
Doc Sadler was named head coach at the University of Nebraska on Aug. 8, 2006. Sadler brings an exciting brand of basketball to Lincoln in his first season with the Huskers, as he utilizes an uptempo game with a "baseline to baseline" attack, one that will thrill fans and players alike.

Sadler has more to offer than just an engaging and energetic personality, which has helped him gain a reputation as a players coach. He also has a successful background that includes 11 postseason appearances in 14 years at the Division I level. He has coached or recruited 19 players who went on to play in the National Basketball Association.


CONNECTING WITH THE PAST

In his first two months in Lincoln, Doc Sadler has been a prominent figure in the public. He has traveled to meet fans from all over the state while speaking at numerous events and private functions. He has also been a positive force in the basketball community around Nebraska. He provided a free coaches clinic (left) for more than 150 area basketball coaches and held open tryouts for the student body.

In his first season with the Huskers, Coach Doc Sadler has assembled an experienced and versatile staff that has a proven history of success on the recruiting trail as well as developing players to move onto the professional level. The staff has combined to produce 31 NBA players over the past 20 years, including 19 players Sadler has recruited or coached.

BUILDING A CHAMPION

MAGICAL EXPERIENCE



Husker fans have created an intimidating environment for visiting teams during the first 30 years of the Bob Devaney Sports Center. The Huskers own an all-time record of 356-114 (.757) in the building, including a 218-32 (.872) mark vs. non-conference opponents.

Nebraska, which is 193-64 (.751) at home since the start of the 1990-91 season, has seen its significant home-court advantage increase over the past few years behind the support of the "Red Zone" student section.

PREGAME AT THE DEVANEY CENTER

Nearly 5 million fans have packed the Devaney Center since it opened in 1976. After receiving \$7.9 million in improvements including new video boards in 1999, the 13,595-seat Bob Devaney Sports Center is one of the best venues in the Big 12 and the nation.






CELEBRATING A VICTORY WITH THE FANS

Nebraska fans have been rewarded through the years as the Huskers continually face – and beat – nationally ranked teams in the Devaney Center. NU has earned a home win over a ranked team in 13 of the past 15 years, including its most recent upset of a top-5 team with a victory over No. 4 Oklahoma State in 2005.

BOB DEVANEY SPORTS CENTER



Named after Nebraska's longtime football coach and athletic director, the 13,595-seat Bob Devaney Sports Center is the home to the Husker men's and women's basketball, gymnastics, swimming and diving, track and field and wrestling teams. The Devaney Center has played host to numerous NCAA postseason events since opening its doors in 1976. Before the 1999-2000 season, the Devaney Center underwent \$7.9 million in renovations inside the arena and in the concourse areas. The Devaney Center court was refinished and redesigned in 2004 and most recently, the coaches and administrative offices were renovated in the fall of 2006.

NEBRASKA BASKETBALL LOCKER ROOM

The Nebraska locker room (left) and lounge (above) in the Bob Devaney Sports Center have both been refurbished in the past four years. The Devaney Center also houses a complete weight facility while the men's basketball team has its own video area (bottom left) to review game and practice film. The coaches review all film on DVD and digital format, including practices and game footage, while staying on the cutting-edge in technology.




Mabel Lee Hall on the Nebraska campus houses the basketball practice facility. The Huskers typically practice in the Devaney Center but have the flexibility to schedule workouts any time of the day with the use of the second practice area.

Only three non-conference teams have won more than one game in the Devaney Center in the past 30 years. Since 1990-91, only 10 schools have won more than once against the Huskers in the building.

The main concourse of the Bob Devaney Sports Center received extensive renovations in 2000, with the addition of a Husker Hall of Honor (far left) and a Husker Walk of Fame. Inside the arena, a new display of the retired jerseys (left) in the basketball programs were unveiled in 2006.

Over the past five years, nearly half of NU's home losses have been to ranked teams, while the Huskers have upset six ranked teams at the Devaney Center, including No. 4 Oklahoma State in 2005 and No. 12 Oklahoma in 2006.




Husker Power, the model strength and conditioning program in the nation, plays a major role in the continuing success of Nebraska athletics. With seven full-time members and four interns, Nebraska's Performance Team is one of the most comprehensive strength and conditioning organizations in the nation.

Nebraska's strength training facilities have always been among the finest in the nation. The strength complex was one of the most efficient and well-designed weight rooms in the country for nearly three decades.

Nebraska took the next step in peak performance with the addition of the new Tom and Nancy Osborne Athletic Complex in 2006. Within the Osborne Complex, the 63,500-square foot Charles and Romona Myers Performance Center features the nation's top weight room, a nutrition center and a technologically advanced training complex that utilizes specially designed transformers in use only at Nebraska.






Three Reasons for Success

Nebraska's Coordinator of Sports Nutrition James Harris works with all 23 of Nebraska's sports by educating athletes on topics such as gaining weight, losing body fat, staying hydrated, increasing energy and supplement use. This knowledge can be applied in Nebraska's Performance Buffet.

Making solid nutritional choices not only helps an athlete become stronger, but also improves game-day performance. The Nebraska Performance Buffet is open to the public each day for lunch, while dinner is available to all Husker student-athletes.

MEDICAL FACILITIES FOR CHAMPIONS

Providing expert care to more than 550 Husker student-athletes, Nebraska features one of the most well-trained and highly skilled Athletic Medicine staffs in the country.

Under the guidance of Director of Athletic Medicine Dr. Lonnie Albers and Head Athletic Trainer and Physical Therapist Jerry Weber, the 2006-07 Nebraska Athletic Medicine Staff consists of five doctors, two therapist/trainers, five athletic trainers and six graduate assistant athletic trainers.

Nebraska's team of orthopaedists is led by Chief of Staff Dr. Pat Clare, a nationally respected orthopaedic surgeon with more than 30 years of service to Husker athletics.



The medical facilities at Nebraska have long been among the nation's best, and NU's new Athletic Medicine Center within the Tom and Nancy Osborne Athletic Complex will keep the Huskers on the front line of technology for decades to come. In addition to Nebraska's North Stadium facility, the Bob Devaney Sports Center also features a dedicated athletic medicine area.

Assistant Athletic Trainer Brad Brown (lower left) and the rest of Nebraska's athletic medicine staff provide Husker athletes with highly trained medical care throughout the season. Brown travels to all away games and is on hand at practices all year to assist with injuries and preventive care.



Nebraska features one of the finest Athletic Medicine facilities in the nation in the Tom and Nancy Osborne Athletic Complex. Nebraska's Athletic Medicine Center features nearly 14,000 square feet, including a hydro-therapy pool (top left). 

GAMEDAY AT NEBRASKA

Every game during the season is carried live on the Husker Sports Network on radio stations across the Midwest. Each contest is also streamed live on the Internet at Huskers.com and can be heard around the world.





Nebraska basketball can be seen on television throughout the season. The Huskers have played on TV 43 times over the past two seasons since signing a television contract with FSN Midwest. Nebraska, which will have at least 18 games televised in 2006-07, will play in front of a national audience at least twice this season, including a Jan. 29 contest against Kansas on ESPN's Big Monday telecast from the Devaney Center.

NEBRASKA'S NATIONAL TELEVISION EXPOSURE

Nebraska is consistently covered by national print publications such as *Sports Illustrated*, *USA Today*, *The Sporting News* and *ESPN the Magazine*. The Huskers also receive immense exposure within the state and region through the print media while additional national coverage comes from Internet.

BIG 12 BASKETBALL



Formed before the 1996-97 campaign, the Big 12 Conference has become one of the strongest basketball leagues in the nation over the past decade. Divided into North and South divisions of six teams each, the squads play a 16-game conference schedule including home and away contests with each divisional foe and one contest with each opposite division opponent. The league championship has been played in Kansas City and Dallas and makes its first appearance in Oklahoma City in 2007.




- Over the last five years, the Big 12 has had five teams advance to the Final Four, the most of any conference in the country.

- Since the 2002 season, the Big 12 ranks second nationally in the number of NCAA regional semifinalists. The conference has had 13 squads qualify for the Sweet 16 during that time.

- The Big 12 posted the second-best winning percentage and second-most wins of any conference in the nation against Associated Press top 25 opponents in 2005-06.

- Big 12 teams have 16 wins over nationally-ranked squads during the past two years. Nebraska owns three of those victories.

- The Big 12 has five newcomers this season who were named to the roster for the 2006 McDonald's All-America Game. The five signees in the Big 12 tied for the second-most nationally in one conference.

BIG 12 CONFERENCE FACTS



SITE OF THE 2007 BIG 12 CHAMPIONSHIP

The Big 12 Championship will be played at the Ford Center in Oklahoma City for the first time in 2007. The Ford Center has been the home site for the New Orleans/Oklahoma City Hornets of the NBA since Hurricane Katrina ravaged New Orleans in 2005.

Last winter, the league championship was held in Dallas at the American Airlines Center, the home of the NBA's Dallas Mavericks.

FIRST-CLASS TRAVEL



The Nebraska men's basketball team charts an airplane for all games that are more than three hours driving distance away. The 50-seat plane has all first-class seats and returns the team to Lincoln immediately following the game so all players can attend class the next day.

NEBRASKA UTILIZES AIR CHARTER SERVICE



Nebraska plays an ambitious schedule in 2006-07 with the Huskers playing in 11 states during the course of the season. Among the trips will be four straight weekends in December when the Huskers criss-cross the country from Nebraska to New Jersey to Oregon to Hawaii to Florida.

CHAMPIONSHIP FACILITIES



One of the "Cathedrals of College Football" according to The Sporting News, Memorial Stadium is one of the most intimidating locations to play in all of sports.

With expanded capacity reaching beyond 80,000 fans for the first time in 2006, Nebraska's NCAA-record streak of consecutive sellouts will reach 282 by the end of the season.



The excitement of the more than 80,000 fans that fill Memorial Stadium each home football Saturday reaches a fever pitch for the Tunnel Walk, when the Huskers officially take the field. Over the past 18 seasons, Nebraska has won an amazing 92 percent of its games inside Memorial Stadium.

TOM AND NANCY OSBORNE ATHLETIC COMPLEX

Nebraska's new Hawks Championship Indoor Center (below) provides an indoor workout area for all Husker teams. The facility opened during spring football practice in 2006 and features FieldTurf identical to Memorial Stadium's surface. The indoor center is connected by a skybridge to the new Tom and Nancy Osborne Athletic Complex (left) to give Nebraska the best all-around indoor facilities in the nation.

DEVANEY CENTER INDOOR TRACK

Home to Nebraska's two-time national champion volleyball team, the 4,200-seat NU Coliseum (right) is one of the premier facilities in college volleyball and the home to an 86-match consecutive sellout streak through the 2006 season.

Completed in June of 2001, Hawks Field at Haymarket Park (below) is the crown jewel of a \$29.53 million baseball and softball complex that is among the best in the nation. In 2006, the Nebraska baseball team averaged more than 5,000 fans per game for the first time in school history, while hosting an NCAA Regional for the third time in four seasons.



HUSKERS IN THE PROS



Nebraska players have enjoyed significant professional success following their careers as Huskers. NU has had 24 players drafted by the National Basketball Association, including three first-round picks during the 1990s. Three former Huskers played in the NBA last year— Tyronn Lue, Eric Piatkowski and Mikki Moore – and are on training camp rosters again heading into the 2006-07 campaign.



DAVE HOPPEN



ERIC PIATKOWSKI, 13-YEAR NBA VETERAN

Eric Piatkowski (above) was one of three Huskers to be taken in the first round of the NBA Draft in the 1990s. After joining the Phoenix Suns this summer as a free agent, Piatkowski is entering his 13th season in the NBA. He played nine years with the Los Angeles Clippers, where he scored more than 7,000 points and left as the franchise's all-time leader with 738 3-pointers.

HUSKER COACHING STAFF NBA FACTS

- During his career, Coach Sadler has recruited or coached 19 players who have gone on to play in the NBA. Sadler personally recruited eight of those players.
- Coach Sadler's staff has also been successful recruiting and developing players that have moved on to the NBA. Overall, his staff has combined to coach 31 players that went on to the league.



RICH KING

Rich King (above), a 1991 first-round draft pick, played center for the Seattle SuperSonics from 1991 to 1995. Dave Hoppen (above left), Nebraska's all-time leading scorer, was drafted by the Atlanta Hawks in 1986 and was the second pick of the 1988 expansion draft by the Charlotte Hornets.



MIKKI MOORE, EIGHT-YEAR NBA VETERAN

An eight-year NBA veteran, Tyronn Lue (below) won a pair of NBA Championships with the Los Angeles Lakers before signing to play with the Washington Wizards and Michael Jordan. A first-round pick after his junior season at Nebraska, Lue averaged a career-best 13.5 points and 5.4 assists per game while starting 46 of 49 contests in 2004-05 for the Atlanta Hawks.



Erick Strickland entered the NBA as a free agent but went on to play nine years in the League. He gained career highs with 12.9 points and 4.8 rebounds per game while starting 67-of-68 contests for the Dallas Mavericks in 1999-2000. After retiring last year, he rejoined the Mavs in the front office.

HUSKER NBA FACTS

- Through the years, Nebraska has had 24 players drafted by teams in the National Basketball Association.
- In the 1990s, Nebraska had three first-round selections in the NBA Draft. Rich King was the 14th selection in 1991, Eric Piatkowski was picked 15th overall in 1994 and Tyronn Lue was selected 23rd in 1998. Lue entered the draft following his junior season.
- Nebraska has had four players on NBA rosters at the start of each of the past three seasons. The total number of active players in the NBA ranked fourth among Big 12 Conference teams last year.

THE HUSKER NBA CONNECTION

HUSKER CENTURY



Entering its 111th year of Husker basketball, Nebraska is looking to build on two of the strongest decades in school history. Nebraska has averaged more than 18 wins per season over the past 20 years, while making 12 postseason tournaments in that span.



The 1990-91 team won a school-record 26 contests against just eight losses while on its way to the first of four straight NCAA Tournament appearances. Nebraska had a pair of eventual first-round NBA Draft selections on that squad in center Rich King and guard Eric Piatkowski.


1897-1906
Nebraska posted a 59-26 (.694) record in its first decade of basketball, including three perfect seasons. In those 10 years, the Huskers were coached by Frank Lehmer, T.P. Hewitt, E. Berry, Fred Morrell, Walter Hiltner and R.G. Clapp.

1907-16
The last five teams of the Huskers' second decade all posted winning records. The 1911-12 team (below) won the school's first Missouri Valley Conference title and then repeated as champs in 1912-13 and 1913-14.

1917-1926
Nebraska fashioned its first-ever 20-win season in 1919-20, finishing 22-2 and setting a school record for wins that stood until 1990-91. During the decade, Nebraska was 111-71 (.610) and had six winning campaigns.

Program Quick Facts

- The Huskers own 1,298 all-time victories, including 11 20-win seasons.
- Nebraska has had 23 1,000-point scorers in program history, most recently by Cary Cochran in 2002. Herschell Turner was the first to accomplish the feat in 1960.
- Dave Hoppen owns the school record with 2,167 points between 1983 and 1986. He is the only 2,000-point scorer in school annals.



A HISTORY OF SUCCESS ON THE HARDWOOD

1927-1936

NU opened the decade in the Nebraska Coliseum, but didn't have much of a home-court advantage, finishing under .500 at home in 1925-26. In 1928-29, Nebraska joined Missouri, Kansas, Kansas State, Iowa State and Oklahoma to form the Big Six Conference.

1937-1946

Nebraska's record of 65-120 (.351) in the decade was its worst ever. Twice, in 1943-44 and 1944-45, the Huskers mustered only two wins. Sid Held and Don Fitz earned first-team All-Big Six honors in 1940-41.

1947-1956

The Huskers were 102-141 (.420) in the decade. However, the 1948-49 team tied for first in the Big Seven Conference and beat Oklahoma to advance to the NCAA District Tournament. Claude Retherford was a first-team All-Big Seven pick that season and led the team in scoring. In 1949-50, Bus Whitehead earned first-team all-conference honors as Nebraska tied Kansas and Kansas State for the Big Seven championship.

1957-66

The Huskers' 20-5 record in 1965-66 was their first 20-win season since 1919-20. Lantz, who finished second to KU's Jo Jo White in the Sophomore-of-the-Year balloting, would go on to become a third-round NBA draft pick. For the decade, NU was 102-142 (.418).

1967-1976

Nebraska finished above .500 for the decade with a 147-111 (.570) record. Marvin Stewart became the first player to average 20 points in a season in 1970-71. The Huskers closed out the decade with a third-place Big Eight finish in 1975-76 and said goodbye to the Nebraska Coliseum. Jerry Fort earned three straight first-team all-conference awards from 1974 to 1976.

1977-1986

The Cornhuskers posted a 175-119 (.595) record in the decade, including a 15-14 ledger in 1976-77, the first season at the Bob Devaney Sports Center. In 1977-78, the Huskers earned their second postseason tournament bid and first since 1966-67, advancing to the second round of the NIT. NU posted 20 wins twice during the decade (1977-78, 1982-83).

1987-1996

The Huskers enjoyed their most successful decade, winning 20-or-more games five times. Nebraska advanced to the NCAA Tournament four times, won its first-ever Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament trophy in 1994 and captured the NIT Championship in 1996. For the decade NU was 185-131 (.585).

1997-Present

Nebraska has continued its success while starting its second century of play. The Huskers have added a pair of 20-win seasons to bring Nebraska's total to 11 in history, and six in the past 17 years. NU was also one of just 15 schools to appear in nine consecutive postseason tournaments from 1991 to 1999.



Eric Piatkowski helped Nebraska to its first Big Eight Tournament title – and first league title of any kind in more than four decades – when he propelled the Huskers to three straight wins in 1994. Overall, the Huskers have won eight conference titles and advanced to the postseason 20 times over the last 110 years since the 1896-97 squad went 2-0 to start the program. Fourteen of those postseason appearances, including five of the Huskers' six all-time NCAA Tournament bids, have come in the last 20 years.



Stu Lantz (above) capped an otherwise disappointing Husker decade by leading Nebraska to a second-place Big Eight finish and first-ever NIT appearance in 1965-66.



ACADEMIC SUCCESS



The success of Nebraska athletes reaches far beyond athletic competition. More Husker student-athletes have been selected to CoSIDA Academic All-America teams than from any other school in the nation, and more Huskers have earned academic all-conference honors than athletes from any other league school. NU has led the Big 12 in graduation rates in six of the conference's first 10 years.

Nebraska Academic Highlights

- Nebraska has the highest number of first-, second- and third-team CoSIDA Academic All-Americans in the nation with 233, 57 more than any other school. NU has had 117 of those earn first-team honors, including 66 since 1990.
- A total of 15 Husker student-athletes have earned the NCAA Today's Top Eight Award, the highest honor bestowed on a student-athlete by the NCAA.
- NU boasts a 93-percent Exhausted Eligibility Graduation Rate for student-athletes.
- In 2005, Nebraska received the National Consortium for Academics and Sport Award of Excellence for highest combined total in community outreach and degree completion.
- Nebraska student-athletes earned 126 academic all-conference awards across all sports, including three basketball honorees in 2005-06. Nebraska leads the league with 14 first-team selections over the past three seasons.
- A pair of basketball players earned academic all-district honors last season, bringing NU's total to four in the past five years.




The Nebraska men's basketball team has received numerous honors at the annual Nebraska Student-Athlete Academic Banquet held every spring. Five Huskers were honored last year.

The men's basketball program has benefited from the academic support as nearly 90 percent (17-of-19) of the team's seniors over the last five years have earned their diplomas.

Season Preview

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Keeping It Simple


The Cornhuskers have a new approach to the game, but the goal remains the same as every year – reach the postseason.

To get there, first-year coach Doc Sadler has a simple plan that he is asking his players to follow: play hard every day. Period.



Like every squad in the country, the Nebraska basketball team has high expectations for the 2006-07 season. This year, however, the Huskers may be gauging success in different terms.

