

Please take a moment to review the following policies and services which are intended to assist you in your coverage of Nebraska basketball this season.

Media Credentials: All requests for press, broadcast, photo and parking credentials for Nebraska basketball home games should be directed to Chris Anderson, Sports Information Director or Keith Mann, Assistant Sports Information Director, 116 South Stadium, Lincoln, Neb., 68588-0123. Requests must be made in writing on appropriate letterhead at least one week prior to the game. Requests via fax are acceptable (see fax information below). As a general rule, working space is allocated on the following basis: (1) daily newspaper and wire-service writers covering for next-day publication; (2) radio and television personnel for broadcast origination; (3) sports editors of Nebraska daily newspapers; (4) official school student daily newspaper, one seat only; (5) approved special coverage.


Media Will Call: Media passes which are not mailed may be picked up at the will-

call window, located under the south ramp of the Bob Devaney Sports Center. The will-call window opens 90 minutes before tipoff. Identification is required to pick up credentials or tickets.

Media Parking: Parking for the media is located adjacent to the Bob Devaney Sports Center on the south side. The south street lot is accessible from Court Street, between 14th and 17th Streets.

Devaney Center Directions: The Bob Devaney Sports Center is located on the west edge of the Nebraska State Fairgrounds. To reach it from the Lincoln Municipal Airport, turn right on Northwest 12th Street as you drive out of the airport. Northwest 12th Street becomes Cornhusker highway, which intersects with 14th Street. Exit south on 14th Street off Cornhusker Highway. Travel to Court Street, turn left, and go two blocks east to the arena, which is on the north side of Court Street. From Omaha's Eppley Airfield, follow the signs to downtown Omaha and I-480. Take I-480 west to I-80, then take I-80 west approximately 60 miles to I-180. Exit South on I-180, then exit east to Cornhusker Highway and follow the instructions above.

Player Interviews: All media requests for interviews with Nebraska basketball players should be directed to Assistant SID Keith Mann (office phone: 402-472-2263; home phone: 402-474-4327) at least one day in advance. Players are usually available for telephone interviews early afternoons and evenings, except game days. The best time for in-season interviews is after



practice at the Bob Devaney Sports Center. With advance notice, interviews can be arranged for other hours.

Nee Interview Time: The best time to reach Coach Danny Nee for an interview is weekdays from 11:30 a.m. to noon, Central time. Interviews with Coach Nee should be scheduled through the Sports Information Office. Coach Nee's office telephone number is 402-472-2265. During the season, Nee will host a weekly press conference at the Bob Devaney Sports Center on the following dates--Nov. 19, Dec. 2, Dec. 9, Dec. 16, Jan. 7, Jan. 14, Jan. 21, Jan. 28, Feb. 4, Feb. 13, Feb. 18, Feb. 25 and March 4. Nee will also participate in the weekly Big 12 Conference telephonic press conferences at 11:30 a.m. (Central), beginning Dec.3. Contact the Big 12 Service Bureau, 214-742-1212 for more information.

Postgame Interviews: The Nebraska postgame locker room is closed to the media. For home games, Nebraska's postgame news conference will be held following a brief cooling off period in the "ready" room, located adjacent to the Huskers' locker room in the Bob Devaney Sports Center. The "ready" room can be reached off the hallway at the southwest corner of the playing floor. The visiting team is usually headquartered in the central locker room, located off the hallway at the northeast corner of the playing floor. On the road, after the cooling off period, Nee and Nebraska players will be available outside the Huskers' locker room.

Press Row Location: Press row for Nebraska basketball games is located on the south sideline of the playing floor, opposite the team benches. The old press box, located above section C-12 on the south side of the arena, is used as an overflow area. The camera deck is located at the top of the arena, directly behind the old press box. Television crews broadcasting live may shoot from either floor level (northeast or southwest baselines) or the camera deck, but they may not occupy space in the C-12 press area. The press room is located off the hallway at the southeast corner of the playing floor.

Media Services: Pregame notes, programs and media guides will be provided prior to each game. Play-by-play sheets, final statistics, coach and player quotes from each locker room will be distributed. Starting one-and-one-half hours before tipoff, refreshments will be served in the press room. An SID Office representative will be in the Press Room until all writers have filed.

N- INFORMATION

Radio/Television Broadcast Space: Requests for live radio and television broadcast space and credentials should be made to Keith Mann, Assistant Sports Information Director, 116 South Stadium, University of Nebraska, Lincoln, Neb., 68588-0123, telephone 402-472-2263. If statisticians are needed, please contact the Sports Information Office at least three days in advance.

Broadcast Rights: The University of Nebraska-Lincoln and Pinnacle Sports Productions own exclusive radio broadcast rights to all of the University's men's basketball games played in the Bob Devaney Sports Center. Other than the Nebraska Sports Network and the University of Nebraska student station (KRNU), the only stations or networks which will be allowed to broadcast Nebraska games from the Devaney Center are those which have rights to broadcast games played by the opposing team. All radio stations and networks broadcasting from the Bob Devaney Sports Center must sign a contract with the University and are subject to a rights fee. Any representative of a radio station or network that has not purchased such rights shall not air live game action or description of any game while it is in progress, nor shall such representatives air tape-recorded or live commentary of Nebraska coaches or players for one hour before or after a game. Only stations which have purchased broadcast rights may install telephones on press row, or use telephones on press row for reporting on games. By accepting media credentials, representatives of stations and networks which have not purchased broadcast rights signify their agreement to the above stipulations.

Telephones: Nebraska provides four modular telephones in the Bob Devaney Sports Center Press Room. All long distance calls must be credit card, collect or billed to a third number. Any media source wishing to place a telephone on press row should contact University of Nebraska Telecommunications (402-472-2000) at least two weeks prior to the game.

Broadcast Telephone Lines: Visiting radio stations are welcome to have their own telephone lines installed on press row and may do so by contacting University of Nebraska Telecommunications (402-472-2000). However, Pinnacle Sports Productions installs additional telephone lines for visiting official broadcasts and charges a fee for the use of those lines for nonconference games (Big 12 official stations receive the use of the lines free of charge as part of a cooperative). Stations interested in using the lines should contact Paul Aaron at Pinnacle (402-289-0808).

Pro Scouting Passes: Per Big 12 Conference rules, the University of Nebraska does not provide press row access or media credentials for scouts of professional basketball teams. Scouts may arrange through the Sports Information Office (402-472-2263) to purchase tickets for Nebraska home games. The tickets may be picked up at the will-call window.

Sports Information Office: The University of Nebraska Sports Information Office is located in Room 116 of the South Stadium Building, which is located at the south end of Memorial Stadium at Stadium Drive and T Streets. The South Stadium Building is approximately one mile from the Devaney Center.

Fax Access: The Nebraska Sports Information Office has an automatic facsimile machine which can transmit or receive documents. The phone number for the fax is 402-472-2005. A facsimile machine is available in the Bob Devaney Sports Center following the game, and Sports Information Office personnel will send box scores free of charge as time permits. Nebraska and all Big 12 Conference schools are participating in a conference-wide fax-back system, where interested parties may call directly and have releases, notes and statistics faxed to their machine. There will be no charge to the receiver, other than the normal cost of the long distance call. Please contact the Nebraska Sports Information Office (402-472-2263) or the Big 12 Conference (214-742-1212) for more information. To access Fax-on-Demand, call 770-399-3066. The Big 12 code is 1212, while Nebraska's release/game notes/statistics can be found under 1865 and the Huskers' most-recent box score under 1867. Box scores will be updated immediately after home games and as soon as possible on away games.

Husker Basketball on The Internet: Nebraska basketball information will be regularly updated on the Internet throughout the season. The Nebraska home page and live and delayed radio broadcasts can be accessed at http://huskerwebcast.com.

PINNACLE SPORTS PRODUCTIONS

University of Nebraska basketball will have a different look and sound this winter. After 13 seasons with KFAB as the network's flagship station, Pinnacle Sports Productions retained the rights to broadcast Nebraska sports. Pinnacle Sports Productions will head up a large network of state and national affiliates, which will allow Husker games to be heard statewide and in various areas of the United States. As of press time, Pinnacle Sports had a 34-station network for Husker men's basketball, including 28 in-state and six out of state stations. The contract also brings about a change in onair talent for Husker athletics. sportscaster Warren Swain will be the playby-play voice of the Huskers this winter. Swain has been in the sports radio business for nearly three decades, spending the last 11 years as the radio voice of University of

Virginia football, basketball and lacrosse. Nebraska Director of Basketball Operations Nick Joos will serve as the color commentator for Husker games, home and away, after serving in that role on the road for the past two seasons.

NCAA RULE CHANGES

1-13: It is recommedned that basket ring loads be transferred to the support system by a single strut boom behind the backboard or to the backboard frame.

1-21: Teams shall warm up and shoot at the end of the court farthest from their own bench for the first half.

3-5: A solid contrasting color "shadow" trim, not to exceed 1/2 inch in width, may be used on part of the uniform number.

3-5: Sleeves and necklines of a player's undershirt shall be unaltered (e.g. no cut-off sleeves, no cut-off necklines) and shall be of the same length.

4-33; 4-36: A tap is defined as a try for field goal.

5-8: Free-throw penalty exception: After the horn sounds to end the game, only those free throws necessary to determine a winner will be awarded.

5-11: In games not involving commercial electronic media, teams are entitled to four full-length timeouts and two 20-second timeouts. The two 20-second timeouts may be used at any time during the game.

5-11: In games involving commercial electronic media, teams are entitled to two full-length timeouts and three 20-second timeouts. Two of the three 20-second timeouts may be carried over from the first half to the second half.

10: In an instance when fouls are committed by opponents at approximately the same time (i.e., double technical foul or double flagrant technical foul) if the free throw penalties for each foul are the same, no free throws will be awarded and the ball will be awarded by the alternating possession arrow.

10-5: Playing a musical instrument while the game is in progress no longer will be an unsporting technical foul but rather an administrative technical foul.

Points of Emphasis: Sporting behavior of coaches, players, fans, bands and mascots is a continued point of emphasis for the 1996-97 season. All will be asked to display positive behavior during games. Other points of emphasis for men's basketball, include more consistent enforcement of the traveling rule, and more emphasis on illegal post play and palming the basketball.

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

Big 12-The nation's toughest basketball conference comprised of Nebraska, Kansas, Kansas State, Iowa State, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Missouri, Colorado, Baylor, Texas, Texas A&M and Texas Tech.

Big Eight--Nebraska's conference from 1960 until 1996. Nebraska begins its first season of play in the Big 12 in 1996-97. Black-The color of jersey NU has donned six times. The Huskers first wore their special uniforms in a 65-57 win at Iowa State in 1990-91, then in a 91-71 loss at Missouri and again in an 87-83 win over Kansas in semifinals of the 1991 Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament. Coliseum-Home of Nebraska basketball from 1926-27 season through 1975-76 campaign.

Creative Sports-Big 12 TV syndicator.

Day, Bernard-Ranks as highest scoring junior college transfer in school history with 802 points from 1985-87.

Devaney Center-NU homecourt that opened its doors for the 1976-77 season and bears the name of the Huskers' long-time football coach and athletic director, Bob Devaney.

Doane-Nebraska's first intercollegiate opponent in 1898-99

Ekwall, Rex-Standout for NU in mid-1950s whose 10.4 career rebound average still ranks as school record.

ESPN-The national cable network which features a Big 12 game on its "Big Monday" package.

F

Fort, Jerry-First three-time first-team All-Big Eight selection in school history who finished his career with 1,882 points. Fox-Nickname of NU's longtime Sports Information Director and current Associate Athletic Director of Public Relations, Don Bryant.

G

Good, Harry-Served as NU head coach from 1947 through 1954 and guided Huskers to shares of 1949 and 1950 Big Seven titles. He was enshrined into the Citizens Savings College Basketball Hall of Fame in 1975.

H

Hammond Hustlers-Nickname given to Hammond, Ind., natives Brian Banks and Carl McPipe, who finished their careers with 1,150 and 1,300 points, respectively.

Hare, Fred-His follow-up basket at the buzzer with no time left gave Nebraska a 74-73 upset of No. 1 Michigan and Cazzie Russell in Lincoln during the 1964-65 season.

Hokuf, Steve-Standout all-around athlete who earned firstteam all-conference honors in football, won the Big Six javelin title and earned All-America and all-conference honors in

Hoppen, Dave-NU's all-time leading scorer with 2,167 points who was the second three-time first-team All-Big Eight pick in school history and the first player in school history to have his jersey number (42) retired.

Iba, Moe-The son of the late legendary coach Henry P. Iba, Moe posted 106 wins on Husker bench from 1981-86 and guided the school to its first "official" NCAA Tournament berth in 1986. International-The NCAA allows schools to take a foreign trip once every four years, and under Coach Danny Nee, the Huskers have made treks to Australia (1988) and Europe (1992).

Johnson, Bill-Grabbed school single-game record 26 rebounds against Iowa State, Jan. 4, 1954.

Jura, Chuck-Earned first-team All-Big Eight honors on the court and in the classroom as a senior in 1972.

K

Kansas-The Jayhawks and Cornhuskers first met on the court on March 2, 1900, a game that was the first matching presentday Big 12 opponents.

King, Rich-Became first first-round NBA draft pick in school history when the Seattle SuperSonics selected him with the 14th selection of the 1991 draft.

Kubacki, Jim-Hit game-winning jumper to beat No. 1 Kansas and Wilt Chamberlain, 43-41, during 1957-58 season.



Lantz, Stuart-Two-time first-team All-Big Eight pick in 1967 and 1968 who went on to eight-year NBA career and had his jersey number (24) retired in 1989.

Lehmer, Frank-First basketball coach in school history (1897-99), finished career with 7-3 record.

M

Maclay, Don-Earned All-America honors in 1931.

Moore, Jack-One of the most popular Cornhuskers ever, he earned the 1982 Naismith Award as the nation's top player under 6-feet. Nebraska's most valuable player award is named in honor of Moore, who was killed in a 1984 plane crash.

Matzke, John and Stan-Stan lettered from 1952 through 1955, while his son John was a second-team Academic All-America pick in 1984.

N

National Basketball Association-Twenty-two Huskers have been drafted by NBA teams over the years.

National Invitation Tournament-NU has made a Big 12leading 10 appearances in the nation's oldest postseason tournament. Last year, Nebraska captured the tournament title, defeating St. Joseph's (Pa.) in Madison Square Garden.

NCAA Tournament-The Huskers have earned five bids to the "Big Dance," including bids in four of the last five years.

Overtime-The Huskers are 43-27 all-time in overtime games, including 10-3 under Coach Danny Nee.

Parsons, Robert-Two-time first-team All-Big Six performer who earned All-America honors in 1937.

Phillips 66-Title sponsor for Big 12 Tournament at Kansas City. Polish Rifle--Nickname of two-time All-Big Eight pick and 1994 Big Eight Tournament MVP Eric Piatkowski.

Postseason-Nebraska has made 15 postseason appearances, including a school-record six consecutive.

Quadruple-Nebraska and Alabama-Birmingham played four overtimes on Dec. 22, 1979, before the Huskers scored a 92-84 victory over the Blazers in the school's longest game ever.

R

Rankings-Nebraska finished with its highest national rankings ever in 1990-91, No. 9 in UPI and No. 11 in AP.

Rebounder's Club-Booster organization for NU basketball. Retherford, Claude-Leading scorer on NU's 1949 Big Seven championship team and a two-time first-team all-conference

Reid. Beau-Was two-time third-team Academic All-America pick who had a knack for hitting game-winning jumpers, as he provided NU's winning points on four different occasions, including upsets of eventual NCAA champion Kansas in 1987-88 and No. 5 Michigan State in 1990-91.

Sauer, George—The only Husker football All-American to earn a basketball letter, he was an All-America fullback in 1933 and lettered on the hardwood in 1932 and 1933.

Simmons, Grant-First-team All-Big Eight pick in 1966 and school's first first-team academic All-Big Eight selection.

Smith, Andre-1981 Big Eight Player-of-the-Year, the only Husker ever to win the award.

Stewart, Marvin-The only player in school history to reach the 1.000-point plateau in fewer than 70 career games.

Stiehm, E.O.-First full-time basketball coach in school's history (1912-15) and the only man in conference history to win league titles in football (1912, 1913, 1914) and basketball (1912, 1913, 1914) in the same year.

Strickland, Erick--A three-year starter for Nebraska who is the Huskers' all-time steals leader and is sixth in scoring.

Swain, Warren--Nebraska's play-by-play voice.

T

Trevs-Nebraska hit a school-record 194 3-pointers during the 1993-94 campaign. Carr hit the first trey in school history in a game at Cal-Irvine during the 1986-87 season.

Titles-Nebraska has won or shared seven league titles, none though since the 1949-50 campaign, although NU did capture the 1994 Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament title.

Turner, Herschell-First player in NU history to score 1,000 career points.

Though the Huskers finished just 13-18, Nebraska beat eventual national champion Kansas 70-68 in Lincoln on a jumper by Beau Reid as time expired.



Nebraska suffered its worst record under Nee as the Huskers went just 10-18. Rich King, Clifford Scales and Carl Hayes earned honorablemention All-Big Eight awards.



Nebraska (19-10) made back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances for the first time in school history. Eight of its 10 losses were to nationallyranked foes.



Nebraska recorded back-to-back 20win seasons for the first time in school history and won the school's firstever Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament title.





In his first season as head coach, Danny Nee's Huskers finished 21-12, missing the school record for season wins by one and finished third in the National Invitation Tournament.



Nebraska made its second postseason tournament appearance under Nee, advancing to the NIT second round.



Nebraska won a schoolrecord 26 games and made the school's second-ever NCAA Tournament appearance. The Huskers finished with their highest ranking ever at No. 11 by the Associated Press.



With its second 20win season in the last three years, Nebraska made a third straight NCAA Tournament appearance. Eric Piatkowski won first-team All-Big Eight honors.



Nebraska made its schoolrecord-tying fifth straight postseason tournament appearance, advancing to the second round of the NIT, where it lost to Penn State 65-59. Jaron Boone earned second-team allconference honors.

