

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

The 1997-98 Nebraska Media Guide is designed to assist the media in its coverage of Husker basketball. Additional information, including releases, photographs, slides and videotape may be obtained by contacting the Sports Information Office at (402) 472-2263. Please take a moment to review the following policies and services which are intended to assist you in your coverage of Nebraska basketball this season.

Media Credentials: All requests for press, broadcast, photo and parking credentials for Nebraska basketball home games should be directed to Chris Anderson, Sports Information Director or Keith Mann, Assistant Sports Information Director, P.O. Box 880123, 116 South Stadium, Lincoln, Neb., 68588-0123. Requests must be made in writing on appropriate letterhead at least one week before the game. Requests via fax are acceptable (see fax information below). As a general rule, working space is allocated on the following basis: (1) daily newspaper and wire-service writers covering for next-day publication; (2) radio and television personnel for broadcast origination; (3) sports editors of Nebraska daily newspapers; (4) official school student daily newspaper, one seat only; (5) approved special coverage.

Media Will Call: Media passes which are not mailed may be picked up at the will-call window, located under the south ramp of the Bob Devaney Sports Center. The will-call window opens 90 minutes before tipoff. Identification is required to pick up credentials or tickets.

Media Parking: Parking for the media is located adjacent to the Bob Devaney Sports Center on the south side. The south street lot is accessible from Court Street, between 14th and 17th Streets.

Devaney Center Directions: The Bob Devaney Sports Center is located on the west edge of the Nebraska State Fairgrounds. To reach it from the Lincoln Municipal Airport, turn right on Northwest 12th Street as you drive out of the airport. Northwest 12th Street becomes Cornhusker highway, which intersects with 14th Street. Exit south on 14th Street off Cornhusker Highway. Travel to Court Street, turn left, and go two blocks east to the arena, which is on the north side of Court Street. From Omaha's Eppley Airfield, follow the signs to downtown Omaha and I-480. Take I-480 west to I-80, then take I-80 west approximately 60 miles to I-180. Exit South on I-180, then exit east to Cornhusker Highway and follow the instructions above.

Player Interviews: All media requests for interviews with Nebraska basketball players should be directed to Assistant SID Keith Mann (office phone: 402-472-2263; home phone: 402-474-4327) at least one day in advance. Players are usually available for telephone interviews early afternoons and evenings, except game days. The best time for in-season interviews is before or after practice at the Bob Devaney Sports Center. With advance notice, interviews can be arranged for other hours.

Nee Interview Time: The best time to reach Coach Danny Nee for an interview is weekdays from 11:30 a.m. to noon, Central time. Interviews with Coach Nee should be scheduled through the Sports Information Office. Coach Nee's office telephone number is 402-472-2265. During the season, Nee will host a weekly press conference at the Bob Devaney Sports Center on the following tentative dates--Nov. 13, Nov. 24, Dec. 3, Dec. 9, Jan. 5, Jan. 12, Jan. 19, Jan. 26, Feb. 2, Feb. 9, Feb. 16, Feb. 23 and March 2. Nee will also participate in the weekly Big 12 Conference telephonic press conferences at 11:40 a.m. (Central), beginning Dec. 2. Contact the Big 12 Service Bureau, 214-742-1212 for more information.



Postgame Interviews: The Nebraska postgame locker room is closed to the media at home games. For home games, Nebraska's postgame news conference will be held following a brief cooling off period in the "ready" room, located adjacent to the Huskers' locker room in the Bob Devaney Sports Center. The "ready" room can be reached off the hallway at the southwest corner of the playing floor. NOTE: Beginning this season entrance to the postgame interview area will be from the outside hallway only --media will not be allowed to enter the "ready" room through the men's basketball office. The visiting team is headquartered in the visitor's locker room, located off the hallway at the northwest corner of the playing floor. On the road, after the cooling off period, Nee will be available outside the Huskers' locker room. When Nee leaves for his postgame radio show, the Husker locker room will be opened to the media.

Press Row Location: Press row for Nebraska basketball games is located on the south sideline of the playing floor, opposite the team benches. The old press box, located above section C-12 on the south side of the arena, is used as an overflow area. The camera deck is located at the top of the arena, directly behind the old press box. Television crews broadcasting live may shoot from either floor level (northeast or southwest baselines) or the camera deck, but they may not occupy space in the C-12 press area. The press room is located off the hallway at the southeast corner of the playing floor.

Media Services: Pregame notes, programs and media guides will be provided prior to each game. Play-by-play sheets, final statistics, coach and player quotes from each locker room will be distributed. Starting one-and-one-half hours before tipoff, refreshments will be served in the press room. An SID Office representative will be in the Press Room until all writers have filed.

Radio/Television Broadcast Space: Requests for live radio and television broadcast space and credentials should be made to Keith Mann, Assistant Sports Information Director, 116 South Stadium, P.O. Box 880123, University of Nebraska, Lincoln, Neb., 68588-0123, telephone 402-472-2263. If statisticians are needed, please contact the Sports Information Office at least three days in advance.

Broadcast Rights: The University of Nebraska-Lincoln and Pinnacle Sports Productions own exclusive radio broadcast rights to all of the University's men's basketball games played in the Bob Devaney Sports Center. Other than the Nebraska Sports Network and the University of Nebraska student station (KRNU), the only stations or networks which will be allowed to broadcast Nebraska games from the Devaney Center are those which have rights to broadcast games played by the opposing team. All radio stations and networks broadcasting from the Bob Devaney Sports Center must sign a contract with the University and are subject to a rights fee. Any



representative of a radio station or network that has not purchased such rights shall not air live game action or description of any game while it is in progress, nor shall such representatives air tape-recorded or live commentary of Nebraska coaches or players for one hour before or after a game. Only stations which have purchased broadcast rights may install telephones on press row, or use telephones on press row for reporting on games. By accepting media credentials, representatives of stations and networks which have not purchased broadcast rights signify their agreement to the above stipulations.

Telephones: Nebraska provides four modular telephones in the Bob Devaney Sports Center Press Room. All long distance calls must be credit card, collect or billed to a third number. Any media source wishing to place a telephone on press row should contact University of Nebraska Telecommunications (402-472-2000) at least two weeks prior to the game.

Broadcast Telephone Lines: Visiting radio stations are welcome to have their own telephone lines installed on press row and may do so by contacting University of Nebraska Telecommunications (402-472-2000). However, Pinnacle Sports Productions installs additional telephone lines for visiting official broadcasts and charges a fee for the use of those lines for non-conference games (Big 12 official stations receive the use of the lines free of charge as part of a cooperative). Stations interested in using the lines should contact Mike Elliott of Pinnacle Sports Productions (402-430-7312).

Pro Scouting Passes: Per Big 12 Conference rules, the University of Nebraska does not provide press row access or media credentials for scouts of professional basketball teams. Scouts may arrange through the Sports Information Office (402-472-2263) to purchase tickets for Nebraska home games. The tickets may be picked up at the will-call window.

Sports Information Office: The University of Nebraska Sports Information Office is located in Room 116 of the South Stadium Building, which is located at the south end of Memorial Stadium at Stadium Drive and T Streets. The South Stadium Building is approximately one mile from the Devaney Center.

Fax Access: The Nebraska Sports Information Office has an automatic facsimile machine which can transmit or receive documents. The phone number for the fax is 402-472-2005. A facsimile machine is available in the Bob Devaney Sports Center following the game, and Sports Information Office personnel will send box scores free of charge as time permits. Nebraska and all Big 12 Conference schools are participating in a conference-wide fax-back system, where interested parties may call directly and have releases, notes and statistics faxed to their machine. There will be no charge to the receiver, other than the normal cost of the long distance call. Please contact the Nebraska Sports Information Office (402-472-2263) or the Big 12 Conference (214-742-1212) for more information. To access Fax-on-Demand, call 770-399-3066. The Big 12 code is 1212, while Nebraska's release/game notes/statistics can be found under 1865 and the Huskers' most-recent box score under 1867. Box scores will be updated immediately after home games and as soon as possible on away games.

Husker Basketball on the Internet: Nebraska basketball information will be regularly updated on the Internet throughout the season. The Nebraska home page and live and delayed radio broadcasts can be accessed at http://huskerwebcast.com.

"THE DANNY NEE SHOW"

The Danny Nee Show can be seen on four stations this season, including KMTV-Omaha, KLKN-Lincoln, KSTF-Scottsbluff and KNOP-North Platte. Rich Roberts of KMTV is in his ninth year as the show's host. Most Saturday's the show can be seen at noon on KMTV. Check local listings for times and dates of the show on other stations.

Pinnacle Sports Productions is in its second year of producing live broadcasts of University of Nebraska sporting events, including men's basketball. The Pinnacle Sports contract began with the 1996-97 year and continues through 2000-2001. The contract includes exclusive radio broadcast rights to Nebraska football, men's and women's basketball and volleyball.

Pinnacle heads up a large network of state and national affiliates, which allows Husker games to be heard statewide and in various areas of the United States. As of press time, Pinnacle Sports had a 28-station network, including 27 in Nebraska and one in Iowa, for Husker men's basketball. The games can also be heard live on the Internet by accessing Nebraska's home page at huskerwebcast.com.

The on-air talent for Nebraska basketball will be the same as a year ago. Veteran

sportscaster Warren Swain is in his second season as the Huskers' play-by-play voice. Swain has been in the sports radio business for nearly three decades. Before coming to Nebraska, he spent 11 years as the radio voice of University of Virginia football, basketball and lacrosse. Nebraska Director of Basketball Operations Nick Joos will once again serve as the color commentator for Husker games, both home and away. Joos is in his second year as the color commentator for all games and his fourth year of broadcasting Nebraska road games.

NCAA RULE CHANGES

2-10: Added the omission of a shot clock violation to the list of correctable errors.

3-4: During multiple free-throw personal fouls, substitutions may be made only before the final attempt in the sequence or after the final attempt has been successfully converted.

4-6: A player is guarded closely when holding or dribbling the ball while being guarded within six feet in the front court only. A violation will occur if the closely guarded player anywhere in the front court holds or dribbles the ball for five seconds. The count shall not begin or it shall be terminated during an interrupted dribble.

5-10-d: Timeout requests can be made by a player on the court or by the head coach.

5-12: The game clock and shot clock shall be started simultaneously when the ball touches or is touched by another player on the court. Exceptions to this rule are the jump ball at the beginning of the first half or any overtime period, and possession occurring after a rebounded free throw. In those instances, the shot clock will not begin until one team has clearly gained possession.

10-5-1: Technical fouls assessed due to fans purposely throwing debris on the court will be charged as administrative technical fouls rather than unsporting technical fouls and no longer will be charged to the head coach.

POINTS OF EMPHASIS

1. Palming (illegal dribble).

2. Rough play away from the ball.

3. Players must be clearly in control of the ball before being allowed to request a timeout.

4. Coaches are required to remain within the coaching box. Officials may choose to provide an initial warning when appropriate, otherwise the coach will be assessed a technical foul.

MEN'S APPROVED EXPERIMENTATION

Subject to the approval of the NCAA Special Events Committee, the following experimental rules will be used during selected exempt events during the 1997-98 season.

1. The team in control shall attempt a try for a field goal within 40 seconds.

2. A maximum of five players shall occupy the free-throw lane space marks during an attempted free throw. The defensive team must by rule occupy the two lane-space marks nearest the basket and has the option of filling one additional spot, while the offensive team has the option to occupy two lane-space marks.

One experimental rule was approved for regular-season play only. Permission for a conference to use the experimental rule must be granted by Ed Bilik, Director of Athletics, Springfield College, 263 Alden Street, Springfield, MA, 01109. Following is the experimental rule for the 1997-98 season.

1. An offensive turnover will result when the defensive team initiates a held ball situation (with the exception of a held ball after a rebound).



Attendance-Last season, NU ranked 34th in the country with 10,882 per game.

B

Baack, Tom-Ranks ninth on school's all-time scoring list with 1,299 points and later served as an assistant coach under Moe Iba.

Big 12-One of the nation's toughest basketball conferences comprised of Nebraska, Kansas, Kansas State, Iowa State, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Missouri, Colorado, Baylor, Texas, Texas A&M and Texas Tech.

Big Eight--Nebraska's conference from 1960 until 1996. Ne-

braska is in its second season of Big 12 play.

Black-The color of jersey NU has donned 12 times. The Huskers first wore their special uniforms in a 65-57 win at Iowa State in 1990-91. Nebraska then wore them twice later that season and three times in 1992-93, before putting them away for four seasons. The uniforms returned last year, as the Huskers wore black six times, posting a 3-3 record. Overall, Nebraska is now 7-5 when wearing black uniforms.

Coliseum-Home of Nebraska basketball from 1926-27 season through 1975-76 campaign.

D

Day, Bernard-Ranks as highest scoring junior college transfer in school history with 802 points from 1985-87.

Devaney, Bob--Longtime Nebraska football coach and athletic director who passed away last May. Nebraska's homecourt, the Bob Devaney Sports Center, which opened its doors for the 1976-77 season, bears his name.

Doane-Nebraska's first intercollegiate opponent in 1898-99 season.

E

Ekwall, Rex-Standout for NU in mid-1950s whose 10.4 career rebound average still ranks as school record.

ESPN-The national cable network which features a Big 12 game on its "Big Monday" package.

Fort, Jerry-First three-time first-team All-Big Eight selection in school history who finished his career with 1,882 points. Fox-Nickname of NU's longtime Sports Information Director, Don Bryant.

G

Good, Harry-Served as NU head coach from 1947 through 1954 and guided Huskers to shares of 1949 and 1950 Big Seven titles. He was enshrined into the Citizens Savings College Basketball Hall of Fame in 1975.

H

Hammond Hustlers-Nickname given to Hammond, Ind., natives Brian Banks and Carl McPipe, who finished their careers with 1,150 and 1,300 points, respectively.

Hare, Fred-His follow-up basket at the buzzer with no time left gave Nebraska a 74-73 upset of No. 1 Michigan and Cazzie

Russell in Lincoln during the 1964-65 season.

Hokuf, Steve-Standout all-around athlete who earned firstteam all-conference honors in football, won the Big Six javelin title and earned All-America and all-conference honors in basketball.

Hoppen, Dave-NU's all-time leading scorer with 2,167 points who was the second three-time first-team All-Big Eight pick in school history and the first player in school history to have his jersey number (42) retired.

1

Iba, Moe-The son of the late legendary coach Henry P. Iba, Moe posted 106 wins on Husker bench from 1981-86 and guided the school to its first "official" NCAA Tournament berth in 1986. **International-**The NCAA allows schools to take a foreign trip once every four years, and under Coach Danny Nee, the Huskers have made treks to Australia (1988) and Europe (1992).

Johnson, Bill-Grabbed school single-game record 26 rebounds against Iowa State, Jan. 4, 1954.

Jura, Chuck-Earned first-team All-Big Eight honors on the court and in the classroom as a senior in 1972.

K

Kansas-The Jayhawks and Cornhuskers first met on the court on March 2, 1900, a game that was the first matching present-day Big 12 opponents.

King, Rich-Became first first-round NBA draft pick in school history when the Seattle SuperSonics selected him with the 14th selection of the 1991 draft.

Kubacki, Jim-Hit game-winning jumper to beat No. 1 Kansas and Wilt Chamberlain, 43-41, during 1957-58 season.



L

Lantz, Stuart-Two-time first-team All-Big Eight pick in 1967 and 1968 who went on to eight-year NBA career and had his jersey number (24) retired in 1989.

Lehmer, Frank-First basketball coach in school history (1897-99), finished career with 7-3 record.

M

Maclay, Don-Earned All-America honors in 1931.

Moore, Jack-One of the most popular Cornhuskers ever, he earned the 1982 Naismith Award as the nation's top player under 6-feet. Nebraska's most valuable player award is named in honor of Moore, who was killed in a 1984 plane crash.

Matzke, John and Stan-Stan lettered from 1952 through 1955, while his son John was a second-team Academic All-America pick in 1984.

N

National Basketball Association-Twenty-two Huskers have been drafted by NBA teams over the years. Two Huskers, Eric Piatkowski and Erick Strickland are active in the league.

National Invitation Tournament-NU has made a Big 12-leading 11 appearances in the nation's oldest postseason tournament. Nebraska captured the 1996 tournament title, defeating St. Joseph's in Madison Square Garden.

NCAA Tournament-The Huskers have earned five bids to the "Big Dance," including bids in four times in the 1990s.

Rebounder's Club-Booster organization for NU basketball. Retherford, Claude-Leading scorer on NU's 1949 Big Seven championship team and a two-time first-team all-conference selection.

Reid, Beau-Was two-time third-team Academic All-America pick who had a knack for hitting game-winning jumpers, as he provided NU's winning points on four different occasions, including upsets of eventual NCAA champion Kansas in 1987-88 and No. 5 Michigan State in 1990-91.

Sauer, George—The only Husker football All-American to earn a basketball letter, he was an All-America fullback in 1933 and lettered on the hardwood in 1932 and 1933.

Simmons, Grant-First-team All-Big Eight pick in 1966 and school's first first-team academic All-Big Eight selection.

Smith, Andre-1981 Big Eight Player-of-the-Year, the only Husker ever to win the award.

Stewart, Marvin-The only player in school history to reach the 1,000-point plateau in fewer than 70 career games.

Stiehm, E.O.-First full-time basketball coach in school's history (1912-15) and the only man in conference history to win league titles in football (1912, 1913, 1914) and basketball (1912, 1913, 1914) in the same year.

Strickland, Erick--A three-year starter for Nebraska who is the Huskers' all-time steals leader and is sixth in scoring. Strickland is a member of the NBA's Dallas Mavericks and recently signed a six-year contract.

T

Treys-Nebraska hit a school-record 194 3-pointers during the 1993-94 campaign. Brian Carr hit the first trey in school history in a game at Cal-Irvine during the 1986-87 season.