That new perspective comes on the heels of possibly the biggest summer roster shake-up of any team in the country as the Huskers replaced their head coach less than a month before the start of the fall semester.

Doc Sadler, an energetic and fiercely competitive coach who won 48 games in his first two seasons at the Division I level, took over the Cornhusker program on Aug. 8. While it may seem that he has gotten up and running quickly, Sadler was still assembling a staff, finishing the schedule and fine tuning the roster when school started, a time when other new coaches around the country were beginning to lay down game plans for the season.

Sadler isn't alone. He is one of six new coaches in the Big 12 Conference. The difference between them is that the other five were all hired before May and had at least six months to prepare for their first season with their new team. With Sadler's hiring in late summer, he had just 66 days before the first official practice.

But as Sadler likes to say, you play with what you are dealt. And the Huskers will be just fine playing the cards they have this season no matter how they measure success.

"Our only goal is to be successful," Sadler said. "We're going to think about one thing though. I don't care about winning games, but we have to play harder than the other team. All I want these players to concentrate on is playing hard. If that happens, they are talented enough that they're going to win games."

Nebraska returns three starters from a team that reached the postseason for the second time in three years in 2006. That squad finished sixth in the Big 12 Conference standings – its best placing since 1999 – and made a surprising run to the league tournament semifinals behind wins over Missouri and nationally ranked Oklahoma. NU entered the season with just three players with more than one year of experience at the Division I level. This year, the Huskers have two.

But those two – senior point guard Charles Richardson Jr. and junior center Aleks Maric – will be key components in the Huskers' success this season.

Richardson is the elder statesman of the squad. He was the one providing invaluable guidance to the younger players during the transition between coaches and has embraced a leadership role since the team lost four seniors to graduation last year.

With three years under his belt – and 35 career starts – Richardson also knows the ins and outs of the rugged Big 12 Conference and has his eye on a third postseason appearance to end his career, something that Sadler believes should be the prize the team has its focus on every season.

"The state of Nebraska deserves this team to be in the NCAA Tournament and we want it to happen – not next year, not two years from now. We want it to happen now," Sadler said at his opening press conference.

"Charles Richardson is graduating. He's not going to be here next year. You think he cares about next year? He wants to play in that thing this year and that's what we're going to try to do."

The Huskers are aiming for their first NCAA Tournament appearance in nearly a decade and will use every available tool at their disposal. With a lack of height in the front court, the Huskers will engage a fast-paced offensive approach that will allow the players to utilize their speed and conditioning.

"We're going to get it up and down the floor," Sadler said. "I'm going to ask so much of these guys on one end of the floor, they have no idea how much I'm going to ask of them. None. But because of what I'm going to ask them to do on the defensive end, we're going to let them go as fast as they can the other way. If we get a good shot, then we're going to shoot it quick. If we don't, we're going to wait until we do get a good shot. So it's going to be baseline to baseline, 94 feet."

Inexperience may be the biggest hurdle the Huskers face this season, but there are several key pieces to the puzzle – including the return of Maric, one the top post players in the conference – that could propel Nebraska back to the postseason.

"I think having Aleks back obviously gives you a starting point," Sadler said. "I don't know that many teams in the country will have a low-post presence like Aleks. The bottom line is that we have to help him. The good news is that I think we can shoot the ball a little bit and that will take a little bit of pressure off him."

The pressure may be off Maric, but it will be on the Huskers as they face one of the most daunting schedules in program history.

Unlike past years when serious competition came only during the conference slate, Nebraska takes on an ambitious non-conference schedule that includes teams from the Atlantic Coast, Pac-10, Big East and Missouri Valley conferences. Add in possible matchups in Hawaii at the Rainbow Classic against schools from Conference USA, the Mountain West and the Atlantic 10 conferences and four straight weekends on the road in December, and it's easy to see that Nebraska will be a tested squad by the time the Big 12 Conference opener comes around on Jan. 10 at Iowa State.

"I can't imagine a lot of teams in the Big 12, especially with the loss of the experience that we had from last year, having a tougher schedule," Sadler said. "Not only are the teams we're playing very difficult, but the way it's been set up is difficult because you're playing back-to-back on the road. But that's the schedule and we have to go play it, so we'll do the best we can with it."

>>> At the Point

Point guard **Charles Richardson Jr.** could not have envisioned a better opportunity heading into his senior season.

With the addition of Sadler to the Husker bench, Richardson will have a chance to get back to the tempo of play that he grew up with on Chicago's west side, a style that helped him become one of the top point guards in the state while pushing the ball all over the court with high school teammates and future NBA Draft picks Shannon Brown and Dee Brown.

Running and gunning in a new up-tempo offensive attack and applying aggressive, smothering defensive pressure along every inch of the court is perfectly fine with Richardson. The 5-9, 165-pound speedster may lack some physical tools but he more than makes up for it in determination and heart, his trademarks that have been witnessed by the Big Red faithful over the years and helped make him a Devaney Center fan favorite.

The new offensive philosophy could reap great dividends for Richardson, who quietly became one of the top floor generals in the Big 12 Conference last season.

While leading the team to 19 victories – its most wins in nearly a decade – Richardson finished the year ranked 10th in the conference with 3.3 assists per game and became the first Husker in four seasons to reach triple-figure assists with 100 on the year. He was efficient at distributing the ball as his assist-to-turnover ratio (1.92:1) was rated fourth in Big 12, the third straight year he improved in the category.

Richardson will be a steady force for the Huskers as he has gained his team's trust during his time as a part-time starter over the past three years. He returns for his final year with the most collegiate playing experience of any Husker and looks to become the first Nebraska player in a half-decade to play in three postseason tournaments during his career.

Richardson has a chance to put his name in the record books this season after posting 220 assists heading into his final year with the Huskers. With an output similar to last season's performance, he can crack the NU career top 10. He needs 102 assists to tie Eric Piatkowski, who ranks 10th with 322 assists in his college career.

When Richardson is not on the court, the coaching staff has a handful of choices to guide the Husker offense.

After redshirting last season in the program, **Mike Smith** looked to transfer during the summer until Sadler took over and convinced Smith to return to Lincoln. The invite back to campus gave the Huskers solid depth at the point as Smith, who stands in at 6-2, 190 pounds, provides an impressive physical presence in the back court.

A native of the Bronx, N.Y., Smith has great athleticism to go with an explosive driving

ability, keys for penetrating guards that Sadler likes to utilize. Smith has also continued to work on his offensive game from 15 feet and out.

Adding more depth at the point will be another first-time contributor in **Jay-R Strowbridge**. The true freshman from Ardmore, Ala., was a late addition for the Huskers last spring after he originally signed with Murray State but chose to seek his release from the Racers program after a coaching change. Despite getting to know his third college head coach in one year, Strowbridge impressed his teammates in the summer and pre-season with his offensive abilities and ball-handling skills.

While Richardson should be the Huskers' primary ball-handler, Strowbridge looks to provide a different dimension at the point. Strowbridge possesses a nice outside shot to go with a knack for getting to the basket through traffic. Strowbridge averaged nearly 19 points and four assists per game as a senior last year, while leading his high school team to the state quarterfinals.

>>> In the Post

The Huskers will have few options to go big across the front line with only three players listed taller than 6-7 this fall. But that will not stop Nebraska from pounding the ball into the paint this season.

Center **Aleks Maric** is the Huskers' primary playmaker in the low post, giving NU hope that an inside game can thrive despite the lack of depth up front. The big Aussie has consistently improved his game and has gotten stronger late in the year as the stretch run through the conference season heats up. Nebraska needs Maric to continue that impressive play in 2006-07 if it is going to have a chance to return to the postseason.

Maric was a dominant force at times for Nebraska last year when he averaged 10.9 points and 8.1 rebounds per game. His 251 rebounds on the season were third-most by a sophomore in school history and ranked 11th on the Nebraska single-season list, making him the top returning rebounder in the conference.

Against Big 12 competition, Maric came up huge by leading the league in rebounding with 9.4 boards per contest, only the third Husker in the last decade to pace the

conference in rebounding. Many of those rebounds came on the offensive end where Maric converted them into easy points, helping him lead the team in scoring at 12.9 points per game during league action.

Over the last 10 games of the year, Maric topped the squad with 14.8 points and 9.1 rebounds per game while hitting a solid 53.1 percent (51-of-96) from the field. The first game of that stretch was a benchmark performance by the Australian as he set the Big 12 sophomore record with 37 points on the road at Iowa State. Maric hit 13-of-15 attempts from the floor and completed the dominant effort by adding 15 rebounds.

Maric's ability to get deep in the post comes easily behind his 6-11, 270-pound frame. One of the largest players in the conference, Maric has redefined his body in the offseason and is in top condition while getting ready for the fast-paced action of Sadler's offensive game plan.

Maric has used his size effectively as he has 13 career double-doubles, including 10 last season when he ranked third in the league behind only NBA first-rounders LaMarcus Aldridge and P.J. Tucker. During conference action, Maric led the league with seven double-doubles. Maric, Aldridge and Tucker were the only three players in the league to post more than two double-doubles over the 16-game conference schedule.

On the defensive end, Maric expanded his role and began to provide a significant shot-blocking presence. After posting eight blocks in non-conference play, Maric began forcing the action during the Big 12 slate when he had 23 blocks to rank seventh in the league standings. He is second among returning shot blockers this season in the conference.

Behind Maric, the Huskers will be inexperienced up front. The four players listed at forward on the roster have combined for just 184 minutes of playing time entering this season. While some pundits may look at that as a negative, the Huskers see it as an opportunity for someone to step up and play a significant role this season.

Possibly leading the way to fill that spot and gain valuable minutes for the Huskers this season is sophomore **Jim Ledso**. After redshirting as a freshman in 2004-05, the 6-9, 220-pounder saw action in 17 games for a total of 61 minutes last year. Ledso averaged less than one point per game but showed a knack in chasing down the loose ball with 1.2 rebounds per contest.

While Ledso may lack experience, he does not lack ability or work ethic. A self-proclaimed blue-collar worker, Ledso has worked hard to add nearly 30 pounds to his frame since joining the Husker program and has increased his vertical jump and explosive skills needed to provide Nebraska with another capable shot blocker. Ledso also has worked to become more consistent with his game near the basket and could give the Huskers another offensive option in the post.

Along with Ledso, sophomore **Kyle Marks** saw limited action last year and was

hopeful of competing for a starting spot in the front line. Marks may still crack the lineup this season, but his plans to push for early playing time were sidelined before official practices started because of an injury.

When healthy, Marks gives Nebraska tremendously athletic small forward long arms and outstanding leaping ability. He paced the Huskers in the weight room last year as a freshman and was rewarded by being named the team's lifter of the year.

Marks trained on the wing last season where he could utilize his long reach and significant jumping ability to alter shots. The lefty possesses a nice touch on the offensive end and has shown the ability to take good shots. He knocked down 50 percent (9-of-18) from the field last season while averaging one point per game. He also hit 5-of-7 from the free throw line and, when healthy, could give NU a perfect target when getting out on the fast break and opening up the offense.

A pair of newcomers will also push for playing time this season. Redshirt freshman **Chris Balham** and freshman **Kris Douse** give the Huskers athletic defenders up front, but each is still a raw product on the offensive end. Balham worked out with the Huskers last season and at 6-8, 225 pounds is a physical specimen who could provide needed minutes when the Huskers are in the middle of the bruising conference schedule. Douse possesses great ability but is still learning the game. He has played in the United States for only two years since moving from Toronto, Ontario.

>>> On the Wing

While the Huskers may be lacking experienced depth in the paint, there could be some serious battles taking place in practice on a daily basis among a quintet of Huskers looking to find playing time at shooting guard and on the wing.

Despite only playing for one season in the program, sophomore guard **Jamel White** will be the Huskers' top returnee on the wing despite missing the start of fall practice with an injury. When back on the court, the Brooklyn, N.Y., native should continue an impressive start to his career that began by posting 8.7 points and 1.9 assists per game as a freshman last year. Those numbers are a little deceiving as he played limited minutes for the Huskers until a breakout game against Missouri when he posted 28 points, the second-highest freshman single-game total in school history.

White's numbers increased rapidly after being inserted into the starting lineup as he averaged 10.1 points per game in conference play and ranked second on the team in scoring at 13.6 points per contest over the final 10 games of the year. White was the second Husker in as many years to earn Big 12 All-Freshman Team honors.

White gives Nebraska a multi-dimensional threat because he can penetrate the lane or knock down the 20-footer. His versatile game helped him move into the NU freshman record book in six categories last year, including points, scoring average, field goals, 3-pointers, assists and steals. His 44 3-pointers ranked second on the team and second in school history for a freshman.

Nebraska has a second veteran sharp-shooter who could provide leadership and scoring in guard **Marcus Perry**.

The former junior college All-American benefited from a redshirt year to post solid numbers last season. While knee problems limited his production early in the year, Perry came on strong down the stretch by hitting nearly 48 percent from 3-point range over the final 10 games. Perry was at his best in the Big 12 Championship, when he helped the Huskers by hitting 5-of-8 3-point attempts over the first two games to lead NU into the semifinals for only the second time in the Big 12 era.

The third returnee on the wing is the one with the fewest career minutes as **Paul Velander** has been plagued by injury since joining the Huskers in 2004. Following a redshirt year, Velander was poised to help the Huskers last season before having surgery on his ankle during the preseason, which forced him to miss nearly three-quarters of the Huskers' games. He was again sidelined this fall before the start of practice, but could give NU another lethal shooter from long range when healthy.

Newcomers **Ryan Anderson** and **Sek Henry** will try to fight their way into the lineup this fall and each has an impressive background.

Henry was the first addition to the roster by Coach Sadler, as he signed scholarship papers in August during the first week of classes. Henry was one of the nation's top 100 prospects as a senior in 2005 before spending a year at prep school where he guided his team to a 34-3 record last year. Henry is a big, lefty shooting guard who can knock down the mid-range shot and forces teams to extend the defense past the 3-point line.

Anderson was regarded as one of the top shooters on the West Coast as a senior last year at nationally renowned Rainier Beach High School in Seattle, Wash. Anderson guided his team to the playoffs four straight years and finished his career as a unanimous all-state selection by averaging 19 points, nine rebounds and seven assists per game.

2006-07 Season Notebook

>>> Sadler Takes Over Husker Program

Doc Sadler was named the 26th head coach in program history on Aug. 8, 2006, less than three weeks before the start of fall classes. Sadler replaced Barry Collier, who resigned on Aug. 2 to take the position of athletic director at his alma mater, Butler University.

Sadler took over the Husker staff after two years as head coach at Texas-El Paso, where he posted an impressive 48-18 record and two postseason appearances. Sadler's first team in 2005 won 27 games, a mark that tied for seventh in NCAA history for Division I wins by a first-year head coach. His 48 victories in Division I are the most in the first two years of a career by any current coach in the Big 12 Conference.

Sadler's teams will apply aggressive defensive pressure the full length of the court. Last season his team ranked 15th nationally in scoring defense as it allowed just 59.5 points per game. The previous year, Sadler's team got the job done on the offensive end with school records for points scored and assists while averaging nearly 75 points per game.

During his career, Sadler has been associated with 11 postseason teams in his 14 years in Division I and has coached or recruited 19 players who have gone on to play in the NBA. Coupled with versatile assistants who have head coaching and high Division I assistant coaching experience, the Husker staff boasts 31 former players who went on to play in the NBA.

Sadler got his start in coaching at Arkansas under Hall of Famer Eddie Sutton. Sadler has also been a Division I assistant for 12 seasons and spent five years as a junior college head coach in his native state of Arkansas, where he posted a 120-39 record.

>>> Testing the Water

Doc Sadler may have been the biggest addition to the Nebraska program this summer, but the largest returnee for the Huskers – literally and figuratively – this season was junior center Aleks Maric.

The 6-11, 270-pound Maric entered his name into the NBA Draft on April 28, 2006. After testing the waters, Maric withdrew his name before the deadline and, since he did not hire an agent, was able to return to the Huskers for the 2006-07 campaign.

Maric, however, wasn't initially convinced that he would return to Lincoln following Barry Collier's resignation as head coach in August. To help Maric make up his mind, Doc Sadler got on a plane to Australia less than 48 hours following his appointment as head coach and spent a few days with Maric and his family so they could get to know each other. The following week Maric announced he would return to Lincoln in time for the start of fall classes.

Maric was the first Husker underclassman to declare early for the draft since Tyronn Lue announced his decision to forgo his senior season in 1998. Lue remained in the draft and was a first-round selection of the Denver Nuggets. He is still in the NBA playing for the Atlanta Hawks, one of three former Huskers currently in the league.

Maric was one of eight underclassmen from the Big 12 Conference to declare early for the draft, a high for any conference. Six of the players remained in the draft, with Maric and Colorado's all-league guard Richard Roby being the only two to pull out. Of the six who stayed in the draft, four were selected in the first two rounds.

>>> Quick Hits

- Nebraska will have a young lineup for the second straight season in 2006-07. Last year's inexperienced squad posted 19 victories and gave NU its second postseason berth in three years. This season the Huskers hope to have a similar outcome despite entering the year with even less experience. When the Huskers open play, only two players – senior Charles Richardson Jr. and junior Aleks Maric – will have more than one season of Division I experience.

- After placing sixth in the league standings last year, the Huskers are looking for their first back-to-back upper-division finishes since 1998 and 1999. Those three years, including 2006, are the only seasons NU has finished in the top six in the league since the Big 12 was formed.

- Nebraska hopes to use the momentum gained at the end of last season to lift it to new heights in 2006-07. NU posted a pair of victories to reach the semifinals of the 2006 Big 12 Championship, the Huskers' best showing since winning the league title in 1994. It was only the third time in school history NU won more than one game at the postseason tournament.

- Nebraska has been strong on the glass the past three years, and with Aleks Maric returning in the paint, that success looks to continue this winter. Last year, the Huskers posted the eighth-best rebound total in school history with 1,277 boards for an average of 38.7 rpg. NU has ranked in the top four in the league in rebounding each of the past three seasons.

- NU has the players in place to challenge for one of the top spots in the Husker 3-point record book this winter.

Nebraska has posted at least 200 3-pointers as a team only three times in school history – all since 2000 – including hitting 221 treys last year to rank second all-time. Returning guards Jamel White, Marcus Perry, Paul Velandar and Charles Richardson Jr., along with newcomers Ryan Anderson and Sek Henry, will form an impressive long-range attack for the Huskers this season.

- Maric's 10 double-doubles last year tied for fifth in NU single-season history. With 13 career double-doubles, Maric enters the 2006-07 campaign ranked eighth on the NU career chart. Maric needs six to move into the top five and with another 10, he would move to third on the list. Venson Hamilton, the 1999 Big 12 Player of the Year, leads the list with 45 double-doubles, while Carl McPipe is second with 25 and Dave Hoppen third with 22.

- Maric has 420 rebounds entering the season and by posting the same total as he had last year (251), he would move into 10th on the Husker career rebounds chart. Maric is just 10 rebounds behind the total Hamilton had at the end of his sophomore season. Hamilton is the only player in NU history to post more than 1,000 career rebounds.

- Maric will also have a chance to move into the NU career top 10 for blocked shots in 2006-07. He owns 55 blocks entering the year and needs just 10 to take over sole possession of 10th place.

- By duplicating his rookie campaign, guard Jamel White will challenge for a spot on the Nebraska career top-10 chart for 3-pointers. White ranked second in the freshman record book with 44 treys last year and needs 59 to move into a tie for 10th place with Chris Cresswell.

- Nebraska has four new freshmen on the roster looking for playing time. Nebraska has had solid success with freshmen recently as at least one Husker rookie has been selected to the Big 12 All-Freshman Team each of the past two years. Last season, White earned the honor after moving into the NU freshman record book in six categories despite seeing limited playing time early in the season.