A late season surge by the Huskers propelled them to a National Invitation Tournament Championship, the first national post-season championship of any kind in Nebraska history. The Huskers beat St. Joseph 60-56 for the NIT crown.





A LOOK BACK THROUGH THE DECADES

1896-1906


Nebraska posted a 59-26 (.694) record in its first decade of basketball, including three undefeated seasons. In those 10 years, the Huskers were coached by Frank Lehmer, T.P. Hewitt, E. Berry, Fred Morrell, Walter Hiltner and R.G. Clapp.

1916-1926

Nebraska fashioned its first 20win season ever in 1919-20 finishing 22-2 and setting a school-record for wins that stood until 1990-91. During the decade Nebraska was 111-71 (.610) and had six winning campaigns.



The last five teams of the Huskers' second decade all posted winning records. The 1911-12 team (right) won the school's first Missouri Valley Conference title and then repeated as champs in 1912-13 and 1913-14.



1926-1936

NU opened the decade in the Nebraska Coliseum, but didn't have much of a home court advangtage, finishing under .500 at home in 1925-26. In 1928-29, Nebraska joined Missouri, Kansas, Kansas State, Iowa State and Oklahoma in forming the Big Six Conference.

1936-1946

Nebraska's record of 65-120 (.351) in this decade is its worst ever. Twice, in 1943-44 and 1944-45, the Huskers mustered only two wins. Sid Held and Don Fitz earned first-team All-Big Six honors in 1940-41. Nebraska lost to the eventual NCAA Champion in both 1939-40 (Indiana) and 1940-41 (Wisconsin).

1956-66

Stu Lantz (left) capped off an otherwise disappointing decade by leading the Huskers to a second-place Big Eight finish and first-ever NIT appearance in 1965-66. The Huskers 20-5 record was its first 20-win season since 1919-20. Lantz, who finished second to KU's Jo Jo White in the Sophomore-of-the-Year balloting, would go on to become a third-round NBA draft pick. For the decade, NU was 102-142 (.418).

1946-1956

The Huskers were 102-141 (.420) in the decade. However, the 1948-59 team tied for first in the Big Seven Conference and beat Oklahoma to advance to the NCAA District Tournament. Claude Retherford was a first-team All-Big Seven pick in that season and led the team in scoring. In 1949-50, Bus Whitehead earned first-team all-conference honors as NU tied Kansas and Kansas State for the Big Seven title.

1966-1976

Nebraska finished above .500 for the decade with a 147-111 (.570) record. Marvin Stewart became the first player to average 20 points in a season in 1970-71. The Huskers closed out the decade with a third-place Big Eight finish in 1975-76 and said goodbye to the Nebraska Coliseum. Jerry Fort earned three straight first-team all-conference awards from 1974-76.

1976-1986

The Cornhuskers posted a 175-119 (.595) record in this decade, including a 15-14 ledger in 1976-77, the first season at the Bob Devaney Sports Center. In 1977-78, the Huskers earned their second postseason tournament bid and first since 1966-67, advancing to the second round of the NIT. NU posted 20 wins twice during the decade (1977-78, 1982-83).

1986-Present

The Huskers have enjoyed their most successful decade under the direction of Head Coach Danny Nee. In the past 10 seasons, Nebraska has won 20or-more games five times, advanced to the NCAA Tournament four times, won its first-ever Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament trophy in 1993-94 and last year captured the NIT Championship.





THIS IS NEBRASKA NATIONAL COVERAGE... NEBRASKA IN THE SPOTLIGHT

Nebraska has traveled to Europe, Australia, Hawaii and Puerto Rico over the last nine years.



With the resurgence of the Nebraska basketball program under Coach Danny Nee, media attention for the Huskers is at an all-time high. Nebraska is scheduled to make nine national or regional television appearances during the 1996-97 season, including a national appearance against perennial powerhouse Kansas on ABC, Sunday, March 2. In addition, NU's home game against Missouri (Jan. 18) will be televised by ESPN. Six other games will be shown by Creative Sports Marketing.

The Huskers will also once again be a part of "Big Monday," ESPN's most-watched prime-time block during the college basketball season. Nebraska will appear on "Big Monday" on Feb. 10 at Kansas State on ESPN2.

The media attention isn't limited to television broadcasts as the Huskers are consistently covered by national print publications such as *USA Today* and *The Sporting News*, as well as hundreds of regional media outlets. The state's two largest papers, *The Omaha World-Herald* and the *Lincoln Journal Star*, cover Nebraska basketball on a daily basis. Nebraska has been ranked at least once in the wire service polls in five of the last six seasons, and six years ago, finished with its highest national rankings ever with a No. 9 finish in the UPI poll and No. 11 in AP.

Husker basketball can be heard throughout the Midwest on the newly formed Nebraska Sports Network headed by Pinnacle Sports Productions. Calling the Husker action will be play-by-play announcer Warren Swain and color commentator Nick Joos.




Nebraska will celebrate its 21st season in the Bob Devaney Sports Center this season.

The 14,200-seat Bob Devaney Sports Center is one of the most beautiful arenas in the Big 12 Conference. Opened in the fall of 1976, the Big 12's third-largest arena is located on the Nebraska State Fairgrounds. The building, a \$13 million project, houses the Huskers' basketball, track, swimming, wrestling and gymnastics teams. A host of other activities, including concerts and commencements are held in the arena.

Since the building became the home of Husker basketball, more than 3.5 million fans have passed through the Devaney Center turnstiles. Named after Bob Devaney, Nebraska's highly successful football coach and athletic director (1962-93), the Husker faithful have flooded into the Devaney Center in record numbers.







The Nebraska Performance Team is a pioneer in the development of strength and conditioning and Coach Danny Nee believes it is a vital part of the Huskers' on-court success. The strength complex at Nebraska was expanded to 30,000 square feet in 1989, making it the largest on any college campus in the nation. In addition, the basketball team utilizes a weight room at the Bob Devaney Sports Center.

Assistant Athletic Director of Athletic Performance Boyd Epley, heads a staff of nine full-time performance team members who utilize their knowledge along with a wide array of equipment and tests to provide one of the nation's top performance programs. Team members are Epley; Mike Arthur, Assistant Director of Athletic Peformance; Randy Gobel, Assistant Director of Athletic Performance: Bryan Bailey, Coordinator of Reconditioning; Kevin Coleman, West Stadium Strength Coach; Dave Ellis, Coordinator of Peformance Nutrition; Curt Thompson, Coordinator of Performance Educational Services; Dr. Jack Stark, Performance Psychologist; Lisa Morris, Assistant West Stadium Strength Coach; Danny Noonan, Assistant Coordinator for Peformance Education and Rodger DeGarmo, Basketball Weight Coordinator. Evaluation, goal-oriented programs, supervision and state-of-the-art facilities help Nebraska athletes become faster, stronger and more flexible.

The medical facilities at Nebraska are a highpriority item. The Huskers' locker room and training room facilities are located in the Bob Devaney Sports Center and rank among the nation's best equipped. NU's medical staff includes six full-time trainers, three registered physical therapists, a physician's assistant and six doctors who are available to treat Husker athletes and to prevent injuries.





Nebraska's academic facilities are among the finest in the nation. In fact, College Athletic Management magazine and Walt Disney Corp., have honored the Huskers' support system as the most comprehensive and innovative in the country. Located in the West Stadium, the Hewit Center and Boekel Academic Center allow Nebraska's student-athletes access to the latest academic support services.

The \$2.3 million academic area originated in 1983 and was expanded in 1989 to nearly 30,000 square feet in size. Initial funding came from the Nebraska football teams' appearance in the inaugural Kickoff Classic in 1983. The money from that game, combined with generous donations from the Boekel and Hewit families, enable Nebraska student-athletes to enjoy the best academic support center in the country. THE ACADEMIC EXPERIENCE: THREE STEPS TO SUCCESS

With an enrollment of nearly 25,000 students, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln offers an environment rich in academic tradition. Faculty members at Nebraska have long been recognized for serving students with excellence, distinction and a level of expertise matched by few.

There are nine academic colleges at the University of Nebraska, and each offers a variety of disciplines for students to select. The colleges are: Agriculture, Architecture, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Engineering and Technology, Human Resources and Family Science, Journalism and Mass Communications, Teachers College and Fine and Performing Arts.

From the day student-athletes decide the University of Nebraska is the right place to be, the Academic Peformance Team provides personal support, academic support and professional development to ensure that student athletes will get the most out of their years as Huskers.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT COUNSELING AT NEBRASKA

1. Career Exploration--Knowing that less than I percent of all collegiate athletes advance to professional sports, Nebraska pioneered a comprehensive Career Counseling Program for student-athletes in 1988. This program has been modeled by many other NCAA institutions and is now a component of the NCAA Life Skills Program.

The exploration phase has programs designed to help with career selection and clarification. These programs include: interest inventories, DISCOVER (an interactive computerized career guidance program), monthly career nights, career fairs, shadowing experiences, internships and cooperative education.

- 2. Career Planning-An important aspect of preparing for a career is the teaching of job-development skills. At Nebraska, methods are taught to improve these skills, including resume development, cover-letter writing, job search strategies, interviewing skills, and graduate, law and medical school placement assistance. The "Play it Safe" computer career disc also helps student-athletes explore majors and careers, while learning the latest in job development skills.
- 3. Career Placement--Assistance is provided in securing full-time employment upon graduation. Both the University Career Services office and Alumni office play an instrumental role in the placement process.
- 4. Degree Audit Program--The Hewit Center has a tracking system in place to ensure accurate course selection and provide monitoring of each student-athlete's progress toward a degree in his/her chosen field. Nebraska boasts an 86 percent graduation rate of those who complete their collegiate eligibility at Nebraska.




ACADEMIC SUPPORT


- 1. Tutorial Support--One of Nebraska's largest and perhaps most beneficial support services for student-athletes is the Tutorial Program. Mentor tutors and subject tutors assist student-athletes in making successful transitions into college, while experiencing academic success.
- 2. Supplemental Instruction--A sub-component of the tutorial program, this program is effective in helping student-athletes get adjusted to college academics, while enhancing academic self-esteem and study skills.
- 3. Academic Supervision--In order to monitor the academic and graduation progress of Husker student-athletes, the counselors dedicate extensive time toward academic supervision. Counselors receive periodic grade reports from faculty, and various study hall and class attendance programs are in place, all for the benefit of the student athletes.
- 4. Computer Resources--Student-athletes can become more efficient and productive by accessing a variety of state of the art software programs in the 24 terminal computer lab located in the Hewit Center The lab features a combination of IBM and MacIntosh computers complete with laser-jet printers.
- 5. Educational Assessments--During new student-athlete orientation, the academic staff administers a variety of educational assessments to student-athletes to better determine academic strengths and areas for improvement. The results help counselors and athletes to develop a personalized academic support team.

PERSONAL SUPPORT

- 1. Orientation--The Hewit Center coordinates an annual New Student-Athlete Orientation program aimed at helping student-athletes experience a smooth transition into college life.
- 2. Personal Counseling--Counseling staff members provide student-athletes with a supportive and caring environment. Areas addressed within personal counseling include: transitional issues, stress management, academic focus and personal crisis intervention.
- 3. Multi-Cultural Support--This program is designed to enhance cultural awareness for all student-athletes to help build a supportive, caring environment while learning about different cultural backgrounds. Educational programs and sensitivity trainings are also offered to student-athletes, coaches and administrators.
- 4. Husker Outreach Program-Involvement in the award-winning Husker Outreach program gives Husker student-athletes the opportunity to make a positive impression on youth, while the student athletes further develop their own leadership and interpersonal skills. Through Ventures in Partnership activities, National American Education Week, and the annual "School is Cool Jam" session, more than 70,000 youth statewide hear motivational and inspirational messages. Walt Disney Sports recently announced that it will model Nebraska's "School is Cool" Jam to open its multimillion dollar state of the art sports complex.
- 5. Student-Athlete Advisory Board--Student-athletes from every sport meet regularly with athletic department administrators in order to be included on all decisions affecting their personal, academic and professional development. In 1995, The Board was recognized by *College Athletic Management* magazine as the top student organization in the nation.
- 6. Preparation for Life After Sports--Seminars and counseling support aimed at helping student-athletes with the disengagement from athletics while discovering how to maximize transferable skills.
- 7. NCAA Life Skills Program--Student-athletes receive expert education and intervention regarding personal and social issues. Campus administrators, national experts and former student-athletes share information and insights to assist student-athletes in making responsible decisions.









The success of Nebraska athletes is not limited to only the athletic arenas. More Cornhusker studentathletes have been selected to the GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-America team than athletes from any other school in the country, and more Huskers have earned academic All-Big Eight honors than any other conference school.

In addition, no school has had more athletes receive the NCAA's highest award, The Today's Top Eight, than the Nebraska. Husker athletes have also been awarded the third-highest number of NCAA postgraduate scholarships to help further their educations.

NCAA TODAY'S TOP EIGHT AWARD

The most prestigious honor a student-athlete at an NCAA member institution can win is the Today's Top Eight Award. The University of Nebraska-Lincoln is proud to claim it has had more student-athletes win this award than any other school. Last season, football center Aaron Graham became Nebraska's 12th recipient of the prestigious Today's Top Eight Award.

GTE/CoSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA TEAMS

Since 1952, sports information directors have selected Academic All-America teams from qualified student-athletes representing eight different sports.

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln has had more male and female student-athletes selected as Academic All-Americans than any other school in either the University or College Divisions.

As of June, 1996, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln has seen a total of 142 student-athletes earn this distinction, 59 more than second-place Bucknell (83). Nebraska also leads the nation in first-team GTE Academic All-Americans with 83. The basketball men's program has produced four Academic All-America performers.



FIVE RETURNING LETTERMEN KEY TO HUSKER HOPES IN '96-97

In some cases, less can definitely mean more. The Nebraska basketball team is hopeful that will be the case this season.

Coach Danny Nee's squad includes just nine scholarship players, however the Huskers believe the ingredients are in place for more success than in the past two seasons.

The Huskers are coming off a 21-14 season and an NIT Championship, however after two successive trips to the NIT, the 1996-97 Husker edition will be looking for its first trip to the NCAA Tournament since 1994. In the process Nebraska will look to extend its school record streak of postseason appearances to seven.

Last year's visit to the postseason was a fruitful one for Nebraska. After a disappointing regular season, the Huskers reeled off five consecutive victories to capture the NIT Championship, the school's first national tournament title of any kind. In the process, Nebraska finished with a 21-14 overall record, equalling the fifth-most wins ever by a Husker team.


Nee will look to use that momentum as a springboard for his 11th Husker team, which moves into the first season of competition in the Big 12 Conference.

There is mild concern about the lack of overall numbers, however as Nee sees it, the end of last season should carry into 1996-97.

"When you lose the amount of athletes and experience we did, you're concerned," Nee said. "But at the same time, I think an era has ended and a new era is beginning. As eras move on, everything changes. I think we've got a fresh start with this group. They experienced winning a championship, which is a fresh start we can build on."

That fresh start comes after a season which ended on a positive note, but featured a number of low points. After jumping to a 15-4 start, including 3-1 in league play, Nebraska dropped nine consecutive games and had to fight its way into the NIT.

While the majority of that squad is gone, including nine




Danny Nee returns for his 11th season as the Huskers' head coach, just 15 victories short of 200 wins at Nebraska.

lettermen, Nebraska's well isn't dry. The Huskers return three starters, 44 percent of the scoring from last year and nearly 60 percent of the rebounding

Nee expects an improved team mentally, which he believes could translate to success as the season progresses.

"On paper we're young and inexperienced," Nee said. "But the guys coming back had a unique first year. I think some of them are mentally tough and they know what it's going to take to win. I think our chemistry is the key. If we can get it going and play the way we want to play this has the makings of a good team."

THE LOSSES

Gone from the NIT Championship squad are nine players, including four who spent at least four years on the NU campus. The two biggest losses are guards Erick Strickland and Jaron Boone.

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The 6-3 Strickland capped a stellar career by being named the Most Valuable Player in the NIT. He was also named to the Big Eight All-Defensive Team for the third time in his career and was a second-team All-Big Eight selection. He finished his career with a team-leading 14.7 points per game last season and is Nebraska's all-time steals leader and ranks sixth in scoring.

Boone was Strickland's backcourt running mate for four seasons and finished just ahead of Strickland on the career scoring chart in fifth place with 1,609 points. Boone was a second-team all-league selection as a junior and dropped in 13.8 points per game as a senior.

Also gone are fifth-year seniors Jason Glock and Terrance Badgett, who each earned four letters at NU. Badgett scored 953 points in his career, including 6.7 per contest last year as he was named to the Big Eight All-Bench Team. Along with Boone and Strickland, Badgett holds the school record for games played with 127. Glock was a constant contributor throughout his career and was one of the top Huskers in the classroom, earning Phillips 66 Academic Honor Roll honors last season.

Guard Tom Wald and center Chris Sallee each played two seasons in the NU program and have also graduated. Wald was an impact player in the Husker backcourt, averaging six points OUTLOOK

per game as a senior, while Sallee who completed his eligibility at the semester, averaged nearly four points per contest.

Guard Chad Ideus, forward Chester Surles and center Leif Nelson are not back with the team after playing reserve roles last year.

THE RETURNEES

Just five players return to the fold for Coach Danny Nee, however three of them started last season and all five made significant contributions. Leading the way are two seniors in 6-11 center Mikki Moore and 6-7 forward Bernard Garner.

Moore is in his fourth year in the Husker program and has made steady improvement throughout his career. With 20 pounds of muscle added to his frame, big things are expected from the Gaffney, S.C., native in 1996-97. Moore played in all 35 games last season, started 27 and finished as the team's fourthleading scorer at 9.0 points per game. He was second on the team in rebounding with 5.9 per contest and led the team in blocked shots with 71. Moore is primed to become Nebraska's all-time leader in swats are just 35 short of the career mark held by Rich King.

Moore came on strong at the close of last season, as he averaged nearly 16 points and nine rebounds in the final four games of the regular season. He also recorded four double-doubles in the final nine games of the season, including an 11-point, 13-rebound performance in the NIT Championship game.

"Mikki Moore has the ability to be playing professionally a year from now," Nee said. "He really came on at the end of last year


and with the work he's put in during the offseason, I'm real excited to see his progress."