Titles-Nebraska has won or shared seven league titles, none though since the 1949-50 campaign, although NU did capture the 1994 Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament title.

Turner, Herschell-First player in NU history to score 1,000 career points.

Upset-NU has knocked off three No. 1 teams, handing Kansas a 43-41 loss in 1958, Michigan a 74-73 loss in 1964-65 and Missouri a 67-51 loss at Columbia during the 1981-82 campaign. Nebraska made its schoolrecord-tying fifth straight postseason tournament appearance, advancing to the second round of the NIT, where it lost to Penn State 65-59. Jaron Boone earned second-team allconference honors.

DANNY NEE BEGINS 12TH SEASON AT NU

1996-97



Nebraska extended its school-record postseason streak to seven years in 1996-97. The Huskers were 18-15 in the first year of the Big 12. Danny Nee recorded his 200th win at Nebraska and his 300th overall collegiate victory.

1995-96



A late season surge by the Huskers propelled them to a National Invitation Tournament Championship, the first national postseason championship of any kind in Nebraska history. The Huskers beat St. Joseph's 60-56 for the NIT crown.





A LOOK BACK THROUGH THE DECADES

1896-1906

Nebraska posted a 59-26 (.694) record in its first decade of basketball, including three undefeated seasons. In those 10 years, the Huskers were coached by Frank Lehmer, T.P. Hewitt, E. Berry, Fred Morrell, Walter Hiltner and R.G. Clapp.

1916-1926

Nebraska fashioned its first 20win season ever in 1919-20 finishing 22-2 and setting a school record for wins that stood until 1990-91. During the decade Nebraska was 111-71 (.610) and had six winning campaigns.

1906-16

The last five teams of the Huskers' second decade all posted winning records. The 1911-12 team (right) won the school's first Missouri Valley Conference title and then repeated as champs in 1912-13 and 1913-14.

1926-1936

NU opened the decade in the Nebraska Coliseum, but didn't have much of a home court advantage, finishing under .500 at home in 1925-26. In 1928-29, Nebraska joined Missouri, Kansas, Kansas State, Iowa State and Oklahoma in forming the Big Six Conference.



1956-66

Stu Lantz (left) capped off an otherwise disappointing decade by leading the Huskers to a second-place Big Eight finish and firstever NIT appearance in 1965-66. The Huskers' 20-5 record was its first 20win season since 1919-20. Lantz, who finished second to KU's Jo Jo White in the Sophomore-of-the-Year balloting, would go on to become a third-round NBA draft pick. For the decade, NU was 102-142 (.418).

1966-1976

Nebraska finished above .500 for the decade with a 147-111 (.570) record. Marvin Stewart became the first player to average 20 points in a season in 1970-71. The Huskers closed out the decade with a thirdplace Big Eight finish in 1975-76 and said goodbye to the Nebraska Coliseum. Jerry Fort earned three straight first-team all-conference awards from 1974-76.

1976-1986

The Cornhuskers posted a 175-119 (.595) record in this decade, including a 15-14 ledger in 1976-77, the first season at the Bob Devaney Sports Center. In 1977-78, the Huskers earned their second postseason tournament bid and first since 1966-67, advancing to the second round of the NIT. NU posted 20 wins twice during the decade (1977-78, 1982-83).





1936-1946

Nebraska's record of 65-120 (.351) in this decade is its worst ever. Twice, in 1943-44 and 1944-45, the Huskers mustered only two wins. Sid Held and Don Fitz earned first-team All-Big Six honors in 1940-41. Nebraska lost to the eventual NCAA Champion in both 1939-40 (Indiana) and 1940-41 (Wisconsin).

1946-1956

The Huskers were 102-141 (.420) in the decade. However, the 1948-49 team tied for first in the Big Seven Conference and beat Oklahoma to advance to the NCAA District Tournament. Claude Retherford was a first-team All-Big Seven pick in that season and led the team in scoring. In 1949-50, Bus Whitehead earned first-team all-conference honors as NU tied Kansas and Kansas State for the Big Seven title.

1986-Present

The Huskers have enjoyed their most successful decade under the direction of Head Coach Danny Nee. In the past 11 seasons, Nebraska has won 20or-more games five times, advanced to the NCAA Tournament four times, won its first-ever Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament trophy in 1993-94 and in 1995-96 captured the NIT Championship.




With the resurgence of the Nebraska basketball program under Coach Danny Nee, media attention for the Huskers is at an all-time high. Nebraska is scheduled to make nine national or regional television appearances during the 1997-98 season, including a national appearance against perennial powerhouse Kansas on ABC, Sunday, February 1. In addition, the Huskers have two games scheduled for ESPN and one game slated for ESPN2. Five other games will be shown on the Big 12 Conference's syndicated television package.

The Big 12 has become a fixture on ESPN's "Big Monday" package. Last year, "Big Monday" earned the highest rating of any ESPN college basketball time slot. It also marked the highest rating the network has earned in a college basketball time slot since 1994.

The media attention isn't limited to television broadcasts as the Huskers are consistently covered by national print publications such as *USA Today*, *The Sporting News*, and *Basketball Times* as well as hundreds of regional media outlets. The state's two largest papers, *The Omaha World-Herald* and the *Lincoln Journal Star*, cover Nebraska basketball on a daily basis. Nebraska has been ranked at least once in the wire service polls in five of the last seven seasons, and in 1990-91, finished with its highest national rankings ever with a No. 9 finish in the UPI poll and No. 11 in AP.

Husker basketball can be heard throughout the Midwest on the newly formed Nebraska Sports Network headed by Pinnacle Sports Productions. Calling the Husker action will be play-by-play announcer Warren Swain and color commentator Nick Joos.








Nebraska will celebrate its 22nd season in the Bob Devaney Sports Center in 1997-98.

The 14,200-seat Bob Devaney Sports Center is one of the most beautiful arenas in the Big 12 Conference. Opened in the fall of 1976, the Big 12's third-largest arena is located on the Nebraska State Fairgrounds. The building, a \$13 million project, houses the Huskers' basketball, track, swimming, wrestling and gymnastics teams. A number of other activities, including concerts and commencements are held in the arena.

Since the building became the home of Husker basketball, more than 3.6 million fans have passed through the Devaney Center turnstiles. Named after Bob Devaney, Nebraska's highly successful football coach and athletic director (1962-93), the Husker faithful have flooded into the Devaney Center in record numbers.

Raucous Nebraska crowds have cheered NU to a 20year record of 253-72 in the building, including a 90-22 record during the last seven seasons.

The Nebraska Performance Team is a pioneer in the development of strength and conditioning and Coach Danny Nee believes it is a vital part of the Huskers' on-court success. The West Stadium Strength Complex at Nebraska was expanded to 30,000 square feet in 1989, making it the largest on any college campus in the nation. In addition, the basketball team utilizes the Bob Devaney Sports Center weight room.

Assistant Athletic Director of Athletic Performance Boyd Epley, heads a staff of nine full-time performance team members, a team pyschologist and nutritionist. The Performance Team utilizes its knowledge, along with a wide array of equipment and tests, to provide one of the nation's top performance programs. Team members include Epley; Mike Arthur, Assistant Director of Athletic Performance; Randy Gobel, Assistant Director of Athletic Performance; Bryan Bailey, Coordinator of Reconditioning; Dave Ellis, Coordinator of Performance Nutrition; Dr. Jack Stark, Performance Psychologist; John Archer, West Stadium Strength Coach; Courtney Carter, Assistant West Stadium Strength Coach/Nutrition Supervisor; Danny Noonan, Assistant Coordinator for Performance Education Services; Rodger DeGarmo, Bob Devaney Sports Center Strength Coach and Chad Wade, who will serve as the men's basketball strength coach for the 1997-98 season. Evaluation, goaloriented programs, supervision and state-of-the-art facilities help Nebraska athletes become faster, stronger and more flexible.

The medical facilities at Nebraska are a highpriority item. The Huskers' locker room and training room facilities are located in the Bob Devaney Sports Center and rank among the nation's best equipped. NU's medical staff includes six full-time trainers, including two registered physical therapists. Four doctors are available every day to treat Husker medical needs.

Nebraska Student-Athletes...A Lifelong Commitment

The following article is reprinted from the October 5, 1997, edition of the Omaha World-Herald.

You're 48 years old. You live in New York City. You're a commercial real estate agent whose earnings range from \$40,000 to \$80,000 annually. And you're the father of an 8-year-old son you adore.

Sounds like life was good for Clifford Moller. And it was, he said.

So why did he cut his business ties this summer, leave his family and friends and give up his Manhattan apartment to move into a University of Nebraska dorm room and enroll as an undergraduate majoring in communications?

Moller laughs when lunacy is suggested as a reason.

"People have said that," he said. "But the majority of those I talked to about this adventure were in favor of it. If there were any discouraging words, they were about moving away from my son.

"But once I got on this road, I had to keep going. In the long run, it will be for

The road that Moller has chosen will take him down a path on which he first started in 1967 as a scholarship basketball player at Nebraska.

Éx-Husker Assistant Glenn Potter, in New York to scout a player on another team, was so impressed with Moller that he started to recruit the 6-foot-1 all-city guard. After a trip to Lincoln where his hosts were eventual Husker basketball Hall of Famers Nate Branch and Stuart Lantz, Moller said he chose Nebraska over North Carolina, South Carolina, Long Island U., Weber State and Fairleigh

Why?

Clifford Moller "Nebraska was an exotic name to me at the time," he said. "It was far away and sounded appealing."

Moller had a promising season on the Husker freshman team--first-year players were ineligible for varsity play at that time--averaging 14.2 points a game. But he scored only 3.1 points as a sophomore reserve, then quit school during

his junior year.
"My objective when I first came here was to play professional basketball," Moller said. "I wasn't mature enough to deal with things at this level at the time, which I can say after 30 years of looking back on it.

"My problem was if I couldn't do basketball here, I didn't want to do anything else, either.

Moller moved back to New York and worked for a time as a teacher.

"There was such a shortage of teachers in New York in the early 1970s," he said, "that they accepted anyone with college experience.

Moller also coached basketball and played semi-pro ball with the Allentown

(Pa.) Jets in 1971 and 1972. Then a friend introduced him to the real estate

"Working part time at that, I made more money quickly than at anything else I had done," he said. "So I quit teaching and went into that full time."

In the 26 years since, Moller has worked as a commercial real estate salesman, broker and manager.

For the past seven years, Moller was the property manager for 60 buildings in midtown Manhattan that were part of the 42nd Street Developmental Project, one of New York's largest revitalization plans of the decade

"That is one of the crowning moments of my life," he said. "A lot of what it took to do that job I learned in lessons from my first time at Nebraska.'

Despite such success, Moller couldn't forget his days in Lincoln.
"I failed, and it was my fault," he said. "That's a bad feeling, and I don't like that feeling. Going back to school and finishing school is a loose string in my life that I want to tie up.'

Moller originally planned to resume his schooling in 1996 at a community college in New York. So he called Nebraska for a copy of his grade transcript. During that conversation, Moller was asked if he was aware of the National Consortium for Academics and Sport.
"I had never heard of it," he said, "and knew nothing about it."

The consortium was created in 1985 through the Center for the Study of Sport in Society at Northeastern University in Boston. About 140 schools nationwide, including such big names as Nebraska, Texas, Florida, Notre Dame and Kentucky, are members of the program.

Through the consortium, former scholarship athletes who failed to earn degrees are invited back to school to study tuition-free in exchange for work in the athletic department and community service appearances.

Susan Katz, director of the consortium, said by phone from Orlando, Fla., that about 11,000 former college athletes have returned to campus in the program's 12 years. She said there have been about 3,400 professional athletes, about 7,400 non professionals and about 200 Olympians.

Of those who have returned, Ms. Katz said, about 4,600 have graduated. No statistics have been gathered on the age of ex-athletes who returned to school, Ms. Katz said. But in her five years with the program, she could recall

only one other athlete older than Moller to attempt a school comeback.

Upon hearing of the consortium, Moller called the academic services staff at Nebraska. Counselor Robert Hicks asked for a rundown on Moller's background, then promised to call back in a few days.

"Three days later," Moller said, "the phone rang and it was Mr. Hicks. He said,

'When do you want to come?'
"I said, 'Wait a minute. I can't just get up and leave. I have a family and a business to think of.' But it got me to thinking about how much I wanted to

So from August 1996 to July 1997, Moller shut down his business operations in New York to prepare for a move to Lincoln.

"We already were phasing out our part of the 42nd Street project, so I was looking for something else to do," Moller said. "For all the times before when I had looked into going back to school and said I couldn't do it because of business or family, everything seemed to come into place this time.'

One key hurdle arose during the summer. Moller said he and his wife, from whom he is separated, had agreed that 8-year-old, Clifford Cameron Moller would go to Lincoln with his father.

"But at the last moment, there was a change of heart," Moller said. "He is with his mother in New York. This has been hard. It's the first time I've never been

"We talk on the phone two or three times a week, and communicate every night on the Internet. Thank God for the Internet.'

Moller's voice cracked when he talked about being 1,500 miles away for his son's ninth birthday this week.

"His teachers have told me there are times when he sits down in school to write that he cries because he misses his daddy," Moller said. "But he doesn't know how much hid daddy misses him, too.

"It's very hard now, but this will be for the better down the road."

Though away from daily parental duties, Moller already is a father-figure to some Husker athletes around the Hewit Center. He monitors study halls and does mentoring work in the evenings. Moller, who had enough credits from his previous stay at NU hold up to be classified a junior, is taking four classes this semester.

Clifford Moller is one of three former Huskers who are back in school and taking advantage of the National Consortium for Academics and Sport. Anthony Bailous and Bernard Day, who both played for Nebraska in 1986 and 1987, are also back at Nebraska working toward degrees.

"For anyone over 30, it takes a lot of courage to go back to school these days," said Dennis Leblanc, NU's assistant athletic director for academic services. "I applaud him for that.

"It's also wonderful for our athletes to see someone like Clifford do this and to hear his story. He already has been a positive influence on a lot of kids.'

Moller said his message to current athletes is to learn the culture and the structure of their environment, then work within it instead of trying to change

"I thought I could buck it the first time I was here," he said. "But the structure is bigger and stronger than all of us.

"As I look back, I got a heck of an educational experience my first time around here--not from an academic standpoint, but from a life-experience one. I'm trying to show the athletes who are here now not to let their chance get away." Moller said living in the Selleck Quadrangle dormitory and being in class with

people less than half his age has invigorated him for his second chance at a degree.
"You can't imagine how good it feels to be around these kids," he said. "I missed out on a lot the first time I was here. Being an athlete, you tend to be isolated from the general population.

"Now I've got a broader view. I'm looking at more than basketball. I see more, and I like what I see.

Living in Selleck, which has a higher ratio of students classified as "nontraditional" than other dormitories, has lessened the shock to others of having someone around who is old enough to be a grandparent to college students,

His basketball skills also have halted any jokes about advancing age. "When I go to the rec center, I can still take most people to the basket," Moller said. "And that's not bravado, either."

Moller said his eventual goal is to earn a law degree, and combine that with his real estate background to create his own business. And he wants that business to be in Lincoln.

"I have fallen in love with this city," he said. "Most places I have traveled to have wanted to get out of after two days. But I would love to bring my son out here to live.

Besides with Lincoln's central location, I think I could do business from here to anywhere in the country. Warren Buffet does it. Why can't I?





THE ACADEMIC EXPERIENCE: THREE STEPS TO SUCCESS

With an enrollment of nearly 25,000 students, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln offers an environment rich in academic tradition. Faculty members at Nebraska have long been recognized for serving students with excellence, distinction and a level of expertise matched by few.

There are nine academic colleges at the University of Nebraska, and each offers a variety of disciplines for students to select. The colleges are: Agriculture, Architecture, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Engineering and Technology, Human Resources and Family Science, Journalism and Mass Communications, Teachers College and Fine and Performing Arts.

From the day student-athletes decide the University of Nebraska is the right place to be, the Academic Programs and Student Services Team provides personal support, academic support and professional development to ensure that student-athletes will get the most out of their years as Huskers.

Professional Development Counseling at Nebraska

1. Career Exploration--Knowing that less than 1 percent of all collegiate athletes advance to professional sports, Nebraska pioneered a comprehensive Career Counseling Program for student-athletes in 1988. This program has been modeled by many other NCAA institutions and is now a component of the NCAA Life Skills Program.

The exploration phase has programs designed to help with career selection and clarification. These programs include: interest inventories, DISCOVER (an interactive computerized career guidance program), monthly career nights, career fairs, shadowing experiences, internships and cooperative education.

- 2. Career Planning--An important aspect of preparing for a career is the teaching of job-development skills. At Nebraska, methods are taught to improve these skills, including resume development, cover-letter writing, job search strategies, interviewing skills, and graduate, law and medical school placement assistance. The "Play it Safe" computer career disc also helps student-athletes explore majors and careers, while learning the latest in job development skills.
- 3. Career Placement--Assistance is provided in securing full-time employment upon graduation. Both the University Career Services office and Alumni office play an instrumental role in the placement process.
- 4. Degree Audit Program--The academic center has a tracking system in place to ensure accurate course selection and provide monitoring of each student-athlete's progress toward a degree in his/her chosen field. Nebraska boasts an 86 percent graduation rate of those who complete their collegiate eligibility at Nebraska.



ACADEMIC AND PERSONAL SUPPORT ... ALWAYS AVAILABLE

Academic Support

Tutorial Support--One of Nebraska's largest and perhaps most beneficial support services for student-athletes is the Tutorial Program. Mentor tutors and subject tutors assist studentathletes in making successful transitions into college, while experiencing academic success.

2. Supplemental Instruction--A sub-component of the tutorial program, this program is effective in helping student-athletes get adjusted to college academics, while enhancing academic self-

esteem and study skills.