>>> Schedule Notes

- Nebraska will face six Big 12 Conference teams and at least four other squads that made postseason appearances last season. The games against 2006 postseason teams already on the schedule include: Creighton, at Rutgers, at Miami, Western Kentucky, Oklahoma State, at Oklahoma, Colorado, Texas, Kansas and Texas A&M. The Huskers also have possible matchups with 2006 postseason teams from Houston and UNC-Charlotte at the Outrigger Rainbow Classic during December. Overall, the Huskers play at least 12 contests against 2006 postseason teams.
- Nebraska makes its first trek to the Hawaiian Islands for a regular-season tournament since participating in the 1997 Rainbow Classic. The Huskers went 1-2 that season with a win over Virginia (80-65) and losses to host Hawaii (87-62) and Vanderbilt (80-69).
- Nebraska is one of four teams in the Rainbow Classic field to reach the 2006 postseason, joining UNC-Charlotte, Houston and in-state foe Creighton. A rematch with the Bluejays in Hawaii would mark the second time since 2004 that the teams played twice in one season.
- The Huskers will play 16 regular-season home games at the Bob Devaney Sports Center this year, down from a building record 19 games in 2005-06. Nebraska earned a 14-5 record at home last year, including a 4-4 conference mark, to improve to 356-114 in 30 years in the building.
- The Huskers will be seen on television at least 18 times during the season, including 15 of 16 Big 12 Conference games. For the first time in history, every conference road game for the Huskers will be televised. NU is in the second year of a contract with FSN Midwest and will also have at least eight games on the ESPN family of networks via the Big 12 Conference television package. The Huskers have averaged more than 12 televised contests (national, regional and local) each of the past five years.
- Nebraska takes on Kansas in a game televised on ESPN's Big Monday package, the Huskers' first on the show since Feb. 14, 2000. The NU-KU game will be the second nationally televised contest for the Huskers this season as the game at Oregon is slated for an FSN national telecast.



After winning 19 games last year, the Nebraska Cornhuskers have a young roster for the second straight season as they enter 2006-07 with only two players (point guard Charles Richardson Jr. and center Aleks Maric) with more than one year of Division I playing experience ... Nebraska will only have two seniors and one junior on its roster this season ... despite the Huskers' youth, Nebraska is looking for its third postseason appearance in four years, and first NCAA Tournament bid since 1998 ... Maric is the Huskers' top returning scorer (10.9 ppg, third on team last year), rebounder (8.1 rpg, first) and shot blocker (39 blocks, second) and looks to improve on his honorable-mention All-Big 12 finish last year ... Maric led the Big 12 in double-doubles during conference play (7) and was third overall with 10 double-doubles behind LaMarcus Aldridge (16) and P.J. Tucker (16), who as underclassmen were both selected in the 2006 NBA Draft ... Maric also missed the NU single-season top-10 list by one rebound, finishing 11th all-time with 251 last year ... sophomore guard Jamel White was a Big 12 All-Freshman Team selection last year as the team's fourth-leading scorer (8.7 ppg) and returns looking to move among the conference's elite shooting guards ... White was second on the team in 3-pointers (44) last year and second in the NU freshman record book ... Richardson returns for a second year as the team's starting point guard after posting nearly a 2:1 assist-to-turnover ratio (100:52) last year ... Richardson also ranked in the top 10 in the league for assists per game (3.33) last year.

Charles Richardson Jr. started his junior campaign later than the rest of the team as he was slowed by a preseason injury and missed the first three contests of the year. After returning to the rotation in the second week, he began a transition into the starting lineup, where he remained over the final 21 games of the season.

On the year, Richardson averaged a career-best 4.4 points and 2.6 rebounds per game while playing 776 minutes to rank fifth on the squad. On the defensive end, Richardson tied for the team lead with 34 steals and paced the squad by drawing 17 charging fouls.

As he looked to develop his offensive game throughout the season, Richardson steadied a young Husker attack by averaging 3.33 assists per contest to rank 10th in the Big 12 Conference. His assist:turnover ratio, which has improved every season at Nebraska, reached an all-time high at 1.92:1 to place fourth in the league standings. He was also the first Husker in four years to post triple-figure assists, as he dished out 100 assists against 52 turnovers.

During non-conference play, Richardson eased back into action following his early injury but finished non-conference play with 32 assists in 10 games. He came off the bench seven times, including every contest of an impressive three-game stretch when he posted 13 assists against just one turnover.

Richardson's top performance came in the middle game as he had an eight-assist, no-turnover contest against North Carolina A&T. It was his second consecutive solid all-around performance as he had six points, six rebounds and four assists against one turnover in the Huskers' previous victory two days before against Chicago State.

Richardson opened Big 12 Conference play with a bang as he posted a career effort against nationally ranked Oklahoma. Despite playing against two of the bigger guards in the conference, Richardson torched the No. 12 Sooners as he hit 4-of-6 field-goal attempts, including draining 3-of-5 from outside the arc, to score a career-best 15 points.

He completed the solid effort with three rebounds and four assists in the upset.

The Huskers trailed the Sooners by five points with 40 seconds left before Richardson hit his final 3-pointer to pull NU within two, 58-56, and set up the winning play. After OU turned the ball over on its next possession, Richardson ran the offense to perfection, getting the clock to under 10 seconds remaining before making the assist on a game-winning 3-pointer with five ticks left.

Richardson continued his solid play throughout conference action, including a seven-point game with seven assists and one turnover at Iowa State for the best road performance of his career. When he wasn't getting to the free throw line against the Cyclones -- he was 5-of-6 at the stripe -- Richardson was feeding the post and center Aleks Maric. Richardson's pin-point passing helped Maric post an NU and Big 12 Conference sophomore record 37 points on 13-of-15 shooting.

In the Big 12 Championship, Richardson struggled with his shot but still held the Huskers together, guiding Nebraska to two wins and a spot in the semifinals. He had a 5:1 assist:turnover ratio (15 to 3), and added 10 rebounds and three steals while helping NU equal its best league tourney showing during the Big 12 era.

In the tournament opener, Richardson posted his second straight solid rebounding game against Missouri. Richardson had a career-best seven rebounds in the regular-season finale against the Tigers and then turned around four days later to post six more boards. He also had 11 assists against just two turnovers in the final two games vs. MU.

>>> 2004-05 (Sophomore)

Richardson averaged 2.0 points, 1.7 rebounds and 2.1 assists per game as a sophomore while playing in 26 contests, including making two starts. He was third on the team with 54 assists despite playing just 15.0 minutes per game on the year. His assist:turnover ratio of 1.86:1 was also third on the team, as he had the second-fewest turnovers (29) of any player with a start.

Richardson was highly productive down the stretch, as he gained 3.9 points, 1.8 rebounds and 3.3 assists over the final nine contests of the season. During that period, Richardson averaged 20.8 minutes per game and hit an impressive 73.3 percent (11-of-15) from the floor, including 66.7 percent (4-of-6) from 3-point range. Before his stretch run, Richardson had hit just 6-of-30 field-goal attempts (20.0 percent) while draining just 3-of-17 3-point attempts (17.6 percent).

In his first start of the season against Missouri on the road, Richardson picked up a season-high seven assists against one turnover while collecting three boards and one steal in 20 minutes. Richardson's seven assists against the Tigers tied for the second-highest single-game total during the season by a Husker.

During the last seven games of the year, Richardson collected at least eight points three times, including a season-high 10 points in a victory over Colorado at home. Richardson hit 5-of-6 field-goal attempts against the Buffs and added three assists without a turnover and one steal in 18 minutes. His previous career high had been eight points on two occasions as a freshman.

In the final game of the season, Richardson gained his second start of the year and pitched in eight points, five assists against one turnover with one board and one steal in a season-high 30 minutes.

It was possibly the most complete game of his career although not unusual for him against the Tigers. In Nebraska's three games against Missouri including the postseason, Richardson gained 12 assists against just two turnovers while shooting 50.0 percent (5-of-10) from the floor and adding three steals.

>>> **2003-04 (Freshman)**

Richardson had a solid first season with the Huskers, as he played in all 31 contests, including 10 starts, while averaging 16.3 minutes per game. The Maywood, Ill., native averaged 2.2 points and 2.0 rebounds per game as a rookie while hitting 40.9 percent from the floor and 42.9 percent from 3-point range. The defensive whiz added 17 steals to rank fifth on the squad.

Richardson added a team-high 66 assists (2.2 apg) against just 36 turnovers for a 1.83:1 assist:turnover ratio, the best ratio of any Husker to play at least 25 games. He had 26 assists against 16 turnovers in Big 12 action while playing all 16 games, including five starts. Richardson had at least three assists in 12 games, including a career-best nine assists against Tennessee.

During a six-game stretch between Dec. 29 at Minnesota and Jan. 21 against Baylor, Richardson recorded 21 assists against zero turnovers, including no turnovers in his first 91 minutes of Big 12 action. He went more than 130 minutes during the stretch without a turnover.

Richardson had a season-high eight points against South Florida and Kansas. He added a solid 3-for-4 shooting day against Oklahoma in the Big 12 Tournament.

Richardson held his own when rebounding, adding 60 defensive boards and three offensive rebounds. He had at least three rebounds in 11 contests, including a then-career-high six boards at Missouri and at Oklahoma State.

Off the court, he was named to the Big 12 Commissioner's Fall Honor Roll in 2003.

>>> **Before Nebraska**

As a senior, Richardson was the top-ranked point guard in the state of Illinois as he led Proviso East to a 25-4 record and a top-25 regular-season national ranking under Coach Troy Jackson. On the court, he averaged 15 points, eight assists, six steals and five rebounds per game, as Proviso East finished the season ranked 12th in the state.

Richardson, who was one of the top defensive guards in Chicago, was an all-conference selection and nominated for All-America honors, earning honorable-mention accolades from FutureStars.com. Throughout his career, Richardson was paired with former Michigan State star and 2006 first-round NBA Draft pick Shannon Brown at Proviso East, who was the top high school shooting guard in 2002-03. The duo was also in the starting backcourt at Proviso East with Dee Brown in 2002, who was the Big Ten's top freshman in 2003 and led Illinois to the 2005 national title game.

As a junior, Richardson helped Proviso East to a 26-3 record in 2001-02 while reaching the sectional final. Richardson averaged 12 points, six steals, five assists and four rebounds.

Richardson started his prep career on solid ground, as he averaged more than 10 points, four assists and four steals his first two years of high school. As a sophomore, he helped the Pirates to a 25-4 mark.

Following his sophomore and junior seasons, Richardson played summer ball under Coach Larry Butler with the Illinois Warriors, an elite AAU team he helped to the 17-and-under national title in 2001.

A National Honor Society member off the court, Richardson carried a 3.8 grade-point average as an honor roll student.

The grandson of Dorothy and Thornton Callum, Charles is the son of Demetrius Callum and was born Oct. 12, 1984. Charles' mentor is Gene Mobley. Charles has two sisters, Takisha and Carolyn, and one brother, Dominique, and is majoring in English at Nebraska. Richardson chose the Huskers after receiving interest from Marquette, DePaul, Mississippi State and Southern Illinois.

Marcus Perry had a solid first season on the floor with the Huskers. He finished the year ranked fourth on the squad with 31 3-pointers and averaged 4.2 points per game while coming off the bench in 31-of-32 contests.

Perry missed the Chicago State contest when he was excused to be with his wife, who gave birth to their second daughter the day before. He returned to the squad for the next game two days later when he scored a career-high 13 points off the bench against North Carolina A&T. Perry hit three shots from the floor, including a pair of 3-pointers against the Aggies and nailed 5-of-6 attempts from the charity stripe to post his first career double-figure scoring game.

Perry had his only foray into the starting lineup against Missouri at home when he played a career-high 22 minutes. Perry struggled a little over the next three games, but then hit his stride down the stretch to help Nebraska reach the postseason for the second time in three years.

Over the final 11 games of the season, Perry hit 44.0 percent (22-of-50) from the field, including an impressive 47.5 percent (19-of-40) from 3-point range. Before his strong finish, Perry had hit just 12-of-46 (26.7 percent) from beyond the arc in his first 21 games.

Perry played a large role in Nebraska advancing to the semifinals at the Big 12 Championship. During the tournament, he hit 9-of-16 (56.3 percent) from the floor and 7-of-12 (58.3 percent) from 3-point range, including a perfect 3-for-3 effort from long range in Nebraska's second victory of the season over a nationally ranked Oklahoma squad. Perry finished with nine points against the Sooners and came back in the semifinals to play 21 minutes while adding 10 points and two steals against Kansas.

>>> 2004-05 (Junior)

Perry redshirted during his first season with the Huskers. He practiced with the team but did not play in any games.

>>> Before Nebraska

A first-team all-region and honorable-mention All-America selection in 2003-04, Perry ranked seventh nationally (NJCAA Division I) in scoring by averaging 25.4 points per game for Southern Union State Community College under Coach Ron Radford. He added 4.1 rebounds, 2.6 steals and 1.8 assists as a sophomore.

throw line. Southern Union State ranked 15th nationally as a team by hitting 38.1 percent from beyond the arc, while connecting on 69.7 percent from the charity stripe to rank 18th in the country.

Perry hit 107 3-pointers on the year while connecting on 39.5 percent from beyond the arc. He recorded at least six treys in a game six times.

Perry helped his 2003-04 Southern Union State CC squad to a 19-13 record and a tie for fourth place (9-7) in the 11-team Alabama Community College Conference. SUSCC ended the year by reaching the semifinals of the NJCAA Region XXII Tournament before falling to the eventual champion.

Perry recorded a season-high 46 points on 16-of-28 shooting from the floor, including 8-of-16 from 3-point range, against Wallace State-Hanceville. He scored at least 30 points nine times in 2003-04 and reached the 40-point plateau twice. His last 30-plus point effort came against Marion Military Institute when Perry poured in 37 points on 12-of-21 shooting, including 10 3-pointers.

In the classroom, Perry earned the Southern Union State CC academic award as he graduated with a 3.1 grade-point average.



Aleks Maric entered his name into the NBA Draft on April 28, becoming the first Husker underclassman to declare for the draft since Tyrone Lue in 1998. While Lue went on to be a first-round selection and is currently with the Atlanta Hawks, Maric withdrew his name and, since he did not hire an agent, returned to Nebraska for the 2006-07 season.

Maric went home this summer to try out for the Australian Senior National Team, the Boomers. After starting with 33 players, the team went through four rounds of tryout sessions before Maric was named to the 12-man team roster in June. In August he was removed from the team due to a shoulder injury before it went to the World Championships in Japan.

>>> 2005-06 (Sophomore)

Maric flourished as the season progressed, finishing the year as Nebraska's top rebounder and third-leading scorer while helping the Huskers to their first upper-division conference finish since 1998. Maric was a dominant force in the paint as he averaged 10.9 points per game while posting 8.1 rebounds per contest on the season. His rebounding total ranked third among all Big 12 players. With tremendous size and strength, Maric took advantage of his position in the lane to hit 47.7 percent from the floor while adding 38 assists, 39 blocked shots and 25 steals.

For the season, Maric's 251 rebounds were the third-highest total by a Nebraska sophomore in school history and ranked 11th on the Husker single-season chart. He missed making the top-10 list by one rebound, while moving his career total to 420 boards in two seasons.

With the strong rebounding performances – he had 12 double-figure rebounding games, including five straight in one stretch – Maric posted 10 double-doubles on the year, including a Big 12-leading seven in conference play. His 10 double-doubles tied the Husker sophomore record set previously by Venson Hamilton (who went on to become the 1999 Big 12 Player of the Year) and Carl McPhee.

Maric also ranked third in the Big 12 Conference in double-doubles, trailing only Texas' LaMarcus Aldridge and P.J. Tucker, who each finished with 16. Maric's seven double-doubles in conference-only games were a league high, two better than Tucker and three better than Aldridge. They were the only three Big 12 players with more than two double-doubles in league play.

Maric finished the conference season averaging a team-best 12.9 points and 9.4 rebounds

per game. His rebounding average was the best among all Big 12 players during conference play, making him only the third Husker during the Big 12 era to lead the conference in rebounding during league-only games.

Defensively Maric also picked up the pace in the conference season as he posted 23 of his blocked shots against Big 12 teams. He finished the league campaign ranked seventh in the conference-only standings. For the year, he moved into fifth on the Nebraska sophomore season chart.

Maric started the season on a strong note as he was selected to the all-tournament team at the season-opening John Thompson Basketball Challenge after leading Nebraska to a 3-0 record, including a win over Louisiana Tech in the final game. Maric played a career-high 38 minutes against the Bulldogs while posting a then-career high 22 points with 14 rebounds, his second double-double of the weekend. He hit 7-of-11 attempts from the floor and 8-of-12 from the charity stripe while pulling down six offensive boards and adding three assists.

Maric's effort in the last tournament game came against a Bulldog squad led by 2006 NBA second-round selection Paul Millsap, who finished the contest with eight points, 10 rebounds and six turnovers without an assist.

Maric turned in his third double-double in the first five games when he posted 15 points and 11 rebounds in a Husker victory over NCAA Tournament-bound Marquette. From there, he struggled a little over the next five games before heading home for a week at Christmas.

Following the break, it only took three games before he returned to form by posting 15 points and a career-high 17 rebounds on the road against Kansas State. While helping NU open league play with a 2-0 record for only the second time in the Big 12 era, Maric had 13 rebounds in the first period, just two off the NU single-half record set more than 30 years ago.

Maric went on to score double figure points in 11 of 16 conference games, including setting the Nebraska and Big 12 Conference sophomore record with a 37-point effort in a road victory at Iowa State. Maric hit 13-of-15 attempts from the field and 11-of-15 shots at the free throw line while posting 16 rebounds and four blocked shots. The 37 points were the fifth highest in school history and the most since Eric Piatkowski scored a school-record 42 points in 1994.

Maric scored 19 points and added eight rebounds with four assists (no turnovers) in a first-round victory over Missouri in the Big 12 Championship. It was Nebraska's first conference tourney win since 1998 and with a victory the following day over nationally ranked Oklahoma, the Huskers reached the Big 12 semifinals for the second time in school history.

The win also propelled NU into the postseason for the second time in three years. Nebraska fell in the first round of the NIT at Hofstra. Despite missing the previous two days of practice with an illness, Maric posted nine points, 12 rebounds and a career-high five blocked shots at Hofstra.

Maric returned to Australia immediately after the spring semester ended, just in time to participate in tryouts for the Australian U21 National Team, known as the Crocs. He easily made the roster and spent the majority of the summer traveling the world.

Young Men held in Argentina from Aug. 5-14. Overall, Maric saw action in 36 games during the summer, effectively giving him another season of preparation.

Maric guided the Crocs to the medal round with a 4-0 record. Australia struggled in the round and finished just outside of medal consideration in fourth place while posting a 6-2 record.

Maric averaged 10.6 points per game while hitting 50.9 percent from the floor. He also added a team-best 9.4 rebounds per game to rank second in the 11-team field. Maric trailed only Peter Ramos of Puerto Rico, who tallied 9.5 boards per game. The 7-3 Ramos was a 2004 Olympian for his native country and played in a reserve role for the Washington Wizards earlier that year.

>>> 2004-05 (Freshman)

Maric had an outstanding rookie campaign as he averaged 8.0 points with a team-high 6.3 rebounds per game. Maric played in 27 games and ranked third on the squad by hitting 47.9 percent from the field. He was also one of five Huskers to hit better than 70 percent (71.6) from the charity stripe.

Maric ranked 11th in the Big 12 Conference and was second among freshmen in rebounding. He finished with a team-high 5.4 boards per game to tie for 18th in conference-only games. Maric helped NU rank first in all games rebounding margin (+5.4) and second in rebounding average in all games (38.3).

The Aussie recorded a double-double in his first career game and went on to tie the NU freshman record with three double-doubles on the season. Maric picked up 12 points and 14 boards against Arkansas-Pine Bluff in the season opener and added 10 points and a season-high 15 boards in his first road game at UAB on national television.