Garner will team with Moore to form an excellent combination in the Husker frontcourt. In his

first season in the NU program, Garner showed why he was a junior-college All-American before arriving on the Husker campus.

The rugged forward is Nebraska's leading returning scorer and rebounder, averaging 10.7 points and 6.3 rebounds last season. Those marks ranked third and first, respectively, on last year's team. Garner turned in two double-doubles on the year, including a 21-point, 12-board effort at Oklahoma, when he established career highs in both categories. With a year of experience under his belt, Garner's numbers are expected to significantly rise.

"I'm excited about Bernard Garner," Nee said. "He has a year of experience playing at this level under his belt and I think there is a real upside to him that you will see this season. He learned a lot in his first season in the Big Eight and he can be a real goto-guy this year."



blocked shots as his 148 career swats are just 35 short of the career mark held by Rich King.

Mikki Moore is Nebraska's second-leading returning scorer and rebounder and is just 36 blocked shots short of establishing a new NU career rejections record.

The third returning starter is sophomore point guard Tyronn Lue, who had an excellent freshman season. The "quarterback" of the Husker attack, the 6-0 Lue averaged 8.5 points per game and started all but one game at point guard in 1995-96. In the process, Lue established two freshman records. In the second game of the season he netted 30 points in a win over Oregon, establishing a freshman single-game scoring record. In addition, his 144 assists were a NU freshman record, shattering the old mark of 87. Lue was also named to the NIT All-Tournament team for his part in Nebraska's march to the tournament crown.

Lue will set the table for Garner and Moore and will be counted upon to increase his own scoring output in 1996-97.

"Tyronn Lue has the potential to be a really good player," Nee said. "I think he is the type of athlete we want in our program. His athleticism really gives our team an entire different element."

Two other sophomore forwards return in Venson Hamilton and Andy Markowski. They will give Nebraska even more depth in the front court and make the Huskers' inside game one of the best in the Big 12.

The 6-9 Hamilton is the more experienced of the two, as he played in 32 games and drew one start. He averaged 6.1 points and five rebounds per contest. Hamilton also made his mark in the Husker record book as a rookie, tying the school record for most field goals in a game without a miss (9-9) and setting a frosh blocked shot record with 39 last season.

After playing a valuable reserve role last season, Hamilton will be expected to take the next step this winter.

"I really like Venson," Nee said. "I think he has a great upside. He really came on at the end of the year and he'll go into his sophomore season ready to take his game to the next level."

Nebraska native Andy Markowski is the Huskers' final returning letterman. Markowski provided valuable depth off the bench as a redshirt freshman, when he appeared in 28 games and averaged 1.8 points and 1.9 rebounds. With a year under his belt, the 6-8, 210-pound Ord native, will be counted on much more heavily this season.

"Andy Markowski has a great work ethic," Nee said. "He is just a clone in his work ethic and toughness of Bruce Chubick. He brings a high level of intensity to our team and we expect good things from him."

THE NEWCOMERS

Quite often in Division I, new players in the basketball programs must wait their turn before getting significant playing time. However, with the limited numbers on the Husker roster in 1996-97, immediate playing time is available to four Husker newcomers.

Three of the four newcomers were in the Husker program last

year, but sat out the season. Guard Alvin Mitchell, swingman Troy Piatkowski and forward Larry Florence will all attempt to show their year on the sidelines was a positive one.

The 6-0 Mitchell is one of the top prepsters in Nebraska in recent years and will be expected to provide depth in the Husker backcourt this year. Mitchell dropped in 19.8 points, grabbed 4.1 rebounds and handed out six assists per game as a senior at Omaha Burke, leading his team to the state semifinals in his senior year.

Piatkowski is the brother of former Husker great and current NBA player, Eric Piatkowski. Nee is hopeful the younger Piatkowski, a 6-5, 200-pounder can provide the same shooting touch and immediate scoring as his older brother. Troy starred at Rapid City (S.D.) Stevens High School, averaging 19.5 points and 11 rebounds in his senior season.

Of the three first-year sophomores, Florence may be the one relied on for the most playing time. A slashing offensive player and strong defender, the 6-6 Florence could push for a starting job and draw playing time at both the big guard and small forward positions. He averaged 19.2 points and 13.2 rebounds per game

in his senior year of prep ball at Central High School in Phenix City, Ala.

Nebraska's final newcomer is true freshman guard Segado "Cookie" Belcher. Like his distant cousin, Tyronn Lue, Belcher hails from Mexico, Mo. and also like his cousin could push for a starting job as a true freshman. The 6-3 Belcher is an extremely quick player who has already tied the school's 10-yard dash record of 1.52 seconds. He comes to Nebraska after averaging 24.2 points and 8.3 rebounds as a senior at Mexico High, where he was a three-time Missouri Class 3A

(third-largest) all-state selection.

"I like the group of newcomers we have coming in," Nee said. "They filled our immediate needs and we expect all of them to contribute this season."

With limited numbers of scholarship players, Nebraska will rely on a five-man walk-on class to provide depth in practice situations. Walk-ons to the Husker program for this season include juniors Chad Burbach, Ryan Hinckley, Michael Johnette and Ryan Phifer, as well as freshman Andy Schwindt.

THE SCHEDULE

Highlighting Nebraska's 1996-97 schedule is its first season of play in the Big 12 Conference. The Huskers will play a home-and-home series with each of the other five members of the North Division and will meet each member of the South Division once for a total of 16 league games.

Perennial powerhouse Kansas is the team to beat in the North

Division, while Big Eight second-place finisher Iowa State returns all five starters for the season. The South features three teams who made NCAA appearances last season in Texas Tech, Texas and Oklahoma.

"The Big 12 will be even tougher than the Big Eight with more quality games," Nee said. "The northern division is probably a little tougher in basketball. In my opinion, Kansas is probably

going to be ranked in the top three nationally. And I really believe Iowa State is a top 10 or top 15 team. Colorado is improved, Missouri's improved and Kansas State is always good.

"Down south, Texas is Texas, a quality program. Texas Tech is coming off a great season and has great athletes, Texas A&M is turning it around and Baylor has great ath-

letes. Then you've got the two Oklahomas, with great coaches and great programs. I'm excited. It's a good conference and basketball is going to go to an even higher level."

In addition to the rugged league schedule, Nebraska will take on a strong non-conference slate with four NCAA tournament teams and two NIT teams on the schedule. Nebraska will also have an island vacation for the New Year's holiday, traveling to San Juan, P.R. for the inaugural San Juan Classic.

1996-97 HUSKER NOTES

♦ HUSKERS LOOK FOR RETURN TO NCAA TOURNEY

After two trips to the National Invitation Tournament, the Nebraska basketball team will eye a return to the NCAA Tournament in 1996-97. Coach Danny Nee's 11th Husker squad will be looking to improve on last season's 21-14 record and seventh-place conference finish. The NIT bid was Nebraska's sixth straight postseason invitation overall, establishing a school record. The run began with four straight NCAA berths, followed by NIT invitations each of the past two seasons.

The Huskers will be looking to carry last year's momentum into this season as Nebraska finished a roller coaster campaign on a high note, capturing the NIT title last March. The title was the first national tournament championship of any kind in the 100-year history of the NU hoops program and provided an improb-

able ending to the season.

The 1995-96 campaign began with promise as the Huskers won their first six games and stood at 15-4 in late January. However, Nebraska dropped its next nine games before winning its final regular season contest against Kansas State. A loss to Iowa State in the first round of the Big Eight Tournament ended NU's NCAA chances, but the Huskers responded with their run through the NIT. Nebraska has now posted six-straight winning seasons and .500-plus records in 21 of the past 23 seasons.

head coach, and is 185-131 (.585) in 10 seasons at Nebraska. The only coach in school history to take eight teams to postseason play (four NCAAs, four NITs), guide five 20-game winners and direct a Nebraska team to a Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament title and a national tournament title (NIT), Nee's 185 victories rank

second to Joe Cipriano's 253 wins in 17 seasons on the NU sideline from 1964-80. Second among active Big 12 men's basketball coaches in seniority behind Missouri's Norm Stewart (29 years), Nee came to Nebraska after posting a six-year mark of 107-67 (.615) at Ohio University. After watching his first four Husker teams post a 61-64 (.488) record, Nee has led the Huskers to a 124-67 (.649) mark over the last six campaigns, an average of just over 20 wins per season. In 1996, he led Nebraska to the National Invitation Tournament crown, the first national postseason title for a Husker team. Nee, a Brooklyn, N.Y., native who received his master's degree in health, physical education and recreation from Kansas State in 1972, is 7-7 in Big Eight postseason play at Nebraska, 11-3 in the NIT and 0-4 in the NCAA Tournament.

♦ SIX AND COUNTING

Nebraska set a school record in 1995-96 with its sixth consecutive postseason appearance, with its conference-leading 10th National Invitation Tournament trip. The first four postseason trips were to the NCAA Tournament, followed by NIT appearances in each of the past two seasons. Only 16 of the nation's 300-plus Division I schools carry a longer postseason

streak into the 1996-97 season, including just Oklahoma and Kansas in the Big 12 Conference. Refer to the chart on the previous page for a detailed look at active postseason streaks.

♦ Nebraska in Postseason Play

The 1995-96 season marked Nebraska's 15th postseason trip, its sixth straight appearance and its 12th in the last 14 years. Last season Nebraska made its Big 12-leading 10th NIT appearance and advanced to the NIT semifinals in New York for the third time (also in 1983 and 1987), winning the championship for the first time in school history. The Huskers now own a 17-9 overall record in the NIT, including an 11-3 mark under Danny Nee.

In 1994-95 Nebraska's string of NCAA appearances ended at four, as the Huskers were tabbed for the NIT. Nebraska defeated Georgia in the first round in Lincoln, before dropping a 65-59 decision to Penn State in the second round. The loss to the Nittany Lions was Nebraska's only loss in 12 NIT home games.

The previous four seasons Nebraska was selected for the NCAA tournament, but failed to advance to the second round. In 1994, Nebraska was the sixth seed in the East Regional, but lost 90-80 to 11th-seeded Penn in the opening round. The Huskers were seeded 10th in the East Regional in 1993 and dropped a 93-79 decision to New Mexico State in the opening round. In 1992, Nebraska entered the tournament as the eighth seed in the Southeast, but was upended by Connecticut, 86-65, in the opening round. The Huskers entered the 1991 tournament as the third seed in the Midwest Regional, but was stunned in the first round by 14th-seeded Xavier, 89-84. Nebraska's other NCAA appearance came in 1986, when the Huskers were eliminated in the first round by Western Kentucky.

Nebraska now owns a 17-9 mark in the NIT, including an 11-1 record at the Devaney Sports Center and an 0-5 record in NCAA tournament play. Overall the Huskers are 17-14 in postseason play, excluding a loss in the 1949 NCAA playoff game between the Big Seven and Missouri Valley Conferences (not recognized as official NCAA Tournament appearance).

◆ A PUERTO RICAN HOLIDAY

Nebraska will spend the New Year's holiday in an island paradise, taking part in the inaugural San Juan Classic from Dec. 30-Jan. 1, in San Juan, P.R. The Huskers open the eight-team tournament against Old Dominion on Dec. 30, while the remainder of the field includes Southeast Missouri State, Mississippi State, Bowling Green, Cincinnati, Fresno State and Southwest Missouri State.

This will mark Nebraska's third trip in seven seasons to Puerto Rico. The Huskers participated in the San Juan Shootout, a tournament over the Thanksgiving holiday, to start the 1990-91 and 1994-95 seasons. Nebraska finished second in the 1990 tournament with a 2-1 record and went on to the best season in school history (26-8), and went 2-1 in 1994 to finish third in the tournament.

◆ Lue Named to NIT All-Star Team

Nebraska sophomore guard Tyronn Lue played on the 12-man NIT all-star team, which toured Greece and Italy in late June and early July. The team was made up of players who participated in either the Preseason or Postseason NIT, and was coached by former St. John's coaching legend Lou Carnesecca. Lue was selected based on his strong performance in Nebraska's NIT championship run, in which the frosh guard averaged 7.8 points, handed out 17 assists and was named to the NIT All-Tournament Team. Lue scored 15 points in the semifinal game against Tulane and 11 in the championship victory over St. Joseph's. Lue was the

third Husker to play on the NIT All-Star team, joining Dave Hoppen in 1984 and Erick Strickland in 1995.

♦ HUSKERS IN THE NATIONAL POLLS

Nebraska failed to make an appearance in the 1995-96 Associated Press poll, marking the first time in six seasons the Huskers did not spend at least one week in the national rankings. NU did receive votes in eight Associated Press polls, with the highest point total coming on Dec. 5, Jan. 9 and Jan. 23 when the Huskers earned 19 points in each poll. Nebraska received votes in four USA Today/CNN Coaches Polls with its highest point total of 25 coming at the conclusion of the season, following NU's NIT title. Nebraska has finished in the final Associated Press poll twice in the last six seasons, including 1990-91 when the Huskers finished No. 11 and 1993-94 when NU checked in at No. 22.

◆ Devaney Center Provides Home Cooking

Entering its 21st season in the 14,200-seat Bob Devaney Sports Center, Nebraska owns an all-time record of 240-69 (.777), including a 94-52 (.644) mark vs. Big Eight Conference opponents. The Huskers, who are 77-19 (.802) at Devaney since the start of the 1990-91 season, are 51-3 (.944) in that stretch against non-league opponents and 26-16 (.619) vs. conference foes. NU finished 8-1 vs. non-league foes at home in 1995-96 and 3-4 against Big Eight opponents. Under Coach Danny Nee, NU is 123-37(.769) at home, 83-7 (.922) against non-conference opponents and 40-30 (.571) vs. the Big Eight.

Since 1990-91, only 10 schools--Oklahoma State (four times), Missouri (three), Oklahoma (three), Kansas (twice), Iowa State (twice), Kansas State (1992-93), Texas (1993-94), Colorado (1994-95), Penn State (1994-95) and Northern Iowa (1995-96), have exited Devaney with a win. NU, 11-5 at home in 1995-96, has had a .500 or better home mark for 23-straight seasons and 32 of the last 33.

◆ Fans File into Devaney Center

Nebraska basketball was a hot ticket in 1995-96, as some 168,225 fans went through the Devaney Center doors for 16 home games, an average of 10,514 fans per game. The per-game average of 10,514 ranks as the 11th-highest mark in the building's history, while the season attendance total also stands as the 11thhighest in the arena's history. The mark also ranked 39th among NCAA Division I schools in 1995-96 attendance. The Huskers have topped the 200,000 attendance figure in four of the past five

Since the start of the 1990-91 campaign, the Huskers have drawn 1,204,728 fans into the Devaney Center, an average of 12,420 fans per game. Nebraska's home attendance mark over the last six seasons accounts for nearly one-third of the total number of fans who have come through the Devaney Center doors over the last 20 campaigns for Husker hoops. Nebraska drew 14,620 fans against Kansas on Jan. 28, the 14th-largest crowd in Devaney Center history.

♦ HUSKERS DOUBLING UP

Nebraska returning starters Mikki Moore and Bernard Garner each posted double-doubles last season. Moore turned the trick four times, while Garner posted double-figure scoring and rebounding totals twice in the same game. Moore sparkled down the stretch as his four double-doubles came in the final nine games of the season. The senior center posted his first doubledouble of the season against Oklahoma on Feb. 25, then posted three double-doubles in the NIT, including an 11-point, 13rebound effort against St. Joseph's in the title game. Garner posted his first double-double on Jan. 13 at Oklahoma when he scored 21 points and grabbed 12 boards and again on Feb. 3 when

he scored 16 points and had 13 rebounds against Iowa State in

◆ Freshmen Fill Husker Record Books

Sophomores Tyronn Lue and Venson Hamilton will look to build on their excellent freshman seasons. Lue averaged 8.5 points per game and started all but one game at point guard for the Huskers. In the process, Lue established two freshman records. In the second game of the season, he netted 30 points in a win over Oregon, establishing a freshman single-game scoring record. In addition, his 144 assists are a record for a Nebraska freshman, shattering the previous record held by Jaron Boone (87 in 1992-93). Lue was also named to the NIT All-Star Team for his part in the Huskers' tournament title.

Hamilton, one of the first men off the bench in 1995-96, showed tremendous potential in his rookie season. He appeared in 32 games, started one and averaged 6.1 points and 5.0 rebounds per game. He also established a pair of records in his first season as a Husker. Hamilton was 9-9 from the field against Iowa State on Feb. 3, tying the school record for most field goals without a miss. His 39 blocked shots were an NU freshman record, breaking the previous mark set by Rich King (20) in 1987-88.

♦ HUSKERS FORMING OWN SWAT TEAM

Nebraska recorded a school-record 185 blocked shots in 1995-96. The Huskers broke the previous record of 169 set in 1991-92, when the Huskers blocked six shots in the second round of the NIT against Washington State. Mikki Moore, who ranks second in school history with 148 blocks, finished as the team leader with 71 rejections, while Venson Hamilton finished second with an NU freshman-record 39 swats. Moore's 71 blocks was the second-highest single season total in NU history, trailing only Derrick Chandler's 91 rejections in 1991-92. Moore needs just 36 blocked shots this season to pass the NU career record held by Rich King at 183. Hamilton's 39 rejections ranked eighth on the school's single-season blocked shot chart, while Bernard Garner had 22 blocks, just outside NU's top 10 list.

◆ Eighty Spells Victory For Huskers

For the Nebraska basketball team, 80 has become an important number. The Huskers were 14-4 last season when scoring 80 or more points and just 7-10 when scoring 79 or fewer points. In Nebraska's nine-game losing streak the Huskers reached the 80point mark just one time, a 99-98 loss at Missouri. In fact in that stretch, NU averaged just 70.1 points per contest, some 10 points less than NU's season average. NU, which averaged 83.9 points per game in 21 victories last season (compared to 74.3 in 14 losses), owns an 88-19 record when scoring 80 or more points since the start of the 1990-91 campaign. In Danny Nee's 10-year tenure, the Huskers are 115-33 (.777) when putting 80 or more points on the board.