3. Academic Supervision--In order to monitor the academic and graduation progress of Husker student-athletes, the counselors dedicate extensive time toward academic supervision. Counselors receive periodic grade reports from faculty, and various study hall and class attendance programs are in place, all for the benefit of the student-athletes.

4. Computer Resources--Student-athletes can become more efficient and productive by accessing a variety of state of the art software programs in the newly expanded 40 terminal computer lab located in the Hewit Center for Student-Athletes. The lab features a combination of IBM and MacIntosh computers complete with laser-jet printers.

5. Educational Assessments--During new student-athlete orientation, the academic staff administers a variety of educational assessments to student-athletes to better determine academic strengths and areas for improvement. The results help counselors and athletes to develop a personalized academic support team.

Personal Support

1. Orientation--The Hewit Center coordinates an annual New Student-Athlete Orientation program aimed at helping studentathletes experience a smooth transition into college life.


Personal Counseling--Counseling staff members provide student-athletes with a supportive and caring environment. Areas addressed within personal counseling are: transitional issues, stress management, academic focus and personal crisis intervention.

- Multi-Cultural Support--This program is designed to enhance cultural awareness for all student-athletes to help build a supportive, caring environment while learning about different cultural backgrounds. Educational programs and sensitivity trainings are also offered to student-athletes, coaches and administrators.
- Husker Outreach Program--Involvement in the awardwinning Husker Outreach program gives Husker student-athletes the opportunity to make a positive impression on youth, while the student athletes further develop their own leadership and interpersonal skills. Through Ventures in Partnership activities, National American Education Week, and the annual "School is Cool Jam" session, more than 70,000 youth statewide hear motivational and inspirational messages.
- 5. Student-Athlete Advisory Board--Student-athletes from every sport meet regularly with athletic department administrators in order to be included on all decisions affecting their personal, academic and professional development. The Board was recognized by College Athletic Management magazine as the top student organization in the nation.
- 6. Preparation for Life After Sports--Seminars and counseling support aimed at helping student-athletes with the disengagement from athletics while discovering how to maximize transferable skills.
- 7. NCAA Life Skills Program--Student-athletes receive expert education and intervention regarding personal and social issues. Campus administrators, national experts and former studentathletes share information and insights to assist student-athletes in making responsible decisions.











ACADEMIC SUCCESS... HUSKERS LEAD THE NATION

Of the 33 players under Nee who have completed their eligibility at Nebraska, whether scholarship or walkons, 21 have left with a degree in hand. Nebraska's graduation rates for all sports, including only those students who completed their eligibility at NU, is an outstanding 86 percent.

In addition, no school has had more athletes receive the NCAA's highest award, The Today's Top Eight, than Nebraska. Husker athletes have also been awarded the third-highest number of NCAA postgraduate scholarships to help further their educations.

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln is proud to claim it has had more student-athletes win this award than any other school. In 1995, football center Aaron Graham became Nebraska's 12th recipient of the prestigious Today's Top Eight Award.

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln has had more male and female student-athletes selected as Academic All-Americans than any other school in either the University or College Divisions.


As of June, 1997, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln has seen a total of 150 student-athletes earn this distinction, 61 more than second-place Notre Dame (89). Nebraska also leads the nation in first-team GTE Academic All-Americans with 87. The basketball men's program has produced four Academic All-America performers.

The University of Nebraska was chartered by the Legislature in 1869 as the state's public university and land-grant institution. 





♦ Nebraska finished a school-best fourth in the Sears Directors' Cup standings. Nebraska had eight of its 22 teams finish in the top 10 nationally.





NEBRASKA "CORE" HOLDS KEY TO NCAA TOURNAMENT HOPES

Each of Nebraska's last seven seasons has ended with a postseason tournament berth. That fact alone represents the most successful period in Husker basketball history.

Although Nebraska is proud of its school-record string, the Huskers enter the season looking to end a streak as well as to extend one.

Nebraska's ultimate goal for the 1997-98 season is to make its first appearance in the NCAA Tournament since

Coach Danny Nee believes the pieces are in place for his 12th team to become his fifth Nebraska squad to reach the NCAA field.

THE RETURNEES

Nee bases his assessment on the return of four starters and six returning scholarship lettermen. The returnees accounted for nearly 70 percent of last year's scoring and more than 60 percent of the Huskers' 1996-97 rebounding totals.

"We have a good core coming back this season," Nee said. "We have a lot of experience back at the point and post and good experience back at our wing spots. Hopefully, that experience will carry over into poise and intensity on the court."

Nee expects the Huskers to get much of that poise from the return of their floor general, junior point guard **Tyronn Lue (above)**.

As a sophomore, Lue led the Huskers in scoring with 18.8 points per game and is the Big 12's second-leading returning scorer. His 603 points were the fourth-highest total in Nebraska history and the most ever by a Husker sophomore.

Lue had one of the most complete seasons in school history and is primed for even better things as a junior. A second-team All-Big 12 choice a year ago, Lue is a leading contender for conference player-of-the-year and All-America honors.

The 6-0, 175-pounder gained added experience this summer,

as he earned a spot on the United States 22 and Under World Championship team. A leg injury cut short Lue's stint with the team, but he made a strong impression, playing with and against many of the nation's top collegiate players.

Nee, entering his 18th year as a college head coach, isn't

afraid to heap abundant praise on his third-year point man.

"He is one of the best if not the best point guard in the

"He is one of the best, if not the best point guard, in the country," Nee said. "Tyronn Lue has the whole game. He has the offensive game, the defensive game and the innate ability to

lead others. He has a charisma about him. He is totally focused and dedicated. He is the best all-around player I have coached at Nebraska."

That's right. After just two seasons, Nee isn't afraid to put Lue's name ahead of former Huskers such as Eric Piatkowski, Erick Strickland and Rich King, all of whom have went on to play in the National Basketball Association.

He also isn't afraid to single out the lightning-quick Lue when the discussion turns to Nebraska's best alltime floor leaders. Lue has led the Huskers

straight years and enters his junior season ninth on NU's career assists chart. "Jack Moore had a court presence about him, Brian Carr had a court presence and Clifford Scales learned the point and had that presence," Nee said.

"Tyronn has that presence, but the thing he has the others did not is tremendous explosiveness and

power. With the basketball, he is the quickest player I have ever coached."

With that type of praise, it is no surprise Nee expects Lue to be Nebraska's leader this winter. Nee points to a fellow Big 12 school for a model for Lue to follow.

"Great players make the players around them better," Nee said. "That will be the true test for Tyronn. An example of that is Chauncey Billups at Colorado last season. He strapped the Colorado program on his back and took them to the NCAA Tournament. For Tyronn Lue to be labeled a great player, he has to strap the Nebraska program on his back and carry us to another level.

"He has an excellent supporting cast, but Tyronn is going to have to be the guy that gives us the leadership and intangibles to be a great team. The rest of the team understands Tyronn is the leader."

While Lue will be the catalyst to Nebraska's NCAA Tournament hopes, there is plenty of talent surrounding him.

Leading the way in Nebraska's "supporting cast" is junior center Venson Hamilton (right), one of the Big 12 Conference's premier big men. The 6-10 Hamilton teamed with Mikki Moore to give Nebraska one of the league's best one-two inside punches last season. With Moore gone, Hamilton will become Nebraska's go-to-guy underneath this season.

Hamilton was Nebraska's third-leading scorer at 10.8 points per game last season. He finished as the Huskers' leading rebounder at 8.4 per contest, good for fifth in the Big 12. Hamilton recorded 11 double-doubles as a sophomore and



reached double figures in rebounding 14 times. Nee believes Hamilton's play will jump another level this season and expects him to contend for All-Big 12 honors.

"Venson has a God-given talent and tremendous hands to be a great rebounder," Nee said. "He has an ability that few big men have to get rebounds in a crowd. He was a raw talent when we recruited him and each year he has gotten a little better. He has the ability to dominate games and I expect him to show that this season."

Not only does Nebraska possess an excellent inside-outside tandem in Hamilton and Lue it has experienced wing players as a complement.

Lue's running mate in Nebraska's backcourt will once again be Cookie Belcher. The 6-3 sophomore had one of the top rookie campaigns in Nebraska school history. He became just the fourth Husker freshman to score 300 or more points and also established a new freshman steals record. Belcher was also the only Husker to start all 33 games. He was possibly Nebraska's most well-rounded player, finishing first on the team in steals and three-point percentage, second in assists, third in blocked shots and minutes and fifth in both scoring and rebounding.

Belcher was the runner-up for conference rookieof-the-year honors and was named to the Big 12's allrookie squad. Nee said Belcher's first season should be just an indicator of what the future holds.

"Cookie Belcher has a year of experience and I believe he has improved every aspect of his game," Nee said. "He gives us a very physical presence on the wing and is an excellent defender. He has an excellent knack for stealing the basketball."

On Nebraska's other wing is another strong defender, 6-5 junior forward Larry Florence. Florence battled nagging injuries in his first season in a Husker uniform. Despite the injuries, he started 29 games last season and finished the year averaging more than seven points per game and nearly four rebounds per game.

Florence was Nebraska's designated "defensive stopper", often shadowing the opponent's top scorer. Nee expects a

healthier, more focused Florence to make a big impact this season.

"Larry Florence is as healthy as he has been in two years," Nee said. "He should be much more explosive this season and

should help us out on the boards more than he did last season. He has worked as hard as anyone on his outside jump shot and I expect him to be at a whole different level this season."

Junior forward Andy Markowski is expected to fill the final spot in the Husker starting lineup. Markowski was one of Nebraska's top reserves as a sophomore, averaging 4.2 points and 3.9 rebounds per game.

On a Nebraska roster without any seniors, Markowski is the Huskers' most experienced player. The 6-8 Markowski redshirted his first year in Lincoln and is in his fourth season at Nebraska. Nee feels the Ord, Neb., native is ready for a breakthrough year.

"Andy has worked hard on every aspect of his game," Nee said. "He is our most experienced player and probably our hardest worker. He is a Nebraska kid and he takes a lot of pride in this program being successful."

Nebraska's final returnee is 6-5 junior swingman Troy

Piatkowski, who appeared in 22 games last season as a first-year sophomore. Piatkowski will be one of the Huskers' top players off the bench and will be expected to deliver scoring from the perimeter.

Also returning to the Husker roster are three valuable walkons. Chad Burbach, Michael Johnette and Ryan Phifer are all native Nebraskans and are in their second season with Nebraska.

THE NEWCOMERS

With just six returning scholarship lettermen, Nebraska's five incoming freshmen must be ready to contribute immediately. The Huskers signed three guards, one forward and one post player last season. All should compete for significant playing time in 1997-98.

In the backcourt, Nee has added Cary Cochran, Todd Smith and Rodney Williams. The 6-2 Cochran is a deadly outside shooter who broke a number of scoring records in Iowa. As a senior Cochran averaged 33.0 points per game and shot better than 41 percent from behind the three-point arc. He finished his prep career with 2,650 points, shattering the all-time Iowa high school record.

Smith, a 6-4, 195-pounder, was an honorablemention all-state player at Baldwin High School in Milledgeville, Ga. Smith averaged 16 points and 11 rebounds as a senior and was asked to play nearly every position on the floor. Nee believes Smith is a sleeper in the class who could make a big impact this winter.

Williams is also a versatile performer who should help the Huskers at both guard spots. The 6-3 Williams starred at The Kinkaid School in Houston, averaging 20 points per game as a senior.

At the forward spot, **Chad Johnson** is an athletic player who should back up both the three and four positions. The 6-6 Johnson averaged 15 points and nine rebounds per game for Florida A&M High School, who won two state titles with Johnson on its roster.

The final member of Nebraska's freshman class, **Brant Harriman**, is the biggest player on the Husker roster. Harriman stands 6-10 and weighs 250 pounds and will be asked to produce immediately for Nebraska. He was one of three players from Mason City (Iowa) High to sign Division I letters-of-intent last year. Harriman averaged 17 points and 11 rebounds and shot nearly 80 percent from the floor as a senior, helping Mason City to its second consecutive state championship.

The Husker freshman class was hit by injuries in the fall. Team doctors discovered stress fractures in both of Smith's lower legs shortly after he arrived on campus and performed surgery to insert steel rods into

both legs. Cochran underwent surgery in mid-September to remove bone spurs from his right ankle. Both are expected to return to the court in early December. Harriman also underwent minor surgery to repair a fracture in his right hand, but will be ready for the start of the season.

"Our recruiting shored up some weaknesses," Nee said. "It is a solid and deep class. We have had some minor health setbacks, but these guys are going to help us out this season."



1997-98 HUSKER OUTLOOK

THE LOSSES

The five Husker newcomers will be expected to replace five departed lettermen from the 1996-97 team. Only two of the lettermen lost saw extensive playing time a year ago.

The most notable loss from the 18-15 Husker squad is Mikki Moore, a four-year letterman for Nee. The 6-11 Moore finished his career as Nebraska's all-time leader in blocked shots. Moore had 236 career rejections, 53 blocks more than the previous school record. He also established the Husker single-game blocked shot record with nine and owns three of the school's top five single-season blocked shot totals.

Moore was Nebraska's second-leading scorer and rebounder

as a senior, averaging 11.7 points and 7.4 rebounds per game. He led Nebraska in field goal percentage and was an honorable-mention All-Big 12 selection a year ago. He finished his career just 14 points shy of becoming Nebraska's 19th, 1,000-point career scorer.

Also missing from the Husker roster is 6-7 forward Bernard Garner. Garner was one of the top two-year players in Nebraska history. As a senior, Garner was fourth on the team in scoring, averaging 9.9 points per game and finished as the Huskers' third-leading rebounder at 5.4 per contest.

In the backcourt, Nebraska lost sophomore

Alvin Mitchell who transferred from the program after last season. Mitchell averaged 15 minutes and 2.7 points per game last year.

Walk-ons Ryan Hinckley and Andy Schwindt are also gone after earning letters in 1996-97.

OVERALL OUTLOOK

Nee expects his 12th edition of Husker Hoops to take on a characteristic common to many of his previous teams-athleticism.


"We are hopeful that some teams are going to have problems matching up with our athleticism," Nee said. "We should have a strong inside-outside combination, but we still want to run the fast break and attack the basket."

He expects that athleticism to cause a great deal of problems on the defensive end.

"This team has the capability of being one of the best defensive teams we've had here," Nee said. "All five starters can guard. The key to good defense starts with one-on-one defense and they all have good ability in that area."

Nee has also addressed areas of concern with his team heading into the season. He said Nebraska must take better care of the basketball this season and improve its free-throw shooting. Probably most important, Nee said, is for his team to avoid the health problems it has faced all summer.

"Hopefully, we will have adequate depth, but we know we are not going to be deep at the post spots," Nee said. "We have to stay healthy, because there are some players, especially Lue and Hamilton, that aren't replaceable."

THE SCHEDULE

Nee knows his Huskers will once again have their work cut out for them in the highly-competitive Big 12 Conference. As part of the North Division, the Huskers must face perennial national championship contender Kansas twice this season.

Nee expects the Jayhawks to again be the team to beat in the conference. He said Nebraska can use Kansas as a gauge for meeting its own goals this season.

"Everybody expects Kansas to be the class of the Big 12 again this season," Nee said. "We feel like if we are able to keep them within our sights, we will be in position to reach our goals for the season."

Those goals include being in contention for the Big 12 Championship, making a run at the Big 12 Tournament title and returning to the NCAA Tournament. While the Husker program will use Kansas as a guideline, Nee said he expects a very balanced Big 12 as a whole. Once again, Nee believes the key to conference success is playing well at home.

"The key is always going to be defending your homecourt," Nee said. "We did a pretty good job of that last year, by going 6-2 at home. If we can get the same number or one more win at home we will be in good position. Now we just need to teach our players to win on the road in the Big 12. Our goal is to be .500 away from home."

Before Nebraska reaches the Big 12 portion of its schedule, the Huskers play another strong non-conference slate. Nebraska opens with a five-game homestand, and will make road trips to Tulsa and Minnesota, both 1997 NCAA qualifiers. Nebraska gets a two-week break before the Huskers' non-conference schedule concludes with a holiday trip to the Rainbow Classic in Honolulu.



1997-98 HUSKER NOTES

HUSKERS SET SIGHTS ON NCAA TOURNAMENT

Nebraska enters the 1997-98 season with a goal of extending its school-record postseason streak to eight years. However, the Huskers are looking for their first trip to the NCAA Tournament since the 1993-94 season. Nebraska began its record postseason run with four straight "Big Dance" appearances. However, Nebraska has been in the NIT each of the past three seasons.

Coach Danny Nee's squad will be looking to improve on its 18-15 record and seventh-place finish in the Big 12 Conference. Nebraska made it through a demanding non-conference schedule with a respectable 9-4 mark and opened league play with a 3-1 record. However, the Huskers struggled from late January to mid-February, losing six of seven games and falling to 12-11 on the season. A strong regular-season finish, including a win at seventh-ranked Iowa State, gave Nebraska a 16-13 record. After a disappointing Big 12 Tournament loss to Missouri, Nebraska qualified for the NIT for the third straight year. The Huskers opened with wins over Washington in Lincoln and at Nevada, before Connecticut ended NU's NIT winning streak at seven games in the quarterfinal round.

Nebraska has now posted seven-straight winning seasons and .500-plus records in 22 of the past 24 years. During its seven straight years in postseason play the Huskers have won 20 or more games four times, including a school-record 26 victories in 1990-91.