Maric tied the record with 13 points and 12 boards in NU's biggest road victory of the year at NCAA Tournament-bound Iowa State. He had a double-double in the first half before foul trouble slowed him in the second frame.

In the previous game, Maric only had two boards but posted a season-high 15 points and three assists without a turnover in Nebraska's upset of No. 4 Oklahoma State. It was one of Maric's five double-figure scoring games in the Huskers' final eight games. Maric had posted six double-figure scoring games in NU's first 19 contests.

Maric missed NU's final non-conference game and played at less than 100 percent during the following two league games after a bout with the flu. He rounded back into form against Baylor when he hit 4-of-6 shots from the floor for 10 points while adding seven boards and a season-high three blocked shots. Maric finished the season with 16 blocks to rank eighth on the Nebraska freshman chart.

Over the final eight league games, Maric averaged 10.0 points and 5.9 rebounds while hitting an impressive 59.6 percent (31-of-52) from the field. He also hit 78.3 percent (18-of-23) at the free throw stripe.

Maric came to the United States in October 2003, and quickly made an impact. In one season of high school basketball at Burlington (N.J.) Life Center, Maric averaged 19 points and 12 rebounds per game for Coach Darryl Gladden.

Maric was quickly ranked among the top 70 prep players in the country by hoopscooponline.com. He was ranked No. 22 nationally among fifth-year players by the recruiting service, and was the No. 9 senior in the state by the recruiting web site NJHoops.com. Maric was listed No. 61 nationally by Bob Gibbons, and was the No. 8-ranked fifth-year player in the New York/New Jersey area and a four-star recruit by TheInsiders.com.

Maric played at the Australian Institute for Sport under Coach Marty Clarke before coming to the United States. AIS is a national development center for the country's elite athletes. At AIS, Maric averaged 10 points and 13 rebounds in 2002-03. He went on to help the Australian Under-20 National Team win the gold medal at the World Championships in Greece in 2003. Under the guidance of Coach Rob Beverage, Maric helped his New South Wales team to the silver and gold medals in his state the previous two years, respectively.

Maric also played competitive soccer for seven years before turning his talents to the hardwood.

Despite seeing limited action during the middle part of the season, Jamel White produced one of the best freshman campaigns in school history while making a splash in the Big 12 Conference in 2006.

A versatile athlete who can play either the point or shooting guard, White averaged double figures during the league schedule and earned Big 12 All-Freshman and All-Reserve Team accolades from the Associated Press. It was the second straight season a Husker earned all-freshman honors.

On the year, White averaged 8.7 points, 3.1 rebounds and 1.9 assists per game while helping the Huskers to their second postseason appearance in three years. White's scoring average improved greatly in conference action with 10.1 points per contest, one of four Huskers to average double figures against Big 12 teams.

With a solid touch outside the arc, White hit 44 3-pointers to tie for second place on the NU freshman chart. He was the second Husker freshman in two years to post at least 44 treys. Before 2005, only one former Husker – current NBA veteran Eric Piatkowski – had posted at least 40 3-pointers as a freshman.

While his efforts from 3-point range were valuable to the Huskers, White provided an electrifying all-around game that helped him move into the NU freshman top 10 in six categories. In addition to the 3-pointer list, White also ranked eighth on the freshman scoring chart (287 points), ninth in scoring average, steals (23) and field goals (87) and 10th in assists (65).

White began his career by earning all-tournament honors at the John Thompson Foundation Basketball Challenge by playing hard on both ends. He not only scored in double figures twice but took five charges that opening weekend and finished the season second on the team with 13 charges. White then scored double figures in just one of the next 16 games and saw his playing time diminish before a breakout contest against Missouri.

Against the Tigers on Jan.28, White came off the bench to produce the second-highest scoring game by a Husker freshman ever, as he poured in 28 points in 23 minutes to help NU snap a three-game losing streak and get back to .500 in the conference standings. White hit 7-of-9 attempts from the floor, including all four of his 3-point tries. The only NU freshman to score more points in a single game was current NBA veteran Tyronn Lue, who had 30 points in a game as a rookie in 1996.

White also nailed an impressive 10-of-11 from the charity stripe against the Tigers and finished the year second on the team by hitting 80.2 percent (69-of-86) at the line. He got to the free throw line at least 10 times in three games, and drained at least eight each time.

Over the final 11 games of the year, White was second on the team with 13.5 points per contest while hitting 39.5 percent from the field, including 38.1 percent behind the arc. He recorded nine double-figure scoring games in that stretch, including his second career 20-point contest with 22 points against nationally ranked Oklahoma to push NU to the semifinals of the Big 12 Conference Championship.


White was one of the top prep school guards in the country while playing for Laurinburg (N.C.) Institute, where he started at point guard during the team's 40-0 run on its way to a prep school national title. White averaged 14.0 points, 11.2 assists and 3.4 steals per game on a squad that had 14 Division I signees. White led the prep school ranks in assists per game, and was named the MVP of the 2005 National Prep School Invitational in Canada.

Before taking Laurinburg to the title, White averaged 20 points, seven rebounds and six assists per game at Grady High School. He was named first team All-PSAL and nominated for player of the year honors in New York City. White teamed with former Rutgers star and 2006 NBA first-round pick Quincy Douby to guide Grady to the PSAL semifinals in 2004.

White was ranked 91st in the country among breakdownmagazine.com's top 100, a national ranking that includes all classes. He was also ranked No. 33 among fifth-year players by hoopscooponline.com. White was the first commitment to the Huskers' 2005 class.

Jim Ledsome saw action in 17 games as a valuable frontcourt reserve for the Huskers in 2006. He averaged 1.2 rebounds per game and added nine points with four blocked shots on the season.

Ledsome also played a vital role in practice and the weight room, where he continually pushed the Husker forwards and centers to increase their athleticism and strength as he added 10 pounds to his frame.

Ledsome redshirted during his first season with the Huskers. He practiced with the team but did not play in any games.

Ledsome lettered three years at Severna Park High School under Coach Paul Pellicani, a veteran coach who has coached two NBA first-round selections (Sam Cassell and David Johnson). Ledsome helped the team to an 18-8 record and its first county boys title in school history. On the year, Severna Park was one of the state's top defensive teams by allowing just 42 points per game.

Ledsome pushed Severna Park to the regional finals where it lost in double overtime. He was also a force on defense when he recorded 11 rebounds in a 40-38 upset of powerhouse Glen Burnie in the county final. Ledsome added a game-high 19 rebounds with four blocks and nine points in the regional final loss.

One of the top players in program history, Ledsome finished third on the career rebounding chart at Severna Park. He also contributed 11 triple-doubles (points, rebounds, blocks) during his senior season.

For his efforts, Ledsome was selected first-team All-Anne Arundel County by the Washington Post, Baltimore Sun and Capital Gazette. He was also named the MVP of the Capital Gazette Senior All-Star Game following his senior season. During the club season, Ledsome played with Nova United and was coached by Randy White.

Kyle Marks provided valuable minutes as a reserve and played in 24 games during his rookie season. With his tremendous wingspan and athleticism, Marks added great depth on the wing and averaged 1.0 points and 0.9 rebounds per contest while hitting 50.0 percent (9-of-18) from the floor and 5-of-7 (71.4 percent) from the charity stripe. He also had three blocked shots and four steals.

Marks made an impression on his teammates and coaches with his work in the weight room during his first year in Lincoln as he was named the team's lifter of the year. Marks improved his squat max by 100 pounds and bench max by 40 pounds while adding 20 pounds of body weight and increasing his vertical jump by 1 1/2 inches.

Coaches

Ten minutes into the Aug. 8 press conference announcing the new Nebraska men's basketball coach, fans already had heard everything they needed to get excited for the upcoming season.

The new coach said he has passion. He also mentioned that he keeps life – and the game – simple. He pointed out that he doesn't wear a watch because there are 24 hours each and every day; that's enough time to get it done.

And his teams are going to be aggressive and play hard. All the time. Period.

That last part ignited a renewed optimism within the state that Kenneth "Doc" Sadler was the right man for the job at the right time.

"Someone asked me why I would come to Nebraska. It's pretty simple," Sadler said. "I've got a chance to coach at a place that has had 233 academic All-Americans. I've got a chance to coach at a place that has won 22 national championships.

"You don't win national championships because of great coaches. I truly believe this. Because you've had 233 academic All-Americans, you've got some high-character people. And you've got an athletic department and a university that cares about kids. You do not have that kind of success just because of wanting it. You've got a lot of people working for that to happen. Because you've got everybody working together, you've won 22 national championships.

"What more could a coach want than that? I can't think of anything else."



Looking back on Sadler's career, it's obvious why Athletic Director Steve Pederson tabbed him to be the 26th coach in program history.

He's a veteran Division I coach who has been associated with 11 postseason teams. Only three times at this level has a team with Sadler on the sideline not played in the postseason.

He has an all-star coaching heritage after starting in the business at his home state school, Arkansas, with Hall of Fame Coach Eddie Sutton. That puts him in the same coaching family under Mr. Iba, a legend.

On top of that, Sadler helped 19 players reach the pinnacle of their sport – the National Basketball Association. He personally recruited eight of those players.

"In Coach Sadler, we have a man who will bring character, determination, toughness and a winning attitude to the Husker basketball program," Pederson said at the press conference. "Not only is he an excellent coach and recruiter, but he is the kind of family man that you want leading your program. I can't wait for Nebraska fans to get to know Coach Sadler."

That didn't take long.

Sadler's upbeat and energetic presence has been felt around the state as he has focused on getting fans excited again about the Nebraska basketball program, their basketball program. During the first two days following his hiring press conference, Sadler made public appearances in Lincoln and Omaha while being seen and heard in nearly every media outlet throughout the state. Since then he has crisscrossed the state, meeting with fans young and old, while also reconnecting the program with former players and high school coaches throughout Nebraska.

"This is your basketball team," Sadler has repeated throughout Big Red nation. "It's not Doc Sadler's basketball team. This is the state of Nebraska's basketball team and if you can help us with a suggestion, my door is open all the time. It's your basketball team. I understand that and I'll do everything I can to help you be proud of what we're going to do. I'm ready to roll."

Sadler, 46, brings an engaging personality and hard-nosed basketball style to the Big 12 Conference. One of six new coaches in the league in 2006-07, Sadler took over the Husker program after two impressive seasons as head coach at Texas-El Paso, where he helped continue the long-standing tradition of success in Miners basketball.

Sadler's UTEP teams boasted 48 victories over the past two years and won 72.7 percent of their games since the start of the 2004-05 season. Including his first season with the Miners as an assistant coach, Sadler helped UTEP to 72 victories over the past three years, ranking the Miners 20th nationally in victories during that span.

A native of Greenwood, Ark., Sadler made one of the most successful Division I coaching debuts in college basketball history, as his 2004-05 Miners squad ran to an impressive 27-8 record and an NCAA Tournament berth. UTEP won a school-record 14 Western Athletic Conference (WAC) games and its first WAC Tournament title in 15 years to earn the league's automatic bid to the Big Dance.

The 27 wins were one off the UTEP school record and rank Sadler seventh in NCAA history for victories by a first-year Division I coach. Only five coaches have won more than 30 games in their first year in Division I, including Jamie Dixon, who was hired at Pittsburgh before the 2003-04 season by current Nebraska Executive Associate A.D. Marc Boehm.

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Q: What's been the biggest challenge coming in late in the summer?

A: "I think no question the recruiting. To get the players that you need to compete in the Big 12 Conference, you need to start on them in their sophomore and junior years. Getting started in August, that's probably the most challenging part of it."

Q: What will be the biggest strength for this coaching staff?

A: "The experience. You're talking about four guys who had high-level Division I assistant positions and some have even had head coaching experience. I'm a person who likes to have a lot of suggestions and input from my staff and I think that's something that we'll definitely get here."

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Q: What are your views on playing true freshmen?

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Q: How important is it to have such a nationally recognized support system behind the name Nebraska when you're recruiting?

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Q: What are your thoughts on Nebraska being a "football" school?

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Q: What would you want recruits to know about your practices?

A: "I don't know now at the start of the season what the final outcome will be, but I'll be more concerned where we end up with it. last two seasons was awarded a scholarship to a four-year institution, including eight Division I scholarships.

Honing his administrative and fundraising skills, Sadler oversaw a department that posted a 72.4 winning percentage across all sports under his guidance while he also spearheaded efforts to build a new basketball arena for the university.

Considered by many to be a tremendous tactician and strategist, Sadler is equally as impressive on the recruiting paths. Sadler has signed eight players who have gone on to play in the NBA, including Michael Batiste, Tony Battie, Cory Carr, Mark Davis, Darwin Ham, Eddie House, Maurice Jeffers and Jason Sasser.

Sadler has also coached 11 other players who reached the NBA -- Greg Anderson, Mario Bennett, Randy Brown, Isaac Burton, Byron Irvin, Joe Klein, Andrew Lang, Ron Riley, Alvin Robertson, Darrell Walker and Rickie Winslow. Overall, Sadler's total is an impressive number with 19 former pupils who reached the highest level of professional basketball.

Sadler has a passion for winning, but it is his ability to build relationships and then develop players both on and off the court that served him well during his 12 years as an assistant coach. Along with his NBA and all-conference picks, Sadler has seen his players succeed in the classroom, including 10 Miners on the 2005-06 team who earned at least a 3.0 grade-point average in the first semester.

Tony Benford



Tony Benford was the first assistant hired at Nebraska for the 2006-07 season by first-year men's basketball head coach Doc Sadler. Benford originally joined Sadler's staff at Texas-El Paso in July before following Sadler to Nebraska in August.

Benford was added to the Miners' staff after eight seasons on the Arizona State bench where he served as an assistant coach for his first six years in Tempe. Benford was then named associate head coach for his last two seasons with the Sun Devils.

During his time at Arizona State (1999 to 2006), Benford recruited and coached Pac-10 Players of the Year Ike Diogu (2005) and Eddie House (2000), and also brought in all-freshman team performer Jeff Pendergraph in 2006. Benford helped the Sun Devils to four postseason appearances during his tenure, including gaining a spot in the second round of the 2003 NCAA Tournament.

Before joining the ASU staff, Benford spent six seasons as an assistant coach at New Mexico (1993 to 1998). He helped New Mexico to five NCAA Tournament bids while winning 73.2 percent of its games (139-51 record). New Mexico picked up a pair of Western Athletic Conference tournament titles (1993 and 1996) and a regular-season championship (1994) with Benford on the sideline. During his stint with the Lobos, Benford coached the top four scorers in program history, including all-time leading scorer Kenny Thomas, who Benford recruited to New Mexico.

Benford started his career coaching youth teams, including spending four years at All Saints School in Lubbock, Texas, where he served as head coach of the junior high squad.

Sadler and Benford have a long-standing friendship that dates back to their time together at Texas Tech. Sadler served three years as an assistant coach for the Red Raiders, recruiting several players that helped TTU to a conference title and NCAA Tournament appearance in 1993. Benford returned to the Lubbock, Texas, school to complete his degree in 1992.

Benford finished his playing career at Tech in 1986 and during his playing days, he helped Texas Tech to two Southwest Conference Tournament titles (1985, 1986) and the SWC regular-season championship in 1985. He was an all-conference pick as a senior and was the league tournament most valuable player.

A native of Hobbs, N.M., Benford was a 1986 fourth-round NBA Draft selection by the Boston Celtics. He played professionally in Holland during the 1986-87 season.

As a prep all-star, Benford was a Converse All-American and the New Mexico Player of the Year after pouring in 27.5 points per game as a senior. He led Hobbs to the state title in his final season, earning MVP honors of the state championship tournament after posting 29 points in the title game.

Benford and his wife, Deborah, have two daughters, Audriana (17) and Milena (9) and one son, Tony Jr. (14). Benford also has a son, Jeremy (24).

Philip MATHIEWS

Assistant Coach • First Year

Philip Mathews



A veteran recruiter and technician with more than 20 years experience as a head coach, Philip Mathews joined the Husker men's basketball staff as an assistant coach for the 2006-07 season.

Mathews returns to the Division I level for the first time since serving a head coach at San Francisco for nine years. Mathews took over the Dons program in time for the 1995-96 season and won at least 16 games in each of his first three seasons. Among the early highlights was the 1998 campaign when his squad posted a 19-11 mark that led to San Francisco's first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1982.

Two years later, Mathews again led SFU to another 19-win season. Two of his last three squads posted winning overall records and all three finished in the top four in the West Coast Conference standings. He finished his career with a 139-123 record in nine seasons at San Francisco.

Like first-year Nebraska coach Doc Sadler, Mathews honed his coaching skills in the junior college ranks. Mathews compiled a combined 349-73 record in 12 years as head coach at the junior college level and his squads won a conference title 11 times during his tenure.

Mathews' first stint as head coach at the junior college level came at Ventura College, where he spent 10 seasons (1986-95) compiling a 298-56 record. His teams won 10 straight Western States Conference titles. Before his arrival, Ventura had not won a league championship in 17 seasons.

All but one of his teams earned at least 20 victories and six times – including each of his last five years in charge – his teams won at least 30 contests. During the 1995 campaign, Ventura went 37-1 and ranked second nationally while winning the second California state junior college title under Mathews. Eleven players recruited to Ventura for that season earned Division I scholarships.

The past two seasons, Mathews was the head coach at San Bernardino Valley College, where he helped the Wolverines to a 51-17 record. In his first season in 2005, San Bernardino went 27-5 and won the conference title with a 13-1 record. That first team saw every player move on to a four-year school with a scholarship.

Mathews entered the coaching ranks as an assistant at UC Irvine for the 1973 season. He spent the next year at the high school level before returning to Irvine for four years (1975-78). Mathews then returned as head coach at Santa Ana Valley High School, where he won two league titles in three years.

Following the 1981 campaign, Mathews returned to the college level where he was an assistant for four years at Cal State Fullerton (1982-85) before taking over the reins at Ventura College.

A two-year basketball letterwinner at UC Irvine, Mathews earned his bachelors degree in comparative cultures in 1972 and added a masters degree in education in 1975. Mathews is married to the former Margie Holland. He has four children, Sabrina (36), Akilah (29), Jordan (12) and Jonah (8).



Anwar rejoined Sadler's staff after serving the past two seasons under him at Texas-El Paso. During that time, Anwar served as the Miners' director of operations where he was responsible for the program's budget, scheduling and practice management as well as overseeing the administrative staff. Anwar also assisted with special projects and camps along with on-campus recruiting.

Before joining the UTEP program, Anwar served as an assistant coach at Arkansas-Fort Smith for four seasons, including the final three under Sadler. Anwar had on-court and practice responsibilities and also served as the recruiting coordinator.

Arkansas-Fort Smith earned a 101-29 record with Anwar on the bench, including a pair of top-seven national finishes in 2001 (fifth) and 2002 (seventh). The team won the Bi-State Conference East league title each of his three seasons under Sadler and produced numerous all-conference players on the court and in the classroom.

Anwar has helped several programs earn a successful record of academic success, including helping more than 20 players move on to four-year schools from Arkansas-Fort Smith.

Earlier in his career, Anwar helped more than 40 high school and prep players earn a spot on a Division I or II roster while serving as a coach at Lutheran Christian Academy (Pa.) two seasons and a year at Notre Dame Prep (Mass.).

A native of Philadelphia, Anwar earned a bachelor's degree in special education and sociology from Fitchburg State in 1998 and added a master's degree in sports management/sports leadership from Virginia Commonwealth in 2004.

Chris CROFT

Director of Basketball Operations • First Year

A veteran coach and administrator, Chris Croft was named the director of basketball operations at Nebraska in September 2006.

Croft came to Lincoln after spending the past season as a program specialist with Coach Doc Sadler at Texas-El Paso, where he assisted Sadler in a variety of capacities, including overseeing several administrative areas. As director of operations at Nebraska, Croft will administer the team's travel, budget, clinics, camps and will oversee day-to-day office operations. He will also be heavily involved with scheduling and the team's community involvement program.