◆ Defense Keys Victory for Huskers

Nebraska held 24 of its last 27 opponents to less than 50 percent from the floor in 1995-96. Kansas State (.517), Missouri (.528) and Colorado State (.536) were the only teams to shoot above 50 percent against Nebraska in the last 27 games. Twelve times last season, the Huskers held their opponent to less than 40 percent from the field, including St. Joseph's .323 effort in the NIT title game. NU's five NIT opponents shot just 43.9 percent from the field, while the Huskers knocked down 52.5 percent of their field goal attempts. In 14 conference games, NU opponents shot 42.5 percent. Nebraska was 11-2 when allowing less than 70 points last season and Delaware State's 41 points were the fewest allowed under Head Coach Danny Nee.



1996-97 Outlook: Nebraska's top returning scorer and rebounder, senior forward Bernard Garner is expected to contend for conference honors this season. Garner made an immediate impact after transferring from Western Nebraska Junior College and with Mikki Moore, Andy Markowski and Venson Hamilton, is part of an excellent Husker frontline. Garner will likely hold down his starting job at power forward, but is expected to see more action at the

1995-96: Senior forward Bernard Garner, the 1994-95 Junior College Player-of-the-Year, started 34 of 35 games in 1995-96 at power forward...only game he did not start was on Senior Day against Kansas State ... on the year Garner was third on the team in scoring at 10.7 points per game and averaged a team-high 6.3 rebounds per contest, while shooting 56 percent from the floor...in Big Eight action, Garner increased his output, averaging 11.4 points per game (second on team) and 6.4 rebounds...his 6.4 rebounds per game tied for ninth in the conference...Garner averaged 11.2 points and 6.0 rebounds in NU's run to the NIT Championship and also shot 60 percent from the field during the five games...he scored 20 points and grabbed six rebounds in semifinal victory over Tulane...recorded two double-doubles in 1996, the first in a triple-overtime loss at Oklahoma where he scored 21 points and grabbed 12 rebounds and the second at home against Iowa State when he scored 16 points and had 13 rebounds...also had 13 rebounds in second meeting with Oklahoma, including a team season-high seven offensive rebounds...overall Garner had four double-figure rebounding efforts with 12 in the first meeting with OU and 10 against Colorado State...the 21 points at Oklahoma was a season high as Garner scored 20 or more points three times including 20-point efforts against Tulane and Northern Iowa...he scored in double figures 17 times, including three of his five outings in the NIT...Garner scored in double figures eight times in Big

Eight action...grabbed nine rebounds at Creighton...had at least five rebounds in 25 of 35 games, including 15 games with at least seven boards...shot over 50 percent in all but nine games last season and hit one over 50 percent of his field goal attempts in the first 11 games of the season...arguably Nebraska's best allaround player last season Garner was the team leader in rebounds (6.3), third in scoring (10.7), third in steals (38), third in FG pct. (.559), third in FT pct. (.704), fifth in assists (34) and third in blocks (22).







1996-97 Outlook: Senior center Mikki (pronounced MY-key) Moore will be looking to close out his Husker career in the strong fashion he completed his junior season. Moore played well down the stretch last season, posting four double-doubles in Nebraska's last nine games. An explosive leaper, Moore enters his senior season with 148 career blocked shots, just 35 shy of Rich King's school record total. Along with fellow senior Bernard Garner and sophomores Andy Markowski and Venson Hamilton, Moore helps form an outstanding Husker frontcourt. With 20 pounds added to his 6-11 frame, Moore hopes to be a dominant force in his senior season and contend for conference honors.

1995-96: Moore regained his starting position in the sixth game of the 1995-96 season and started 27 of the last 30 games ... averaged 9.0 points and 5.9 rebounds on the year and blocked a team-high 71 shots...scored in double figures in seven of the last nine games...averaged 9.0 points, 7.8 rebounds and 1.8 blocks in the NIT...in four games prior to the NIT, Moore averaged 15.8 points and 8.5 rebounds per contest... Moore started the run with a 17-point, 10-rebound effort against Oklahoma, followed with 11 points and eight boards at Colorado... Moore then had a career-high 20 points and nine rebounds against Kansas State in last regular-season game, and netted 15 points and grabbed seven rebounds against Iowa State in the Big Eight tournament...tied his career high with 13 rebounds in the NIT championship game against St. Joseph's and recorded his team-leading fourth doubledouble as he added 11 points...all four of Moore's double-doubles came in the last nine games of the season, including three in the NIT...hit 51 of 88 field goals (.580) in 14 Big Eight games...in conference games averaged 9.1 points, 5.9 rebounds...blocked at least one shot in 18 of the season's final 20 games...had at least one stuff in 28 of 35 outings, including 18 multiple-block games...ranked fourth in the Big Eight in blocks (2.0)...had a 16-point, eightrebound performance against Minnesota in the Big Island championship game and put up the same numbers against Grambling State in the Ameritas Classic...scored in double figures 17 times last season...led the team in blocked shots (71) and field goal percentage (.584), was second in rebounding (5.9), and fourth in scoring (9.0)...Moore increased his free throw percentage to .687 last season, compared with a .551 mark in 1994-95...pulled down at least six rebounds in 14 games, including 12 of his last 25 outings...had his 13-game streak of shooting over 50 percent from the field snapped against Oklahoma State in Stillwater.

1994-95 (Sophomore): Named to the Big Eight's most improved team...averaged 9.8 points and 7.2 rebounds over his last 12 appearances a year ago, while hitting 50.0 percent from the field, 66.7 percent at the free throw line, and scoring in double figures eight times in that stretch...in Nebraska's second-round NIT loss to Penn State, he had a team-high 15 points, six rebounds and three blocked shots...had 12 points, including five in the game's final 1:58, seven rebounds and three blocked shots in 28 minutes against Georgia...his dunk with 1:58 to go against the Bulldogs gave Nebraska its first lead at 62-60, while his conventional three-point play with 1:32 left increased the lead to 65-60...netted a then-career-high 18 points and nine rebounds against Colorado...credited with a career-high six of NU's schoolrecord 14 rejections against Creighton...also had six blocks against both Missouri and Kansas State...blocked a team-high 67 shots, which ranked as the third-best single-season total in school history...had at least one snuff in 28 of 32 outings, including 17 multiple-block games...was second in the Big Eight in blocks for both all games (2.1 bspg) and league games only (1.9 bspg)...led the Huskers in rebounding (6.2 rpg) and dunks (43), was fourth in field goal percentage (.498) and minutes (788), fifth in scoring (8.0 ppg)...grabbed five or more rebounds 24 times, including a pair of double-figure efforts (10 vs. Delaware State, 12 at Missouri-Kansas City)...recorded 14 double-figure scoring games...started 28 games and hit 50.0 percent or better from the field 16 times...was Big Eight's ninth-best rebounder for league games (6.3 rpg), tied for eighth overall (6.2 rpg).

1993-94 (Freshman): Originally ticketed for a redshirt season in only his fourth year of organized basketball, Moore played in 14 games as a freshman, but did not play in the last eight games...he became a Devaney Center crowd favorite early on after



1996-97 Outlook: Sophomore center Venson Hamilton will be looking to build on an excellent freshman season in which he was one of the first Huskers off the bench. Hamilton averaged 6.1 points and 5.0 rebounds per game in his first year in the Husker program and will be expected to vastly increase those numbers this season. A talented low-post player and imposing defender, Hamilton will fit into a four-man rotation in the Husker frontcourt along with fellow returnees Bernard Garner, Mikki Moore and Andy Markowski. Hamilton will push for a starting job and will see significant time at both power forward and center.

1995-96: Hamilton had an immediate impact on the Husker program, averaging 6.1 points and 5.0 rebounds in his rookie season in Lincoln...he appeared in 32 of 35 games and drew one start...Hamilton averaged 7.4 points and 6.2 rebounds in the 1996 NIT, including a 13-point, nine-rebound effort in the semifinal win over Tulane...scored six points and grabbed a season-high 12 rebounds in second-round win over Washington State and netted 12 points in quarterfinal win over Fresno State...made his only start of the season against Oklahoma in Lincoln...had a career day in the first meeting with Iowa State, setting the school record for most field goals without missing a shot, going 9-9 from the floor...had career highs in points (19) and blocks (4) against ISU and added nine rebounds...scored 13 points and had eight rebounds in win over Oregon in Hawaii, just Hamilton's second game in a Husker uniform...scored 10 points and had eight rebounds in his Big Eight debut against Colorado...played in all but three games last season with a high of 31 minutes against Oregon in the Big Island Invitational ... had a field goal percentage of at least .500 in 17 of 32 games...second on team in blocked shots with an NU freshman record 39, was eighth in scoring (6.1), fourth in field goal percentage (.546) and third in rebounding (5.0)...was perfect from the floor in four games, including the school-record effort against ISU...in confer-

ence games, Hamilton averaged 7.1 points and 4.8 rebounds...Hamilton scored in double figures eight times on the season and pulled down five or more rebounds in 17 of 32 games...grabbed eight or more rebounds seven times...averaged 14.6 minutes per game...had the most rebounds (161) of any non-starter.



6-0 ♦ 170 ♦ Sophomore ♦ Guard ♦ Mexico, Mo. (Raytown)

1996-97 Outlook: Sophomore point guard Tyronn (pronounced Tah-RON) Lue enters his second season as the trigger man for the Huskers. Lue started 34 of 35 games as a true freshman last season and will be a catalyst in NU's success in 1996-97. Despite his youth, Lue had a calming force on the Huskers last season and established a Nebraska freshman assist record in the process. With a year of experience under his belt, Lue is expected to be among the top point guards in the Big 12 Conference. Lue's name is prominent on the Husker performance charts as he holds team records for the vertical jump (35 inches), vertical jump points (565), pro agility run (4.01) and pro agility points (549) and is tied for the record in the 10-yard dash (1.52 seconds).

1995-96: Lue won the starting job as a true freshman and started every game except on Senior Day against K-State...Lue finished his freshman campaign averaging 8.5 points and 3.0 assists per game, while handing out a Nebraska freshman record and team-high 144 assists...for his efforts, Lue was named to the Big Eight All-Freshman Team...in the NIT, Lue sprained his ankle in the Colorado State game and was at half-speed for the Washington State game...averaged 7.8 points, and 3.4 assists in the NIT and was named to the NIT All-Tournament Team...he scored 15 points in the NIT semifinal against Tulane and had 11 points, five rebounds and four assists in the championship victory over St. Joseph's...Lue made an immediate impact on the Huskers as he scored an NU freshman-record 30 points against Oregon in the Big Island Invitational in just his second game in a Big Red uniform...also had nine assists and shot 10-16 from the field against the Ducks...Lue also had career-highs in assists (9), steals (5), field goals (10) and free throws (8) in that game...his 21 points at Kansas were a Big Eight high and the most since his 30 against Oregon...had a season-high five 3-point field goals (6 att.) in the loss at Kansas...in conference games, averaged 7.9 points, 3.4 rebounds and 4.0 assists per game...he scored in double figures in three Big Eight games with a team-high 21 at Kansas, 13 points at Iowa State and 14 at Missouri...Lue had not reached double figures since Dec. 20 win over Delaware State





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

1995-96: Markowski played in 28 games, and averaged 1.8 points and 1.9 rebounds for the Huskers...scored a season-high eight points and grabbed four rebounds in a season-high 15 minutes against Missouri-Kansas City...Markowski played doublefigure minute totals seven times...he shot 63 percent (17-27) from the free throw line, but hit just 31 percent (16-51) from the floor...scored four points and grabbed four rebounds in NU's Ameritas Classic championship victory over Grambling State...had a season-high five rebounds in the Huskers' 69-68 win over Long Beach State...pulled down four rebounds against Grambling, Creighton, UMKC and Missouri...missed five games after breaking his hand against Northern Iowa and continued to play with a cast until the Feb. 25 Oklahoma game, his first without the brace...finished the season with four blocked shots, five assists and six steals...played on the People-to-People Sports All-Star Team last summer, a squad which toured Europe...Markowski averaged 6.6 points and 4.5 rebounds per contest on the 10-game trip.

1994-95: Redshirted. One of two Nebraska preps in the Huskers' fall 1993 recruiting class, Markowski had an outstanding fall in the weight room...in the Huskers' five-week fall strength and conditioning program, he increased his squat from 246 to 277 pounds, his hang clean from 147 to 217 and his vertical jump from 29.5 to 30 inches to earn a Performance Award from the Husker Performance Team.



Andy Markowski averaged 1.8 points and 1.9 rebounds as a redshirt freshman last season for the Huskers. He will be counted on for increased playing time and production in 1996-97.

High School: Ord High School, Ord, Neb....a first-team all-state selection by both the Omaha World-Herald and the Lincoln Journal Star...he averaged 23.2 points, 16.6 rebounds and 6.2 blocked shots as a senior for a 16-7 Ord team, despite playing most of the season with a stress fracture in his foot...he hit 55.1 percent from the field, 66.1 percent from the free throw line and 35.6 percent from 3-point range in final prep season...scored 1,189 points in three-year high school career,

grabbed 854 rebounds and blocked 346 shots...recorded nine career triple-doubles and holds eight Ord records...posted career highs of 34 points, 27 rebounds and 13 blocked shots as a prep...selected to play in the 1994 Nebraska Coaches All-Star Game, the USA All-Star Classic in Kansas City, Mo., and the Nebraska-South Dakota All-Star Game...averaged 20 points, 15.1 rebounds and 7.1 blocked shots as a junior en route to Class B all-state honors...played on the 1993 Valentino's Nebraska All-Star team which finished second at the Las Vegas Invitational...a three-year letterwinner for Coach Lon Bartholomew, he also lettered three times in football, and twice in both track and golf..."I've always been a Nebraska fan," Markowski said when announcing his decision to play for NU. "It's every kid's dream in this state to grow up and play for the Huskers."

Personal: Son of Paul and Barb Markowski, Andy has two sisters...a two-time academic all-state honoree, Markowski was a National Honor Society member and graduated with a 4.0 grade point average...he spends his summer running his own mowing service in Ord...born Nov. 9, 1975...Markowski was named to the Phillips 66 Academic All-Big Eight Honor Roll and holds a 3.547 GPA in elementary education.










CHAD BURBACH


MICHAEL JOHNETTE




RYAN PHIFER




ANDY SCHWINDT

DANNY NEE

Head Coach 292-198 in 16 years overall ◆ 185-131 in 10 years at NU

Nebraska has fielded a basketball team for 100 seasons, but it may well be the memories of the last six years which will forever live in the hearts of Husker fans everywhere. Consider if you will that since a 10-18 record and the second of two-straight seventh-place league finishes in 1989-90, Coach Danny Nee's program has:

◆ Posted the school's best six-year record ever at 124-67 (.649).

◆ Appeared in postseason play for a school-record six-straight seasons, including four straight NCAA Tournament appearances for the first time in school history (1991-94) and trips to the 1995 and 1996 NIT tournaments.

◆ Captured Nebraska's first-ever Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament title with a 77-68 victory over Oklahoma State in the 1994 championship game.

◆ Won its first national tournament crown of any kind in the sport by rolling to five straight victories and winning the 1996 National Invitation Tournament.

Only the third Nebraska coach since 1963, following the late Joe Cipriano (1963-80), and Moe Iba (1981-86), Nee was tabbed as the Huskers' 24th head coach on March 27, 1986. He owns a 16-year head coaching record of 292-198 (.596), and a 10-year NU mark of 185-131 (.585).

The only coach in school history to win 20 games in five different seasons and take four Nebraska teams to the NCAA Tournament, Nee's 185 wins rank second only to Cipriano's school-record 253 victories in 17 seasons. He's only the second coach in school history to be at the helm 10 or more seasons, and he has taken eight of his 10 squads to postseason play. Nee also

ranks as the "junior" dean of Big 12 Conference coaches, as his tenure is second only to Missouri Coach Norm Stewart's 30-year run in Columbia.

In 1995-96, the Huskers rebounded from a disappointing conference season to win the NIT and post a 21-14 overall record. Nebraska opened the season with six consecutive victories, including an impressive title at the Big Island Invitational.

The Huskers also came out of the gates fast in conference play, opening the league slate with a 3-1 mark, including NU's first win at Oklahoma State since Nee's first season on the Husker sideline. However, Nebraska struggled in late January and February, dropping nine consecutive games. Few believed the Huskers could turn the season around, but Nee's unwavering optimism provided the spark Nebraska needed.

Under Nee's direction, Nebraska capped the season on a high note, rolling to five straight victories to capture the NIT crown, including road victories at Colorado State and over Fresno State and legendary Coach Jerry Tarkanian. NU capped its NIT run by defeating Tulane and St. Joseph's (Pa.) in Madison Square Garden.

Husker Debut

When he came to Nebraska from Ohio University after the Huskers' first-ever NCAA appearance in March 1986, he inherited a senior-dominated, but inexperienced squad. The team gelled late in the 1986-87 season, finished 21-12 and was third in the National Invitation Tournament (NIT).

Nee's Huskers stood 12-8 overall and 2-5 in the league at the halfway point of the 1987 Big Eight campaign. However, NU won five of its last seven conference games, advanced to the NIT Final Four at Madison Square Garden and missed the school record for victories by one. Along the way, a then-school-record 197,395 fans packed the Devaney Center for 17 home games.

However, with those seniors gone, the difficult rebuilding process began just as the Big Eight became one of the nation's dominant basketball conferences. Nee's second year at the Husker helm saw three league teams reach the final eight of the NCAA Tournament, with Kansas beating Oklahoma in an all-Big Eight final.

The result in 1987-88 was Nebraska's first losing season in 15 years (13-18), but there were enough moments of youthful brilliance to give hope for the future, including a 70-68 comefrom-behind homecourt win over eventual national champion Kansas.

The Nebraska roster was still freshman- and sophomore-dominated for Nee's third season in 1988-89, but the Huskers climbed back over the .500 mark, finished 17-16, returned to postseason play with an NIT bid and advanced to the second round before being eliminated at Ohio State. Nee's fourth Husker team finished 10-18 in 1989-90, when the Huskers missed the school record for season losses by one.