HEAD COACH DANNY NEE

Nebraska Head Coach Danny Nee (St. Mary's of the Plains, 1971) enters his 12th season on the Husker bench. In his first 11 seasons at Nebraska, Nee has posted a 203-146 (.582) record and stands at 310-213 (.593) in 17 years overall as a collegiate head coach. He is the only coach in school history to take nine

teams to postseason play (four NCAAs, five NITs), guide five 20-game winners and direct a Nebraska team to a Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament title and a national tournament title (NIT). Nee's 203 victories rank second to Joe

Cipriano's 253 wins in 17 seasons on the NU sideline from 1964-80. Nee is averaging 18.5 wins per year compared to Cipriano's 14.9.

Nee is second among Big 12 coaches in seniority, trailing only Missouri's Norm Stewart who has been with the Tigers for 31 seasons. He came to Nebraska after six successful seasons at Ohio University, where he posted a 107-67 (.615) record.

His first four Nebraska teams struggled to a 61-64 (.488) mark, but his last seven Husker teams, all of which have qualified for postseason play, have posted a 142-82 (.634) record. That is an average of just more than 20 wins per season.

Nee is a Brooklyn, N.Y. native, who received his master's degree in health, physical education and recreation from Kansas State in 1972. He is 7-8 in conference postseason play with the Huskers, is 13-4 in the NIT and 0-4 in the NCAA Tournament.

HUSKER STAFF CHANGE

In addition to five newcomers on the court, Nebraska has one new face on the bench this season. Randy Roth joins Nee's staff after five seasons on the Ohio State campus. Roth replaces Bill Johnson, who left Nebraska after two years to become an assistant coach at Columbia University. Roth is an 11-year veteran of the Division I coaching ranks, as he has also been on staff at Akron, Butler and Ohio University. Roth also served as a graduate assistant under Nee at Ohio U. in 1985-86.

HUSKERS HOPING TO EXTEND RECORD STREAK

Nebraska extended a school-record in 1996-97 with its seventh straight postseason appearance. The Huskers NIT appearance, was their Big 12 Conference-leading 11th trip to the nation's oldest postseason tournament.

Nebraska first four postseason trips in the streak were to the NCAA Tournament, all of which ended in first-round defeats. The Huskers have made NIT appearances each of the last three seasons, posting an 8-2 record, including a 5-0 mark in winning the 1996 tournament title.

Only 15 of the nation's 300-plus Division I schools carry a longers postseason streak into the 1997-98 season, including only Oklahoma and Kansas in the Big 12 Conference. A full listing of the schools to appear in postseason play in each of the last seven seasons is on the previous page.

Nebraska in the Postseason

The 1996-97 season marked Nebraska's 16th overall postseason appearance, and its school-record seventh straight. Nebraska has now appeared in postseason action 13 of the past 15 seasons, including nine times under Head Coach Danny Nee. Nebraska is 19-15 all-time in postseason play, 19-10 in the NIT and 0-5 in NCAA Tournament play. The NCAA Tournament record does not include a loss in the 1949 NCAA playoff game between the Big Seven and Missouri Valley Conferences (not recognized as official NCAA Tournament appearance).

Last season, Nebraska made its Big 12-leading 11th appearance in the NIT and advanced to the quarterfinals before losing at Connecticut. The Huskers now own a 13-4 mark in the NIT under Nee. In 1995-96 Nebraska captured the first national tournament title of any kind in school history, winning the NIT. The Huskers defeated Colorado State, Washington State and Fresno State on their way to New York, including two road wins. In the Big Apple Nebraska defeated Tulane in the semifinals and won the title with a 60-56 win over St. Joseph's.

In 1994-95 Nebraska's string of NCAA appearances ended at four, as the Huskers were tabbed for the NIT. Nebraska defeated Georgia in the first round in Lincoln, before dropping a 65-59 decision to Penn State in the second round. The loss to the Nittany Lions was Nebraska's only loss in 13 NIT home games.

The previous four seasons Nebraska was selected for the NCAA tournament, but failed to advance to the second round. In 1994, Nebraska was the sixth seed in the East Regional, but lost 90-80 to 11th-seeded Penn in the opening round. The Huskers were seeded 10th in the East Regional in 1993 and dropped a 93-79 decision to New Mexico State in the opening round. In 1992, Nebraska entered the tournament as the eighth seed in the Southeast, but was upended by Connecticut, 86-65, in the opening round. The Huskers entered the 1991 tournament as the third seed in the Midwest Regional, but was stunned in the first round by 14th-seeded Xavier, 89-84. Nebraska's other NCAA appearance came in 1986, when the Huskers were eliminated in the first round by Western Kentucky.

CHRISTMAS IN HAWAII

The majority of Nebraska's holiday break will be spent at the Rainbow Classic in Honolulu, Hawaii. The Huskers will leave for the island on Christmas Eve with tournament play beginning on Dec. 27 against Virginia. The Huskers will face either Hawaii or Brigham Young in the second round on Dec. 29. The other side of the bracket includes Kansas, Ohio State, Vanderbilt and New Mexico State. The Huskers face one of those teams on Dec. 30.

This marks Nebraska's fifth trip to Hawaii in Danny Nee's 12 seasons as head coach and the second time under Nee Nebraska has played in the Rainbow Classic. Nebraska finished seventh in the 1992 Rainbow Classic. Nebraska also played in the Rainbow Classic in 1979-80 and finished fourth with a 1-2 record.

The Huskers last trip to Hawaii was a success, as NU won the 1995 Big Island Invitational in Hilo. Nebraska defeated Toledo, Oregon and Minnesota en route to the tournament title. The Huskers own a 7-5 record on the Islands under Nee and are 10-10 all-time in seven previous trips.

LUE A MEMBER OF USA 22 & UNDER SQUAD

Nebraska junior point guard Tyronn Lue had a busy summer, as he was named to the United States 22 & Under World Championship Squad. Lue took part in the initial tryout in Colorado Springs, Colo., in late May where he was named one of 16 finalists for the team. More than 60 players tried out for the squad. After further tryouts and exhibition games, under the direction of Utah Coach Rick Majerus, Lue was selected for the 12-man team. He was the first Nebraska player named to the U.S. 22 & Under team.

He averaged 7.4 points and 2.4 assists in 18.2 minutes of action in five USA exhibition games against NBA competition. He was unable to compete in the World Championship competition in Sydney, Australia because of a lower leg injury. Lue returned home from Australia before the team began play in the tournament. The United States finished fifth in the competition.

HUSKERS MAKE THEIR MARK AGAINST TOP TEAMS

Last season Nebraska defeated 15th-ranked Colorado in Lincoln and won at No. 7 Iowa State. The wins marked the seventh consecutive season the Huskers have recorded at least one victory against a ranked opponent. In the last seven years,

THE DEVANEY CENTER ADVANTAGE

Entering its 22nd season in the 14,200-seat Bob Devaney Sports Center, Nebraska owns an all-time record of 253-72 (.778), including a 100-54 (.649) mark vs. conference opponents. The Huskers, who are 90-22 (.804) at Devaney since the start of the 1990-91 season, are 58-4 (.935) in that stretch against non-league opponents and 32-18 (.640) vs. conference foes. NU finished 7-1 vs. non-league foes at home in 1996-97 and 6-2 against Big 12 opponents. Under Coach Danny Nee, NU is 136-40 (.773) at home, 90-8 (.918) against non-conference opponents and 46-32 (.590) vs. league opponents.

Since 1990-91, only 11 schools--Oklahoma State (four times),

Missouri (three), Oklahoma (three), Kansas (three), Iowa State (three), Kansas State (1992-93), Texas (1993-94), Colorado (1994-95), Penn State (1994-95), Northern Iowa (1995-96) and Minnesota (1996-97) have exited Devaney with a win. Last year's three home losses came against Minnesota, Iowa State and Kansas, all teams who advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament. NU, 13-3 at home in 1996-97, has had a .500 or better home mark for 24 straight seasons and 33 of the last 34.

FANS FILE INTO DEVANEY CENTER

Nebraska basketball was a hot ticket in 1996-97, as 174,119 fans went through the Devaney Center doors for 16 home games, an average of 10,882 fans per game. The per-game average of 10,882 ranks as the 10th-highest mark in the building's history, while the season attendance total also stands as the 10th-highest in the arena's history. The mark ranked 34th among NCAA Division I schools in 1996-97 attendance and fifth in the Big 12. The Huskers have topped the 200,000 attendance mark in four of the past six seasons.

Since the start of the 1990-91 campaign, the Huskers have drawn 1,378,847 fans into the Devaney Center, an average of 12,311 fans per game. Nebraska's home attendance mark over the last seven seasons accounts for nearly 40 percent of the total number of fans who have come through the Devaney Center doors over the last 21 campaigns for Husker hoops. Nebraska drew 14,759 fans against top-ranked Kansas last season, the seventh-largest crowd in Devaney Center history.

NEBRASKA SET TO D-IT UP AGAIN

One constant for the Huskers last season was tough defense. Nebraska held 13 opponents to less than 40 percent shooting, including a season-low 27.9 percent by Missouri in Lincoln, the Tigers' worst shooting performance in 19 years. Nebraska was 12-1 when holding its opponent to less than 40 percent shooting.

Entering the 1997-98 season, just six of NU's last 43 opponents have hit 50 percent or better from the floor. Nebraska was 2-6 last season when it was outshot by the opposition and lost all five games when the opponent hit half of its field goals. The Huskers were 0-6 when allowing the opposition to score 80 or more points and 18-9 when limiting the foe to 79 or less.

For the year, NU's opponents shot .410 from the field, the fourth-best field goal defense in the Big 12. Nebraska's defense was much-improved over previous seasons, as the Huskers held opponents to 71.4 points per game, the lowest in Danny Nee's 11 years as NU's head coach. The 41.0 percent shooting by opponents also ranks as a Nee-era best and the best since NU held its opponents to 40.5 percent in 1963-64.

HUSKERS FORMING OWN SWAT TEAM

Nebraska established a new school record for blocked shots in a season last year with 202. The mark bettered the previous record of 185, set just a year earlier. Early last season, Nebraska broke the single-game team blocked shot record with 15 against Coppin State on Dec. 6, and had 13 against UMKC on Dec. 11. Those two games were the top two team blocked shot efforts in the Big 12 a year ago. Senior center Mikki Moore blocked a school-record nine shots against Coppin State and had 88 on the year, the second-best single-season total in school history. Venson Hamilton had 56 rejections, sixth on the NU single-season chart. Hamilton had a career-high six blocked shots at Missouri-Kansas City on Dec. 11, and enters his junior year with 95 career blocks, fourth on the Nebraska charts. Nebraska blocked at least five shots in 27 of 33 games last year. Nebraska enters the 1997-98 season with a blocked shot in 108 straight games, dating back to the 1993-94 season.





1997-98 Outlook: Nebraska center Venson Hamilton should contend for All-Big 12 honors this season. The 6-10 junior will carry the load for Nebraska in the middle this season, after starting 25 games at power forward in 1996-97.






Belcher established a new Husker freshman steals record with 87 last season. His 2.6 steals per game led the Big 12 Conference.

6-2 ◆ 180 ◆ Freshman ◆ Guard ◆ Minden, Iowa (Neola-Tri Center)

1997-98 Outlook: The all-time leading scorer in Iowa prep history, Cary Cochran (pronounced co-HORN) will be counted on for perimeter shooting off the Husker bench. Cochran had surgery in

September to reattach a ligament to his right ankle and remove bone spurs, but should be ready for action in December.


High School (Neola Tri-Center, Minden Iowa): Cochran finished his high school career at Neola Tri-Center as the all-time leading scorer in Iowa prep history, pouring in 2,650 points in his four-year career...1996-97 season marked the third straight year Cochran was a first-team Class 2A all-state selection by the *Des Moines Register*...among his other honors, Cochran was the Council Bluffs *Daily Nonpariel* Player-of-the-Year as a senior and was an honorable-mention All-American, according to *USA Today*...was a three-time all-Southwest Iowa selection by the *Omaha World-Herald* and was the captain of the team as a senior...he was also the runner-up for Iowa Mr. Basketball honors as a senior...averaged more than 23 points per game in each of his four high school seasons, including 33.0 as a senior...Cochran scored a career-high 59 points against Elk Horn-Kimballton last season...he had 40 or

more points 11 times in his career and reached double figures in 92 of 93 prep games...averaged 6.6 rebounds and 8.0 assists per game as a senior and 4.8 rebounds and 7.6 assists per game for his career...Cochran connected on 41.4 percent of his three-point attempts in his career, with a total of 352 career three-pointers...a tremendous foul shooter, Cochran made 93 percent of his free throws as a senior and 87 percent in his career...Tri Center, coached by Cary's father, Carl, posted a 76-17 record during Cochran's high school career and reached the state tournament in 1995 and 1997...Cochran also lettered three times each in football and track at Tri-Center...he and fellow Husker freshman Brant Harriman are the first Iowa prep products to sign with Nebraska in more than 30 years.

Personal: The son of Carl and Cindy Cochran, Cary was a National Honor Society member in high school with better than a 3.5 grade point average...Cochran is an undeclared major and was born on July 17, 1978.

COACH NEE ON CARY COCHRAN

"Cary Cochran is a prolific scorer. He is going to be our designated three-point shooter. He should complement Tyronn Lue very well when they are on the floor together."



52 BRANT HARRIMAN

6-10 ♦ 250 ♦ Freshman ♦ Center ♦ Mason City, Iowa

1997-98 Outlook: One of two Husker freshmen from the state of Iowa, Brant Harriman will be counted on for frontline depth this season. According to Nee, Harriman has a nice shooting touch

for a big man and should give the Huskers a strong rebounder off the bench. This summer, Harriman had a pin inserted in the ring finger of his left hand to repair a fracture, but has fully recovered.

High School (Mason City High): Harriman was the starting center for Mason City, who won consecutive Iowa Class 4-A (largest class) titles in his junior and senior seasons...Harriman averaged 17 points and 11 rebounds per game in his senior season...connected on nearly 80 percent of his field goal attempts for Mason City and coach Bob Horner...capped his high school career with 16 points and 14 rebounds against Sioux City West in the state championship game victory...for his efforts Harriman was named first-team Class 4A all-state by the *Des Moines Register* in each of his last two seasons at Mason City...as a junior Harriman averaged 16.4 points and 10.4 rebounds per contest and shot 70 percent from the floor...averaged 17.3 points, 15.7 rebounds and five blocked shots per game in the 1996 state

tournament as a junior...Mason City was undefeated in 1997 and Harriman finished his career on a 35-game winning streak...Mohawks' two state championships were their first in 53 seasons...was one of three Mason City High products to sign letters-of-intent with Division I schools...Harriman and fellow Husker freshman, Cary Cochran, are the first Iowa high school players to sign with Nebraska in more than 30 years...Harriman was the only member of Nebraska's five-man freshman class to sign during the early period in November of 1996...one of the earliest commitments in NU history, Harriman gave the Huskers an oral commitment in April of 1996, just after his junior season.

Personal: The son of Glenn and Debra Harriman, Brant is majoring in political science...was an honor roll student at Mason City and active in the drama club...born on Nov. 21, 1978...has a younger sister, Brooke, 16.

"Brant Harriman has a great upside. He has excellent hands and a nice shooting touch for a big man. Once he learns how to run the floor a little better he should be a force."





15 CHAD JOHNSON

6-6 ♦ 220 ♦ Freshman ♦ Forward ♦ Tallahassee, Fla. (Florida A&M D.R.S.)

1997-98 Outlook: One of five incoming freshman, Chad Johnson will be called on to provide depth in Nebraska's frontcourt. Nee said Johnson is an excellent leaper and extremely athletic player. Johnson

is the son of Clemon Johnson, who played 10 seasons in the NBA and was a member of the Philadelphia 76ers 1983 NBA Championship team.

High School (Florida A&M University Developmental Research School, Tallahassee, Fla.): Johnson was a standout for Coach Ron Lang at Florida A&M D.R.S. in Tallahassee...A&M was one of the most dominant schools in the state, winning three Class 2A state titles in the last four seasons, including each of the last two seasons...Johnson starred in the state tournament as a senior, earning most valuable player honors...averaged 15 points and nine rebounds per game as a senior...in his career, Johnson averaged 13.9 points and 6.9 rebounds per contest...also averaged more than four assists and 2.5 steals for his career...an extremely versatile player, Johnson played every position except point guard in his high school career...Johnson earned first-team All-Big Bend

honors and was on the all-tournament team at the Florida 17 and under state AAU Tournament...did not commit to Nebraska until this past summer, after the national letter-of-intent signing period...also lettered in baseball.

Personal: The son of Brenda and Clemon Johnson...Clemon played 10 seasons in the NBA with the Portland Trail Blazers, Indiana Pacers, Philadelphia 76ers and Seattle SuperSonics...Clemon was a standout center at Florida A&M University...the Huskers' youngest player, Johnson will turn 18 on December 15...full name is Chadrick...has two sisters, Candace, 11 and Caprese, 7...Johnson, a computer science major at Nebraska, was on the honor roll in his sophomore, junior and senior years of high school.

COACH NEE ON CHAD JOHNSON

"Chad Johnson is a raw talent. He has a lot of athletic talent and quickness. He is an excellent leaper, in the mold of several players we have had here. Chad doesn't turn 18 until this December so he is still learning the game and developing physically."



20 TODD SMITH

6-4 ♦ 195 ♦ Freshman ♦ Guard ♦ Milledgeville, Ga. (Baldwin)

1997-98 Outlook: Todd Smith was one of the top players in the state of Georgia last season and should see significant playing time in his first year in a Husker uniform. Nee describes Smith as a

strong defender with a good all-around game and said the freshman could play either guard position or small forward. Smith underwent surgery to insert steel rods into both lower legs for the repair of stress fractures in late August. Smith should be cleared for game action by early December.