In addition to his solid administrative credentials, Croft has an impressive basketball background as the 33-year-old has previously served stints as an assistant coach in the Big 12 and Pac-10 and has been a head coach at the NAIA level.

Following eight years as a Division I assistant coach, Croft was named head coach at Martin Methodist (Tenn.) College at the age of 30. Croft's first squad in 2003-04 won 22 games and grabbed the TranSouth Conference title – the first in school history – while also advancing to the NAIA national tournament. He was the first coach in league history to win a championship in his initial season as a head coach.

Croft broke into the coaching profession as an undergraduate student assistant at East Central (Miss.) CC in 1991-93. The Louisville, Miss., native then assisted M.K. Turk at Southern Mississippi as an undergraduate before being named an assistant coach at USM at age 22 in 1995. He served one year with the Golden Eagles until moving to the Big 12 under Coach Eddie Sutton at Oklahoma State before the 1996-97 season. In two seasons with the Cowboys, Croft helped OSU to a pair of postseason appearances, including reaching the second round of the 1998 NCAA Tournament. He then moved on to Maryland-Eastern Shore for one year before spending four seasons (1999-2000 to 2002-2003) at Washington State.

Croft earned his bachelor's degree in coaching and sports administration from Southern Miss in 1995 and received a master's degree in human performance in 1996. Croft is currently completing his doctoral degree in educational leadership and administration through the program at Texas-El Paso.



Jim SHAW

Video Coordinator • First Year

Jim Shaw serves as the Huskers' video coordinator after joining the Husker staff in September 2006. His duties include overseeing all aspects of the video operation including film exchange, filming workouts and games, breaking down film and organizing the video library. Shaw will also assist with camps and setting up player appearances in the community.

Shaw joined the Husker staff after serving as a program specialist at Texas-El Paso under new Nebraska coach Doc Sadler and former Miners' coach Billy Gillispie. Shaw handled all duties surrounding the Miners' video system over the past three years and was heavily involved with directing camps and clinics, including serving as director for the Doc Sadler Basketball Camps each of the past two years. He also has significant experience assisting with recruiting efforts and all areas of player development.

A native of San Antonio, Texas, Shaw is familiar with the Midwest after earning his undergraduate degree in economics at Grinnell (Iowa) College in 2003. He then added a master's degree in business administration from Texas-El Paso in 2005 while working with the Miners' program.

Shaw was a four-year letterwinner at Grinnell, helping the Pioneers to four straight Division III national scoring titles, including an all-division scoring record of 124.9 points per game in 2002-03. He led Grinnell to a league title as a sophomore and senior, and in 2001 paced the conference in 3-pointers made while pushing the Pioneers to the NCAA Tournament.



Eric COLBERT

Team Manager/Player Development • First Year

Eric Colbert joined the basketball program as a team manager/player development for the 2006-07 season. Colbert has administrative duties and serves the Huskers as a mentor for student-athletes, specifically assisting with their academic progress. He also has oversight of the student manager staff.

A 2001 graduate of Humboldt State University with a degree in English, Colbert spent the past three years working with Advanced Student Connection in Sacramento, Calif. He was a program facilitator with the non-profit organization, assisting with complete player development in the after-school program for high school athletes. Colbert assisted with off-season workouts and conditioning as well as monitoring student-athletes' academic progress through the counseling and tutoring programs. Colbert also coached at the center and helped organize and promote a yearly celebrity charity basketball game.

Colbert played basketball two seasons at Humboldt State University, lettering in 1998 and 2000. He previously played two years at Compton Community College in his hometown of Los Angeles. Colbert also competed on the basketball court as a prep at Verbum Dei High School, one of the strongest high school programs in the state.

Director of Ticket Operations

Holly Adam has served as director of ticket operations for the Nebraska Athletic Department since 2004. A native of Daykin, Neb., Adam joined the ticket office in 1995 and was promoted to assistant director in 1997. She served as the assistant director for eight years before being promoted to her current position.

Coordinator of Sports Nutrition

His current duties include body composition/frame analysis, nutrition education, weight gain/loss, meal planning, eating disorders, supplementation and counseling for all Husker athletes.

Harris returned to Nebraska after a brief stint at Arizona State University, where he served as a graduate assistant strength coach for football. In addition to his duties with the Sun Devil program, he was also the head nutritionist at Athletes' Performance, a training center for professional athletes in Tempe, Ariz., that provided training and nutrition services for athletes from the NFL, NBA, NHL and MLB.

Harris is from Los Angeles, Calif., and received his bachelor's degree from Nebraska in 2000, and became a Registered Dietitian in 2001 before receiving his master's degree in 2004.

Harris is married to the former Kim Ogee, an All-American softball player at Nebraska in 2002. The couple has a newborn daughter, Kamryn.



Brad Brown
Men's Basketball Trainer, ATC

Brad Brown began his association with the NU Athletic Department in 1997, serving as an assistant athletic trainer on the athletic medicine staff. He took over as the men's basketball trainer before the 2004-05 season. Brown also has served as head athletic trainer for the NU men's and women's track and field and cross country teams for seven years.

Brown joined the Husker staff after serving as the head trainer at Hastings College (1991-97), where he was also an adjunct professor. He was a student trainer at NU (1984-90) and served as the head trainer at Lincoln East High School (1990-91).

Butch Hug
Assistant A.D. for Events

Butch Hug joined the Nebraska staff in 1982 and has served as assistant athletic director for events since 2001. As NU's director of events, Hug schedules all events for NU athletic teams, as well as non-athletic events in athletic department facilities. He also oversees the staffing and staging of each event from parking and traffic control to ushers.

Hug's full-time staff of four event management specialists handles all events in Memorial Stadium, the Bob Devaney Sports Center, the NU Coliseum and Haymarket Park, including Husker athletic events and five Nebraska state high school championships. Among the largest event staffs in the country, Hug oversees the scheduling of more than 800 event staffers for approximately 280 events per year.

Hug was recognized for his outstanding contributions to the University as the recipient of the 1999 Carl A. Donaldson Award for Excellence in Management. He has also earned service awards from the Nebraska Coaches Association and Nebraska School Activities Association, and is a Hall of Fame member of the Husker Track Officials Association, where he is a master-level official.

A member of the International Association of Assembly Managers, Hug has previously worked as an administrative assistant at the Bob Devaney Sports Center and as assistant ticket manager. He came to Nebraska after serving as activities director at Nebraska Wesleyan (1976-82) and assistant to the athletic director and baseball coach at Midland College (1971-76).

A U.S. Army veteran, Hug received his bachelor's degree from Midland College in 1971 and a master's degree in physical education and administration from Nebraska-Omaha in 1974. He is married to the former Caroline Max, and they have two sons, Corey and Casey, and one granddaughter.

Harvey Perlman, J.D.

Chancellor

Harvey Perlman was named the 19th Chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln on April 1, 2001. He had served as Interim Chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln since July 16, 2000.

A former dean of the University of Nebraska College of Law (1983-1998), Perlman has also served as interim senior vice chancellor for academic affairs at UNL (1995-96).

Perlman, a Nebraska native, was raised in York, Neb., and earned a bachelor of arts degree in history and a juris doctorate from the University of Nebraska. During his law school years, he was editor in chief of the Nebraska Law Review and was elected to the Order of the Coif, a law honors society.

He joined the NU law faculty in 1967 after spending a year as a Bigelow Teaching Fellow at the University of Chicago Law School. He served on the Nebraska law faculty until 1974 when he joined the faculty at the University of Virginia Law School. He returned to Nebraska in 1983 when he accepted the deanship of the Nebraska Law

College, a post he held until 1998 when he returned to the professoriate. He has also served as a visiting professor at Florida State University College of Law, the University of Puget Sound School of Law and the University of Iowa College of Law.

His area of legal expertise lies in torts and intellectual property. He is a member of the Nebraska State and American Bar Associations. He is a member of the Council of the American Law Institute. He is a commissioner of the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws. He is co-author of 'Intellectual Property and Unfair Competition' (5th edition, 1998) and co-reporter for the 'Restatement of Unfair Competition' (1994). In February 2002, Perlman was named a Life Fellow of the American Bar Foundation. Fellow status denotes an individual who has demonstrated outstanding dedication to the welfare of his or her community and is committed to the highest principles of the legal profession. Only the top one-third of one percent of the legal profession is eligible for nomination as a Fellow.

At the University of Nebraska, he was chair of the search advisory committee for chancellor in 1991, chairs the Nebraska Bioethics Advisory Panel, and is a member of the Nebraska State Fair Board and the Bowl Championship Series Presidential Oversight Committee.

Perlman and his wife, Susan, an NU alumna, are the parents of two daughters. Anne, who earned degrees from UNL and the University of Nebraska Medical Center, practices medicine in Lincoln. Amie, who graduated from UNL in May 2002, attends law school at Nebraska. He and Susan enjoy the company of two grandchildren, Will and Ava.



Josephine Potuto, J.D.

Institutional Representative

Josephine (Jo) R. Potuto, the Richard H. Larson Professor of Constitutional Law, has been Nebraska's faculty representative to the NCAA and Big 12 Conference since May 15, 1997.

Potuto was appointed in January 2003 to hold one of the Big 12 Conference's three seats on the NCAA Division I Management Council, the chief administrative and legislative body of Division I. She is in her sixth year as a member of the Division I Committee on Infractions (COI) and her second as committee vice chair. The COI meets six times annually to conduct

hearings, make findings of culpability and impose sanctions on institutions for violations of NCAA bylaws. Potuto also serves on a committee of the Division I-A Athletic Directors Association that reviews NCAA legislation and tracks the NCAA governance structure.

Among her Big 12 Conference committee responsibilities, Potuto served on the Big 12 Conference Commissioner Search Committee and on the conference strategic planning committee. She is the conference liaison to the Faculty Athletics Representatives Association (FARA), where she also served as the Division I representative on the executive committee. In 2002, Potuto was named Outstanding Faculty Athletics Representative by the All-American Football Foundation.

Potuto is an expert on issues related to gender equity in collegiate sports. With regard to other current issues in sports, Potuto is a past adviser to the Uniform Law Commissioners Committee to draft a sports agent statute, and she also drafted rules governing search and seizure and hearings for the Nebraska Racing Commission.

At Nebraska, Potuto is an ex officio member of the academic senate's intercollegiate athletics committee and of the subcommittee to evaluate academic support services. She was vice chairwoman of the rules governance committee of Nebraska's NCAA site certification committee, and she chairs the athletic department's NCAA Legislation Committee.

Potuto was project director and a drafter of the Uniform Law Commissioners Sentencing and Corrections Act, as well as the drafter for the Nebraska Supreme Court Committee to Draft Criminal Jury Instructions. She is the author of three books and numerous articles.

Potuto teaches constitutional, procedural and criminal law as well as a course in sports law. She joined the Nebraska law faculty as an assistant professor in 1974 and was named to the Larson professorship in 1988. Potuto has been a visiting professor of law at the University of Arizona, Rutgers University, the Cardozo College of Law at New York's Yeshiva University, the University of Oregon, the University of North Carolina, and Seton Hall University. While on sabbatical during the 1983-84 academic year, Potuto was an assistant prosecutor in the Essex County (Newark, N.J.) prosecutor's office. She also spent five summers working in the prosecutor's office in Morris County, N.J.

Potuto earned her bachelor's degree in journalism at Rutgers' Douglass College and her master's degree in English literature at Seton Hall in 1971. She received her juris doctorate at the Rutgers Law College in 1974. She is a member of the bar of the U.S. Supreme Court, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit and the U.S. District Courts for Nebraska and New Jersey.





Steve Pederson

Athletic Director • Fourth Year • Nebraska, 1980

Tradition, Teamwork, Integrity. These are the core values of the Husker Nation and the principles of champions.

Steve Pederson was named his alma mater's 12th athletic director on Dec. 20, 2002, and quickly established these ideals as the driving force to guide Nebraska back to the pinnacle of collegiate athletics.

Pederson's first priority was improving Nebraska's facilities, an important step in providing the Huskers with another way to attract the best student-athletes in the country. In November of 2003, Pederson announced the Husker Nation Championship Drive, a \$50 million fund-raising project to support the creation of the Tom and Nancy Osborne Athletic Complex, which opened in 2006. The project includes the Hawks Championship Center and new outdoor practice fields that benefit each of NU's 23 varsity programs.

The final piece to the project was an expansion of Memorial Stadium that boosted capacity above 80,000 for the first time in the building's history. Nebraska continued its NCAA-record streak of sellouts, which was set to reach an amazing 282 straight games in the regular-season finale.

Pederson's vision has made the Osborne Athletic Complex the showcase piece of the project. The complex benefits all Nebraska student-athletes as it includes the finest training, sports nutrition and athletic medicine facilities in the nation in the Charles and Romona Myers Performance Center. The new football offices overlook the mammoth weight facility while the adjacent athletic medicine areas provide high-tech rehabilitation services, including a state-of-the-art hydro-therapy pool used by only a handful of colleges in the country.

The improvements in Nebraska's facilities was not only felt by student-athletes, as Pederson has ensured the Husker Nation a fan-friendly environment at Memorial Stadium. Improved fan amenities included increased numbers of concessions stands and restrooms, improved seating options for the disabled and a concourse-level connector that brings the North Stadium together with the East and West. Fans also enjoyed one of the nation's largest big screens during the Tunnel Walk, one of college football's most grand entrances.

The new facilities benefit some of the top athletic squads in the country. During the 2005-06 seasons, 15 of Nebraska's 23 varsity sports finished the year ranked in the national top 25.

The Huskers' nationally renowned volleyball team led the way, as it reached the NCAA title game for the fifth time in school history. The volleyball team's runner-up finish tied the rifle program for the best national team placing on the year, while the women's outdoor track and field (fourth) and women's gymnastics (fifth) teams each finished in the top five.

Individually, Nebraska student-athletes have flourished in recent years, including 37 Huskers earning 48 All-America certificates last season. Arturs Abolins won both the men's indoor and outdoor long jump national titles and Dace Ruskule won a title in the women's discus, while Kristina Fehlings (air rifle) rounded out the Huskers' trio of national champions. Christina Houghtelling (volleyball) and Lindsay Baker (bowling) were named national player of the year in their respective sports, and John Cook (volleyball) was

named the national coach of the year by his peers.

Pederson has pushed the Huskers to uphold their unparalleled tradition and remain at the forefront in the classroom as well as on the field.

Last year, 11 Cornhuskers earned CoSIDA Academic All-America honors, raising Nebraska's NCAA-leading total to 233, 59 more than the closest school. Over two semesters last year, 479 student-athletes earned Big 12 Commissioner's Honor Roll accolades with a 3.0 or better grade-point average, while 126 Huskers claimed academic All-Big 12 honors and 111 earned their degree.

Pederson is an award-winning athletic director with experience at four prominent Division I schools. A tireless worker with a contagious winning attitude, Pederson has implemented his vision for the future of Nebraska, which includes three vital components to success: a staff that will outwork the competition; enhancing facilities in order to attract the nation's best student-athletes; and a unified approach to enable student-athletes to succeed in all facets of life.

"Steve has worked hard to revitalize the tradition that has made Nebraska one of the best athletic programs in the country," said Mike Devaney, son of Hall of Fame Coach and Athletic Director Bob Devaney. "My dad felt that you had to have fun and enjoy what you are doing to be successful, and Steve has made it fun again. At the same time, he is not afraid to make tough decisions. I believe my dad would agree with Steve's vision of the future."

Nebraska's championship tradition has been built by outstanding student-athletes and coaches over the years, but Pederson believes the foundation of Nebraska's success is its fans – not only the 1.7 million people who call the state home, but also fans who support NU from around the nation.

Since December 2002, Pederson has worked hard to integrate Husker fans into the NU athletic program. He declared the 2003-04 season the "Year of the Fan" and conceptualized the first Husker Nation Tour, where football coaches, players and staff blanketed the state. The event was an instant success, and reached more than 35,000 fans across the state over three years.

Pederson developed the Husker Nation Pavilion for football fans to enjoy a family-friendly, fan-fest atmosphere before home football games. He also worked to keep football ticket prices down, as tickets increased just \$1.25 in his first two seasons at Nebraska and prices the last two years have risen at a much lower rate than most other Big 12 schools. He also made single-game football tickets available in an on-line pool, and in 2006, 1,000 new season ticket holders were added to the expanded North Stadium without a donation.

From creating the nation's first comprehensive strength program to its nationally renowned academic support system, Nebraska has always been at the forefront in providing unmatched resources for its student-athletes. Pederson is continuing that tradition as he has shown the foresight and vision needed to ensure long-term success for athletic programs, both at Pittsburgh and Nebraska.

Pederson's efforts have the interests of the student-athletes in mind. He has implemented support programs to aid student-athlete's academic, athletic, personal and

professional development. In order to assist student-athletes with their postgraduation pursuits, he worked with Assistant Athletic Director for Student Life Keith Zimmer to enhance Nebraska's nationally recognized Life Skills program. They created the Life Skills Award for the team that demonstrated the strongest commitment to all phases of the life skills program, including outreach, education and leadership.

According to Pederson, one crucial area in building an athletic department is to have coaches who not only possess strong leadership skills and the vision to run a program, but also the integrity to follow Big 12 and NCAA rules.

In January of 2004, Pederson hired Bill Callahan to guide the Husker football program back to elite status. Recognized nationally as one of the brightest minds in football, Callahan came from the NFL's Oakland Raiders, where he led the franchise to an AFC title and a berth in Super Bowl XXXVII in his first season as head coach.

Pederson's second coaching hire came on Aug. 8, 2006, when he tabbed Doc Sadler to guide the men's basketball program. In Sadler, Pederson found a new coach with an engaging personality and an ability to recruit and move players to the next level. Sadler was also a proven winner on the court with a sparkling two-year record of 48-18, including 27 wins in his debut season that rank seventh all-time in NCAA history.

A firm believer in the philosophy that hard work pays off, Pederson was given his first chance at leading a Division I program when he was hired as athletic director at the University of Pittsburgh in 1996. A young and relatively unknown commodity at the time, Pederson returned the Panthers to the national spotlight in just six years.

Pederson is credited with turning around the Pittsburgh athletic program. As a result of his hard work and effective leadership style, Pederson was named the recipient of the 2002 General Robert R. Neyland Athletic Director Award, annually presented by the All-American Football Foundation for outstanding administrative achievement.

Pederson helped construct several new facilities at Pittsburgh, including shaping the vision of the Petersen Events Center, a convocation center that provided Pittsburgh with one of the finest college basketball arenas in the country. Behind Pederson's efforts, the Panther football team was blessed with the Duratz Athletic Complex and the UPMC Sports Performance Complex, a practice venue that opened in 2000. In 2001, the Panthers debuted Heinz Field, a new facility the football team shares with the Steelers. Pederson also oversaw major upgrades to several Olympic sport facilities.

During his tenure at Pittsburgh, Pederson hired six coaches who combined to earn Big East Coach-of-the-Year honors in football, men's basketball, women's basketball, volleyball, baseball and track and field. Under Pederson's head coaching hires, the football team made three straight bowl appearances, including two victories, while the men's basketball team went on to gain back-to-back Sweet 16 berths.

In his first stint at Nebraska, Pederson helped negotiate the original football contract with adidas in 1995 and oversaw the recent completion of a new contract that will supply all Husker teams with adidas apparel through 2010.

If it seems that Pederson has a passion for the Huskers, he does. In fact, although Pederson lived outside the state for 13 years while gaining valuable experience at three major Division I institutions, Pederson's love of Nebraska has never wavered.

Pederson and his wife, Tami, both earned degrees from the University of Nebraska. Steve earned his bachelor's degree from Nebraska in business administration in 1980 and began his career at Nebraska, first as a sports information assistant (1980-81) and then as football recruiting coordinator (1982 to 1986). He returned as the associate athletic director for football operations from 1994 to 1996.