Operation Turnaround

The 1990-91 season promised to be a pivotal year in Nee's rebuilding program. For the first time in four years, Nee had a solid nucleus of seniors to build upon. But the presence of Rich King, Clifford Scales, Beau Reid and Keith Moody did little to impress the Big Eight-area media, who picked Nebraska to finish a distant last in the league's preseason poll.

That voting prompted the best-remembered question at the annual preseason Big Eight Basketball Media Day at Kansas City, Mo., and it came from Nee at the start of his interview session:

"Why did you guys pick us last?"

There was silence from the assembled writers then, and some embarrassment later when the Huskers roared out to a 16-1 start, helped by a school-record-tying 14-game win string, got into the wire service rankings for the first time in 13 seasons, and went on to NU's highest final rankings ever at No. 9 in the UPI poll and No. 11 in the AP listing.

And, instead of finishing last in the Big Eight, the Huskers ended up third at 9-5, one game back of co-champs Oklahoma State and Kansas. NU then advanced to the finals of the Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament for the first time in school history, but dropped a 90-82 decision to Missouri, and finished the year with a disappointing 89-84 loss to Xavier in the first round of the NCAA Midwest Regional, Nee's first NCAA appearance at NU.

For his efforts, Nee was named the 1991 Big Eight Coach-ofthe-Year by both the Associated Press and United Press International, District V Coach-of-the-Year by the U.S. Basketball Writers Association, and finished fourth in AP's National Coachof-the-Year balloting.

With the loss of more than 60 percent of its scoring and rebounding punch, the 1991-92 season figured to be a transition


year for Nebraska and Nee.

However, Nee developed a blend of veteran players, rookies and pleasant surprises into a unit which shot out to a 12-1 record and finished 19-10 overall. The Huskers were 7-7 (fifth) in the nation's toughest league—the Big Eight, and earned a second-straight NCAA Tournament bid.

Along the way, the Huskers pulled off two of the biggest upsets in the 1991-92 college basketball season. In consecutive home games in February, Nebraska thumped second-ranked, 20-0, Oklahoma State (85-69), then beat third-ranked Kansas (81-79) when Jamar Johnson hit a 3-pointer from the corner on an inbounds pass from Carl Hayes with one second left in overtime. The win over the Big Eight Champion Jayhawks propelled the Huskers into the AP rankings at No. 25 the following week, marking the first time NU had ever been ranked in consecutive seasons.

During the season, Nee also picked up his 200th career victory (86-67 over Wisconsin) and his 100th Nebraska win (74-71 over Missouri-Kansas City).

The 1992-93 campaign was another history-maker for Nee and his rags to riches program, as NU landed a spot in the NCAA Tournament for an unprecedented third consecutive season. In

addition, the Cornhuskers won 20 games (against 11 losses) for the third time in Nee's tenure. Nebraska tied for second in the Big Eight with an 8-6 record, its best league finish in 12 seasons.

The 1992-93 season may well have been the most-anticipated Nebraska basketball campaign ever. Fueled by arguably the best recruiting class in school history, rave reviews from national publications, and the return of four starters, Nebraska raced to a 7-0 record and climbed to 17th in the Associated Press poll. However, the Huskers dropped six of their next 11 games, started

league play 0-3 for the first time since the 1989-90 season, and hopes for another NCAA trip were dented.

But, while some were labeling his seventh team as one of the nation's most-disappointing squads at the season's midway point, Nee rallied his troops to wins in eight of their final 12 games and a share of second place in the Big Eight. The Huskers, who headed into the final week of league play with an outside shot at their first Big Eight title in some 53 seasons, also produced their first All-Big Eight performer of the Nee era in guard Eric Piatkowski, who repeated the feat a year later.

The beat continued for the Huskers in 1993-94, as Nebraska posted a 20-10 record en route to a fourth-straight NCAA Tournament bid and back-to-back 20-win seasons for the first time in school history. NU captured its first-ever Big Eight Tournament title and was 22nd in the final Associated Press poll, only the third time in school history NU had appeared in the final AP ranking.

In 1994-95 Nebraska failed to reach the NCAA Tournament for the first time in five seasons, but did reach the NIT, giving the Huskers a school-record tying five straight postseason appearances. Nebraska finished the '94-95 campaign 18-14 and posted

its fourth straight season of home attendance over the 200,000 mark.

Husker Hoops has been a hit under Nee as the Huskers finished 20th nationally in attendance in 1993-94 with a per-game average of 13,278. The year prior to Nee's arrival, NU averaged 9,741 fans per outing. In the last six years, more than 1.2 million fans have attended Nebraska home games, which accounts for 35.1 percent of the arena's total attendance in 20 seasons as the home of Husker hoops.

Bobcat Tracks

Rebuilding, though, is nothing new for the 51-year-old Brooklyn native. In his six years at Ohio, his teams won 107 and lost 67, including an 87-33 record the last four years and twice he was named Mid-American Conference Coach-of-the-Year—but it was far from easy. He took over a struggling program at the Athens, Ohio, school in 1980-81, started his head-coaching career with an 11-game losing streak and suffered through a 7-20 season. His second Bobcat team improved to 13-14, though, and was followed by four consecutive 20-game winners.

In 1982-83, Nee's squad won a school-record number of games in a 23-9 campaign, captured the MAC title, and he was rewarded with conference and Ohio Coach-of-the-Year honors. The Bobcats went to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in nine years, beat Illinois State (51-49) in the first round of the Mideast Regional before losing to Kentucky in the second round, 57-40.

The Bobcats finished 20-8 in 1983-84, but did not earn a postseason bid. A year later, Ohio U. went 22-8, again captured the MAC title and advanced to the NCAA Tournament, where it dropped a 49-38 first-round decision to Kansas.

In 1985-86, the Bobcats finished 22-8 for the second-straight season, but were second in the MAC behind Miami (Ohio). Ohio U. received an NIT bid, but lost a first-round game to eventual tournament champion Ohio State, 65-62.

Wake Up the Echoes

Nee went to Ohio after four years as an assistant coach under Richard "Digger" Phelps at Notre Dame. During that time, the Fighting Irish were 91-27 and went to the NCAA Tournament all four years, including a Final Four appearance in 1978 and an appearance in the Mideast Regional final in 1979. He recruited and coached 10 current and former NBA players at Notre Dame.

Nee played high school basketball at Power Memorial High School in New York, where one of his teammates was Kareem

A member of Al McGuire's first recruiting class at Marquette University, Nee captained the Warriors' freshman team for frosh coach Hank Raymonds before a two-year tour of duty in the United States Marine Corps. A Vietnam veteran, he received Combat Air Insignia Medals and an honorable discharge in 1968.

He returned to college at St. Mary of the Plains College in Dodge City, Kan., and received a bachelor's degree in English and physical education in 1971. At St. Mary, he was on the Dean's List, was listed in Who's Who Among American Colleges and Universities, and was president of the student body as a senior. He played two years of basketball there before launching his coaching career as a student assistant for the Cavaliers in 1970-71. Nee was inducted into the Ohio University Hall of Fame in 1994. He received a master's degree in health, physical education and recreation from Kansas State in 1972.

Nee coached the junior varsity basketball team at Red Bank, N.J., Regional High School to a 14-6 record in 1972-73. He then became head coach at Brick Township, N.J., High School, where he compiled a 38-35 record in three years before going on to Notre Dame. His Brick Township teams were 32-15 the last two years, winning a school-record 16 games each year.

Nee serves as a congressman in the National Association of Basketball Coaches Association and is a member of the Midwest coaches advisory board to the NCAA Division I men's basketball committee

He is married to the former Janet Scheib of Pittsburgh, Pa., and is the father of three children, Patrick, 18, Nora, 10, and Kevin, 8.

Associate Head Coach Fifth Season

THE WILLIAMS COACHING FILE

As A PLAYER

1967-71 Ashland (Ohio) College

Jimmy Williams, the veteran member of Coach Danny Nee's coaching staff, enters his fifth season with the Huskers, his first as Nebraska's associate head coach and his 24th as a Division I assistant coach.

Williams primary responsibilities include the coaching of the Husker centers. Williams' current pupil is Mikki Moore, who enters his third year as NU's starter and is on track to become Nebraska's all-time blocked shots leader this season. Williams also recruits nationally for the Husker program.

Williams, who joined the Nebraska staff in August of 1992, came to Lincoln after spending three seasons on Coach Jim Brandenburg's San Diego State staff. Before joining the Aztec staff, Williams served one season (1988-89) as an assistant at the University of Tulsa under Coach J.D. Barnett. He helped the Golden Hurricane to a 17-11 record and a second-place finish in the Missouri Valley Conference.

Prior to his stints at San Diego State and Tulsa, Williams was an assistant at the University of Minnesota from the 1971-72 season through the 1985-86 campaign, first under Bill Musselman and later Jim Dutcher. During his 15-year tenure with the Golden Gophers, Minnesota won a pair of Big Ten titles, finished


in the upper division of the rugged Big Ten nine times, made eight postseason tournament appearances and had a .500 or better overall record 12 times.

As an assistant at UM, Williams, 49, recruited and coached 21 student-athletes who went on to play in the National Basketball Association, nine of whom remain active today. Golden Gopher and NBA standouts who Williams personally recruited include Mychal Thompson, Ray Williams, Jim Petersen and Randy Breuer. While at Minnesota, Basketball Times rated him as one of the nation's top 15 recruiters. In 1985-86, he served as the interim coach at Minnesota for part of the season.


A native of Havana, Fla., Williams graduated from Ashland (Ohio) College in 1970 with a bachelor of arts degree in education. He was a college division All-America basketball player for the Eagles and helped the school to the 1969 college division national title.

Williams spent a year and a half teaching and coaching in high schools in Ohio and Washington D.C., then joined the Golden Gopher staff in 1971 as an assistant coach/head freshman coach.

Assistant Coach Second Season

A veteran collegiate coach Scott Howard is entering his second season at Nebraska, and his 10th season as a full-time assistant. Howard was named to Danny Nee's staff on July 6, 1995, following a five-year stint at Miami, Fla.

Howard's primary responsibilities with Nebraska include coaching Nebraska's guards and recruiting nationally for the Huskers.

Howard, who was an assistant on Coach Leonard Hamilton's Hurricane staff from 1990-95, served as Miami's recruiting coordinator and put together three national top 20 (1991, 1992, 1993) recruiting classes during his stint at the Coral Gables school. He also was responsible for coaching the post players at Miami.

Before moving to Miami, Howard spent one season (1989-90) as an assistant to George Raveling at Southern California. During his tenure at USC, he was assistant recruiting coordinator, director of scouting and coached three NBA players. From 1983 to 1987, Howard was an assistant basketball coach at the University of Iowa, three seasons under Raveling and one under Tom Davis. He helped the Hawkeyes to three NCAA Tournament appearances (1985, 1986, and 1987) and his efforts as underclassman recruiting coordinator resulted in four top 20 recruiting classes. At Iowa, Howard coached eight NBA players.

A 1983 graduate of Iowa State University with a degree in physical education, Howard earned a pair of varsity letters for the Cyclones. He received his Masters of Arts in Educational Administration from Iowa in 1985. A native of Iowa Falls, Howard is married to the former Kim McCaulley.





BILL BYRNE

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR
FOURTH YEAR

Now in his fourth year at Nebraska, Bill Byrne continues to lead and improve one of the nation's best athletic programs.

Byrne became Nebraska's 11th athletic director on June 26, 1992, replacing the legendary Bob Devaney. Byrne officially took the reins of the athletic program, Jan. 4, 1993.

He came to Nebraska following 10 very successful years at the University of Oregon. Highly respected among his peers, Byrne was recently re-elected as the secretary-treasurer of the College Football Association and as a member of that organization's board of directors. He has served on the NCAA special committee on marketing and licensing and currently serves on the committee on special events.

Byrne has worked tirelessly to establish a close relationship with the NU community and Husker fans. For four years, Byrne has canvassed the state visiting with boosters to learn the needs of all Husker fans.

Among his many accomplishments at Nebraska, Byrne has been instrumental in upgrading Husker facilities, including the addition of two HuskerVision replay boards at Memorial Stadium in 1994. Besides becoming the first collegiate-owned venue to feature replay boards for its fans, Memorial Stadium was renovated to include a state-of-the-art training room, expanded coaches and players locker rooms, a new public address system, expanded restrooms and concession stands. In addition, section 14 was rebuilt in 1994 to offer increased seating for disabled fans.

The Michael Grace Production Studio in West Stadium and new scoreboards at the NU Softball Complex, Buck Beltzer Stadium and the Bob Devaney Sports Center indoor track are all recent additions.

Byrne's future plans ensure that Nebraska's facilities remain the best in the nation for Husker athletes and fans in their quest for championships. Byrne enlisted the Kansas City, Mo., firm of HOK Sport to develop a master facilities plan for the Nebraska athletic program. A new press box and skyboxes are part of the renovation plans for Memorial Stadium, along with waterproofing and concrete repair throughout the stadium. The Bob Devaney Sports Center will receive a new sound system, new weight room, new women's basketball locker room and a passenger elevator. Buck Beltzer Stadium will get new infield turf for the 1997 baseball season, and the NU Softball Complex will receive new dugouts. The computer center in the Boekel Academic Center also will expand.

Byrne's leadership has kept the Huskers among the nation's elite. In fact, during the 1995-96 season, Nebraska:

- ♦ won its 17th-straight Big Eight all-sports championship.
- won eight of 20 conference championships (football, volleyball, women's swimming, men's swimming, women's gymnastics, men's indoor and outdoor track and women's indoor track).
- won its fourth national title in football and first volleyball national championship.
- ♠ finished in the upper division of the conference standings in 15 of 20 sports and eighth in the Sears National Director's Cup all-sports race.
- produced its nation-leading 12th NCAA Today's Top Eight Award winner in Aaron Graham.
- produced the Big Eight Male Athlete-of-the-Year in Tommie Frazier, and the Big Eight Female Athlete-of-the-Year in Penny Heyns.

With the leadership of Byrne and former Chancellor Graham Spanier, Nebraska became the first Big Eight school to add women's soccer as a varsity sport in 1994, and gave Nebraska a Big 12-leading 22-sport offering. Byrne also led the first Nebraska team fund-raising campaign, which increased donations by more than half a million dollars.

In addition to maintaining the highest standard of excellence on the playing field, Byrne has successfully reorganized the department for the 21st century. Stressing more efficient use of resources, Byrne has created a one-stop shopping type of organization to promptly meet the needs of student-athletes, fans and contributors.

Byrne is recognized as a national leader in intercollegiate athletics and continues to make an aggressive effort, with other Big 12 athletic directors, to place conference officials on key NCAA committees to better represent the views of Big 12 institutions. He

has been instrumental in the development of the Big 12 Conference and an active voice in its planning.

In conjunction with the rest of the UNL administration, Byrne has arranged to use the Husker football and basketball networks to promote causes and concerns important to the entire university community, including the institution's increased role in research.

Before bringing his expertise in the athletic world to Nebraska, Byrne served as the athletic director at Oregon. He assumed the duties of Oregon director of athletics in May of 1984 as one of the youngest directors in Division I. Byrne established fund-raising offices in Portland and southern Oregon and established a full-time marketing and promotions operation, which blossomed to encompass the Oregon Sports Network for statewide in-house production of Ducks' games on radio and television.

Byrne led \$19 million in renovations at Oregon, which resulted in new homes for the Ducks' football team and athletic department offices. He was responsible for the construction of a new press box, sky suites and total renovation of Autzen Stadium, which concluded in 1991. Two years later, the facility's Hall of Champions was dedicated in Byrne's honor.

Byrne has served as president of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) in 1991-92, and is in his fifth year on that orgainzation's executive committee. He was also chairman of the Pac-10 Conference executive committee and was named national fund-raiser-of-the-year by the National Athletic Fundraisers.

Byrne was born in Boston but grew up in Idaho and attended Idaho State University. Byrne was the student body president and received bachelor's and master's degrees in business from Idaho State in 1967 and 1971. Before going to Oregon in 1982, he was assistant athletic director at San Diego State (1980-82), executive director of the New Mexico Lobo Club (1976-79) and director of alumni relations at Idaho State (1971-76).

Byrne's wife, Marilyn, is the Dean of Graduate Studies in Education at Doane College and earned her Ph.D. in Higher Education Administration from NU. The Byrne's have two sons and a 1-year-old grandson, Nicholas. Nicholas' parents, Greg and Regina, live in Medford, Ore., where Greg is an athletic fund-raiser for the University of Oregon. Their other son, Bill, works as an account manager for Visa in its worldwide computer center located in San Mateo, Calif.





CHANCELLOR, UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA-LINCOLN

James Moeser became the 18th chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln on Feb. 1, 1996. He holds the rank of professor of music.

Chancellor Moeser began his academic career in 1966 at the Univer-

sity of Kansas as an assistant professor and chairman of the department of organ. He worked his way through the academic ranks at KU, eventually being named Dean of the School of Fine Arts. In 1984, he was named Althaus Distinguished Professor of Organ, the first academic dean at Kansas ever to be named to a chaired professorship.

In 1986, Dr. Moeser was appointed Dean of the College of Arts and Architecture at the Pennsylvania State University and was also executive director of University Arts and Services in charge of Penn State's cultural programs.

In 1992, he became Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost of the University Future Committee at the University of South Carolina, which established academic priorities and reallocated \$16 million over three years to support those priorities. He spearheaded a number of initiatives designed

to improve the quality of undergraduate education at South Carolina, including the Residential College, enhancement of the library and Honors College and intensified recruitment of high ability students.

Born and raised in Texas, Dr. Moeser earned a bachelor of music degree with honors in 1961 and a master's of music in 1964 from the University of Texas at Arlington. He completed advanced study in Berlin and Paris under a Fulbright grant and earned a doctor of musical arts at the University of Michigan in 1967. He has an international reputation as a concert organist and actively concertized until 1993. He was a past president of the American Guild of Organists and AGO vice president from 1986 to 1990. He also chaired three of AGO's national pedagogy conferences and served as a consultant to numerous churches and universities.

Chancellor Moeser's wife, Susan Dickerson Moeser, holds a doctor of musical arts degree and is an organ professor with an active concert schedule. He is the father of two children. His daughter, Carter, is a college student in Kansas, and his son, Chris, is a journalist in Phoenix.