High School (Baldwin High, Milledgeville, Ga.): Smith starred at Baldwin High School in Milledgeville, Georgia...averaged 16 points, 11 rebounds and nine assists per game as a senior...Smith connected on nearly 45 percent of his three-point attempts and better than 85 percent of his free throws...Smith was named the Sinclair/Oconee Area Player-of-the-Year by the Milledgeville Union-Recorder...earned honorable-mention all-state honors by the Atlanta Constitution...Smith's Baldwin High team, coached by James Lunsford, was ranked first in Class 4A (state's largest) for six weeks in 1997 and finished the season with a 22-4 record, after being upset in the regional semifinals...Baldwin had a four-




players and has solid skills on both the offensive and defensive

Head Coach 310-213 in 17 years overall ◆ 203-146 in 11 years at Nebraska

A quick look through the annals of Nebraska basketball will reveal a quick conclusion. The past seven years has been the Huskers' most successful extended stretch in school history.

Coach Danny Nee's Huskers have qualified for postseason play a school-record seven consecutive seasons, including four trips to the NCAA Tournament.

In the same stretch, Nebraska has won its only conference tournament title in school history with a 77-68 victory over Oklahoma State in the 1994 Big Eight championship game.

Nee has also guided Nebraska to its only national tournament crown of any kind in the sport. The Huskers rolled to five straight victories and won the 1996 National Invitation Tournament, with a 60-56 win over St. Joseph's.

Last year Nee and his staff kept Nebraska's postseason streak intact despite returning only five players from the previous season. Against the toughest schedule in school history, the Huskers finished 18-15 overall and advanced to the NIT quarterfinals.

Nebraska finished in a sixth-place tie in the first season of Big 12 Conference play. For the seventh straight season, the Huskers defeated a ranked opponent, knocking off Colorado at home and Iowa State in Ames. Nebraska seemed to be at its best against top opponents, defeating the seventh-ranked Cyclones on the road and extending then-undefeated and top-ranked Kansas to overtime on the Jayhawks' home floor.

"If I had to do it over again, I'm positive I'd come back to Nebraska. The people here were so good to me. Lincoln was such a great college atmosphere. And it was close enough that my family could see me play. It ended up as a perfect situation."

During the 1996-97 season, Nee also reached two milestones. He picked up his 300th career win in a 71-52 win over Creighton in Lincoln. The overtime upset win at Iowa State was Nee's 200th victory at Nebraska, only the second Husker coach to reach that victory plateau.

Only the third Nebraska coach since 1963, following the late Joe Cipriano (1963-80), and Moe Iba (1981-86), Nee was tabbed as the Huskers' 24th head coach on March 27, 1986. He owns a 17-year head coaching record of 310-213 (.593), and an 11-year NU mark of 203-146 (.582).

Nee's 203 wins rank second only to Cipriano's school-record 253 victories in 17 seasons. He is the only coach in school history to win 20 games in five different seasons and guide four Nebraska teams to the NCAA Tournament. He's only the second coach in school history to be at the helm 10 or more seasons, and he has taken nine of his 11 squads to postseason play. Nee also ranks as the "junior" dean of Big 12 Conference coaches, as his tenure is second only to Missouri Coach Norm Stewart's 31-year run in Columbia.

Nebraska's 1995-96 season is one of the most remarkable in school history. The Huskers rebounded from a disappointing conference season to win the NIT and post a 21-14 overall record. Nebraska opened the season with an impressive 15-4 record, but suffered nine straight losses in late January and February. Few believed the Huskers could turn the season around, but Nee's unwavering optimism provided the spark Nebraska needed to capture the NIT with five straight victories.

The NIT appearances the last two seasons are part of a resurgence of the Nebraska program which occurred after a rocky start to Nee's Husker career.

Operation Turnaround

After a 10-18 season in 1989-90 and a second-straight seventhplace Big Eight finish, the 1990-91 season promised to be a pivotal year in Nee's rebuilding program. For the first time in four years, Nee had a solid nucleus of seniors to build upon. But the presence of Rich King, Clifford Scales, Beau Reid and Keith

Moody did little to impress the Big Eight-area media, who picked Nebraska to finish a distant last in the league's preseason poll.

That voting prompted the best-remembered question at the annual preseason Big Eight Basketball Media Day at Kansas City, Mo. It came from Nee at the start of his interview session: "Why did you guys pick us last?"

There was silence from the assembled writers then, and some embarrassment later when the Huskers roared out to a 16-1 start, helped by a school-record-tying 14-game win string, got into the wire service rankings for the first time in 13 seasons, and went on

to NU's highest final rankings ever at No. 9 in the UPI poll and No. 11 in the AP listing.

Instead of finishing last in the Big Eight, the Huskers ended up third at 9-5, one game back of co-champs Oklahoma State and Kansas. NU then advanced to the finals of the Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament for the first time in school history, but

dropped a 90-82 decision to Missouri. The Huskers finished the year with a disappointing 89-84 loss to Xavier in the first round of the NCAA Midwest Regional, Nee's first NCAA appearance at Nebraska.

For his efforts, Nee was named the 1991 Big Eight Coach-ofthe-Year by both the Associated Press and United Press International and District V Coach-of-the-Year by the U.S. Basketball Writers Association. He finished fourth in AP's National Coachof-the-Year balloting.

With the loss of more than 60 percent of its scoring and rebounding punch, the 1991-92 season figured to be a transition year for Nebraska and Nee.

However, Nee developed a blend of veteran players, rookies and pleasant surprises into a unit which shot out to a 12-1 record and finished 19-10 overall. The Huskers were 7-7 (fifth) in the nation's toughest league—the Big Eight, and earned a second-straight NCAA Tournament bid.

Along the way, the Huskers pulled off two of the biggest upsets in the 1991-92 college basketball season. In consecutive home games in February, Nebraska thumped second-ranked, 20-0, Oklahoma State (85-69), then beat third-ranked Kansas (81-79) on a buzzer-beater with one second left in overtime. The win over the Big Eight Champion Jayhawks propelled the Huskers into the AP rankings at No. 25 the following week, marking the first time NU had ever been ranked in consecutive seasons.

During the season, Nee also picked up his 200th career victory (86-67 over Wisconsin) and his 100th Nebraska win (74-71 over Missouri-Kansas City).

The 1992-93 campaign was another history-maker for Nee and his rags to riches program, as NU landed a spot in the NCAA Tournament for an unprecedented third consecutive season. In addition, the Cornhuskers won 20 games (against 11 losses) for the third time in Nee's tenure. Nebraska tied for second in the Big Eight with an 8-6 record, its best league finish in 12 seasons.

The 1992-93 season may well have been the most-anticipated Nebraska basketball campaign ever. Fueled by arguably the best recruiting class in school history, rave reviews from national publications, and the return of four starters, Nebraska raced to a 7-0 record and climbed to 17th in the Associated Press poll. However, the Huskers dropped six of their next 11 games, started league play 0-3 for the first time since the 1989-90 season, and hopes for another NCAA trip were dented.

But, while some were labeling his seventh team as one of the nation's most-disappointing squads at the season's midway point, Nee rallied his troops to wins in eight of their final 12 games and a share of second place in the Big Eight. The Huskers, also produced their first All-Big Eight performer of the Nee era in guard Eric Piatkowski, who repeated the feat a year later.

The beat continued for the Huskers in 1993-94, as Nebraska posted a 20-10 record en route to a fourth-straight NCAA Tournament bid and back-to-back 20-win seasons for the first time in school history. NU captured its first-ever Big Eight Tournament title and was 22nd in the final Associated Press poll, only the third time in school history NU had appeared in the final AP ranking.

Piatkowski finished his career as Nebraska's second-leading scorer and earned all-league honors for the second straight year. He became Nee's second NBA first-round draft pick when he was selected with the draft's 15th pick. Rich King was tabbed 14th in the 1991 NBA draft.

In 1994-95 Nebraska failed to reach the NCAA Tournament for the first time in five seasons, but did reach the NIT, giving the Huskers a school-record tying five straight postseason appearances. Nebraska finished the '94-95 campaign 18-14 and posted its fourth straight season of home attendance over the 200,000 mark

Husker Hoops has been a hit under Nee as the Huskers finished 20th nationally in attendance in 1993-94 with a per-game average of 13,278. The year before Nee's arrival, NU averaged 9,741 fans per outing. In the last seven years, nearly 1.4 million fans have attended Nebraska home games, which accounts for 38.2 percent of the arena's total attendance in 21 seasons as the home of Husker hoops. Last season Nebraska ranked 34th nationally in average home attendance.

During Danny Nee's 21 years as a collegiate coach, he has recruited and coached 17 players who have went on to play in the National Basketball Association.

Husker Debut

When he came to Nebraska from Ohio University after the Huskers' first-ever NCAA appearance in March 1986, he inherited a senior-dominated, but inexperienced squad. The team gelled late in the 1986-87 season, finished 21-12 and was third in the National Invitation Tournament (NIT).

Nee's Huskers stood 12-8 overall and 2-5 in the league at the halfway point of the 1987 Big Eight campaign. However, NU won five of its last seven conference games, advanced to the NIT Final Four at Madison Square Garden and missed the school record for victories by one. A then-school-record 197,395 fans packed the Devaney Center for 17 home games in Nee's first season.

The difficult rebuilding process began just as the Big Eight became one of the nation's dominant basketball conferences. Nee's second year at the Husker helm saw three league teams reach the final eight of the NCAA Tournament, with Kansas beating Oklahoma in an all-Big Eight final.

The result in 1987-88 was Nebraska's first losing season in 15 years (13-18), but there were enough moments of youthful brilliance to give hope for the future, including a 70-68 comefrom-behind homecourt win over eventual national champion Kansas

The Nebraska roster was still dominated by freshman and sophomores for Nee's third season in 1988-89, but the Huskers climbed back over the .500 mark, finished 17-16 and returned to postseason play with an NIT bid. The Huskers advanced to the second round before being eliminated at Ohio State. Nee's fourth Husker team finished 10-18 in 1989-90, when the Huskers missed the school record for season losses by one.

Bobcat Tracks

The turnaround at Nebraska is not the first successful rebuilding job for the Brooklyn native. In his six years at Ohio, his teams won 107 and lost 67, including an 87-33 record the last four years and twice he was named Mid-American Conference Coach-of-the-Year—but it was far from easy. He took over a struggling program at the Athens, Ohio, school in 1980-81, started his head-coaching career with an 11-game losing streak and suffered through a 7-20 season. His second Bobcat team improved to 13-14, though, and was followed by four consecutive 20-game winners.

"With the exception of Larry Bird, Danny Nee is the finest competitor I have ever been associated with. He's built a program at Nebraska that is not a quick fix. It's a program that will continue to bear fruit over the next decade."

In 1982-83, Nee's squad won a school-record number of games in a 23-9 campaign and captured the MAC title. Nee was rewarded with conference and Ohio Coach-of-the-Year honors. The Bobcats went to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in nine years, beat Illinois State (51-49) in the first round of the Mideast Regional before losing to Kentucky, 57-40.

The Bobcats finished 20-8 in 1983-84, but did not earn a postseason bid. A year later, Ohio U. went 22-8, again captured the MAC title and advanced to the NCAA Tournament, where it dropped a 49-38 first-round decision to Kansas.

In 1985-86, the Bobcats finished 22-8 for the second-straight season, but were second in the MAC behind Miami (Ohio). Ohio U. received an NIT bid, but lost a first-round game to eventual tournament champion Ohio State, 65-62.

Wake Up the Echoes

Nee went to Ohio after four years as an assistant coach under Richard "Digger" Phelps at Notre Dame. During that time, the Fighting Irish were 91-27 and went to the NCAA Tournament all four years, including a Final Four appearance in 1978 and an appearance in the Mideast Regional final in 1979. He recruited and coached 10 current and former NBA players at Notre Dame.

Nee Roots

Nee played high school basketball at Power Memorial High School in New York, where one of his teammates was Kareem Abdul-Jabbar (then known as Lew Alcindor).

A member of Al McGuire's first recruiting class at Marquette University, Nee captained the Warriors' freshman team for frosh coach Hank Raymonds before a two-year tour of duty in the United States Marine Corps. A Vietnam veteran, he received Combat Air Insignia Medals and an honorable discharge in 1968.

He returned to college at St. Mary of the Plains College in Dodge City, Kan., and received a bachelor's degree in English and physical education in 1971. At St. Mary, he was on the Dean's List, was listed in Who's Who Among American Colleges and Universities, and was president of the student body as a senior. He played two years of basketball there before launching his coaching career as a student assistant for the Cavaliers in 1970-71. Nee was inducted into the Ohio University Hall of Fame in 1994. He received a master's degree in health, physical education and recreation from Kansas State in 1972.

Nee coached the junior varsity basketball team at Red Bank, N.J., Regional High School to a 14-6 record in 1972-73. He then became head coach at Brick Township, N.J., High School, where he compiled a 38-35 record in three years before going on to Notre Dame. His Brick Township teams were 32-15 the last two years, winning a school-record 16 games each year.

He is married to the former Janet Scheib of Pittsburgh, Pa., and is the father of three children, Patrick, 19, Nora, 11, and Kevin, 9. Patrick is a freshman at Monmouth University (N.J.) and a member of the basketball team.

JIMMY WILLIAMS

Associate Head Coach Sixth Season

Jimmy Williams, the veteran member of Coach Danny Nee's coaching staff, enters his sixth season with the Huskers, his second as Nebraska's associate head coach and his 25th as a Division I assistant coach.

Williams primary responsibilities include the coaching of the Husker big men. Williams' top current pupil is 6-10 Venson Hamilton, who is one of four returning Husker starters and was among the Big 12's leading rebounders as a sophomore.

Williams also recruits nationally for the Husker program. In recent years Williams has played a major role in signing Hamilton, Tyronn Lue, Larry Florence and Cookie Belcher, NU's four returning starters for the 1997-98 season.

Williams, who joined the Nebraska staff in August of 1992, came to Lincoln after spending three seasons on Coach Jim Brandenburg's San Diego State staff. Before joining the Aztec staff, Williams spent the 1988-89 season as an assistant at the University of Tulsa under Coach J.D. Barnett. He helped the Golden Hurricane to a 17-11 record and a second-place finish in the Missouri Valley Conference.

Before his stints at San Diego State and Tulsa, Williams was an assistant at the University of Minnesota from the 1971-72 season through the 1985-86 campaign, first under Bill Musselman and later Jim Dutcher. During his 15-year tenure with the Golden Gophers, Minnesota won a pair of Big Ten titles, finished in the upper division of the rugged Big Ten nine times, made eight postseason tournament appearances and had a .500 or better overall record 12 times.

As an assistant at Minnesota, Williams recruited and coached 21 student-athletes who went on to play in the National Basketball Association. Golden Gopher and NBA standouts who Williams personally recruited include Mychal Thompson, Ray Williams, Jim Petersen and Randy Breuer. While at Minnesota, Basketball Times rated him as one of the nation's top 15 recruiters. In 1985-86, he served as the interim head coach at Minnesota for part of the season.


A native of Havana, Fla., Williams graduated from Ashland (Ohio) College in 1970 with a bachelor of arts degree in education. He was a college division All-America basketball player for the Eagles and helped the school to the 1969 college division national title.

Williams spent a year and a half teaching and coaching in high schools in Ohio and Washington D.C., then joined the Golden Gopher staff in 1971 as an assistant coach/head freshman coach. Williams has a 12-year-old daughter, Christina Marie.

SCOTT HOWARD

Assistant Coach Third Season

A veteran collegiate coach, Scott Howard is entering his third season at Nebraska and his 11th season as a full-time assistant. Howard's primary responsibilities with Nebraska include coaching guards and recruiting nationally for the Huskers.

Howard's current backcourt includes 1997 second-team All-Big 12 performer Tyronn Lue, who is the league's leading returning scorer. Lue averaged 18.8 points per game last season, more than 10 points better than his freshman scoring average. Fellow starting guard Cookie Belcher was named to the league's all-freshman team last season. In his first season with the Huskers, Howard coached Erick Strickland, a member of the NBA's Dallas Mayericks.

Howard was hired at Nebraska in July of 1995, after a five-year stint at Miami, Fla. He was an assistant on Coach Leonard Hamilton's Hurricane staff from 1990-95, served as Miami's recruiting coordinator and put together three national top 20 (1991, 1992, 1993) recruiting classes during his stay in South Florida. He was also responsible for coaching the post players at Miami.

Before moving to Miami, Howard spent one season (1989-90) as an assistant to George Raveling at Southern California. During his tenure at USC, he was assistant recruiting coordinator, director of scouting and coached three NBA players. He spent the 1988-89 season as recruiting coordinator at Drake University, and the 1987-88 campaign as an assistant coach at Southern Illinois.

From 1983 to 1987, Howard was an assistant basketball coach at the University of Iowa, three seasons under Raveling and one under Tom Davis. He helped the Hawkeyes to three NCAA Tournament appearances (1985, 1986, and 1987) and his efforts as underclassman recruiting coordinator resulted in four top 20 recruiting classes. At Iowa, Howard coached nine NBA players.



who went on to play in the NBA and former Ohio State center Ricky Dudley, a tight end for the NFL's Oakland Raiders.



BILL BYRNE

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS
FIFTH YEAR

In his fifth year at Nebraska, Bill Byrne continues to lead and improve one of the nation's best athletic programs. Byrne became the 11th Nebraska Director of Athletics

on June 26, 1992, replacing the legendary Bob Devaney.

He came to Nebraska following 10 successful years at the University of Oregon. Highly respected among his peers, Byrne was elected vice-president and secretary-treasurer of the College Football Association. He is a member of the NCAA Legislative Strategic Planning Cabinet and has served on the NCAA Special Committee on Marketing and Licensing and the Committee on Special Events. He has worked tirelessly to establish a close relationship with the NU community and Husker fans. For five years, Byrne has canvassed the state visiting with boosters to learn the needs of all Husker fans.

