rebound list.

In addition, Nebraska's veteran trainer, George Sullivan, will receive the Hall of Fame's Special Merit Award. Sullivan, who was tabbed as NU's Assistaht Athletic Director for Athletic Medicine last spring, is in his 41st season as a full-time member of the Huskers' medical staff.

The Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame was the brainchild of longtime Cornhusker athletic supporter Jerry Solomon, who first approaced the University about the project in the fall of 1988. Financial support for the Hall of Fame was also provided by Jack Bock, Dale Herman and Dale Jensen.

The Hall is co-sponsored by the UNL Athletic Department and the Rebounders Club.