JAMES O'HANLON



Institutional Representative

Dr. James O'Hanlon, Dean of Teachers College, became Nebraska's seventh institutional representative to the National Collegiate Athletic Association, Sept. 1, 1982. In January, 1994, he was elected to a four-year term on the NCAA Council. He is a member of the NCAA Committee on Athletic Certification and chairman

of the District Five Postgraduate Scholarships Committee. An NCAA Certification Examiner, he has also been a member of the Faculty Representatives Board of the College Football Association.

During the spring and summer of 1992, he served as chairman of the search committee in charge of finding a replacement for athletic director Bob Devaney. He has also chaired search committees for the deans of journalism and engineering.

Dr. O'Hanlon has been a member of the Nebraska faculty since 1966 when he came to NU from Ohio University as an assistant professor in the Department of Secondary Education. He was promoted to associate professor in 1967 and professor in 1970.

He was the chairman of the Nebraska Coordinating Commission for Post-Secondary Education (1974-75) and served as president of the UNL Faculty Senate in 1981. In 1972, he received the NU Foundation Distinguished Teaching Award. In 1991, he was a visiting scholar to East China Normal University in Shanghai.

From 1975 to 1977, he was the chairman of the Department of Physical Education and Recreation, then became director of the new School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation (HPER). He remained in that position until he became acting Dean of Teachers College, July 1, 1982. He was named Dean of Teachers College, May 1, 1983, and is secretary of the Education Deans Organization.

Dean O'Hanlon is a member of the National Executive Committees of Renaissance Group and the Association of Colleges and Schools of Education in State Universities and Land Grant Colleges and Affiliated Private Universities. He has served as a member of the Steering Committee of the Midwest Holmes Group, and is on the board of the Nebraska Center for Excellence in Education and the ACSESULGC-APU Task Forces on Cultural Diversity and Professional Development Schools. In addition, he has chaired various UNL committees.

A native of Blair, Neb., O'Hanlon attended Grinnell (Iowa) College and received a bachelor's degree in history from Nebraska in 1957. He earned his master's in secondary education from Ohio State in 1958, then served as an infantry officer in the U.S. Army. He taught secondary schools in Parma, Ohio, and Fremont, Neb., before returning to UNL for doctoral study. He received an Ed.D in secondary education and educational psychology and became an assistant professor at Ohio from 1964-66.

He serves on the Boards of Directors of the National Arbor Day Foundation and the Lincoln Orchestra Association. He is a member of the Lincoln Community Concert Band and an avid jogger and reader. O'Hanlon and his wife, Gail, have three children, Greg of Denver, Colo., Susan of Omaha, Neb., and Tim of Minneapolis, Minn.





THE CORNHUSKER LEGEND

Before 1900, Nebraska teams were known by such names as the Old Gold Knights, Antelopes and the Bugeaters. But in 1900, Lincoln sportswriter Charles S. (Cy) Sherman, who was to gain national renown as the sports editor of the Lincoln Star and help originate the Associated Press poll, tired of referring to the Nebraska teams with such an unglamorous term as Bugeaters. Iowa had, from time to time, been called the Cornhuskers, and the name appealed to Sherman.

Iowa partisans seemed to prefer Hawkeyes, so Sherman started referring to the Nebraska team as Cornhuskers, and the 1900 football team was first to bear that label.

Of course, the name caught on and became a Nebraska byword, eventually becoming the official nickname for the state.

There is no official symbol of a Cornhusker and various cartoonists have caricatured the mystical something that typifies Nebraska athletics—some winning fan approval and others arousing fan ire.

The cartoon character, "Herbie Husker" (upper right), evolved out of Nebraska's trip to the 1974 Cotton Bowl in Dallas. Artist Dirk West of Lubbock, Texas, designed a Cornhusker cartoon for the Cotton Bowl press headquarters that caught the eye of former Husker SID Don Bryant. Later, Bryant contacted West for permission to use the cartoon and West expressed a desire to refine his original cartoon and improve some of the character's features. As a result, West was commissioned to draw an original Cornhusker cartoon character that serves as a mascot for all Husker athletic teams.

"Herbie" is the registered logo of the Cornhusker Athletic Department, which controls its use. West's concept of Nebraska football is appropriate—a burly, rugged and confident fellow who is proud of both the athletic and the agricultural traditions of the University of Nebraska.

In recent years, the University has also used the Cornhuskers' football helmet superimposed on a script "Huskers" for a football

logo, script Huskers on a basketball for the men's basketball logo and three years ago, unveiled a block N logo with a script "Huskers." All three are registered trademarks of the Athletic Department. For lincensing information, contact Chris Bahl at (402) 472-9446.

University of Nebraska Licensing Program

In 1981, the University of Nebraska began a licensing program to protect the use of its name and symbols and ensure that the public properly identify and associate NU logos on products bearing the institution's marks. A further development of the program occurred in 1995, when the athletic department hired its first full-time licensing director, Chris Bahl. With Bahl's direction, the Nebraska licensing department has become one of the nation's largest revenue-producing universities. Husker products are licensed around the world. The licensing department, considered one of the most innovative in the United States, is committed to building cooperative relationships with licensees and developing markets for "Officially licensed Products of the University of Nebraska."

Nebraska joined a consortium of other universities throughout the country to bring consistency in the marketplace for officially licensed collegiate products, protect the names and logos of universities and generate additional revenue to support for the scholarship programs and other projects of those universities. 000000000000000

BIG 12 CONFERENCE

The Big 12 Conference, under the leadership of Commissioner Steve Hatchell and institutional representatives of each school, will be one of the nation's outstanding intercollegiate organizations. In February, 1994, Texas, Texas A&M, Texas Tech and Baylor joined the member institutions of the Big Eight to form the Big 12 Conference. Hatchell heads a staff of outstanding people who give leadership and direction to what will be one of the nation's most respected intercollegiate programs.

Donnie Duncan will serve as the senior associate commissioner and director of football operations for the Big 12. Before joining the Big 12 staff, Duncan was the athletic director at the

University of Oklahoma. Britton Banowsky becomes the associate commissioner for administration and compliance and will be assisted by Lori Ebihara, who will serve as the coordinator of the league's compliance program.

Dr. Prentice Gautt, who spent 16 years with the Big Eight and 13 years as an associate commissioner, will be the associate commissioner for academic services and life skills for the Big 12.

Tim Allen will serve as an associate commissioner. Allen

worked in the Big Eight from 1983 through 1996. He was the service bureau director from 1983 to 1989, until he was named assistant commissioner. He became an associate commissioner in the Big Eight in 1995. Bill Foster, a successful collegiate basketball coach, will serve as a special consultant to the Big 12 for men's basketball.

Bo Carter will be the Big 12 service bureau director. Brad Clements and Chris Theisen will be assistant service bureau directors. Tim Millis will be the supervisor of football officials.

Dru Hancock, who served two years as an assistant commissioner and senior women's administrator in the Big Eight, becomes the assistant commissioner of championships in the Big 12. **Steve Pace** will serve the Big 12 as chief financial officer.

The rest of the Big 12 staff includes: Sharon Story, executive assistant to the commissioner; Darlene Widner, administrative assistant; Tracy Vaughan, administrative assistant; Khanh Dao, administrative intern.

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OPPONENTS LOOKING TOWARD THE FUTURE: THE BIG 12 CONFERENCE

The Big 12 Conference became a reality, February 25, 1994, when Baylor, Texas A&M, Texas Tech and Texas joined the Big Eight Conference institutions Iowa State, Kansas State, Oklahoma State, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Oklahoma in pursuit of common endeavors.

Individually, member schools have been respected for successes in the classroom and on the field of competition. League institutions have received accolades for the quality of academic resources, programs and services offered to students. Athletically, the Big 12 Conference has accounted for more than 130 NCAA team championships and 15 wire service football titles, while its student-athletes have claimed more than 750 NCAA crowns entering the 1996-97 academic year. The formation of the new conference is an undertaking by school chief executive officers to combine resources to achieve higher levels of performance.

Institution chancellors and presidents will serve as the chief policy-makers of the Big 12, operating as the Council of Chief Executive Officers. Administration of the league will occur through the Faculty Athletics Representatives, Athletics Directors and Senior Women's

Administrators.

Steve Hatchell was appointed the league's commissioner March 26, 1995, and assumed duties July 1, 1995. Although administrative meetings were conducted since the Big 12 was announced, formal operations actually began July 1, 1996. Hatchell has extensive ties to the league and has served the past three years as commissioner of the Southwest Conference. His association with the current membership of the Big Eight began in the early 1970s while he worked in the athletic department at Colorado, his alma mater. He served as Service Bureau Director/Associate/Interim Commissioner of the Big Eight from 1977 to 1983, working under Commissioners Chuck Neinas and Carl James. His tenure at the Southwest Conference was preceded by a stint as Metro Conference commissioner from 1983 to 1987 and Executive Director of the Orange Bowl.

"The future will provide for some exciting and rewarding experiences for the Conference," Hatchell said. "The Big 12 has an opportunity to be the preeminent conference. With the added power that the Big Eight will have with the four schools coming in, it will allow them to provide the leadership for the NCAA."

Few conferences can match the level of success achieved by Big 12 schools on the basketball court.

Last season six Big 12 teams qualified for the NCAA Tournament in Kansas, Iowa State, Oklahoma, Kansas State, Texas Tech and Texas. Those teams compiled a 7-6 BIG 12 SPORT-BY-SPORT OFFERING

record in the tournament, including Kansas advancing to the Final Eight, while Texas Tech was a Sweet 16 team.

In addition, two schools qualified for the NIT Tournament, including Nebraska and Missouri. The Huskers went on to capture the NIT crown, winning five consecutive contests.

The league consistently produces national powers on the hardwood, as eight of the league's 12 teams have advanced to the Sweet 16 in the past 10 years. Three Big 12 teams have reached the Final Four since 1988, including Kansas' national crown in 1988, when they met fellow Big Eight power Oklahoma in the championship game.

In recent years the Big Eight Conference has compiled impressive numbers on the basketball court, including:

◆ producing 27 first-round NBA draft picks since 1980, 20 of which have come in the last eight seasons.

◆ The Big Eight has posted a nonconference, regular-season winning percentage of at least .800 four times: 1991-92, .882 (97-13); 1994-95, .843 (91-17); 1993-94, .819 (86-19); 1992-93, .800 (88-

With the type of success the Big Eight has produced, coupled with the addition of four excellent institutions Big 12 Basketball promises even better things.

LOOKING BACK: THE BIG EIGHT, A CONFERENCE OF CHAMPIONS

Nebraska joined Colorado, Iowa State, Kansas, Kansas State, Missouri, Oklahoma and Oklahoma State and closed the book on 90 years of the Big Eight Conference tradition on June 30, 1996.

Big Eight Conference history and records date back to 1907, and the members of the league were national leaders from the beginning. Oklahoma A&M (Oklahoma State) gave the Missouri Valley Intercollegiate Athletic Association its first NCAA championship with a wrestling title in 1928. Nebraska provided the Big Eight's final national title, Jan. 2, 1996, with a win over Florida in the Fiesta Bowl to capture the football crown.

Over the years, Big Eight schools won 114 national championships, including 11 mythical football titles. Nebraska won 15 national titles, including four football titles, eight men's gymnastics titles, two women's indoor track championships and the Big Eight's only women's volleyball national title. The Big Eight ranked third among NCAA member conferences in the number of men's team NCAA titles owned behind the Pac-10 and the Big Ten. Oklahoma State led the Big Eight's list of NCAA champions with 42 team sport titles.

Along with the Big Eight Conference's excellence on a variety of playing fields, Big Eight athletes were also leaders in the classroom. The Big Eight had 15 NCAA Today's Top Eight Award winners. Nebraska led the conference with 11 student-athletes honored, including nine Nebraska football players. Nebraska football player Aaron Graham became the final Big Eight recipient

of the award in 1996.

For the final 38 years of its existence, the Big Eight Conference was a model of consistency and leadership in college athletics. But

the Big Eight was not always stable.

Beginning on Jan. 12, 1907, when Nebraska, Kansas, Missouri, Iowa and Washington University of St. Louis met at the Midland Hotel in Kansas City, Mo., to form the Missouri Valley Intercollegiate Athletic Association, the league was changing frequently. Iowa competed only in football and was also a member of the Big Ten. Iowa State, known then as Ames College, and Drake joined the league in March of 1907, and competed for the first time in 1908.

Although the official title stuck with the Missouri Valley Intercollegiate Athletic Association until the name changed to the Big Eight Conference in 1964, the membership was not nearly as stable. Iowa left the league after the 1910-11 season for complete participation in the Big Ten. Kansas State, known as the Kansas College of Applied Science and Agriculture at that time, joined the league in 1913. Grinnell (Iowa) College was admitted in 1919, while Nebraska became an independent school for the 1919 and 1920 football seasons and the 1919-20 basketball season. Oklahoma joined the conference in 1920 and Nebraska rejoined in 1921. Oklahoma State, which was called Oklahoma A & M at the time, withdrew from the Southwest Conference and joined the league in 1925, which brought conference membership to an all-time high of 10 schools.

But on May 19, 1928, Nebraska, Iowa State, Oklahoma, Kansas, Kansas State and Missouri met in Lincoln and organized a separate conference, excluding Oklahoma State, Grinnell, Drake and Washington University of St. Louis. The new league became known to the public and media as the Big Six, but was still officially the Missouri Valley Intercollegiate Athletic Association. Colorado joined the conference in 1947, and the name unofficially changed to the Big Seven. Oklahoma State rejoined the league on June 1, 1957, but the name did not officially change to the Big

Eight Conference until 1964.

From 1964 to June 30, 1996, the Big Eight Conference was synonymous with tradition, academic and athletic leadership and championships. Now, with the dawn of the Big 12 Conference, a new history of excellence will begin and member institutions will continue to be leaders on the playing fields and in the classrooms of America.

HUSKERS CAP UP AND DOWN YEAR WITH NIT TITLE

An old adage says that in Nebraska if you don't like the weather, wait a few minutes and it will change. Last season that saying not only held meaning for Nebraska's climate, but also for the fortunes of its basketball team.

The Huskers began the season with four returning starters and hopes for a return trip to the NCAA Tournament. Nebraska's early season-performance gave no reason to doubt the Huskers would reach that goal.

The 1995-96 season tipped off for the Huskers in Hawaii with the Big Island Invitational. Nebraska opened the season with a victory for the eighth consecutive year by downing Toledo, 72-59, in the first round.

Although it was just the second game of the season, Nebraska's semifinal contest with Oregon may have been the most exciting of the season. Nebraska rallied from a 19-point halftime deficit to force overtime, then scored the final 11 points in the extra session to post a 114-106 win. In the game, Tyronn Lue and Jaron Boone each poured in 30 points for Nebraska, marking the first time in 100 years of Husker hoops two players had scored 30 or more points in the same game. In addition, Lue's 30 points established a new Husker freshman record.

Paced by a season-best 20-21 free-throw shooting performance, Nebraska capped the trip to the islands in impressive fashion with a 96-85 victory over Minnesota. In the process, Nebraska captured its first regular-season three-game tournament title since winning the 1967 Big Eight Holiday Tournament.

Fresh off one tournament title, the Huskers now focused on continuing their domination of their own Ameritas Classic. The Huskers breezed to the tournament crown with victories over Georgia Southern and Grambling State, capturing their eighth straight Ameritas crown. Boone and fellow senior guard Erick Strickland were named to the all-tournament team, with Boone earning MVP honors.

Nebraska improved to 6-0 on the season with an 88-67 victory over intra-state rival Creighton in Omaha. Nebraska fell behind 10-0 out of the gates, but outscored CU 44-13 the rest of the first half and cruised to its sixth consecutive win over the Bluejays.

Just 13 days after defeating Minnesota for the Big Island title, the Huskers and Gophers met again, this time in Minneapolis. Nebraska led by as many as nine points early in the contest, but the Gophers rallied for a 3-point halftime lead. Clutch three-point and free-throw shooting gave Minnesota a 91-80 victory and ended NU's unbeaten start.

The Huskers returned home to take on an upstart Northern Iowa team, with upset hopes in mind. Both teams had hot shooting nights, especially from behind the 3-point arc. Northern Iowa established a Sports Center record with 15 three-pointers and posted a 109-104 victory. The 213 combined points also set a new Devaney Center record.

Stinging from two straight losses, Nebraska looked to get back to its winning ways against Northeastern Illinois. The Huskers jumped to a 14-point halftime lead and went on to post a 94-76 victory. Strickland moved into seventh place at NU in scoring with a team-high 24 points.

The Huskers finished out the 1995 portion of its home schedule with an 88-41 rout of Delaware State. The 47-point victory margin was the fourth-largest in school history, the 41 points was the least allowed by a Danny-Nee coached NU team and the Hornets .230 field-goal percentage was the lowest in arena history.

With the Christmas holiday behind it, Nebraska headed to northwest to take part in the Ford Far West Classic in Portland, Ore. And for the second time on the young season, Nebraska faced

a rematch with a non-conference foe, this time the Oregon Ducks. This time the game was much less dramatic than the first meeting, as the Huskers jumped to a 10-point halftime lead and cruised to a 99-76 victory, led by Boone's 25 points.

Waiting for the Huskers in the championship game was SEC powerhouse Mississippi State. MSU used a 13-0 first-half run to open a 12-point edge at halftime and eventually led by as many as 14 points in the second half. Nebraska went on a 30-13 surge in the second half and led 63-60, with just over three minutes remaining, but the Bulldogs, an eventual Final Four team, rallied for a 69-66 victory and the tournament crown. Boone led Nebraska in scoring against the Bulldogs with 13 points and was named to the Far West Classic All-Tournament team.

Coming off a tough loss to a ranked foe, Nebraska had little time to rest, before taking on 22nd-ranked Texas in the Devaney Center. The Huskers pulled away from a one-point halftime lead to defeat the Longhorns 85-69, despite committing a school-record 30 turnovers. The Huskers also set a school record by making 43 free throws in the contest and tied the NU record with 59 attempts. The Huskers were victorious, despite not making a three-pointer for the first time in 142 games.