Among his many accomplishments at Nebraska, Byrne has continually upgraded facilities, including the addition of two HuskerVision replay boards at Memorial Stadium in 1994. Beside becoming the first collegiate-owned venue to feature replay boards for its fans, Memorial Stadium was renovated to include a state-of-the-art training room, expanded locker rooms for coaches and players, a new public address system, expanded restrooms and expanded concession areas. Section 14 was rebuilt in 1994 to offer increased seating for disabled fans.

Byrne's future plans ensure that NU's facilities remain the nation's best for Husker athletes and fans. He enlisted the Kansas City, Mo., firm of HOK Sports to develop a master facilities plan for the athletic program. A new press box and sky boxes are part of the renovation plans for Memorial Stadium, along with an expanded main concourse area. The East Stadium Plaza is being developed, while waterproofing and concrete repair continue throughout the stadium. The Athletic Ticket Office relocated to the Stadium Drive Parking Garage, and the new Huskers Authentic retail store was built in fall of 1997.

The Bob Devaney Sports Center will receive a new locker room for women's staff and a new roof over the pool area. The central concessions will also be remodeled. The press box will expand at the NU Softball Complex, along with improvements at the NU Coliseum. Last year, the Devaney Center received a new sound system, new weight room, new women's basketball locker room and a passenger elevator. Buck Beltzer Stadium received new infield turf, and the NU Softball Complex got new dugouts. The computer center in the Boekel Academic Center also tripled in size. The Michael Grace Production Studio in West Stadium and new scoreboards at the NU Softball Complex, Buck Beltzer Stadium and the Bob Devaney Sports Center indoor track are also recent additions.

Byrne's leadership has kept the Huskers among the nation's elite. In fact, during the 1996-97 season, Nebraska:

- recorded its best finish ever in the Sears National Directors' Cup standings, with a fourth-place showing in Division I.
- won six Big 12 championships (volleyball, soccer, women's swimming, women's gymnastics, men's and women's indoor track).
- finished in the top 10 nationally in seven sports (men's: football and cross country; women's: volleyball, soccer, swimming, gymnastics and indoor track.
- was chosen by the Dallas Morning News as the best athletic department in the Big 12 Conference.

With Byrne's leadership, Nebraska became the first Big Eight school to add women's soccer as a varsity sport in 1994. Byrne continues to expand opportunities for Husker athletes. During 1997-98, women's bowling will be added as a varsity sport, and women's rifle will begin for the 1998-99 season, giving the Huskers 24 sports, the most in the Big 12.

Along with maintaining the highest standards on the field, Byrne has reorganized the department for the 21st century. Stressing more efficient use of resources, Byrne has created a one-stop shopping type of organization to meet the needs of student-athletes, fans and contributors. He also reorganized Nebraska's fund-raising efforts and started an integrated marketing and licensing program.

Byrne is recognized as a national leader in intercollegiate athletics and continues to make an aggressive effort to help place conference officials on key NCAA committees to represent Big 12 institutions. He has been instrumental in conference development and an active voice in its planning.

In conjunction with the rest of the Nebraska's administration, Byrne has arranged to use the Husker football and basketball networks to promote causes and concerns important to the entire university community, including the institution's increased role in research.

Before bringing his expertise to Nebraska, Byrne was the Oregon Director of Athletics. He assumed the duties of director of athletics in May 1984, as one of the youngest directors in Division I. Byrne established fund-raising offices in Portland and southern Oregon and established a full-time marketing and promotions operation, which blossomed to encompass the Oregon Sports Network for statewide in-house production of Ducks' games on radio and television.

Byrne led the \$19 million fund drive at Oregon that resulted in new homes for the Ducks' football team and athletic department offices. He was responsible for the construction of a new press box, sky suites and total renovation of Autzen Stadium, which concluded in 1991. Two years later, the facility's Hall of Champions was dedicated in Byrne's honor.

Byrne has served as president of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) in 1991-92, and is in his sixth year on the NACDA Executive Committee. He was also chairman of the Pac-10 Conference Executive Committee and was the National Athletic Fundraisers Association National Fundraiser-of-the-Year.

Byrne grew up in Idaho and attended Idaho State. He was the student body president and received bachelor's and master's degrees in business from Idaho State in 1967 and 1971. Before going to Oregon in 1982, he was Assistant Athletic Director at San Diego State (1980-82), Executive Director of the New Mexico Lobo Club (1976-79) and Director of Alumni Relations at Idaho State (1971-76).

Byrne's wife, Marilyn, is the Dean of Graduate Studies in Education at Doane College and earned her Ph.D. in Higher Education Administration from NU. The Byrnes have two sons and a 2-year-old grandson, Nicholas. Nicholas' parents, Greg and Regina, live in Portland, Ore., where Greg is an athletic fundraiser for the University of Oregon. Their other son, Bill, was recently promoted to section manager for Visa in its world-wide computer center located in San Mateo, Calif.

partment of organ. Moeser worked his way through the academic ranks until being named Dean of the School of Fine Arts. He was named Althaus Distinguished Professor of Organ in 1984, the first academic dean at Kansas ever to be named to a distinguished professorship. He was appointed Dean of the College of Arts and Architecture at Penn State in 1986 and was executive director of University Arts Services in charge of Penn State's cultural programs. He became Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost at South Carolina in 1992.

Born and raised in Texas, Moeser earned a bachelor of music degree with honors in 1961 and a master's of music in 1964 from Texas at Arlington. He completed advanced study in Berlin and Paris under a Fulbright grant and earned a doctor of musical arts from Michigan in 1967. He has an international reputation as a concert organist and concertized until 1993.

Chancellor Moeser's wife, Susan Dickerson Moeser, also holds a doctor of musical arts degree and is a faculty member in the UNL School of Music with an active concert organ schedule. Moeser is the father of two children, one is a college student in Kansas, and the other is a journalist in Phoenix.

JOSEPHINE POTUTO, J.D.



Institutional Representative

Josephine Potuto, the Richard H. Larson Professor of Constitutional Law, became Nebraska's eighth institutional representative to the NCAA on May 15, 1997. She officially assumed her duties July 1, but she attended the Big 12

Conference spring meetings May 19-23 in Dallas.

Potuto is secretary and vice chairwoman of the rules governance committee of the university's NCAA certification committee, and in 1996, she completed a three-year term on the academic senate's intercollegiate athletics committee. During that term, the committee reevaluated and rewrote Nebraska's policy governing student-athletes' class absences for competition. Potuto also chaired a subcommittee that created a policy for student-athlete appeals of withdrawal of athletic scholarships.

Potuto joined the Nebraska law faculty as an assistant professor in 1974. She was named to the Larson professorship in 1988 and has been a faculty member at NU's Center of Children, Family and the Law since 1987. She has been a visiting professor of law at the University of Arizona, Rutgers University, the Cardozo



THE CORNHUSKER LEGEND

Before 1900, Nebraska football teams were known by such names as the Old Gold Knights, Antelopes and the Bugeaters. But in 1900, Lincoln sportswriter Charles S. (Cy) Sherman, who was to gain national renown as the sports editor of the Lincoln Star and help originate the Associated Press poll, tired of referring to the Nebraska teams with such an unglamorous term as Bugeaters. Iowa had, from time to time, been called the Cornhuskers, and the name appealed to Sherman.

Iowa partisans seemed to prefer Hawkeyes, so Sherman started referring to the Nebraska team as Cornhuskers, and the 1900 team was first to bear that label.

Of course, the name caught on and became a Nebraska byword, eventually becoming the official nickname for the state.

There is no official symbol of a Cornhusker and various cartoonists have caricatured the mystical something that typifies Nebraska football—some winning fan approval and others arousing fan ire.

The cartoon character, "Herbie Husker", evolved out of Nebraska's trip to the 1974 Cotton Bowl in Dallas. Artist Dirk West of Lubbock, Texas, designed a Cornhusker cartoon for the Cotton Bowl press headquarters that caught the eye of former Husker SID Don Bryant. Later, Bryant contacted West for permission to use the cartoon and West expressed a desire to refine his original cartoon and improve some of the character's features. As a result, West was commissioned to draw an original Cornhusker cartoon character that serves as a mascot for all Husker athletic teams.

"Herbie" is the registered logo of the Cornhusker Athletic Department, which controls its use. West's concept of Nebraska football is appropriate—a burly, rugged and confident fellow who is proud of both the athletic and the agricultural traditions of the University of Nebraska.

In recent years, the University has also a basketball above a script "Huskers" for a logo, the Cornhuskers' football helmet

superimposed on a script "Huskers" for a football logo, and four years ago, unveiled a block N logo with a script "Huskers." All are registered trademarks of the Athletic Department.



University of Nebraska Athletic Licensing and Sales

The University of Nebraska Licensing Program added another dimension to its areas of responsibility by expanding into sales in 1997. This new venture will take the form of the retail development "Huskers Authentic." Located in the first floor of the new parking garage on Stadium Drive, the store will be the No. 1 collegiate concept store in America.

Demand for authentic Husker products is at an all-time high, and the athletic department decided to answer the demand with its own retail outlet featuring exactly what the name implies, authentic Husker products. Husker fans can now purchase equipment and apparel from a store that can assure fans that they are getting the authentic product.

In 1981, the University of Nebraska began a licensing program to protect the use of its name and symbols and ensure that the public properly identify and associate NU logos on products bearing the institution's marks. Under the leadership of Director of Licensing and Sales Chris Bahl and assistant Renee Black (402) 472-9446, the Nebraska licensing department has become one of the nation's largest revenue-producing universities. Husker products are licensed around the world. The licensing department, considered one of the most innovative in the United States, is committed to building cooperative relationships with licensees and developing markets for "Officially licensed products of the University of Nebraska."

Nebraska joined a consortium of other universities across the country to bring consistency in the marketplace for officially licensed collegiate products, protect the names and logos of universities and generate revenue to support scholarship programs and projects of those universities.



Dedicated to achieving the highest goals in the integration of academic and athletic endeavors, Baylor, Colorado, Iowa State, Kansas, Kansas State, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas, Texas A&M and Texas Tech combined forces on February 25, 1994, and forged the Big 12 Conference, one of the most powerful alliances in NCAA Division I competition to date.

Individually, member schools have long been respected for successes both in its classrooms and its stadiums. In all, league institutions have received numerous accolades for the quality of academic resources, programs and services offered to students. Athletically, Big 12 teams have accounted for more than 130 NCAA team

championships and 15 wire service football titles, while its student-athletes have claimed more than 750 NCAA crowns entering the 1997-98 academic year.

The formation of the Big 12 represents an undertaking by school chief executive officers to combine resources to achieve even higher levels of performance heading into the 21st Century. Institution chancellors and presidents serve as the chief policy makers of the Conference, operating as the Board of Directors. Administration of the league occurs through the Council of Faculty Athletics Representatives, Board of Athletics Directors and Board of Senior Woman Administrators.

Steven J. Hatchell became the conference's first commissioner on March 26, 1995, and has been in no small part responsible for the immediate success of the nation's newest conference. Under his direction, the Big 12 took a bold step toward community service in May1996, by adopting Special Olympics as its primary philanthropy. Individual member-institutions have provided facilities for local, regional and national Special Olympics competition for years, but now under the Big 12 blanket, Special Olympians, their coaches and their fans have the opportunity to interact as recipients of clinics and other cooperative efforts in conjunction with Big 12 events. In August 1996, Executive Directors of Special Olympics in the seven-state area and Big 12 officials met and decided to promote the national movement through public service announcements aired to all 48 contiguous states during Big 12 football and basketball games and on the

weekly "Big 12 Showcase" television program. Although the Special Olympians certainly benefit from the use of conference facilities and clinics, Big 12 student-athletes, officials and fans gain almost as much if not more from this special partnership.

Another innovative venture of the Big 12 is the development of the Life Skills Program and Academic Services, which seeks to enhance the "total person" concept both on and off the field. Programs such as the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, Special Olympics and the NCAA's heralded YES program of clinics and stay-in-school messages to youngsters are just a few of the life

skills areas promoted by the Big 12. Student-athletes play an active role in community endeavors such as hospital visits, youth school programs, enhance/eligibility information and anti-violence campaigns, all promoted through public service announcements aired during Big 12 contests. Activities such as these have helped the Big 12 raise the standard of excellence throughout the NCAA.

Exposure is key in any endeavor of this magnitude, and the Big 12 has one of the most comprehensive regional and national telecast agreements in the country. ESPN and ESPN Regional provide regional over-the-air syndication, national cable and national network coverage of up to 90 men's basketball games per season. The Big 12 is a mainstay in the ESPN lineup with the highest rated college basketball slot on "Big Monday." In addition to the highly successful syndicated package within the seven-state Conference region, Creative Sports markets 10 games annually to CBS and ABC for the Big 12. All 11 games of the Big 12 Phillips 66 Men's Basketball

Tournament are aired either regionally or nationally. ESPN will air the 1998 Phillips 66 Men's Basketball Tournament title game.

In all, the packages with ABC, Fox Sports Net and ESPN guarantee the Big 12 the finest intercollegiate coverage for all sports through the year 2000 (2003 with ABC for football television) and at least \$145 million into the coffers of the member institutions.

The Big 12 got off the planning boards and onto the field as Oklahoma claimed the inaugural conference championship in softball May 11, 1996. Big 12 football kicked off in grand fashion as Kansas State defeated Texas Tech 21-14 August 31, 1996, in Manhattan, Kan. The inaugural volleyball crown was won by Nebraska, bringing a very successful 1996 to a close.

On the basketball court, the Big 12 uses a divisional format for the basis of scheduling. The four Texas schools and the two Oklahoma schools form the South Division, while the North is comprised of the other six former Big Eight schools. The schools are split into the same scheduling areas and play an intradivisional round-robin, where each team plays every other member of the same area on a home-and-home basis. Each team also plays each member of the opposite area once. The team with the highest conference winning percentage at the end of the season receives the No. I seed, with the winner of the opposite area receiving the No. 2 spot. The remaining 10 seeds are determined based on conference winning percentage, regardless of division. The champion of the Big 12 Phillips 66 Men's Tournament receives an automatic bid to participate in the NCAA Tournament, a tremendous testimony to the strength of the Big 12. For the first time in history, the NCAA waived the two-year waiting period for a new conference champion to receive an automatic bid. In its inaugural season, the Big 12 sent champion Kansas and four other teams to the men's tournament, while women's champion Colorado and five other teams qualified for the women's championship. The Big 12 also sent two men's hoops teams to the NIT.

After a very successful first full campaign for the Big 12 Conference, the 21 regular season championship trophies were divided among seven schools, with Texas taking seven (football, men's outdoor track, men's swimming and diving, men's tennis, women's golf, women's outdoor track and women's tennis), the most of all conference members. Nebraska came in a close second, winning six trophies (gymnastics, men's indoor track, soccer, women's indoor track, women's swimming and diving and volleyball), while Colorado (men's cross country and women's cross country), Kansas (men's basketball and women's basketball) and Oklahoma State (men's golf and wrestling) finished up the inaugural Big 12 season with two trophies each. Missouri (softball) and Texas Tech (baseball) picked up the other two championship trophies.

In all, the Big 12 is home to more than 1,500 student-athletes on 209 teams in the 21 men's and women's Big 12-sponsored sports. Men's programs regulated by the league include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor/outdoor track and field, swimming and diving, tennis, and wrestling. Big 12-regulated women's programs include basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor/outdoor track and field, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, and tennis.

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NCAA RULES AND REGULATIONS

Your support of Nebraska athletics is very much appreciated. However, there are restrictions regarding your involvement with student-athletes. Help Nebraska assure compliance with NCAA rules and regulations by taking a few moments to read this information. The eligibility of Nebraska student-athletes and reputation of the department and university depend greatly upon your cooperation.

WINNING TRADITION

Supporters of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln are proud of Nebraska's rich tradition in both academic accomplishments and athletic achievements. Student-athletes, coaches and other administrators have worked extremely hard to place Nebraska at the head of the class academically and among the most prestigious athletic programs in the country. Nebraska's tradition is rich in Academic All-Americans, NCAA Top Eight Award Winners, Big 12 Conference titles and national championships.

Most importantly, Nebraska athletics have built and maintained tradition and excellence based on integrity. Winning is important at Nebraska, but winning the RIGHT way by following the NCAA rules that govern the recruitment and treatment of student-athletes is a must!

The goal of this information is to educate you regarding NCAA rules that apply to you when interacting with student-athletes.

KEY POINT

You are considered a *representative* of Nebraska just by being an alumnus, friend or fan.

KEY RULE-NCAA BYLAW 13.01.5.1

In Division I, representatives of an institution's athletics interests are prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off-campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

INTERPRETATIONS

1. Are presentative of a Division I institution is prohibited from making in-person recruiting contact with a prospect and his or her parents/guardians—on or off campus.

Limited Exception: A representative may have contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has already signed a National Letter-of-Intent and the institution is aware that you are making these contacts in regard to the employment.

2. A Division I representative is prohibited from writing or telephoning a prospect and his or her parents or legal guardians.

Limited Exception: A representative may have a phone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call. Such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member and the representative is not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility. The representative must refer any questions about the university's athletic program to the athletic department.

3. A representative is prohibited from contacting a prospect's coach, principal or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.

Limited Exception: NCAA rules do not preclude a representative from viewing a prospect's contest on the representative's own initiative, but the representative may not contact the prospect.

The most common NCAA rules infraction relates to the extra benefits rule. An extra benefit would include provision of any transportation, meals, clothes, entertainment, preferential loan terms or other benefit offered to a student-athlete unavailable to the general student population.

A representative may not provide any such extra benefit to an enrolled student-athlete or their family. Simply put, you may not treat a student-athlete any differently than a student who does not participate in athletics.

KEY CONTACT

Questions regarding NCAA rules, especially those relating to contact between alumni and recruits or enrolled student-athletes, can be directed to Nebraska's Senior Associate Athletic Director in charge of Compliance.