As the Husker associate athletic director for football, Pederson oversaw the refurbishment of the football administrative offices, and the construction of a new halftime meeting room, postgame interview room and players and coaches locker rooms. He reorganized the program's administrative wing and played a definitive role in Nebraska's three national championships in the 1990s (1994, 1995 and 1997) under Head Coach Tom Osborne.

Pederson left the state of Nebraska in 1988 to serve as Ohio State's recruiting coordinator until 1991, then moved on to the University of Tennessee to devote three years as the athletic administrator for football. In three seasons at UT, the Volunteers' recruiting classes were regarded among the nation's top three nationally by several publications. He was promoted from recruiting coordinator to assistant athletic director for recruiting in 1992, and then was elevated to associate athletic director for football operations in 1993.

Pederson has been active on several committees. He is currently the chairperson of the NCAA Football Issues Committee and serves on the Post-Season Bowl Licensing Sub-Committee, as well as the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame District Screening Committee. While at Pittsburgh, he served as the chairman of the Big East Conference Executive Committee.

A native of North Platte, Neb., Pederson spent one year as Ak-Sar-Ben's Public Relations Director (1981-82), and two years in private business in Nebraska (1986 to 1988), before returning to college football in 1988 at Ohio State.

Pederson and his wife Tami Osborne Pederson have three children: Mark (23), Kari (20) and Kristin (17).

Tami earned a bachelor's of music education degree and a master's of music degree from the University of Nebraska. She is a violinist with the Lincoln Symphony Orchestra and teaches violin at Nebraska Wesleyan University. She has performed with professional orchestras and string quartets in Nebraska, Ohio, Tennessee and Pennsylvania and has taught at Capital University and the University of Tennessee.

In 2004-05, Tami, along with Janelle Boehm and Lisa Miles, organized SHARE (Spouses of Husker Athletics Reaching and Embracing), which has done tremendous charitable work within the state. It has involved 30 spouses of Husker athletic department coaches and staff and six local organizations.



Marc Boehm
Executive Associate A.D.

Marc Boehm (pronounced BAME) was hired in May of 2003 to serve as Nebraska's Executive Associate Athletic Director. Boehm is the top assistant to the athletic director and fulfills the director's responsibilities in his absence.

Boehm serves as the department's COO and oversees the efforts of several areas within athletics, including marketing, media relations, athletic medicine, strength and conditioning, events and facilities. He provides guidance to HuskerVision and NU's Internet presence, Huskers.com, and assists on special projects, including television and radio contracts.

As primary administrator for the men's and women's basketball programs, Boehm has been driven to create a fan-friendly atmosphere at the Bob Devaney Sports Center. He has also worked tirelessly with Fox Sports Net and the Big 12 Conference to provide the men's team with its most extensive television package in program history. Boehm's efforts have led to an increase of more than 20 percent in attendance at women's games over the past three seasons. Under Boehm's guidance, the teams have combined for five postseason appearances in the past three years. The women's team advanced to the second round of the WNIT each of the past three seasons, while the men have reached postseason play twice during Boehm's tenure.

Boehm's efforts to enhance NU's gameday atmosphere were not restricted to the basketball programs. He was instrumental in conceptualizing and developing the Husker Nation Pavilion, which quickly became the premier pregame event around home football games. The area, which is free to the public, includes a video board, interactive games, autograph sessions with current and former athletes, professional music groups and vendors. It also serves as the location for the Husker Sports Network pregame show, giving fans a family-friendly venue.

Boehm also took the lead role in obtaining First National Bank as a premier sponsor for the Nebraska Athletic Department for nearly \$3 million over a three-year period. More recently, Ameritas joined First National Bank, ALLTEL, Pepsi and adidas as premier corporate sponsors for Husker athletics.

Boehm held the same position under Steve Pederson at Pittsburgh from 1997 to 2003. Boehm assisted in the rise of the Panthers' basketball program with the men's team posting back-to-back Sweet 16 appearances in the NCAA Tournament.

During construction of the Panthers' new athletic facilities, Boehm played a central role, including serving as principal planner for the football team's move into the UPMC Sports Performance Complex and Heinz Field. He also played a key role in various aspects of the Petersen Events Center, the new basketball arena.

Boehm served as interim athletic director at Pittsburgh for nearly five months before coming to Nebraska. During that time, he hired new men's (Jamie Dixon) and women's basketball (Agnus Berenato) and soccer (Sue-Moy Chin) head coaches for the Panther program. Under Dixon's direction, the Panthers have advanced to five straight NCAA Tournaments, while Berenato has rejuvenated the women's program, which recently set a school record for victories.

Joe Starkey of the Pittsburgh Tribune Review praised Boehm for the outstanding basketball hires, writing in a 2006 article, "Credit Marc Boehm with a key assist here. ... He was Pitt's interim athletic director after Steve Pederson left, and it was under his watch that Berenato and men's basketball coach Jamie Dixon were hired. That's a pretty good legacy."

Boehm spent five years as associate executive director of the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl, where he was instrumental in building community and marketing programs. Boehm directed and managed a 125-member fund-raising committee of Arizona business leaders that was responsible for generating more than \$4.5 million in cash and in-kind partnerships.

Before joining the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl staff, Boehm spent four years as associate executive director and public relations director of the Sun Bowl from 1987 to 1991. He went to the Sun Bowl after one year as a sports information intern at Florida.

Born in Grand Island, Boehm earned his bachelor's degree in communications from Kansas State University in 1984 and added a master's degree in sports management from St. Thomas (Fla.) University in 1985. Boehm and his wife, the former Janelle Broderick of Minot, N.D., have three boys, Broderick, Christian and Lukas John.

Husker-Jayhawk Notes

- The Huskers snapped a nine-game KU win streak with a win over the No. 12-ranked Jayhawks in 2004.
- The Huskers' 19-point victory over KU in Lincoln in 2004 was their largest against the Jayhawks since a 75-55 home win in 1982.
- Nebraska was handed its worst home loss in Devaney Center history when the Jayhawks won 81-51 in 2003.
- NU set a school record with 18 3-pointers in an 88-87 loss against No. 1 KU in 2002.
- Nebraska's regular-season sweep of Kansas in 1999 marked the Huskers' first sweep against the Jayhawks in 16 seasons, and NU's win at Lawrence was its first at Allen Fieldhouse in nearly two decades (since 1983).
- The teams combined for 39 points in overtime at Lawrence in 1996-97, only one point shy of the then-NCAA record.
- Nebraska handed Kansas its worst loss ever, 48-8, in the first-ever meeting between the schools on March 2, 1900. Kansas turned the trick on Nebraska in 1957-58, handing NU its worst loss ever, 102-46, in Lawrence.

Husker-Wildcat Notes

- Nebraska scored its most points ever against the Wildcats with a 99-82 victory in 2002. The point total marked just the second time NU had reached 90 points against KSU since 1968.
- Nebraska ended an 18-game road losing streak with a 63-61 victory over KSU in Manhattan in 2001. The road losing streak was the third-longest in NU history.
- NU's rally from an 18-point halftime deficit against KSU in 1996-97 was the largest since complete box scores have been included in NU record books (1972-73).
- After upsetting Kansas in 1958 at Lincoln, the Huskers upset Kansas State and Omaha native Bob Boozer in their next outing, 55-48. Despite the loss, Kansas State was No. 1 in the AP poll when the new ranking came out the day after the game and the 'Cats went on to finish fourth in the NCAA Tournament.
- Nebraska handed Kansas State a 36-point setback in the series' initial game at Manhattan in 1905-06.

 - Nebraska and OU combined for 230 points in a 133-97 Oklahoma victory at Norman during the 1986-87 season to tie the highest scoring contest in Big Eight history. Three NU-OU games in the 1990s saw each team post 100 points.

- Nebraska and OSU played the seventh overtime game in series history in 2004, with the No. 7-ranked Cowboys pulling out a four-point win at home, 87-83.
 - Nebraska owns the series lead despite winning just 10 of the past 30 meetings.
 - OSU has won eight of the last 14 meetings in Lincoln after going winless in its first 13 games at the Devaney Center.
 - Nebraska ended undefeated OSU seasons twice in the 1990s. In 1996-97, OSU was 11-0 before a 67-62 Husker win in Stillwater. In 1991-92, OSU entered the game in Lincoln with a 20-0 record and ranked second in the nation, but Nebraska rolled to an 85-69 win.
 - The Huskers dropped a 52-32 decision to the Cowboys in a 1949 NCAA District Playoff game at Kansas City, Mo. That game was NU's first-ever postseason tournament game.



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2005-06 Season Notes

The 2005-06 campaign was a successful one that included a trip to the semifinals of the Big 12 Conference Championship and Nebraska's second postseason berth in three years. With a 19-14 overall record on the season, the Huskers recorded their third straight winning regular-season campaign.

Heading into the season, the Huskers had just one double-figure scorer returning from the previous year. Seniors Jason Dourisseau and Wes Wilkinson, along with sophomore Aleks Maric, took advantage of the opportunity and stepped up to post double-figure scoring averages while leading NU to its first upper-division finish in the Big 12 standings since 1999.

Despite the youthful appearance, Nebraska accomplished several high points in the 2005-06 season, including:

- winning 19 games, the 12th-best total in the 111 years of Nebraska basketball
- earning its second postseason berth in three years and 20th in program history
- earning a No. 6 seed at the league tournament, its second-highest seeding since the formation of the league in 1996-97 and highest placement since earning the No. 6 seed in 1999 (The Huskers' highest seed was No. 4 in 1998)
- reaching the league tournament semifinals for only the second time since the formation of the Big 12 Conference in 1996
- winning two games at the league tournament for the first time since running the table in 1994 with a perfect 3-0 record to win their first league title
- sweeping two games from nationally ranked Oklahoma, marking the first time in 15 years that NU defeated OU twice in the same season
- picking up two wins over a ranked team (both vs. Oklahoma) while going 2-2 on the year vs. ranked teams
- grabbing six wins over teams that qualified for postseason play
- earning 20 marks in the NU individual record book and six in the team record book.

>>> Huskers Earn Honors

A trio of Huskers earned honors as selections to the coaches' and writers' all-conference teams and the AP specialty squad.

Wes Wilkinson and Aleks Maric led the way as they were each named honorable-mention All-Big 12 by a vote of the league's coaches, while Maric also earned honorable-mention accolades on the AP team. It was the first career honor for each.

Wilkinson was selected to the Big 12 All-Underrated team by the sportswriters that cover the league, while Maric was named to the All-Improved squad. Jamel White was also honored by the sportswriters, as he was named to the All-Freshman team and was selected to the All-Reserve squad as well. He was the second Husker in two years to earn all-fresh honors.

Freshman guard Marcus Walker also earned league honors during the season as he was named the Big 12 Conference Rookie of the Week on Dec. 27. Walker averaged 16.5 points and 5.5 assists while leading NU to victories over North Carolina A&T and Alabama A&M.

>>> Racking Up Wins

Nebraska won 19 games in 2005-06, the program's most since winning 20 in 1999. The 19 wins tied for 12th in the Husker record book, as only 11 squads in the first 110 years of the program won 20 or more games.

With 17 wins during the regular season, it was the Huskers' third straight campaign with a winning regular-season record. The seven wins in Big 12 Conference play were the most since 1999, while the sixth-place finish (and No. 6 seed in the league tourney) was NU's first upper-division finish since 1999.

>>> Tourney Run Ends in Semis

After coming up just short in a pair of games during the final week of the regular season – NU lost the two contests by a combined three points – the Huskers locked into an attacking mode in the first two games in the league tourney.

The result was a pair of wins with victories over Missouri, 71-64, and No. 22/19 Oklahoma, 69-63, that propelled Nebraska into the tournament semifinals for the first time since 1999 and only the second time in the Big 12 era. Nebraska then fell in the semis to eventual tournament champion Kansas.

Nebraska's two wins were its most in a conference tournament since winning the Big Eight title with a 3-0 record in 1994. In fact, the two victories equalled Nebraska's total wins

in the league championship since the formation of the Big 12 Conference.

It was only the third time since the league formed a postseason tourney to crown the league champion in 1977 that Nebraska won more than one game, joining the 1991 and 1994 teams. Overall it was wins No. 13 and 14 all-time for Nebraska in league tourney play.

>>> Nebraska Earns 20th Postseason Bid

Nebraska's strong run to the semifinals at the Big 12 Championship in Dallas helped solidify a bid in the postseason as the Huskers were selected to compete in the National Invitation Tournament (NIT). It was the second time in three years the Huskers reached the postseason NIT and it marked their 14th all-time berth in the tourney, which the Huskers won in 1996. Nebraska has also had six NCAA Tournament appearances.

The Huskers headed East to take on a tough Hofstra squad, which had a 24-6 record including the most wins by any team not in the NCAA Tournament field. The Pride, who defeated Final Four participant and Colonial Athletic Association foe George Mason twice in the final two weeks before postseason play, earned a 73-62 victory to knock the Huskers out of the first round of the NIT. Hofstra then advanced to the quarterfinals before losing to another CAA foe, Old Dominion.

>>> Maric Excels in Sophomore Campaign

Center Aleks Maric was dominant at times during his sophomore campaign and finished 2005-06 third on the team in scoring at 10.9 points per contest, including a team-high 12.9 points per game in Big 12 Conference play. Maric set the NU sophomore single-game scoring record with 37 points on the road against Iowa State, a total that ranked fifth in Husker single-game history.

While he impressed opposing coaches with this improved scoring prowess, Maric continued to dominate the glass. The 6-11, 265-pounder, who set the NU freshman rebounding mark a year earlier, posted a team-best 251 rebounds in 2005-06. It ranked 11th on the NU single-season chart and was the third-highest sophomore total in school history, trailing only school career rebound leader Venson Hamilton's 259 boards as a sophomore.

Maric bettered Hamilton's freshman rebounding mark by eight and finished his sophomore season trailing Hamilton – the only player in NU history to produce 1,000 career rebounds – by just 10 boards.

Maric ranked third in the conference in rebounding at 8.1 boards per contest. During league-only games, Maric led all Big 12 performers with a solid 9.4 rebounds per contest, becoming only the third Husker to lead the conference in rebounding for Big 12-only games.

Maric also posted 39 blocked shots on the year to rank among the league's top 10, including 23 blocks in conference action. With 55 career blocks, he ended the 2005-06 season just nine blocks out of the Nebraska career top 10.

>>> Charting the Huskers

There was steady movement up the Husker individual single-season and class charts late in the season, as well as moves on the Nebraska team lists. Among the most notable movers and shakers were:

- Senior Wes Wilkinson's team-best 62 3-pointers tied for ninth in NU single-season history while also ranking fourth on the senior class list.

- In a unique combination, Wilkinson also posted 61 blocked shots to rank third in the conference and move into 10th on the NU single-season list. The total was also fourth on the senior class list.

- Nebraska blocked 130 shots on the season, a total that ranked 10th in the single-season record book.

- The Huskers hit 221 3-pointers on the season, a total that ranked second in school history. It was only the third time since the inception of the 3-point line a Husker squad has had more than 200 treys. The record of 267 3-pointers was set in 2002.

>>> Scorching the Net

Center Aleks Maric etched his name into the Nebraska record book with a dominating performance at Iowa State. The Sydney, Australia, native scored a career-high 37 points with 16 rebounds and four blocked shots.

Maric's point total was the fifth-highest in school single-game history and tied for the third-most by a Big 12 player during the regular season. It was the most points by a Husker since Eric Piatkowski set the school record with 42 points in the 1994 Big Eight Tournament against Oklahoma and the first 30-point performance by a Husker since Tyrone Lue had 31 against Colorado in 1998.

The total was also the most points ever scored by a Husker in a regular-season true road contest and set the NU sophomore single-game record, which previously was 33 points shared by Fred Hare in 1964 and Jerry Fort in 1974.

Maric scored 18 points in the first half and came back with 19 points and eight more rebounds in 16 minutes in the second period. Maric finished the game hitting 13-of-15

attempts from the field and 11-of-15 from the charity stripe. In his previous three games, Maric combined to hit 16-of-42 field-goal attempts and 7-of-11 from the line.

>>> Wilkinson's Block Party

Senior forward Wes Wilkinson grabbed 61 of Nebraska's 130 blocked shots on the season, including a career-best six blocks against Creighton. His total helped the squad rank 10th in the NU single-season team record book.

Wilkinson ended his career ranked seventh on the NU blocks chart with 113. He finished fifth on the Nebraska senior class list and became the seventh player in NU history to record 100 career rejections when he picked up three blocks against Colorado in Lincoln.

Wilkinson picked up enough blocks to move onto the NU single-season top-10 chart in 10th place.

>>> Rankings Game

Following a loss to No. 17/18 Kansas in the semifinals of the Big 12 Championship, Nebraska finished the 2005-06 campaign with a 2-2 record against ranked teams.

The Huskers opened conference play with a 59-58 victory over then-No. 12/13 Oklahoma in the Devaney Center and followed with a loss at No. 6/7 Texas on Feb. 11. In the Big 12 Championship quarterfinals, Nebraska upset Oklahoma again, as the then-No. 22/19 Sooners fell to NU 69-63.

The wins over the Sooners marked the second time in three years the Huskers had two victories over ranked squads in the same season. The last time NU had more than two wins over ranked teams in one year was 1998-99 when NU won four games against ranked squads.

Nebraska has won at least one game against a ranked team each of the past six seasons. Dating back to the 2004-05 season, the Huskers have won three of their last five games vs. ranked teams, including knocking off No. 4 Oklahoma State at home in 2005.

Nebraska has 27 victories over ranked teams – including seven wins over top-10 teams – in the past 15 years. Two of the wins over top 10 teams were on the road, including at ISU in 1997 and over No. 3 Missouri, 98-91, in Kansas City as NU ran to its first-ever Big Eight Conference Tournament title in 1994.




The Grand Island, Neb., native led the Huskers and ranked among the league leaders in 3-pointers (62) and

Bob Devaney Sports Center

Named after longtime athletic director and football coach Bob Devaney, the Bob Devaney Sports Center is home to the Nebraska men's and women's basketball, gymnastics, women's swimming and diving, track and field and wrestling teams.

The Bob Devaney Sports Center received extensive renovations in 2000, featuring two HuskerVision replay screens, hustle stat boards and digital message boards. The new sound system, lighting system and ring of honor add to the atmosphere in the arena, as does the addition of chairback seating on the arena floor.

Also in 2000, fans at the Devaney Center saw the addition of a Husker Hall of Fame and a Husker Walk of Fame. The displays in the concourse areas highlight more than 100 years of Nebraska athletics and more than 25 years of women's athletics at the university. In 2004, courtside seating was put in place, giving the Devaney Center an added homecourt advantage with fans closer to the action.

With a capacity of 13,595, the Devaney Center has hosted numerous NCAA postseason events since opening its doors in 1976. The Husker men's basketball team has enjoyed playing on the Devaney Center court, as NU has an all-time record of 356-114 at home. Nebraska has posted less than eight home victories just once (1976-77) in the 30-year history of the Devaney Center.

The Husker men's basketball team has seen recent renovations to the team's locker room and ready room, as well as in the coaches' offices. Renovations in the locker room in 2002 included an expanded area for dressing and team meetings, a new entryway and an audio/visual center for watching game film. In 2004, the court was refinished,

and was redesigned for just the third time ever, giving it a more classic look. In the fall of 2006, the coaches offices and reception area also underwent a significant renovation.

The Devaney Center boasts a top-notch weight room in the facility, making strength training a useful tool before or after practice. The weight room is part of three weight rooms available to NU student-athletes, as the HuskerPower program is the model of excellence in strength training for schools around the nation.

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The History of Nebraska Basketball

As near as anyone can determine, the University of Nebraska was first represented by a men's basketball team on Feb. 2, 1897, just six years after Dr. James A. Naismith set down the rules of the game at the International YMCA Training School in Springfield, Mass.