Nebraska continued its home stretch with a 69-68 victory over Long Beach State, its first one-point victory in three seasons. The Huskers held Long Beach to .421 shooting, the sixth straight opponent NU held under 50 percent from the field.

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With an 11-3 record, the Huskers headed into conference play full of confidence, as NU opened the league season at home against Colorado. Nebraska jumped to an 11-point halftime lead and held on for a 79-74 victory, the Huskers' 13th victory in 14 attempts over CU in Lincoln. Boone and Strickland each scored 18 points, while center Mikki Moore tallied 16 points and eight rebounds.

Nebraska looked to improve to 2-0 in the league with a crucial league road contest at Oklahoma. The Sooners jumped to a 10-point halftime lead and expanded their lead in the second half, before Nebraska rallied to force overtime. The teams could not settle their differences until the third extra period, with the Sooners pulling out a 117-100 triple-overtime victory.

The three overtime contest was the second-longest in Nebraska's 100-year history, with the 117 points the third highest total every allowed by an NU team. Junior forward **Bernard Garner** was outstanding in defeat, registering Nebraska's first double-double of the season with 21 points and 12 rebounds.

Disappointment from the loss in Norman lingered, but the Huskers were able to post an 87-69 home victory over Missouri-Kansas City in the final non-conference game of the season. Nebraska held its ninth straight opponent under 50 percent shooting.

Nebraska took a second shot at a road win in Oklahoma the following Saturday, venturing into the hostile atmosphere of Oklahoma State's Gallagher-Iba Arena. The Huskers opened a 40-28 lead at halftime and held off several Cowboy threats to post a 66-57 road victory. The win marked NU's first victory in Stillwater since a 79-77 overtime victory in 1986-87.

The Huskers continued excellent defensive play in their next conference game against Missouri. Nebraska held the Tigers to 37 percent field goal shooting and cruised to a 76-58 victory, led by Strickland's 21 points. The 18-point victory was NU's largest over Missouri in 30 years and improved NU to 15-4 overall and 3-1 in league play, its best conference start since a 4-1 mark in 1990-91.

Nebraska was full of momentum heading into a Super Bowl Sunday contest at home against third-ranked Kansas. The two teams had a hard-fought first half with Kansas entering the locker 1995-96 REVIEW

room with a 36-35 advantage. The Jayhawks opened the second half with a 25-8 run to open an 18-point lead and went on to an 88-73 victory, dropping NU to 3-2 in the league.

The Huskers looked to get back on track at Kansas State, but found a determined Wildcat squad standing in its way. K-State became the first team in 13 games to shoot over 50 percent from the field against Nebraska and posted a 77-68 win.

A fired-up Iowa State team was next on the slate in the Devaney Center. The Cyclones started quickly and held an 11-point halftime lead and held on for a 75-65 win. Husker freshman Venson Hamiltonwas outstanding for Nebraska, hitting all nine of his field-goal attempts and scoring 19 points.

A spirited NU comeback fell short in its next game at Missouri, as the Huskers dropped a heartbreaking 99-98 decision to the Tigers. Missouri shot 60 percent from the field in the first half and opened a 61-46 halftime edge. The Huskers fell behind by as many as 20 points in the sec-


ond half, but put on a furious rally and took a 98-97 lead with 12 seconds left in the contest. However, Missouri connected on two free throws with four seconds remaining for the final margin. The Huskers fell short despite shooting a season best .597 from the field against the Tigers.

Nebraska continued to struggle dropping 15-point losses at Iowa State and at home against Oklahoma State to drop to 3-7 in conference action. The Huskers road did not get any easier as NU had to travel to Lawrence, Kan. to take on the fifth-ranked Jayhawks.

The Huskers started slowly and fell behind 14-3 and trailed by as many as 16 points in the second half. However, the Huskers rallied to take a one-point lead with 8:50 to play, but Kansas proved to be too much down the stretch and defeated Nebraska 81-71. Lue led the Huskers with 21 points, including a five of six performance from three-point range.

In the Huskers' next contest, NU and Oklahoma again battled into an extra session as the Sooners rallied from a 15-point second half deficit to force overtime. In the extra session, OU outscored Nebraska 15-11 and dropped the Huskers to their eighth straight loss and 3-9 in the league.

Nebraska's season took its most bizarre turn three days later in Boulder, Colo. Nebraska jumped to a six-point halftime lead at 36-30, however the Buffs stormed back in the second half to take control and post a 78-64 victory. The game ended abruptly with 1:07 remaining as NU's Terrance Badgett attempted a follow-up dunk and shattered the backboard. Both teams agreed to call the remainder of the contest and Badgett and Moore were

both treated for cuts from the

Nebraska went into its final regular season game with K-State needing a victory to avoid a first-round Big Eight Tournament game with league champ Kansas. The Huskers responded with a 70-66 victory over the Wildcats, giving NU the seventh seed in the league tourney and ending its nine-game losing slide.

The Huskers pushed 22ndranked Iowa State to the limit in the first round of the Big Eight tournament, dropping a 62-60 decision. The hardfought loss gave Nebraska momentum heading into the NIT

Nebraska opened the NIT on the road and used a blistering 64 percent second-half shooting effort to defeat Colorado State, 91-83. The Huskers trailed by six points at the half, but connected on 10-17 three-point goals to come from behind, led by Strickland's 19 points.

The Huskers returned home to the Devaney Center for the second round of the NIT to take on Pac-10 power Washington State. The Huskers shot a school postseason-best

69 percent from the field to defeat the Cougars, 82-73, improving to 11-1 all-time in home NIT games.

NU's journey to the Big Apple was diverted to Fresno, Calif. for a game with Jerry Tarkanian's Bulldogs. The Huskers trailed by as many as 13 points in the first half, but rallied to take a 45-40 lead into halftime. In the second half Nebraska played nearly flawless basketball and pulled away for an 83-71 victory and advanced to the NIT semifinals in New York for the third time in 13 years.

Coach Danny Nee's squad did not let the bright lights and big city affect them once in New York as Nebraska looked sharp against semifinal foe Tulane. The Huskers came out hot against the Green Wave and never looked back, en route to posting a 90-78 victory. Strickland and Garner each poured in 20 points, while Nebraska shot 57 percent from the field, its fourth straight game over 50 percent and hit 33 free throws.

With the victory the Huskers advanced to the NIT championship game against St. Joseph's a semifinal winner over Alabama. Nebraska opened an eight-point, 34-26 halftime lead and pushed the lead to 10 points midway through the second half. However, the Hawks went on a 10-0 run to tie the game at 47-all. Nebraska's defensive pressure down the stretch was the difference as NU held St. Joe's to 32 percent shooting on the night and captured the NIT title with a 60-56 win. Strickland led the way with 13 points in the title game and earned tournament MVP honors, while Lue was named to the All-Tournament team.

With its first national tournament title of any kind under its belt, the Nebraska basketball team started the season the same way it began--a champion.







Nebraska posted its 20th victory, marking just the ninth time in school history an NU team posted 20 wins... for the fourth consecutive game in the NIT, NU shot over 50 percent from the field and scored over 80 points... the win marked NU's second over the Green Wave in the NIT, as the Huskers also defeated Tulane in the first round of the 1983 tourney when NU also advanced to New York... Nebraska attempted a postseason school-record 45 free throws and tied a postseason school record with 33 made free throws... the Huskers also had a postseason record 12 steals... Erick Strickland and Bernard Garner each scored 20 points, marking the first time in NU postseason history two players scored 20 or more points in a game.

STRICKLAND WINS JACK MOORE AWARD

Erick Strickland, a second-team All-Big Eight selection in 1995-96, received the Jack Moore Award, given annually to NU's outstanding men's basketball player. Strickland started 34 games for the Huskers last season and was the team's leading scorer at 14.7 points per game. He also led the Huskers in steals with 61 and holds the career record for steals at Nebraska and ranks sixth on the all-time scoring chart with 1,586 points. Along with fellow

1996 seniors, Terrance Badgett and Jaron Boone, Strickland is tied for the career record for games played with 127. In addition, Strickland led the Huskers to the NIT Championship and for his efforts was named the MVP of the tournament.


The award is named for late Husker guard Jack Moore, a 5-9 playmaker who set 17 school records in a career that ended in 1982 and culminated with the 1982 Francis Pomeroy-Naismith Award as the nation's best collegiate player under six feet tall. A consensus All-Big Eight performer in 1982, Moore was killed in a plane crash in March of 1984.



Game Notes: Nebraska won an NIT semifinal game for the first time in three tries, after losing in the semifinals in 1983 and 1987...Nebraska posted its 20th victory, marking just the ninth time in school history an NU team posted 20 wins...for the fourth consecutive game in the NIT, NU shot over 50 percent from the field and scored over 80 points...the win marked NU's second over the Green Wave in the NIT as the Huskers also defeated Tulane in the first round of the 1983 tourney when NU also advanced to New York...Nebraska attempted a postseason school-record 45 free throws and tied a postseason school record with 33 made free throws...the Huskers also had a postseason record 12 steals...Erick Strickland and Bernard Garner each scored 20 points, marking the first time in NU postseason history two players scored 20 or more points in a game.



Game Notes: Nebraska's NIT Championship was its first national tournament championship of any kind...Nebraska finished the first half on an 11-3 run to take a 34-26 lead into halftime...the Huskers led 47-37 with 10 minutes to play, before St. Joe's went on a 10-0 run to tie the game at 47-all...St. Joseph's connected on just 32 percent of its field goals attempts, the lowest mark against Nebraska in the postseason...Erick Strickland was named the NIT Most Valuable Player, while freshman Tyronn Lue was named to the All-Tournament team...Mikki Moore posted his third doubledouble of the NIT...after shooting over 50 percent in its first four NIT games, Nebraska made just 44 percent against the Hawks.



THE HISTORY OF NEBRASKA BASKETBALL

As near as anyone can determine, the University of Nebraska was first represented by a men's basketball team on Feb. 2, 1897, just six years after Dr. James A. Naismith set down the rules of the game at the International YMCA Training School in Springfield, Mass.

A team from the Lincoln YMCA was the opponent, and Nebraska posted an 11-8 victory at Grant Memorial Hall, the home of the Huskers for all but two seasons until the Coliseum opened in 1926. The same teams played in Grant Hall three weeks later with a similar result, as NU won 23-14. Nebraska had to rally in the second game. The Hesperian, a student newspaper, reported: "At the end of the first half the score stood 9 to 6 in favor of the visitors but during the second half our boys took a brace and some excellent work was done."

Such was the modest beginning of a program that has enjoyed probably its greatest success over the last six seasons, with a 124-67 record (.649), six consecutive postseason appearances, including four-straight NCAA Tournaments, a Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament title in 1994 and last season's championship of the National Invitation Tournament.

Nebraska doubled its schedule in 1898, losing twice to the Lincoln YMCA and splitting two games with the Omaha YMCA. A 16-12 loss against the Omaha YMCA provided evidence as to why Nebraska finished 1-3 that season. According to The Hesperian account: "The great difficulty of the University team was mere recklessness. Our boys have been playing with a loose interpretation of the rules. The officials were strict and of course the resulting advantage was in favor of Omaha." Then as now, overly aggressive play had its drawbacks.

Nebraska played teams from other universities for the first time in 1899, winning two games against Nebraska Wesleyan and one against Doane en route to the unofficial state championship. The next season, Nebraska played an out-of-state opponent for the first time, defeating the University of Kansas, 48-8, at Lincoln. That game still ranks as the worst loss for a Jayhawk team and was the first for either school against a present-day NCAA Division I school and the first matching present-day Big 12 Conference institutions.

The Kansas team was coached by Dr. Naismith. The Nebraska student yearbook, Sombrero, wrote: "A closely contested game was looked for. The Jayhawkers were, however, completely outclassed, the score

being 48-8." Based on the victory against Kansas and four other similarly decisive victories, "the basketball team for this year was undoubtedly superior to any in the west," the Sombrero concluded. It would be several years before such a claim could be made again.

Nebraska hired its first full-time coach in 1911. E.O. "Jumbo" Stiehm, who scored 24 points against Nebraska as a Wisconsin basketball player in 1908, coached both football and basketball. His first Husker basketball team won 14 of 15 games, its only loss coming at Minnesota, 40-15. The student newspaper, The Daily Nebraskan, blamed the loss on Nebraska's inability to adjust to the Gophers' "100-foot floor."

A Daily Nebraskan account of Nebraska's 29-28 season-ending victory against Kansas at Lincoln in 1912 provides evidence that some fans' behavior hasn't changed much over the years. "The game as a whole was entirely unsatisfactory, being marred by rough tactics of the visitors, incompetent work on the part of the referee and interruptions by the audience, which were in part justifiable."

Nebraska shared the Missouri Valley Conference championship with Kansas in 1912 and 1914 and won the title outright in 1913 under Stiehm's leadership. The 1913-14 team was "so fast it took a movie camera to catch 'em," according to the Cornhusker student yearbook. It was described as a "point-a-minute" team, which wasn't quite accurate. Typically, games lasted 40 minutes (though that wasn't always the case), and Nebraska averaged 30 points per game. Guard Sam Carrier became Nebraska's first All-America basketball player in 1913. He and Carl Underwood led the Huskers to 17 victories in 19 games. Underwood was the Missouri Valley Conference scoring leader with 66 points in 10 conference games.

Nebraska won another conference title outright in 1916, after Sam Waugh replaced Stiehm as the Cornhuskers' coach for one season. Stiehm, who coached the first game of the season before giving way to Waugh, had planned to remain at Nebraska through the basketball season before leaving to become coach and athletic director at Wisconsin. But the Nebraska Athletic Board decided to replace him.

Waugh was succeeded by E.J. "Doc" Stewart, whose three Cornhusker teams had a combined record of 29-23. Nebraska was 22-2 in 1919-20 and 11-3 in 1920-21 under Coach P.J. Schissler. After the 1919-20 season, Schissler challenged the University of Chicago to a game, but to no avail. The Cornhuskers also were invited to a

postseason AAU tournament in Atlanta but didn't go.

Schissler's teams played as independents. Nebraska lost its affiliation with the Missouri Valley Conference because of a decision to play a football game against Oklahoma in Omaha in 1919. Conference rules prohibited such games (Oklahoma had not yet joined the Missouri Valley Conference). Nebraska returned to the Missouri Valley Conference in 1921, and Owen Frank replaced Schissler as basketball coach. The remainder of the Roaring 1920s was, for the most part, undistinguished.

Basketball was rough and tumble. There was a center jump after every basket and no requirement to cross mid-court in 10 seconds or less. The ball was a lot different, too, more like a medicine ball, which contributed to some dull games.

The most significant event during the 1920s was the building of the Coliseum, which was dedicated on Feb. 6, 1926. The Cornhuskers dropped a 25-14 decision to Kansas in the first game at their new home, which was built at a cost of \$445,000 and seated 8,000 for basketball. Prior to that, Nebraska played most of its home games in Grant Hall, which seated about a fourth as many fans as the Coliseum and was located just to the north of where the Sheldon Art Gallery now stands.

Athletic Director Fred Leuhring arranged for Nebraska to play its home basketball games at the State Fairgrounds Coliseum

in 1921, in order to accommodate more spectators. The Cornhuskers played two seaons at the Fairgrounds Coliseum, which had a wider court than Grant Hall's. The first game there was played on Jan. 14, 1921. Nebraska defeated conference opponent Grinnell 31-10 before an audience of 1,500, according to newspaper estimates. After two seasons, the Cornhuskers returned to Grant Hall, which had been remodeled, and continued to play home games there until the NU Coliseum opened.

Nebraska ended the decade with an 11-5 season under Charles T. Black, a former Kansas All-American in 1928-29. In the next 19 seasons, the Huskers had just two winning records, back-to-back campaigns under Coach W.H. Browne in 1935-36 and 1936-37. The 1937 team tied Kansas for the Big Six championship, after finishing second to the Jayhawks in 1936.

The 1930s produced four more Cornhusker All-Americans: center Don Maclay in 1931, guard Steve Hokuf in 1933, guard George Wahlquist in 1936 and guard Robert Parsons in 1937. Maclay was the Big Six scoring leader in 1930, scoring 112 points in 10 league games.

Harry Good was hired as head coach in 1946 and after two losing seasons, turned Nebraska's fortunes around. In 1948-49, Good's Huskers went 16-10, tied Oklahoma for the Big Seven regular-season championship and defeated the Sooners, 57-56, in a conference playoff to qualify for an NCAA playoff game. The NCAA Tournament was structured differently then, and the Cornhuskers needed to win that playoff to advance into the NCAA field. They lost to Oklahoma A&M, the Missouri Valley Conference champion, 52-35, at Kansas City, Mo. Coach Henry P. Iba's Aggies went on to finish second to Kentucky, coached by Adolph Rupp, in the NCAA Tournament.

In 1949-50, Nebraska again won 16 games and shared the Big Seven crown with Kansas and Kansas State. That marks the last time the conference had a three-way tie at the top. "We were King in our day," Claude Retherford once told a newspaper reporter. "They were firing football coaches left and right, but we packed 'em in. Oh, people were interested in football, but basketball was THE game on the Nebraska campus when we played." Retherford earned All-Big Seven recognition in 1949 after leading the conference in scoring with a 12.4 points-per-game average.

The Cornhuskers had another first-team All-Big Seven performer in 1949, Milton "Bus" Whitehead. The 6-10 center from Scottsbluff, Neb., also earned all-conference honors in 1950, when he averaged a


then-school-record 15.7 points per game. Whitehead was named to the District V All-America team by Collier's Magazine. Whitehead also was the first Cornhusker selected to play in the East-West All-Star Game in New York City's Madison Square Garden. When he graduated, Whitehead held nine school scoring records.

Nebraska basketball experienced another drought beginning in 1950-51, with 15 consecutive losing seasons. Despite playing for a team that finished last in the Big Seven in 1952, Husker guard Jim Buchanan earned All-America and all-conference honors. And even though the late Jerry Bush, dubbed the "Big Bear of the Coliseum," never produced a winning team in his nine seasons as head coach at Nebraska, his colorful personality and uncanny ability to fashion upsets kept Cornhusker fans entertained.