Young Huskers Extend NU Postseason Streak to Seven

With just five familiar names at the start of the season, Husker basketball fans were busy checking their rosters to identify the fresh faces. Much the same, the Nebraska coaching staff was busy searching for the right combination of youth and experience to produce a winning formula.

By season's end a team which had lost nine lettermen from the 1996 NIT Championship team, was back in the postseason for a school-record seventh consecutive year. Nebraska capped its 1996-97 campaign, its first in the Big 12 Conference, with a 18-15 record and third-straight NIT appearance.

The Huskers looked to veteran seniors Mikki Moore and Bernard Garner and sophomore returnees Tyronn Lue, Venson Hamilton and Andy Markowski to blend with a talented cast of newcomers.

With arguably the toughest non-conference schedule in school history, NU's inexperienced squad was forced to learn on the run. Nebraska opened the season at 17th-ranked Texas in a non-conference contest. The game marked the first time in NU history, the Huskers had opened the season against a nationally-ranked opponent. Nebraska was up to the task, giving Texas all it wanted before losing 83-81 in overtime.

The game was a glimpse of things to come as Lue led Nebraska with 18 points and Moore and Hamilton both had double-double performances. New starters Cookie Belcher and Larry Florence, looked at home in Husker red, scoring eight and 10 points, respectively, while Alvin Mitchell and Troy Piatkowski added solid game off the Husker bench.

After the tough road opener, a five-game homestand was a welcome sight for the Huskers. Nebraska handled Weber State and Oregon State with relative ease, and held off a pesky Texas-San Antonio team to build a three-game winning streak heading into the 10th annual Ameritas Classic.

In the Ameritas, Nebraska dumped eventual NCAA tourney qualifier Coppin State by 16 points in round one. Moore dominated under the glass, blocking a school-record nine shots, part of an NU team record 15 rejections. The following night, Nebraska captured its ninth consecutive Ameritas title, with a five-point win over Bowling Green.


Lue was named the Most Valuable Player of the tournament, as he averaged 21 points in the two wins. He was joined on the all-tournament team by Moore and Belcher, who averaged nearly 20 points in the two wins, including a career-high 22 against Coppin State.

The Huskers found success on the road at Missouri-Kansas City and returned home to face a strong Minnesota team. The rugged Gophers, ranked 16th at gametime, served notice of their potential with an impressive 70-56 win over Nebraska. The Gophers went on to win the Big Ten and make a national title run, before losing to Kentucky in the Final Four. In the game, Moore put his name in the Husker record books again, breaking the career record for blocked shots.

After a nine-day holiday break, Nebraska found itself in the tropics for the Puerto Rico Holiday Classic. The Huskers dropped NCAA Tournament qualifier Old Dominion in round one by six points. Hamilton keyed the win with 14 points and 18 rebounds, the most by a Husker in five seasons.

The win set up a semifinal battle with sixth-ranked Cincinnati. Nebraska lost its floor leader Lue early in the contest with a strained knee, but battled hard, before losing 84-73. Without Lue and Garner the following day, the shorthanded Huskers gave a strong effort, but lost 58-55 to Bowling Green. Hamilton was the lone Husker named to the all-tournament team.

Nebraska completed its New Year's cross-country adventure

with a trip to Boulder, Colo., to open Big 12 Conference action. With Lue at half speed and Garner out of the lineup, Colorado downed the Huskers 79-73. Moore shined in the loss, with a career-high 27 points on an 11-13 performance from the floor.

After nine days away from home, Nebraska's four-game homestand couldn't have come at a better time. The Huskers opened the Devaney Center stretch with a 71-52 win over intrastate rival Creighton. The victory marked Nebraska's seventh straight win in the series, the longest winning streak by either team. It also marked **Danny Nee's** 300th career coaching victory.

Nebraska returned to conference play and needed everything to hold off a determined Texas A&M squad. The Aggies, led by Jerald Brown's eight three-point goals, led by as many as 13 points in the first half. However, the Huskers rallied behind the play of Lue who scored a game-high 29 points, including 19 after half.

The Huskers dug themselves an even bigger hole in its next outing against Kansas State. The Wildcats built a 20-point first half lead and led 48-30 at intermission. However, the Huskers outscored K-State 21-5 in the first seven minutes of the second half to get back into the game. However, the Huskers still trailed by five with just more than one minute remaining, but threes from Garner and Lue forced overtime. In the extra session, Lue scored eight of his game-high 29 points as Nebraska pulled away for an 87-77 win.

The 20-point deficit was the largest Nebraska had overcame with Danny Nee as head coach. In addition, the 18-point halftime margin is the largest NU has overcome since full box scores are available, beginning with the 1972-73 season.

Nebraska finished off its homestand with its most impressive,



and least heartstopping, game. The Huskers jumped to a quick first-half lead and went on to defeat Missouri 76-53. The margin was NU's second biggest against Mizzou in the series' 184-game history.

In a strange scheduling quirk, Nebraska's next assignment was at Missouri. In a see-saw battle which featured seven ties and 15 lead changes, Mizzou made the big plays at the end to pull out a 75-74 win.

Nebraska continued on the road at Oklahoma and again found itself in position for a conference road win. However, Oklahoma broke open a tight game to win 84-77, despite a career-high tying 30 points from Lue.

After two losses, the Huskers returned home, but the assignment against No. 11 Iowa State was no breather. Nebraska played the 'Clones tough, but fell short 77-67.

NU's next game was as tough of a test as you can get. The Huskers, losers of three straight, traveled to Lawrence, Kan., to take on the undefeated and top-ranked Jayhawks. Kansas took an early eight-point lead and appeared to be in control of the game. However, Nebraska hung tough and trailed by just six points at the half.

In the second half, KU could not shake the Huskers and NU had the ball with a chance to pull the upset at the end of regulation. The Jayhawks stopped NU's threat, but needed a strong overtime effort to pull out an 82-77 win. Lue was spectacular in the loss, scoring 26 points, including 22 after halftime.

Despite losing its fourth straight game, Nebraska entered its contest with 15th-ranked Colorado full of confidence. The Huskers controlled the game throughout and posted an impressive 77-69 win. The victory marked the seventh straight season

the Huskers had posted a win over a ranked opponent.

Fresh off an impressive victory, Nebraska was back on the road to face its fourth consecutive ranked foe at No. 23 Texas Tech. The Red Raiders offensive firepower was too much as NU fell 87-74. Nebraska's most disappointing effort of the season followed in a 61-53 loss at Kansas State, dropping NU to 12-11 overall and 4-7 in league play.

The Huskers' three-game road trip ended with a non-conference contest at Northern Iowa, one of the Missouri Valley Conference's top teams. Nebraska rebounded from two road losses with a complete effort against Northern Iowa, pulling out a 77-69 win. Hamilton was dominant for NU, recording another double-double with 16 points and 17 rebounds.

The Huskers posted one of their most complete efforts of the year in a 79-67 homecourt win over Texas. Hamilton was again strong, with a career-high 20 points and 11 rebounds. Lue finished with 22 points as the Huskers dominated throughout the game.

The win over Texas sent Nebraska back on the road for two games with full momentum. However, a 71-60 loss at Baylor quickly changed the tide and sent the Huskers to Iowa State with their postseason chances dim.

Few gave the Huskers a fighting chance on the seventh-ranked Cyclones' homecourt. However, Nebraska played stifling defense in the first half and led 28-23 at intermission. ISU responded in the second half and took an eight-point lead with less than four minutes remaining. At that point, Lue took over for the Huskers with 12 points in the game's final 3:35 to force overtime. In the extra session, Lue added five more points and NU pulled off the shocking 74-69 overtime win. The win ended the Huskers' 12-game conference road losing skid and was the highest-ranked team NU had defeated in three seasons.

With rejuvenated hopes of an NCAA Tournament bid, Ne-

braska returned home for its final two regular season contests. The Huskers rallied from an 11-point halftime deficit to defeat Oklahoma State 77-68 and improve to 7-8 in the Big 12 and 16-12 overall.

The win put Nebraska in position to make a statement to the NCAA Tournament committee with a win in its final contest. However, making that statement would not be easy as top-ranked Kansas was the opponent. The Jayhawks remembered the tussle NU had given them in Lawrence and came into the Devaney Center inspired. KU jumped on the Huskers early and didn't look back en route to an 85-65 win.

Nebraska headed into the Big 12 tourney as the seventh seed and faced Missouri in the opening round. The Tigers played one of their most complete games of the season and defeated Nebraska 78-72. The loss left Nebraska down, but not out, as three days later the Huskers were selected for the NIT. The bid was a school-record seventh consecutive postseason appearance for NU.


In round one, Nebraska hosted a fired-up Washington squad. The Huskies made a late first-half run to

lead 36-33 at intermission and led by as many as seven in the second half. Nebraska was strong late in the game and prevailed for a 67-63 win.

In a game billed as the biggest in Nevada school history, Nebraska stole the show in Reno, downing the Wolfpack 77-67 in the second round. The Huskers opened a 15-point lead early in the game and dominated throughout. Moore showed he wasn't ready to end his Husker career, with a 9-9 performance from the floor. Overall he scored 21 points and had 15 rebounds to lead the Huskers.

Nebraska found itself just a win away from a return trip to the NIT semifinals in New York City, but a tough test stood in the way at Connecticut, a perennial Big East power. Nebraska dominated the opening half and led by nine at intermission. The weary Huskers could not hold on in the second period as Connecticut made 67 percent of its field goals after halftime and pulled away for a 76-67 victory. The loss left Nebraska at 18-15 on the season.

Nebraska failed to end a two-year drought of not qualifying for the NCAA Tournament last season. However, the young Huskers did extend their postseason streak to seven years and won 18 games for a seventh-straight season and laid the groundwork for an NCAA Tournament run in 1997-98.

Moore also holds the Husker record for blocked shots in a game with nine against Coppin State last season and has three of the top five seasons on the Husker career blocked shot list. The four-year letterman, finished just 14 points shy of becoming Nebraska's 19th, 1,000-point career scorer.



Moore also finished ninth on Nebraska's career rebounding list and has the sixth-best field goal percentage in NU history. Moore was Nebraska's second-leading scorer and rebounder as a senior, averaging 11.7 points and 7.4 rebounds per game and earned honorable-mention All-Big 12 honors.



He started 43 games in his NU career and finished with two-year averages of 10.3 points and 5.9 rebounds per game. Garner was Nebraska's leading rebounder as a junior, averaging 6.3 boards per game. As a senior, Garner was NU's



SOPHOMORE LUE WINS JACK MOORE AWARD

Tyronn Lue, a second-team All-Big 12 selection in 1996-97, received the Jack Moore Award, given annually to NU's outstanding men's basketball player. Lue led Nebraska in scoring, averaging 18.8 points per game and became the first sophomore to win the

Moore award in five seasons. The 6-0 Lue also led the Huskers in assists (136), minutes played (1,150), three-point goals (47) and free-throw percentage (.813). Lue's 603 points is the fourth-best single-season total in Nebraska history and the most ever by an NU sophomore. Lue led Nebraska in scoring 20 times during the season, including two 30-point efforts. His 1,150 minutes played ranked as the secondmost ever by a Husker, just five short of the all-time season record set by Dave Hoppen in 1985.





THE HISTORY OF NEBRASKA BASKETBALL

As near as anyone can determine, the University of Nebraska was first represented by a men's basketball team on Feb. 2, 1897, just six years after Dr. James A. Naismith set down the rules of the game at the International YMCA Training School in Springfield, Mass.

A team from the Lincoln YMCA was the opponent, and Nebraska posted an 11-8 victory at Grant Memorial Hall, the home of the Huskers for all but two seasons until the Coliseum opened in 1926. The same teams played in Grant Hall three weeks later with a similar result, as NU won 23-14. Nebraska had to rally in the second game. The Hesperian, a student newspaper, reported: "At the end of the first half the score stood 9 to 6 in favor of the visitors but during the second half our boys took a brace and some excellent work was done."

Such was the modest beginning of a program that has enjoyed probably its greatest success over the last six seasons, with a 124-67 record (.649), six consecutive postseason appearances, including four-straight NCAA Tournaments, a Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament title in 1994 and the 1996 National Invitation Tournament championship title.

Nebraska doubled its schedule in 1898, losing twice to the Lincoln YMCA and splitting two games with the Omaha YMCA. A 16-12 loss against the Omaha YMCA provided evidence as to why Nebraska finished 1-3 that season. According to The Hesperian account: "The great difficulty of the University team was mere recklessness. Our boys have been playing with a loose interpretation of the rules. The officials were strict and of course the resulting advantage was in favor of Omaha." Then as now, overly aggressive play had its drawbacks.

Nebraska played teams from other universities for the first time in 1899, winning two games against Nebraska Wesleyan and one against Doane en route to the unofficial state championship. The next season, Nebraska played an out-of-state opponent for the first time, defeating the University of Kansas, 48-8, at Lincoln. That game still ranks as the worst loss for a Jayhawk team and was the first for either school against a present-day NCAA Division I school and the first matching present-day Big 12 Conference institutions.

The Kansas team was coached by Dr. Naismith. The Nebraska student yearbook, Sombrero, wrote: "A closely contested game was looked for. The Jayhawkers were, however, completely outclassed, the score

being 48-8." Based on the victory against Kansas and four other similarly decisive victories, "the basketball team for this year was undoubtedly superior to any in the west," the Sombrero concluded. It would be several years before such a claim could be made again.

Nebraska hired its first full-time coach in 1911. E.O. "Jumbo" Stiehm, who scored 24 points against Nebraska as a Wisconsin basketball player in 1908, coached both football and basketball. His first Husker basketball team won 14 of 15 games, its only loss coming at Minnesota, 40-15. The student newspaper, The Daily Nebraskan, blamed the loss on Nebraska's inability to adjust to the Gophers' "100-foot floor."

A Daily Nebraskan account of Nebraska's 29-28 season-ending victory against Kansas at Lincoln in 1912 provides evidence that some fans' behavior hasn't changed much over the years. "The game as a whole was entirely unsatisfactory, being marred by rough tactics of the visitors, incompetent work on the part of the referee and interruptions by the audience, which were in part justifiable."

Nebraska shared the Missouri Valley Conference championship with Kansas in 1912 and 1914 and won the title outright in 1913 under Stiehm's leadership. The 1913-14 team was "so fast it took a movie camera to catch 'em," according to the Cornhusker student yearbook. It was described as a "point-a-minute" team, which wasn't quite accurate. Typically, games lasted 40 minutes (though that wasn't always the case), and Nebraska averaged 30 points per game. Guard Sam Carrier became Nebraska's first All-America basketball player in 1913. He and Carl Underwood led the Huskers to 17 victories in 19 games. Underwood was the Missouri Valley Conference scoring leader with 66 points in 10 conference games.

Nebraska won another conference title outright in 1916, after Sam Waugh replaced Stiehm as the Cornhuskers' coach for one season. Stiehm, who coached the first game of the season before giving way to Waugh, had planned to remain at Nebraska through the basketball season before leaving to become coach and athletic director at Wisconsin. But the Nebraska Athletic Board decided to replace him.

Waugh was succeeded by E.J. "Doc" Stewart, whose three Cornhusker teams had a combined record of 29-23. Nebraska was 22-2 in 1919-20 and 11-3 in 1920-21 under Coach P.J. Schissler. After the 1919-20 season, Schissler challenged the University of Chicago to a game, but to no avail. The Cornhuskers also were invited to a


postseason AAU tournament in Atlanta but didn't go.

Schissler's teams played as independents. Nebraska lost its affiliation with the Missouri Valley Conference because of a decision to play a football game against Oklahoma in Omaha in 1919. Conference rules prohibited such games (Oklahoma had not yet joined the Missouri Valley Conference). Nebraska returned to the Missouri Valley Conference in 1921, and Owen Frank replaced Schissler as basketball coach. The remainder of the Roaring 1920s was, for the most part, undistinguished.

Basketball was rough and tumble. There was a center jump after every basket and no requirement to cross mid-court in 10 seconds or less. The ball was a lot different, too, more like a medicine ball, which contributed to some dull games.

The most significant event during the 1920s was the building of the Coliseum, which was dedicated on Feb. 6, 1926. The Cornhuskers dropped a 25-14 decision to Kansas in the first game at their new home, which was built at a cost of \$445,000 and seated 8,000 for basketball. Prior to that, Nebraska played most of its home games in Grant Hall, which seated about a fourth as many fans as the Coliseum and was located just to the north of where the Sheldon Art Gallery now stands.

Athletic Director Fred Leuhring arranged for Nebraska to play its home basketball games at the State Fairgrounds Coliseum in 1921, in order to accommodate more

spectators. The Cornhuskers played two seaons at the Fairgrounds Coliseum, which had a wider court than Grant Hall.

The first game there was played on Jan. 14, 1921. Nebraska defeated conference opponent Grinnell 31-10 before an audience of 1,500, according to newspaper estimates. After two seasons, the Cornhuskers returned to Grant Hall, which had been remodeled, and continued to play home games there until the NU Coliseum opened.

Nebraska ended the decade with an 11-5 season under Charles T. Black, a former Kansas All-American in 1928-29. In the next 19 seasons, the Huskers had just two winning records, back-to-back campaigns under Coach W.H. Browne in 1935-36 and 1936-37. The 1937 team tied Kansas for the Big Six championship, after finishing second to the Jayhawks in 1936.

The 1930s produced four more Cornhusker All-Americans: center Don Maclay in 1931, guard Steve Hokuf in 1933, guard George Wahlquist in 1936 and guard Robert Parsons in 1937. Maclay was the Big Six scoring leader in 1930, scoring 112 points in 10 league games.