A team from the Lincoln YMCA was the opponent, and Nebraska posted an 11-8 victory at Grant Memorial Hall, the home of the Huskers for all but two seasons until the Coliseum opened in 1926. The same teams played in Grant Hall three weeks later with a similar result, as NU won 23-14. Nebraska had to rally in the second game. The *Hesperian*, a student newspaper, reported: "At the end of the first half the score stood 9 to 6 in favor of the visitors but during the second half our boys took a brace and some excellent work was done."

Such was the modest beginning of a program that has enjoyed its greatest success over the last 25 seasons when it has earned a 439-352 record and 17 postseason appearances – including five NCAA Tournaments – while adding a Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament title in 1994 and the 1996 National Invitation Tournament championship title.

Nebraska doubled its schedule in 1898, losing twice to the Lincoln YMCA and splitting two games with the Omaha YMCA. A 16-12 loss against the Omaha YMCA provided evidence as to why Nebraska finished 1-3 that season. According to *The Hesperian* account: "The great difficulty of the University team was mere recklessness. Our boys have been playing with a loose interpretation of the rules. The officials were strict and of course the resulting advantage was in favor of Omaha." Then as now, overly aggressive play had its drawbacks.

Nebraska played teams from other universities for the first time in 1899, winning two games against Nebraska Wesleyan and one against Doane en route to the unofficial state championship. The next season, Nebraska played an out-of-state opponent for the first time, defeating the University of Kansas, 48-8, at Lincoln. That game still ranks as the worst loss for a Jayhawk team and was the first for either school against a present-day NCAA Division I school and the first matching present-day Big 12 Conference institutions.

The Kansas team was coached by Dr. Naismith. The Nebraska student yearbook, *Sombrero*, wrote: "A closely contested game was looked for. The Jayhawkers were, however, completely outclassed, the score being 48-8." Based on the victory against Kansas and four other similarly decisive victories, "the basketball team for this year was undoubtedly superior to any in the west," the *Sombrero* concluded. It would be several years before such a claim could be made again.

Nebraska hired its first full-time coach in 1911, E.O. "Jumbo" Stiehm, who scored 24 points against Nebraska as a Wisconsin basketball player in 1908, coached both football and basketball. His first Husker basketball team won 14 of 15 games, its only loss coming at Minnesota, 40-15. The student newspaper, *The Daily Nebraskan*, blamed the loss on Nebraska's inability to adjust to the Gophers' "100-foot floor."

A *Daily Nebraskan* account of Nebraska's 29-28 season-ending victory against Kansas at Lincoln in 1912 provides evidence that some fans' behavior hasn't changed much over the years.

"The game as a whole was entirely unsatisfactory, being marred by rough tactics of the visitors, incompetent work on the part of the referee and interruptions by the audience, which were in part justifiable."

Nebraska shared the Missouri Valley Conference championship with Kansas in 1912 and 1914 and

won the title outright in 1913 under Stiehm's leadership. The 1913-14 team was "so fast it took a movie camera to catch 'em," according to the Cornhusker student yearbook. It was described as a "point-a-minute" team, which wasn't quite accurate. Typically, games lasted 40 minutes (though that wasn't always the case), and Nebraska averaged 30 points per game. Guard Sam Carrier became Nebraska's first All-America basketball player in 1913. He and Carl Underwood led the Huskers to 17 victories in 19 games. Underwood was the Missouri Valley Conference scoring leader with 66 points in 10 conference games.

Nebraska won another conference title outright in 1916, after Sam Waugh replaced Stiehm as the Cornhuskers' coach for one season. Stiehm, who coached the first game of the season before giving way to Waugh, had planned to remain at Nebraska through the basketball season before leaving to become coach and athletic director at Wisconsin. But the Nebraska Athletic Board decided to replace him.

Waugh was succeeded by E.J. "Doc" Stewart, whose three Cornhusker teams had a combined record of 29-23. Nebraska was 22-2 in 1919-20 and 11-3 in 1920-21 under Coach P.J. Schissler. After the 1919-20 season, Schissler challenged the University of Chicago to a game, but to no avail. The Cornhuskers also were invited to a postseason AAU tournament in Atlanta but didn't go.

Schissler's teams played as independents. Nebraska lost its affiliation with the Missouri Valley Conference because of a decision to play a football game against Oklahoma in Omaha in 1919. Conference rules prohibited such games (Oklahoma had not yet joined the Missouri Valley Conference). Nebraska returned to the Missouri Valley Conference in 1921, and Owen Frank replaced Schissler as basketball coach. The remainder of the Roaring 1920s was, for the most part, undistinguished.

Basketball was rough and tumble. There was a center jump after every basket and no requirement to cross mid-court in 10 seconds or less. The ball was a lot different, too, more like a medicine ball, which contributed to some dull games.

The most significant event during the 1920s was the building of the Coliseum, which was dedicated on Feb. 6, 1926. The Cornhuskers dropped a 25-14 decision to Kansas in the first game at their new home, which was built at a cost of \$445,000 and seated 8,000 for basketball. Prior to that, Nebraska played most of its home games in Grant Hall, which seated about a fourth as many fans as the Coliseum and was located just to the north of where the Sheldon Art Gallery now stands.

Athletic Director Fred Leuhning arranged for Nebraska to play its home basketball games at the State Fairgrounds Coliseum in 1921, in order to accommodate more spectators. The Cornhuskers played two seasons at the Fairgrounds Coliseum, which had a wider court than Grant Hall.

The first game there was played on Jan. 14, 1921. Nebraska defeated conference opponent Grinnell 31-10 before an audience of 1,500, according to newspaper estimates. After two seasons, the Cornhuskers returned to Grant Hall, which had been remodeled, and continued to play home games there until the NU Coliseum opened.

Nebraska ended the decade with an 11-5 season under Charles T. Black, a former Kansas All-American in 1928-29. In the next 19 seasons, the Huskers had just two winning records, back-to-back campaigns under Coach W.H. Browne in 1935-36 and 1936-37. The 1937 team tied Kansas for the Big Six championship, after finishing second to the

Jayhawks in 1936.

The 1930s produced four more Cornhusker All-Americans: center Don Maclay in 1931, guard Steve Hokuf in 1933, guard George Wahlquist in 1936 and guard Robert Parsons in 1937. Maclay was the Big Six scoring leader in 1930, scoring 112 points in 10 league games.

Harry Good was hired as head coach in 1946 and after two losing seasons, turned Nebraska's fortunes around. In 1948-49, Good's Huskers went 16-10, tied Oklahoma for the Big Seven regular-season championship and defeated the Sooners, 57-56, in a conference playoff to qualify for an NCAA

playoff game. The NCAA Tournament was structured differently then, and the Cornhuskers needed to win that playoff to advance into the NCAA field. They lost to Oklahoma A&M, the Missouri Valley Conference champion, 52-35, at Kansas City, Mo. Coach Henry P. Iba's Aggies went on to finish second to Kentucky, coached by Adolph Rupp, in the NCAA Tournament.

In 1949-50, Nebraska again won 16 games and shared the Big Seven crown with Kansas and Kansas State. That marks the last time the conference had a three-way tie at the top. "We were King in our day," Claude Retherford once told a newspaper reporter. "They were firing football coaches left and right, but we packed 'em in. Oh, people were interested in football, but basketball was THE game on the Nebraska campus when we played." Retherford earned All-Big Seven recognition in 1949 after leading the conference in scoring with a 12.4 points-per-game average.

The Cornhuskers had another first-team All-Big Seven performer in 1949, Milton "Bus" Whitehead. The 6-10 center from Scottsbluff, Neb., also earned all-conference honors in 1950, when he averaged a then-school-record 15.7 points per game. Whitehead was named to the District V All-America team by Collier's Magazine. Whitehead also was the first Cornhusker selected to play in the East-West All-Star Game in New York City's Madison Square Garden. When he graduated, Whitehead held nine school scoring records.

Nebraska basketball experienced another drought beginning in 1950-51, with 15 consecutive losing seasons. Despite playing for a team that finished last in the Big Seven in 1952, Husker guard Jim Buchanan earned All-America and all-conference honors. And even though the late Jerry Bush, dubbed the "Big Bear of the Coliseum," never produced a winning team in his nine seasons as head coach at Nebraska, his colorful personality and uncanny ability to fashion upsets kept Cornhusker fans entertained.

The most dramatic upset during Bush's tenure as coach came on Feb. 22, 1958, against Kansas. The Jayhawks featured 7-foot center Wilt Chamberlain and were ranked fourth in the nation when they came to Lincoln. Earlier in the season, the Jayhawks had defeated the Huskers, 102-46, at Lawrence, Kan., with Chamberlain matching Nebraska by scoring 46 points. Nebraska scored a 43-41 victory in the rematch, when 5-9 guard Jim Kubacki hit a 15-foot jump shot with two seconds remaining.

But that's only part of the drama. Kubacki, a senior from Toledo, Ohio, spent all but the final 6:53 of the game sitting on the bench in street clothes, forced there by a knee injury and the kind of fate from which legends are built. When the Cornhuskers' captain, Gary Reimers, left the game with leg cramps, Kubacki convinced Bush to let him suit up. Four minutes and seven seconds later, Kubacki went into the game. Two minutes and 44 seconds after that, he hit the winning shot.

Bush also had the distinction of coaching the school's first 1,000-point scorer, guard Herschell Turner, who came from Indianapolis, Ind., where he was rated the second-best

high school player in the state as a senior, behind only crosstown-rival Oscar Robertson. Turner earned All-America honors in 1959 and followed with All-Big Eight honors in 1960 and ended his Cornhusker career with 1,056 points.

Following the 1962-63 season, Bush was replaced as head coach by Joe Cipriano, who brought the nickname "Slippery Joe" and up-tempo basketball to the Coliseum. His teams pressed full-court and ran a fast-break offense, which led the Big Eight in scoring average in 1966, 1967 and 1968.

Cipriano's first two teams had a combined record of 17-33. But his third team, in 1965-66, was one of the most successful in school history, finishing 20-5 and second to Kansas in the Big Eight. All-Big Eight guard Grant Simmons, the first Cornhusker to earn academic All-Big Eight honors, was the team's leader.

The 1966-67 team finished 16-9 and made the school's first appearance in the 16-team National Invitation Tournament, played at New York City's Madison Square Garden. Guard Stu Lantz was a two-time All-Big Eight pick and led the Cornhuskers in scoring and rebounding in both 1966-67 and 1967-68.

Guard Marvin Stewart and center Chuck Jura earned All-Big Eight honors for Cipriano in 1971 and 1972, respectively. Guard Jerry Fort, who finished his career with a then-school-record 1,882 points, was the first Nebraska player chosen first-team all-conference three times, from 1974 through 1976. With Fort's leadership, Nebraska began a string of 14 winning seasons.

In the fall of 1976, Cornhusker basketball moved out of the Coliseum and into the state-of-the-art Bob Devaney Sports Center. Located on the State Fairgrounds, the \$13 million athletic complex was financed by a special cigarette tax.

Cipriano coached Nebraska to another 20-victory season in 1977-78. The Cornhuskers, led by All-Big Eight guard Brian Banks, finished with a 22-8 record and advanced to the second round of the NIT. Despite failing health – a battle against cancer that he finally lost – Cipriano shared coaching duties with his assistant, Moe Iba, in 1979-80, and took

Nebraska to the NIT again. For their efforts, the duo shared United Press International Big Eight Coach-of-the-Year honors.

Cipriano brought Nebraska into the modern era, coaching 17 seasons and 450 games. His record was 253-197, and those 253 victories represent nearly one-fifth of Nebraska's all-time total. Following Cipriano's death, Iba was named head coach, and he continued Cipriano's winning ways. In Iba's six seasons on the bench, Nebraska was 106-71 and advanced to postseason play four times.

Center Andre Smith was the 1981 Big Eight MVP and twice earned All-Big Eight honors. However, it was the late Jack Moore, a 5-10 playmaker from Muncie, Ind., who captured the hearts of Nebraska fans from 1980 through 1982. Moore earned All-Big Eight honors in 1982, when he won the Naismith Award, given annually to the nation's top player under 6-feet tall. The first three-time academic All-Big Eight pick in Nebraska history, Moore scored 1,204 points and hit .901 from the free throw line during his career.

The cornerstone of Iba's teams from 1983 through 1986 was Omaha, Neb., native Dave Hoppen, a three-time All-Big Eight center and the first Nebraska basketball player to have his jersey number (42) retired by the school. In 1982-83, Hoppen's freshman season, the Cornhuskers were 22-10 and won three games in the NIT before losing to DePaul in the semifinals at Madison Square Garden. The Cornhuskers returned to the NIT each of the next two seasons, advancing to the second round both times.

Hoppen's college career, though, was ended by a knee injury he sustained in a game at Colorado on Feb. 1, 1986. He finished as the school's all-time scoring leader with 2,167 points and broke or tied 19 school records during his four-year stay. After Hoppen's injury, Iba's team regrouped and went on to earn the school's first-ever "official" NCAA Tournament berth. Nebraska lost to Western Kentucky in the first round of the Southeast Regional, 67-59. Following the game, Iba announced his resignation.

On March 27, 1986, Danny Nee was officially introduced as Nebraska's 24th basketball coach. During a news conference to announce his hiring, Nee said a "new era" in Cornhusker basketball was beginning.

Nee's 14 teams appeared in postseason play 11 times and topped the 20-victory mark in seven seasons. In his first season, Nebraska was 21-12 and finished third in the NIT.

After a 13-18 record in his second season, the Cornhuskers got back over the .500 mark with a 17-16 record in 1988-89 and advanced to the second round of the NIT.

>>>Nebraska won the 1996 NIT title at Madison Square Garden. It was the third time since 1980 that the Huskers reached at least the NIT semifinals.

Nebraska missed the school single-season record for losses by one in 1989-90 (10-18), then won a school-record 26 games, with only eight losses, in 1990-91. The Cornhuskers reached the Big Eight Tournament championship game for the first time and advanced to the NCAA Tournament, losing to Xavier 89-84 in the first round of the regionals at Minneapolis, Minn.

The 1990-91 team included two first-round NBA draft picks, senior Rich King and redshirt freshman Eric Piatkowski. The 7-2 King was the tallest player in Cornhusker history.

Piatkowski, Nebraska's sixth-man in 1990-91, went on to win first-team all-conference honors twice. He ranks second on the Cornhuskers' career-scoring list with 1,934 points, and he is the only Nebraska player to finish with at least 1,900 points, 600 rebounds (669) and 300 assists (322). In 2006, Piatkowski became the third Husker, joining Hoppen and Stu Lantz (No. 22), to have his jersey number (52) retired.

Three more NCAA Tournament appearances followed the record-shattering 1991 season. In 1992-93, the Huskers registered their highest league finish under Nee by tying for second in the Big Eight.

In addition to reaching the NCAA Tournament for a fourth consecutive season and recording back-to-back 20-victory seasons for the first time in school history, Nee's 1993-94 team made history by winning the school's first Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament title. The Cornhuskers defeated Oklahoma, Missouri and Oklahoma State, in that order, to earn the tournament championship.

Nebraska's NCAA Tournament run ended at four in 1994-95, but the Huskers kept their postseason streak alive with an NIT berth, advancing to the second round. The 1995-96 team struggled down the stretch but was back in the NIT and capped its season with a run to the tournament title.

The Huskers won two games on the road and scored more than 80 points in four of their five postseason games. They finished with a 60-56 victory against St. Joseph's at Madison Square Garden.

"The NIT run was incredible when you look at the teams we beat and how we beat them," Nee said after the remarkable run. "I don't care what anybody says, it was domination."

The 1996 NIT championship team was one of the most talented in school history. Two future NBA players, Erick Strickland and 1998 first-round draft pick Tyronn Lue, were in the backcourt. And two other players on the team scored 1,000 career points, Jaron Boone and freshman Venson Hamilton, who would finish his career in 1999 as the school's all-time leading rebounder and shot-blocker.

Lue's contributions as a freshman to the NIT championship team were only a preview

of what was to come. The lightning-quick, 6-0 point guard finished his career as the seventh-leading scorer in school history, and he ranked in the top 10 in 12 other career categories. His leadership carried the 1996-97 Cornhusker team, the first to play in the Big 12, to another NIT appearance.

Behind a late-season run, which included Nebraska's longest conference winning streak in 20 years, Nee's 12th team finished fourth in the Big 12 and returned to the NCAA Tournament. The bid was the Cornhuskers' fifth during the 1990s and extended the school-record postseason run to eight.

The streak reached nine in 1999, as the Cornhuskers just missed an NCAA Tournament bid and advanced to the second round of the NIT. In the process, NU reached the 20-victory mark for a second consecutive season, and Hamilton was named Big 12 Player of the Year.

The optimism that preceded the 1999-2000 season, Nee's last, quickly faded with the loss of guard Cookie Belcher, who was sidelined by a wrist injury and forced to take a medical redshirt. The Cornhuskers were off-balance almost from the beginning of the season and fell far short of expectations.

Even though Nee became the winningest coach in school history in 1999-2000, getting victory No. 254 to pass Joe Cipriano in the Cornhuskers' final home game against Colorado, his final team finished with an 11-19 record. The 19 losses tied for the most in school history.

With then-Director of Athletics Bill Byrne setting his sites on bringing NU basketball back to national prominence, he hired Barry Collier as the Cornhuskers' new coach on April 5, 2000.

In Collier's first season with the Huskers, Nebraska finished with a 14-16 mark as Belcher returned to the lineup and earned second-team All-Big 12 Conference honors while finishing third in NCAA history for career steals with 353.

The following season, Nebraska collected just 13 wins but set a solid foundation for the future. The Huskers set a school record for 3-point field goals and had the second-fewest turnovers in school history, both of which ranked in the national top 10. Cary Cochran led the nation at the free-throw line by hitting at a 92.1-percent clip.

The Huskers hit a bump in the road in 2002-03, as Nebraska went just 11-19 but started to make major gains the following season when Nebraska ran to an 18-13 record and its first postseason bid in five years. Nebraska won its first two games in the 2004 NIT, including an exhilarating 71-70 road victory over in-state foe Creighton in the opening round. After a home-court victory over Niagara, the Huskers' season came to an end three days later in a valiant effort at Hawaii when NU came back from 17 points down at halftime to tie the game before the first media timeout of the second period.

Brian Conklin, a 6-11 forward, led Nebraska's charge against Hawaii and, for that matter,

all season long as he was a lethal threat from long range. Like every Collier-led team, the Huskers were strong shooters from outside the arc, where Conklin hit a school- and Big 12-record 55.9 percent (66-of-118) from 3-point range, including a gaudy 66 percent in league-only games.

Nebraska struggled the following season but an influx of young talent helped the Huskers remain at .500 with a 14-14 overall record. Freshman guard Joe McCray led the way as he set an NU freshman scoring record with 15.5 points per game and drained a Big Conference freshman record 80 3-pointers on the year. He was only the second Husker ever to record at least 80 treys in a season and crushed the former school freshman record of 44 set by Piatkowski more than a decade before.

Along with McCray, 6-11 center Aleks Maric made an immediate impact as he broke the NU freshman rebounds record and ranked in the rookie top 10 for blocked shots. Maric – the first Australian to ever play basketball for the Huskers – was a force in the paint as he tied the school freshman record for double-doubles.

The Huskers made their second postseason appearance in three years in 2006 before finishing with a 19-14 record. It was the most wins under Collier and the first time his Huskers won a game at the Big 12 Championship. Another talented freshman aided Nebraska's cause as Jamel White led Nebraska to the semifinals of the conference tourney for the first time since winning the Big Eight Tournament title in 1994.

Collier looked to have a solid base in place for 2006-07 before abruptly resigning in early August to take the position of athletic director at his alma mater, Butler University, ending his career at Nebraska with an 89-91 overall record.

The late opening posed little challenge for Athletic Director Steve Pederson, who said, "As an administration, we believe that Nebraska can be a consistent NCAA team and play with the top teams in this conference on a consistent basis. It is going to take a lot of work and a leader that has a focused belief that Nebraska can be great."