The most dramatic upset during Bush's tenure as coach came on Feb. 22, 1958, against Kansas. The Jayhawks featured 7-foot center Wilt Chamberlain and were ranked fourth in the nation when they came to Lincoln. Earlier in the season, the Jayhawks had defeated the Huskers 102-46 at Lawrence, Kan., with Chamberlain matching Nebraska by scoring 46 points. Nebraska scored a 43-41 victory in the rematch, when 5-9 guard Jim Kubacki hit a 15-foot jump shot with two seconds remaining.

But that's only part of the drama. Kubacki, a senior from Toledo, Ohio, spent all but the final 6:53 of the game sitting on the bench in street clothes, forced there by a knee injury and the kind of fate from which legends are built. When the Cornhuskers' captain, Gary Reimers, left the game with leg cramps, Kubacki convinced Bush to let him suit up. Four minutes and seven seconds later, Kubacki went into the game. Two minutes and 44 seconds after that, he hit the winning shot.

Bush also had the distinction of coaching the school's first 1,000-point scorer, guard Herschell Turner, who came from Indianapolis, Ind., where he was rated the

second-best high school player in the state as a senior, behind only crosstown rival Oscar Robertson. Turner earned All-Big Eight honors in 1960 and ended his Cornhusker career with 1,056 points.

Following the 1962-63 season, Bush was replaced as head coach by Joe Cipriano, who brought the nickname "Slippery Joe" and up-tempo basketball to the Coliseum. His teams pressed full-court and ran a fastbreak offense, which led the Big Eight in scoring average in 1966, 1967 and 1968.

Cipriano's first two teams had a combined record of 17-33. But his third team, in 1965-66, was one of the most successful in school history, finishing 20-5 and second to Kansas in the Big Eight. All-Big Eight guard Grant Simmons, the first Cornhusker to earn Academic All-Big Eight honors, was the team's leader.

The 1966-67 team finished 16-9 and made the school's first appearance in the 16-team National Invitation Tournament, played at New York City's Madison Square Garden. Guard Stu Lantz was a two-time All-Big Eight pick and led the Cornhuskers in scoring and rebounding in both 1966-67 and 1967-68.

Guard Marvin Stewart and center Chuck Jura earned All-Big Eight honors for HISTORY

Cipriano in 1971 and 1972, respectively. Guard Jerry Fort, who finished his career with a then-school-record 1,882 points, was the first Nebraska player chosen first-team all-conference three times, from 1974 through 1976. With Fort's leadership, Nebraska began a string of 14 winning seasons.

In the fall of 1976, Cornhusker basketball moved out of the Coliseum and into the state-of-the-art Bob Devaney Sports Center arena. Located on the State Fairgrounds, the \$13 million athletic complex was financed by a special cigarette tax.

Cipriano coached Nebraska to another 20-victory season in 1977-78. The Cornhuskers, led by All-Big Eight guard Brian Banks, finished with a 22-8 record and advanced to the second round of the NIT. Despite failing health--a battle against cancer that he finally lost--Cipriano shared coaching duties with his assistant, Moe Iba, in 1979-80, and took Nebraska to the NIT again. For their efforts, the duo shared United Press International Big Eight Coach-of-the-Year honors.

Cipriano brought Nebraska into the modern era, coaching 17 seasons and 450 games. His record was 253-197, and those 253 victories represent one-fourth of Nebraska's all-time total. Following Cipriano's death, Iba was named head coach, and he continued Cipriano's winning ways. In Iba's six seasons on the bench, Nebraska was 106-71 and advanced to postseason play four times.

Center Andre Smith was the 1981 Big Eight MVP and twice earned All-Big Eight honors. However, it was the late Jack Moore, a 5-10 playmaker from Muncie, Ind., who captured the hearts of Nebraska fans from 1980 through 1982. Moore earned All-Big Eight honors in 1982, when he won the Naismith Award, given annually to the nation's top player under 6-feet feet tall. The first three-time Academic All-Big Eight pick in Nebraska history, Moore scored 1,204 points and hit .901 from the free throw line during his career.

The cornerstone of Iba's teams from 1983 through 1986 was Omaha, Neb., native Dave Hoppen, a three-time All-Big Eight center and the first Nebraska basketball player to have his jersey number (42) retired by the school. In 1982-83, Hoppen's freshman season, the Cornhuskers were 22-10 and won three games in the NIT before losing to DePaul in the semifinals at Madison Square Garden. The Cornhuskers returned to the NIT each of the next two seasons, advancing to the second round both times.

Hoppen's college career, though, was ended by a knee injury he sustained in a game at Colorado on Feb. 1, 1986. He finished as the school's all-time scoring leader with 2,167 points and broke or tied 19 school records during his four-year stay. After Hoppen's injury, Iba's team regrouped and went on to earn the school's first-ever "official" NCAA Tournament berth. Nebraska lost to Western Kentucky in the first round of the Southeast Regional, 67-59. Following the game, Iba announced his resignation.

On March 27, 1986, Danny Nee was officially introduced as Nebraska's 24th basketball coach. During a news conference to announce his hiring, Nee said a "new era" in Cornhusker basketball was beginning. "I understand I have to win, but I believe we have to play a style people will come to see. Basketball was made to be played up and down the floor. I think the people will enjoy it."


Nee's nine teams have appeared in postseason play eight times and have topped the 20-win mark five times. In Nee's first season, Nebraska was 21-12 and finished third in the NIT. After a 13-18 record in his second season, the Cornhuskers got back over the .500 mark with

a 17-16 record in 1988-89 and advanced to the second round of the NIT.

After missing the school record for losses in a season by one in 1989-90 (10-18), Nebraska won a school-record 26 games, against only eight losses, in 1990-91. The Cornhuskers played in the Big Eight Tournament championship game for the first time and advanced to the NCAA Tournament, losing to Xavier, 89-84, in the first round at Minneapolis, Minn.

The 1990-91 team included two first-round NBA draft picks, senior Rich King and redshirted freshman Eric Piatkowski. The 7-2 King was the tallest player in Cornhusker history. Piatkowski, Nebraska's sixth-man in 1990-91, went on to win first-team all-conference honors twice. He ranks second on the Cornhuskers' career-scoring list, with 1,934 points. Piatkowski is the only Nebraska player to finish with at least 1,900 points, 600 rebounds (669) and 300 assists (322).

Since the record-setting 1990-91 season, the Cornhuskers have made three more NCAA Tournament appearances and two NIT appearances. They won the NIT

last season, in impressive fashion. "The NIT run was incredible, when you look at the teams we beat and how we beat them," Nee said. "I don't care what anybody says, it was domination."

In addition to reaching the NCAA Tournament for a fourth straight season and recording back-to-back 20-victory seasons for the first time in school history, Nee's 1993-94 team made history by winning the school's first Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament title. The Cornhuskers defeated Oklahoma, Missouri and Oklahoma State to earn the championship.

Nee has taken Nebraska's program to another level as the Huskers prepare for their first season in the Big 12 Conference. "When you lose the amount of athletes and the experience we did, you're concerned," Nee said. "But at the same time, I think an era has ended and a new era is beginning.

"As eras move on, everything changes. I think we've got a fresh start with this group. They experienced winning a championship... a fresh start we can build on."

Three-time All-Big Eight center Dave Hoppen finished his career as Nebraska's all-time leading scorer with 2,167 points. Hoppen, whose four-year collegiate career was cut short by a knee injury in a game at Colorado, Feb. 1, 1986, broke or tied 19 Nebraska records and five Big Eight marks during his standout career. A native of Omaha, Neb., Hoppen was the first player in

Husker basketball history to have his jersey (42) retired. Originally drafted by the National Basketball Association's Atlanta Hawks in the third-round of the 1986 draft, he played with both Charlotte and Philadelphia, in addition to a stint in the CBA.

2. ERIC PIATKOWSKI, G/F, RAPID CITY, S.D. (STEVENS)



One of only two players in school history to play on four-straight NCAA Tournament teams, Eric Piatkowski finished his career as the second-leading scorer in school history with 1,934 points. The Most Valuable Player in the 1994 Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament, Piatkowski had a school and tournament-record 42 point out-burst in Nebraska's first-round victory over Okla-

homa. A two-time first-team All-Big Eight pick, Piatkowski averaged 21.5 points in his final season as a Husker, and became the first player in school history to score 1,900 points (1,934), grab 600 rebounds (669) and dish out 300 assists (322). A first-round draft pick of the NBA's Indianapolis Pacers, Piatkowski's draft rights were then traded to the Los Angeles Clippers.

3. Jerry Fort, G, Chicago, Ill. (Franciscan)



The first Husker basketball player to earn All-Big Eight honors for three-straight seasons, Jerry Fort finished his career with 1,882 points—a record that stood for nine seasons, until Dave Hoppen broke it, Dec. 15, 1985. Fort was a third-round draft pick of the Boston Celtics following his senior season. He scored a thenschool-record 40 points against Missouri as a

junior. Fort was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1991.

Andre Smith closed his brilliant four-year career in 1980-81 when he led the Big Eight Conference in scoring with a 19.5 average in league games only. Smith was named the league's player-of-the-year for his efforts—the last time a Husker cager earned the honor, and was a two-time all-conference selection. He scored 1,717 points and grabbed 753 rebounds during his

career and was chosen in the seventh round of the 1981 NBA Draft by the Cleveland Cavaliers. He was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1994.

5. JARON BOONE, G, SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH



Boone played in a school-record tying 127 games and started 102, the second-highest total in school history. Boone became the 17th player in school history to reach 1,000 points, but just the fifth to do so before completing his junior season. Boone earned second-team All-Big Eight honors as a junior and helped Nebraska to the NIT Championship his senior year. Boone's

559 points in his junior season is the fifth-highest single season output in school history. Boone scored 20-or-more points 18 times in his career and ranks among the school leaders in 3-point goals made (second, 184) and attempted (third, 501), assists (second, 446) and minutes (third, 3,589).

6. ERICK STRICKLAND, G, BELLEVUE, NEB. (WEST)



One of two 1,000 point scorers on the 1995-96 team, Erick Strickland finished his career with 1,586 points. Strickland was a second-team all-conference selection as a senior when he led the team in scoring (14.7) and was named the MVP of the NIT. Strickland played in a schoolrecord tying 127 games and started 84. His 516 points in his senior season rank as the 10th-

highest single season total in school history. A three-time member of the Big Eight All-Defensive Team, Strickland is the all-time NU steals leader with 257 thefts, a total which ranks seventh in league history. Strickland scored 20-or-more points 14 times in his career and ranks third in 3-point field goals made (179), second in 3-point field goal attempts (512) and fourth in assists (414).

The tallest player in Nebraska history at 7-2, Rich King finished his career with 1,475 points, and school records for blocked shots, 183, and games played, 124. King had a big hand in the Huskers' record-breaking 26-8, 1990-91 campaign, as he led the team in scoring (15.5 ppg) and rebounding (8.1 rpg) en route to honorablemention All-America honors from both AP and

UPI. King, who was a first-round draft pick by the Seattle SuperSonics in the 1991 NBA Draft, tied Jerry Fort's then-school single-game scoring record with a 40-point outburst against Northern Illinois, Feb. 18, 1991.

One-half of the "Hammond Hustlers"—Brian Banks was the other-'Pipe,' and 'BB' provided Nebraska with a great four-year, one-two punch. McPipe, a three-year starter, finished his career with 1,300 points. As a junior, McPipe earned USBWA District V honors and was one of 12 starters designated as an All-American by the Citizens Savings Athletic Foundation. In his

final year in a Husker uniform, Banks was a repeat pick on the USBWA team and a fifth-round draft selection of the Philadelphia 76ers.

9. Tom Baack, F, Fort Wayne, Ind. (Concordia)




Tom Baack, a 1995 Nebraska Hall of Fame inductee, finished his career with 1,299 points, a figure that stood as the school record until guard Jerry Fort came along 10 years later. He played on three-straight winning NU teams from 1965 through 1968, and helped the Huskers to an NIT appearance in 1966-67—NU's first-ever bid to the nation's oldest postseason tourna-

ment. Known for his satin-smooth jump shot, Baack served as an assistant at Nebraska for eight seasons, and his 17.3 per-game average for his career ranks third in school history. Baack was selected in the 10th round of the 1968 NBA Draft by the Detroit Pistons.

Stuart Lantz teamed with Tom Baack to give Nebraska a potent one-two offensive punch. Lantz finished his career with 1,269 points and 571 rebounds. A two-time All-Big Eight pick, Lantz went on to play eight seasons in the NBA with four teams (San Diego/Houston Rockets, Detroit Pistons, New Orleans Jazz, Los Angeles Lakers). A charter member of the Nebraska

Basketball Hall of Fame, Lantz had his jersey retired in the fall of 1989.

11. CHUCK JURA, CENTER, SCHUYLER, NEB.



One of the top all-around centers in Nebraska history, Chuck Jura's 1,255 points rank ninth on the school's all-time list, and trail Stuart Lantz's career total by 14 points. Jura earned All-Big Eight honors as a senior and was an academic All-Big Eight choice, too. One of only five players in school history to average more than 20 points in a season (21.2), Jura ranks fifth on the all-

time rebounding chart (740) and his 305 rebounds in his final season still stand as the NU single-season record. Like Lantz, Jura was a charter member of the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame. A third-round NBA draft pick by the Chicago Bulls, Jura played professional basketball in Europe for several seasons.

12. Jack Moore, Guard, Muncie, Ind. (Central)



Jack Moore will long be remembered by Husker faithful for his gutty play on the basketball court. He was honored with the 1982 Naismith Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top player under six-feet tall. During his four-year career, Moore scored 1,204 points, and shot .901 from the free-throw line—the second-best career mark in NCAA Division

I history. Moore's .901 free-throw percentage broke the Big Eight record for career marksmanship, which had been held by his coach, Moe Iba. A consensus All-Big Eight selection as a senior, Moore was the first Husker cager to earn first-team academic All-Big Eight honors for three-straight seasons and his 382 career assists stand second on NU's all-time chart. Nebraska's MVP Award is named in honor of Moore, who was killed in a March, 1984 plane crash. Moore was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1993.

Brian Carr is the only player in Nebraska history and one of just five in Big Eight Conference history to score 1,000 points and collect over 600 assists in a career. Carr, who finished his four-year career with 14 Nebraska school records, scored 1,182 points and collected 682 assists. The 682 assists rank as the second-best total in Big Eight history, only two off the

record of 684 held by former Kansas guard Cedric Hunter. A second-team All-Big Eight selection as a senior (UPI), Carr was a two-time, first-team academic All-Big Eight performer.

Marvin Stewart finished his three-year career with 1,138 points, and is remembered by Husker fans as one of the finest fast-breaking guards in school history. In his senior season, Stewart averaged 21.4 points, the third-best season average in school history, and earned first-team All-Big Eight honors. Stewart owns the distinction of being the only 1,000-point club member

to top the mark in fewer than 70 games, as he appeared in 66. Stewart was a second-round draft selection of the NBA's Chicago Bulls in 1971. He was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1994.

The first Husker cager to top the 1,000-point mark, Herschell Turner finished his career with 1,056 points. Turner teamed with Al Maxey to provide a strong offensive punch for Coach Jerry Bush's teams in the late 1950s. A first-team All-Big Eight selection as a senior, Turner was a strong rebounder and held NU's

single-season rebounding record for 10 seasons (244), until Leroy Chalk grabbed 257 rebounds in 1969. Turner finished his three-year career with 626 rebounds, which ranks eighth on NU's all-time chart, and was a sixth-round draft choice of the NBA's Syracuse Nationals. He was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1990.

HUSKERS BOAST EIGHTEEN 1,000 CAREER POINT SCORERS



NU BASKETBALL HALL OF FAME TO HONOR FIVE

The ninth class of the Nebraska Basket-ball Hall of Fame will be installed at half-time of the Huskers' Jan. 18, 1997, game against Missouri. A party for all Nebraska letterwinners will be held on Friday, Jan. 17, and an alumni game will be held before the NU-MU contest.

Elmer Dohrmann was a three-year letterman for the Huskers from 1936-38 as he played for Coach William Browne's teams. He helped Nebraska to a tie for the Big Six title in 1937, when the Cornhuskers finished the league slate with an 8-2 record. Nebraska finished in second place in the conference in 1936 and in a third-place tie in 1938.

Dohrmann is one of the most decorated athletes in Nebraska athletics, as he is the Huskers' all-time letterwinner leader with 11 overall. In addition to his three basketball monograms, he also won three in football, three in baseball and two in track and field.

The second inductee into the hall of fame is Fred Seger, who lettered for the Huskers from 1952-54. Seger played for Coach Harry Good's squads for Nebraska in NU's years in the Big Seven Conference.

Nebraska struggled during Good's career, but he was one of NU's leaders in that period, leading the Huskers in free-throw shooting during the 1952 campagin.

The third inductee into the hall is **Tom Scantlebury**, a three-year letterman for the Huskers from 1968-70, under Coach Joe Cipriano. Scantlebury helped Nebraska to its only Big Eight Holiday Tournament championship during the 1967-68 season.

Nebraska finished third in regular season Big Eight play in 1968 and repeated the feat during Scantlebury's senior season in 1970. He led the team in scoring in 1970, averaging 14.4 points per contest and stands 21st on NU's career scoring charts with 965 points. Scantlebury also led the Huskers in free throw shooting in 1969 and ranks in the top 10 on the career free throw percentage chart at Nebraska.

In addition to inducting three new members to the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame, the chapters Special Merit Award will also be presented. This year's recipients of the Merit Award are long-time NU basketball equipment manager Mel Worster and former University of Nebraska President D.B. "Woody" Varner.

Worster is in his 40th year as a member of the athletic department and has spent over 20 years in charge of outfitting the Husker basketball team and 14 other Nebraska squads.

Varner served as the president of the University from 1970 through 1976. Varner is a long-time friend of the athletic department and helped in the planning and development of the Bob Devaney Sports Center.

The Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame was the brainchild of longtime Husker athletic supporter Jerry Solomon, who first approached the University about the project in the fall of 1988. Financial support for the Hall of Fame was also provided by Jack Bock, Dale Herman and Dale Jensen. The Hall is co-sponsored by the NU Athletic Department and the Rebounders Club.