Harry Good was hired as head coach in 1946 and after two losing seasons, turned Nebraska's fortunes around. In 1948-49, Good's Huskers went 16-10, tied Oklahoma for the Big Seven regular-season championship and defeated the Sooners, 57-56, in a conference playoff to qualify for an NCAA playoff game. The NCAA Tournament was structured differently then, and the Cornhuskers needed to win that playoff to advance into the NCAA field. They lost to Oklahoma A&M, the Missouri Valley Conference champion, 52-35, at Kansas City, Mo. Coach Henry P. Iba's Aggies went on to finish second to Kentucky, coached by Adolph Rupp, in the NCAA Tournament.

In 1949-50, Nebraska again won 16 games and shared the Big Seven crown with Kansas and Kansas State. That marks the last time the conference had a three-way tie at the top. "We were King in our day," Claude Retherford once told a news-paper reporter. "They were firing football coaches left and right, but we packed 'em in. Oh, people were interested in football, but basketball was THE game on the Nebraska campus when we played." Retherford earned All-Big Seven recognition in 1949 after leading the conference in scoring with a 12.4 points-per-game average.

The Cornhuskers had another first-team All-Big Seven performer in 1949, Milton "Bus" Whitehead. The 6-10 center from Scottsbluff, Neb., also earned all-conference honors in 1950, when he averaged a

then-school-record 15.7 points per game. Whitehead was named to the District V All-America team by Collier's Magazine. Whitehead also was the first Cornhusker selected to play in the East-West All-Star Game in New York City's Madison Square Garden. When he graduated, Whitehead held nine school scoring records.

Nebraska basketball experienced another drought beginning in 1950-51, with 15 consecutive losing seasons. Despite playing for a team that finished last in the Big Seven in 1952, Husker guard Jim Buchanan earned All-America and all-conference honors. And even though the late Jerry Bush, dubbed the "Big Bear of the Coliseum,' never produced a winning team in his nine seasons as head coach at Nebraska, his colorful personality and uncanny ability to fashion upsets kept Cornhusker fans entertained.



But that's only part of the drama. Kubacki, a senior from Toledo, Ohio, spent all but the final 6:53 of the game sitting on the bench in street clothes, forced there by a knee injury and the kind of fate from which legends are built. When the Cornhuskers' captain, Gary Reimers, left the game with leg cramps, Kubacki convinced Bush to let him suit up. Four minutes and seven seconds later, Kubacki went into the game. Two minutes and 44 seconds after that, he hit the winning shot.

Bush also had the distinction of coaching the school's first 1,000-point scorer, guard Herschell Turner, who came from

Indianapolis, Ind., where he was rated the second-best high school player in the state as a senior, behind only crosstown rival Oscar Robertson. Turner earned All-Big Eight honors in 1960 and ended his Cornhusker career with 1,056 points.

Following the 1962-63 season, Bush was replaced as head coach by Joe Cipriano, who brought the nickname "Slippery Joe" and up-tempo basketball to the Coliseum. His teams pressed full-court and ran a fast-break offense, which led the Big Eight in scoring average in 1966, 1967 and 1968.

Cipriano's first two teams had a combined record of 17-33. But his third team, in 1965-66, was one of the most successful in school history, finishing 20-5 and second to Kansas in the Big Eight. All-Big Eight guard Grant Simmons, the first Cornhusker to earn Academic All-Big Eight honors, was the team's leader.

The 1966-67 team finished 16-9 and made the school's first appearance in the 16-team National Invitation Tournament, played at New York City's Madison Square Garden. Guard Stu Lantz was a two-time All-Big Eight pick and led the Cornhuskers in scoring and rebounding in both 1966-67



and 1967-68.

Guard Marvin Stewart and center Chuck Jura earned All-Big Eight honors for Cipriano in 1971 and 1972, respectively. Guard Jerry Fort, who finished his career with a then-school-record 1,882 points, was the first Nebraska player chosen firstteam all-conference three times, from 1974 through 1976. With Fort's leadership, Nebraska began a string of 14 winning

In the fall of 1976, Cornhusker basketball moved out of the Coliseum and into the state-of-the-art Bob Devaney Sports Center arena. Located on the State Fairgrounds, the \$13 million athletic complex was financed by a special cigarette tax.

Cipriano coached Nebraska to another 20-victory season in 1977-78. The Cornhuskers, led by All-Big Eight guard Brian Banks, finished with a 22-8 record and advanced to the second round of the NIT. Despite failing health--a battle against cancer that he finally lost--Cipriano shared coaching duties with his assistant, Moe Iba, in 1979-80, and took Nebraska to the NIT again. For their efforts, the duo shared United Press International Big Eight Coach-of-the-Year honors.

Cipriano brought Nebraska into the modern era, coaching 17 seasons and 450 games. His record was 253-197, and those 253 victories represent one-fourth of Nebraska's all-time total. Following Cipriano's death, Iba was named head coach, and he continued Cipriano's winning ways. In Iba's six seasons on the bench, Nebraska was 106-71 and advanced to postseason play four times.

Center Andre Smith was the 1981 Big Eight MVP and twice earned All-Big Eight honors. However, it was the late Jack Moore, a 5-10 playmaker from Muncie, Ind., who captured the hearts of Nebraska fans from 1980 through 1982. Moore earned All-Big Eight honors in 1982, when he won the Naismith Award, given annually to the nation's top player under 6-feet feet tall. The first three-time Academic All-Big Eight pick in Nebraska history, Moore scored 1,204 points and hit .901 from the free throw line during his career.

The cornerstone of Iba's teams from 1983 through 1986 was Omaha, Neb., native Dave Hoppen, a three-time All-Big Eight center and the first Nebraska basketball player to have his jersey number (42) retired by the school. In 1982-83, Hoppen's freshman season, the Cornhuskers were 22-10 and won three games in the NIT before losing to DePaul in the semifinals at Madison Square Garden. The Cornhuskers returned to the NIT each of the next two seasons, advancing to the second round both times.

Hoppen's college career. though, was ended by a knee injury he sustained in a game at Colorado on Feb. 1, 1986. He finished as the school's all-time scoring leader with 2,167 points and broke or tied 19 school records during his fouryear stay. After Hoppen's injury, Iba's team regrouped and went on to earn the school's first-ever "official" NCAA Tournament berth. Nebraska lost to Western Kentucky in the first round of the Southeast Regional, 67-59. Following the game, Iba announced his resignation.

On March 27, 1986, Danny Nee was officially introduced as Nebraska's 24th basketball coach. During a news conference to announce his hiring, Nee said a "new era" in Cornhusker basketball was beginning. "I understand I have to win, but I believe we have to play a style people will come to see. Basketball was made to be played up and down the floor. I think the people will enjoy it."

peared in postseason play

nine times and have topped the 20-win mark five times. In Nee's first season, Nebraska was 21-12 and finished third in the NIT. After a 13-18 record in his second season, the Cornhuskers got back over the .500 mark with a 17-16 record in 1988-89 and advanced to the second round of the NIT.

After missing the school record for losses in a season by one in 1989-90 (10-18), Nebraska won a school-record 26 games, against only eight losses, in 1990-91. The Cornhuskers played in the Big Eight Tournament championship game for the first time and advanced to the NCAA Tournament, losing to Xavier, 89-84, in the first round at Minneapolis, Minn.

The 1990-91 team included two firstround NBA draft picks, senior Rich King and redshirted freshman Eric Piatkowski. The 7-2 King was the tallest player in history. Cornhusker Piatkowski, Nebraska's sixth-man in 1990-91, went on to win first-team all-conference honors twice. He ranks second on the Cornhuskers' career-scoring list, with 1,934 points. Piatkowski is the only Nebraska player to

finish with at least 1,900 points, 600 rebounds (669) and 300 assists (322).

Since the record-setting 1990-91 season, the Cornhuskers have made three more NCAA Tournament appearances and three NIT appearances. They won the NIT in 1995-96, in impressive fashion, winning two games on the road and scoring more than 80 points four times in five contests.

"The NIT run was incredible, when you look at the teams we beat and how we beat them," Nee said. "I don't care what anybody says, it was domination."

In addition to reaching the NCAA Tournament for a fourth straight season and recording back-to-back 20-victory seasons for the first time in school history, Nee's 1993-94 team made history by winning the school's first Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament title. The Cornhuskers defeated Oklahoma, Missouri and Oklahoma State to earn the championship.

The 1996-97 season was Nebraska's first in the Big 12 Conference and marked another postseason appearance. As the Huskers settle into the new league, Nee has the Nebraska program on solid ground.

Three-time All-Big Eight center Dave Hoppen finished his career as Nebraska's all-time leading scorer with 2,167 points. Hoppen, whose four-year collegiate career was cut short by a knee injury in a game at Colorado, Feb. 1, 1986, broke or tied 19 Nebraska records and five Big Eight marks during his standout career. A native of Omaha, Neb., Hoppen was the first

player in Husker basketball history to have his jersey (42) retired. Originally drafted by the National Basketball Association's Atlanta Hawks in the third-round of the 1986 draft, he played with both Charlotte and Philadelphia, in addition to a stint in the CBA.

2. ERIC PIATKOWSKI, G/F, RAPID CITY, S.D. (STEVENS)



One of only two players in school history to play on four-straight NCAA Tournament teams, Eric Piatkowski finished his career as the second-leading scorer in school history with 1,934 points. The Most Valuable Player in the 1994 Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament, Piatkowski had a school and tournament-record 42-point outburst in Nebraska's first-round

victory over Oklahoma. A two-time first-team All-Big Eight pick, Piatkowski averaged 21.5 points in his final season as a Husker, and became the first player in school history to score 1,900 points (1,934), grab 600 rebounds (669) and dish out 300 assists (322). A first-round draft pick of the NBA's Indianapolis Pacers, Piatkowski's draft rights were then traded to the Los Angeles Clippers.

Andre Smith closed his brilliant four-year career in 1980-81 when he led the Big Eight Conference in scoring with a 19.5 average in league games only. Boone played in a school-record tying 127 games and started 102, the second-highest total in school history. Boone became the 17th player in school history to reach 1,000 points, but just the fifth to do so before completing his junior season. Boone earned second-team All-Big Eight honors as a junior and helped Nebraska to the NIT Championship his senior

year. Boone's 559 points in his junior season is the sixth-highest single-season output in school history. Boone scored 20-or-more points 18 times in his career and ranks among the school leaders in 3-point goals made (second, 181) and attempted (third, 501), assists (second, 446) and minutes (third, 3,624).

One of two 1,000 point scorers on the 1995-96 team, Erick Strickland finished his career with 1,586 points. Strickland was a secondteam all-conference selection as a senior when he led the team in scoring (14.7) and was named the MVP of the NIT. Strickland played in a school-record tying 127 games and started 84. His 516 points in his senior season rank as the

11th-highest single season total in school history. A three-time member of the Big Eight All-Defensive Team, Strickland is the all-time NU steals leader with 257 thefts, a total which ranks seventh in Big Eight history. Strickland scored 20-or-more points 14 times in his career and ranks third in 3-point field goals made (179), second in 3-point field goal attempts (512) and third in assists (414). He is a member of the NBA's Dallas Mavericks.

7. RICH KING, C, OMAHA, NEB. (BURKE)



The tallest player in Nebraska history at 7-2, Rich King finished his career with 1,475 points, and then school records for blocked shots, 183, and games played, 124. King had a big hand in the Huskers' record-breaking 26-8, 1990-91 campaign, as he led the team in scoring (15.5 ppg) and rebounding (8.1 rpg) en route to honorable-mention All-America honors from

both AP and UPI. King, who was a first-round draft pick by the Seattle SuperSonics in the 1991 NBA Draft, tied Jerry Fort's then-school single-game scoring record with a 40-point outburst against Northern Illinois, Feb. 18, 1991.

9. Tom Baack, F, Fort Wayne, Ind. (Concordia)




Tom Baack, a 1995 Nebraska Hall of Fame inductee, finished his career with 1,299 points, a figure that stood as the school record until guard Jerry Fort came along 10 years later. He played on three-straight winning NU teams from 1965 through 1968, and helped the Huskers to an NIT appearance in 1966-67—NU's first-ever bid to the nation's oldest postseason

tournament. Known for his satin-smooth jump shot, Baack served as an assistant at Nebraska for eight seasons, and his 17.3 per-game average for his career ranks third in school history. Baack was selected in the 10th round of the 1968 NBA Draft by the Detroit Pistons.

Stuart Lantz teamed with Tom Baack to give Nebraska a potent one-two offensive punch. Lantz finished his career with 1,269 points and 571 rebounds. A two-time All-Big Eight pick, Lantz went on to play eight seasons in the NBA with four teams (San Diego/Houston Rockets, Detroit Pistons, New Orleans Jazz, Los Angeles Lakers). A charter member of the Nebraska

Basketball Hall of Fame, Lantz had his jersey retired in the fall of 1989.

11. Chuck Jura, Center, Schuyler, Neb.



One of the top all-around centers in Nebraska history, Chuck Jura's 1,255 points rank 11th on the school's all-time list, and trail Stuart Lantz's career total by 14 points. Jura earned All-Big Eight honors as a senior and was an academic All-Big Eight choice, too. One of only five players in school history to average more than 20 points in a season (21.2), Jura ranks fifth on

the all-time rebounding chart (740) and his 305 rebounds in his final season still stand as the NU single-season record. Like Lantz, Jura was a charter member of the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame. A third-round NBA draft pick by the Chicago Bulls, Jura played professional basketball in Europe for several seasons.

12. Jack Moore, Guard, Muncie, Ind. (Central)



Jack Moore will long be remembered by Husker faithful for his gutty play on the basketball court. He was honored with the 1982 Naismith Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top player under six-feet tall. During his four-year career, Moore scored 1,204 points, and shot .901 from the free-throw line-among the all-time best career marks in NCAA

Division I history. Moore's .901 free-throw percentage broke the Big Eight record for career marksmanship, which had been held by his coach, Moe Iba. A consensus All-Big Eight selection as a senior, Moore was the first Husker cager to earn first-team academic All-Big Eight honors for three-straight seasons and his 382 career assists stand fourth on NU's all-time chart. Nebraska's MVP Award is named in honor of Moore, who was killed in a March, 1984 plane crash. Moore was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1993.

Brian Carr is the only player in Nebraska history to score 1,000 points and collect more than 600 assists in a career. Carr, who finished his four-year career with 14 Nebraska school records, scored 1,182 points and collected 682 assists. The 682 assists rank as the third-best total in Big Eight history, behind only former Kansas stars Cedric Hunter and Jacque Vaughn.

Carr is also the school career leader in minutes played. A secondteam All-Big Eight selection as a senior (UPI), Carr was a twotime, first-team academic All-Big Eight performer.

Marvin Stewart finished his three-year career with 1,138 points, and is remembered by Husker fans as one of the finest fast-breaking guards in school history. In his senior season, Stewart averaged 21.4 points, the third-best season average in school history, and earned first-team All-Big Eight honors. Stewart owns the distinction of being the only 1,000-point club member

to top the mark in fewer than 70 games, as he appeared in 66. Stewart was a second-round draft selection of the NBA's Chicago Bulls in 1971. He was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1994.

The first Husker cager to top the 1,000-point mark, Herschell Turner finished his career with 1,056 points. Turner teamed with Al Maxey to provide a strong offensive punch for Coach Jerry Bush's teams in the late 1950s. A first-team All-Big Eight selection as a senior, Turner was a strong rebounder and held NU's single-

season rebounding record for 10 seasons (244), until Leroy Chalk grabbed 257 rebounds in 1969. Turner finished his three-year career with 626 rebounds, which ranks 11th on NU's all-time chart, and was a sixth-round draft choice of the NBA's Syracuse Nationals. He was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1990.

NEBRASKA BASKETBALL HALL OF FAME TO HONOR FIVE

The ninth class of the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame will be installed at halftime of the Huskers' Feb. 14, 1998, game against Baylor. A party for all Nebraska letterwinners will be held on Friday, Feb. 13, and an alumni game will be held before the NU-Baylor contest.

The three new members of the Hall of Fame represent three different decades of Husker basketball. Paul Amen played for Nebraska in the 1930s, Willard Fagler wore the scarlet and cream in the 1950s and Willie Campbell was a Husker standout in the 1960s.

Amen was a three-year letterman for Nebraska from 1936-38. He was a key factor in Nebraska earning a share of the Big Six title in the 1936-37 season, NU's first league title in 20 seasons. NU's 1936 and 1937 teams, coached by William H. Browne, became the first to post back-toback double-digit win totals in more than

Fagler earned four Husker letters for Nebraska from 1952-55. He stands 45th on the Nebraska career scoring list with 705 points. Fagler played his first three seasons for Coach Harry Good, before starring in his senior season for Jerry Bush.

Fagler averaged 8.4 points per game for his entire career and led the Huskers with a 13.6 average in 1954-55.

The third inductee is Campbell who was a three-year letterman from 1965-67. Campbell played on Nebraska's first postseason team as a senior in 1967. The Huskers qualified for the NIT, but dropped a first round game to Marshall.

A 6-6 forward, Campbell scored 524 career points, including 244 in his senior season when he averaged 9.8 per game. Campbell also pulled down 354 career rebounds, averaging 6.3 per game as a junior and 5.4 a contest as a senior.

In addition to inducting three new members to the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame, the chapters Special Merit Award will also be presented. This year's recipients of the Merit Award are former Nebraska manager Ed Kaplan and Jerry Solomon of Lincoln.

Kaplan was a popular student manager for the Huskers in the mid-1950s. Solomon, who graduated from the University of Nebraska, was the key player in pulling the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame project together. He is a Lincoln resident and owns and operates Solomon Collins and Associates.

The Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame was the brainchild of longtime Husker athletic supporter Solomon, who first approached the University about the project in the fall of 1988. Financial support for the Hall of Fame was also provided by Jack Bock, Dale Herman and Dale Jensen. The Hall is co-sponsored by the NU Athletic Department and Rebounders Club.