A week later, on Aug. 8, 2006, Pederson introduced Kenneth 'Doc' Sadler as the 26th head coach in program history.

"Someone asked me why I would come to Nebraska. It's pretty simple. I've got a chance to coach at a place that has had 233 academic All-Americans. I've got a chance to coach at a place that has won 22 national championships," Sadler said. "Now you don't win national championships because of great coaches. I truly believe this. Because you've had 233 academic All-Americans, you've got some high-character people. And you've always got an athletic department and a university that cares about kids.

"You do not have that kind of success just because of wanting it. You've got a lot of people working for that to happen. Because you've got everybody working together, you've won 22 national championships. What more could a coach want than that? I can't think of anything else."

>>> Jack Moore Award

For the second straight season and only the fourth time since the award's inception, two players – seniors Jason Dourisseau and Wes Wilkinson – shared the Jack Moore Award as the most outstanding player for the Nebraska men's basketball team in 2006.

Dourisseau became just the fifth Husker to earn the honor from his teammates twice, as he was also co-MVP as a junior. A 6-6 guard, Dourisseau finished the 2006 season averaging 11.3 points and 7.3 rebounds with three double-doubles. His rebound total ranked among the top 10 in the Big 12 Conference and was 16th in NU single-season history.

Wilkinson led the team with 11.9 points while adding 6.2 rebounds per game. He paced the Huskers with 61 blocked shots to rank 10th on the Nebraska single-season chart while his team-best 62 3-pointers ranked ninth on the single-season chart. He finished his career ranked in the Husker top 10 for blocks and 3-pointers.

The award is named for late-Husker guard Jack Moore, a 5-9 playmaker who set 17 school records in a career that ended in 1982. Moore's career culminated with the 1982 Francis Pomeroy-Naismith Award as the nation's best collegiate player under six feet tall. A consensus All-Big Eight performer in 1982, Moore was killed in a plane crash in March of 1984.

Nebraska's 1,000-Point Scorers

>>> 1. Dave Hoppen – 2,167 Points

6-11, 235, C, 1983-86, Omaha, Neb. (Benson)

Three-time All-Big Eight center Dave Hoppen finished his career as Nebraska's all-time leading scorer with 2,167 points. Hoppen, whose four-year collegiate career was cut short by a knee injury in a game at Colorado, Feb. 1, 1986, broke or tied 19 Nebraska records and five Big Eight marks during his standout career. A native of Omaha, Neb., Hoppen was the first player in Husker basketball history to have his jersey number (42) retired. Originally drafted by the NBA's Atlanta Hawks in the third round of the 1986 draft, he played with both Charlotte and Philadelphia, and a stint in the CBA. Hoppen was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1996.

6-7, 215, F, 1991-94, Rapid City, S.D. (Stevens)

One of only two players in school history to play on four-straight NCAA Tournament teams, Eric Piatkowski finished his career as the second-leading scorer in school history with 1,934 points. The Most Valuable Player in the 1994 Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament, Piatkowski had a school and tournament-record 42-point outburst in Nebraska's first-round victory over Oklahoma. A two-time first-team All-Big Eight pick, Piatkowski averaged 21.5 points in his final season as a Husker, and became the first player in school history to score 1,900 points (1,934), grab 600 rebounds (669) and dish out 300 assists (322). A first-round draft pick of the NBA's Indianapolis Pacers, Piatkowski's draft rights were then traded to the Los Angeles Clippers, who he played with for eight seasons before joining the Houston Rockets during the summer of 2003. He was traded to the Chicago Bulls in the summer of 2004 and signed with the Phoenix Suns in 2006. Piatkowski's jersey No. 52 was retired by the Huskers in 2006, the same year he was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame.

The first Husker basketball player to earn All-Big Eight honors for three-straight seasons, Jerry Fort finished his career with 1,882 points – a record that stood for nine seasons, until Dave Hoppen broke it, Dec. 15, 1985. Fort was a third-round draft pick of the Boston Celtics following his senior season. He scored a then-school-record 40 points against Missouri as a junior. Fort was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1991.

Andre Smith closed his brilliant four-year career in 1980-81 when he led the Big Eight Conference in scoring with a 19.5 average in league games only. Smith was named the conference's player of the year for his efforts – the last Husker to earn that honor until Venson Hamilton in 1999. Smith was also a two-time all-conference selection. He scored 1,717 points and grabbed 753 rebounds during his Husker career and was chosen in the seventh round of the 1981 NBA Draft by the Cleveland Cavaliers. He was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1994.

Jaron Boone played in 127 games and started 102 to rank third and fourth, respectively, in school history. Boone became the 17th player in school history to reach 1,000 points, but just the fifth to do so before completing his junior season. Boone earned second-team All-Big Eight honors as a junior and helped Nebraska to the NIT championship his senior year. Boone's 559 points in his junior season is the seventh-highest single-season output in school history. Boone scored at least 20 points 18 times in his career and ranks among the school leaders in 3-point shots made (third, 181) and attempted (fourth, 501), assists (third, 446) and minutes (fourth, 3,624).



6-3, 210, G, 1993-96, Bellevue, Neb. (West)

One of two 1,000-point scorers on the 1995-96 team, Erick Strickland finished his career with 1,586 points. Strickland was a second-team all-conference selection as a senior when he led the team in scoring (14.7) and was named the MVP of the NIT. Strickland played in 127 career games, tied for third in school history, and started 84. His 516 points during his senior season rank 12th in school single-season history. A three-time member of the Big Eight All-Defensive Team, he is second in steals at NU with 257. Strickland ranks fourth in 3-point field goals made (179), third in 3-point field goal attempts (512) and fifth in assists (414). He spent nine years in the NBA, including four with the Dallas Mavericks and two with the Milwaukee Bucks. Overall, he played with seven teams.

6-0, 175, G, 1996-98, Mexico, Mo. (Raytown)

Tyronn Lue became one of the few Huskers to eclipse the 1,000-point mark by early in his junior season. He finished his career with 1,577 points before turning pro a year early. Lue was a first-round NBA draft pick of the Denver Nuggets before being traded on draft night to the Los Angeles Lakers where he won a pair of NBA titles. He also played for the Washington Wizards, Orlando Magic and Houston Rockets, and is now the Atlanta Hawks. Lue ranks in the top 10 in 13 Husker career categories, including assists (fourth, 432), 3-pointers (seventh, 145), games started (seventh, 96) and steals (sixth, 154). Lue started 96 of 99 games in his Husker career and led NU to three straight postseason appearances, including an NCAA berth in 1998.

6-4, 205, G, 1997-2001, Mexico, Mo. (Mexico)

During the 1999 season, Cookie Belcher became the 21st player in school history to join the Huskers' 1,000-point club. With another stellar campaign in 2001, he moved into the Huskers' all-time top 10, finishing his career with 1,552 points. He was just the eighth player in NU history to reach 1,000 points before the start of his senior season. Belcher made a strong mark on the Husker record books in other areas. He owns the Nebraska game, season and career records for steals and finished his career ranked third in NCAA history with 353 steals. He also ranks in the top 10 on NU's career 3-point (sixth, 146) and assist lists (second, 477) and owns the school records for most career starts (129) and games played (131). He has enjoyed a successful professional career in Europe for five years.

The tallest player in Nebraska history at 7-2, Rich King finished his career with 1,475 points and then-school records for blocked shots (183) and games played (124). King had a big hand in the Huskers' record-breaking 26-8 campaign in 1990-91, as he led the team in scoring (15.5 ppg) and rebounding (8.1 rpg) en route to honorable-mention All-America honors from both AP and UPI. A first-round draft pick of the Seattle SuperSonics in the 1991 NBA Draft, King tied Jerry Fort's then-school single-game scoring record with a 40-point outburst against Northern Illinois, Feb. 18, 1991.

>>>10. Venson Hamilton – 1,416 Points

6-10, 240, C, 1996-99, Forest City, N.C. (Oak Hill Academy)

One of two Huskers to reach the 1,000-point plateau in 1998-99, Venson Hamilton was a four-year standout for Coach Danny Nee. Hamilton finished his career with 1,416 points and ranks 10th on NU's all-time scoring list. His senior season was one of the finest campaigns in school history. For his efforts, Hamilton earned Big 12 Player-of-the-Year honors, the only Husker in the last 25 seasons to capture that prestigious award. Hamilton still owns NU records for rebounds (1,080) and blocked shots (241) and is second in games played (129). Hamilton was just the fourth player all-time among Big 12 schools to score 1,000 points, grab 1,000 rebounds and block 200 shots in his collegiate career. He was a second-round draft pick of the Houston Rockets, and has since experienced a successful career in Europe.

6-8, 225, C, 1976-79, Hammond, Ind. (Technical)

One-half of the "Hammond Hustlers" (Brian Banks was the other), 'Pipe' and 'BB' provided Nebraska with a great four-year, one-two punch. McPipe, a three-year starter, finished his career with 1,300 points. As a junior, McPipe earned USBWA District V honors and was one of 12 starters designated as an All-American by the Citizens Savings Athletic Foundation. In his final year in a Husker uniform, Banks was a repeat pick on the USBWA team and a fifth-round draft selection of the Philadelphia 76ers.

>>>12. Tom Baack – 1,299 Points

6-5, 192, F, 1966-68, Fort Wayne, Ind. (Concordia)

Tom Baack, a 1995 Nebraska Hall of Fame inductee, finished his career with 1,299 points, a figure that stood as the school record until guard Jerry Fort came along 10 years later. He played on three straight winning NU teams from 1965 through 1968, and helped the Huskers to an NIT appearance in 1966-67—NU's first-ever bid to the nation's oldest postseason tournament. Known for his satin-smooth jump shot, Baack had a 17.3 points-per-game average for his career, which still ranks third in school history. Baack served as an assistant at Nebraska for eight seasons after his playing days. He was selected in the 10th round of the 1968 NBA Draft by the Detroit Pistons.

Stuart Lantz teamed with Tom Baack to give Nebraska a potent one-two offensive punch. Lantz finished his career with 1,269 points and 571 rebounds. A two-time All-Big Eight pick, Lantz went on to play eight years in the NBA with four teams (San Diego/Houston Rockets, Detroit Pistons, New Orleans Jazz, Los Angeles Lakers). A charter member of the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame, Lantz had his jersey (No. 22) retired in the fall of 1989.

One of the top all-around centers in Nebraska history, Chuck Jura's 1,255 points rank 14th on the school's all-time list, and trail Stuart Lantz's career total by 14 points. Jura earned All-Big Eight honors as a senior and was an academic All-Big Eight choice. One of only six players in NU history to average more than 20 points in a season (21.2), Jura ranks sixth on the rebounding chart (740) and his 11.7 rebounds per game (305 total) in his final season are still an NU single-season record. Like Lantz, Jura was a charter member of the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame. A third-round NBA draft pick by the Chicago Bulls, Jura played professional basketball in Europe for several seasons.

Forward Larry Florence surpassed the 1,000-point milestone midway through the 1999-2000 season. Florence ranks third at Nebraska in career starts (105) and is tied for eighth in games played (123). A four-year starter, Florence was Nebraska's captain as a senior and led the Huskers in scoring at 13.0 points per game. In his senior season, Florence earned honorable-mention All-Big 12 honors from the league's coaches. Florence also earned the reputation as a strong defender and a hard worker in the weight room. He was named the Husker Power Male Athlete of the Year for all sports in 1999 and was a three-time men's basketball lifter of the year.

5-9, 165, G, 1979-82, Muncie, Ind. (Central)

Jack Moore will long be remembered by Husker faithful for his gully play on the basketball court. He was honored with the 1982 Naismith Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top player under 6-feet tall. During his four-year career, Moore scored 1,204 points, and shot .901 from the free-throw line – among the all-time best career marks in NCAA Division I history. Moore's .901 free-throw percentage broke the Big Eight record for career marksmanship, which had been held by his coach, Moe Iba. A consensus All-Big Eight selection as a senior, Moore was the first Husker cager to earn first-team academic All-Big Eight honors for three straight seasons, and his 382 career assists stand sixth on NU's all-time chart. Nebraska's MVP Award is named in honor of Moore, who was killed in a March 1984 plane crash. Moore was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1993.

The 682 assists ranked as the third-best total in Big Eight history, behind only former Kansas stars Cedric Hunter and Jacques Vaughn. Carr also ranks second in career minutes played at NU. A second-team All-Big Eight selection as a senior (UPI), Carr was a two-time, first-team academic All-Big Eight performer. Carr was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 2001.

He co-captained the Huskers' record-setting 26-8 squad during the 1990-91 season.

One of the most dangerous long-distance threats in Nebraska and Big 12 history, Cary Cochran topped the 1,000-point mark during his senior campaign. Cochran set Nebraska records for career (268), single-season (89) and single-game (8) 3-pointers during his senior season. He led the team in scoring at 14.0 points per game as a senior, and led the conference and nation in free-throw percentage by hitting 92.2 percent at the charity stripe. For his career, Cochran was an 89.6 percent shooter from the foul line, and was second in Nebraska history by hitting 42.5 percent from behind the arc. Cochran was an honorable-mention All-Big 12 pick by the coaches as a senior, and earned academic all-district and all-conference honors.

The first Husker cager to top the 1,000-point mark, Herschell Turner finished his career with 1,056 points. Turner teamed with Al Maxey to provide a strong offensive punch for Coach Jerry Bush's teams in the late 1950s. A first-team All-Big Eight selection as a senior, Turner earned All-America honors as a junior. Turner was a strong rebounder and held NU's single-season rebounding record (244) for 10 seasons, until Leroy Chalk grabbed 257 rebounds in 1969. Turner finished his career with 626 rebounds, which ranks 13th on NU's all-time chart. He was a sixth-round draft choice of the NBA's Syracuse Nationals in 1960. He was inducted into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 1990.

Attendance– Nebraska has averaged more than 10,000 fans per game over a complete season 17 times in the Bob Devaney Sports Center.

Baack, Tom– Ranks 12th on school's all-time scoring list with 1,299 points and served as an assistant coach under Moe Iba.

Belcher, Cookie– Holds Nebraska single-game, season and career steals records, along with the Big 12 steals record at 353. He owns NU's career record for games played, games started and minutes played.

Big 12– One of the nation's toughest basketball conferences comprised of Nebraska, Kansas, Kansas State, Iowa State, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Missouri, Colorado, Baylor, Texas, Texas A&M and Texas Tech. Big 12 Conference play began in 1996.

Big Eight– Nebraska's conference from 1960 until 1996.

Boone, Jaron– Husker swingman from 1993 to 1996 who ranks in the top five in nine career categories, including scoring (6th, 1,609) and assists (3rd, 446).

Branch, Nate– Former Husker went on to fame with the Harlem Globetrotters.

Browne, William– Guided Huskers to 1937 Big Six title.

Bush, Jerry– Known as the "Big Bear of the Coliseum," this popular Husker coach guided NU from 1955 to 1963, and directed two of the greatest upsets ever – a 43-41 victory over top-ranked Kansas and Wilt Chamberlain, and a 55-48 victory over No. 4 Kansas State and Olympian Bob Boozer during the 1957-58 campaign.

>>>C C C

Carr, Brian– Nebraska's all-time assist leader, with 682 from 1984 to 1987.

Carrier, Sam– First Husker cager to earn All-America honors (1913).

Chalk, Leroy– Second on Nebraska's all-time rebounding list with 782 boards.

Cipriano, Joe– Second-winningest coach in school history with all-time mark of 253-197 from 1964 through 1980.

Coliseum– Home of Nebraska basketball from 1926-27 season through 1975-76 campaign.



>>>Cookie Belcher set the Nebraska and Big 12 record for steals and ranked third in NCAA history with 353 during his Husker career.

>>>D D D

Day, Bernard– Ranks as highest-scoring junior college transfer in school history with 802 points from 1985 to 1987.

Devaney, Bob– Longtime Nebraska football coach and athletic director who passed away in May of 1997. Nebraska's home court, the Bob Devaney Sports Center, which opened its doors for the 1976-77 season, bears his name. The Devaney Center underwent a major facelift for the 1999-2000 season with new instant replay screens, a new sound system, new lighting system and a revamped concourse.

Ekwall, Rex– Standout for NU in mid-1950s whose 10.4 career rebound average still ranks as a school record.

ESPN– The national cable network which features a Big 12 game on its weekly "Big Monday" package. NU will face Kansas at home on Big Monday, Jan. 29, 2007.

>>>F F F

First-Round Draft Choices– Nebraska had three in the 1990s, Rich King (1991), Eric Piatkowski (1994) and Tyrone Lue (1998).

Fort, Jerry– First three-time first-team All-Big Eight selection in school history who finished his career with 1,882 points.

>>>G G G

Good, Harry– Served as NU head coach from 1947 through 1954 and guided the Huskers to shares of the 1949 and 1950 Big Seven titles. He was enshrined into the Citizens Savings College Basketball Hall of Fame in 1975.

>>>H H H

Hamilton, Venson– The 1999 Big 12 Player of the Year and Nebraska's all-time leader in rebounds and blocked shots.

Hammond Hustlers– Nickname given to Hammond, Ind., natives Brian Banks and Carl McPipe, who finished their careers with 1,150 and 1,300 points, respectively.

Hare, Fred– His follow-up basket at the buzzer with no time left gave Nebraska a 74-73 upset of No. 1 Michigan and Cazzie Russell in Lincoln during the 1964-65 season.

Hokuf, Steve– Standout all-around athlete who earned first-team all-conference honors in football, won the Big Six javelin title and earned All-America and all-conference honors in basketball.

Hoppen, Dave– NU's all-time leading scorer with 2,167 points who was the second three-time first-team All-Big Eight pick in school history and the first player in school history to have his jersey number (42) retired.

>>>I I I

Iba, Moe– The son of legendary coach Henry P. Iba, Moe posted 106 wins on the Husker bench from 1981 to 1986 and guided the school to its first "official" NCAA Tournament berth in 1986.

International– The NCAA allows schools to take a foreign trip once every four years, allowing the Huskers to visit Australia (1988, 2004) and Europe (1992).

>>>J J J

Johnson, Bill– Grabbed a school single-game record 26 rebounds against Iowa State, Jan. 4, 1954.

Jura, Chuck– Earned first-team All-Big Eight honors on the court and in the classroom as a senior in 1972.

>>>K K K

Kansas– The Jayhawks and Huskers first met on March 2, 1900, a game that was the first meeting of present-day Big 12 opponents.

King, Rich– Became the first first-round NBA draft pick in school history when the Seattle SuperSonics selected him with the 14th selection of the 1991 draft.

Kubacki, Jim– Hit game-winning jumper to beat No. 1 Kansas and Wilt Chamberlain, 43-41, during the 1957-58 season.

>>>L L L

Lantz, Stuart– Two-time first-team All-Big Eight pick (1967-68) who went on to an eight-year NBA career and had his Husker jersey number (22) retired in 1989.

Lehmer, Frank– First basketball coach in school history (1897-99), he finished career with a 7-3 record.

Lue, Tyronn– 1998 All-Big 12 pick who ranks seventh in career scoring at Nebraska and is tied for the school record with seven 30-point games. A first-round NBA draft pick in 1998.

Maclay, Don– Earned All-America honors in 1931.

Moore, Jack– One of the most popular Cornhuskers ever, he earned the 1982 Naismith Award as the nation's top player under six feet. Nebraska's most valuable player award is named in honor of Moore, who was killed in a 1984 plane crash.

Matzke, John and Stan– Stan lettered from 1952 through 1955, while his son, John, was a second-team academic All-America pick in 1984.

National Basketball Association– Twenty-four Huskers have been drafted by NBA teams over the years. Five Huskers – Eric Piatkowski, Erick Strickland, Mikki Moore, Tyronn Lue and Kimani Ffriend – were on training camp rosters to open the 2005-06 season.

National Invitation Tournament– NU has made a Big 12-leading 13 appearances in the nation's oldest postseason tournament with its most recent berth coming in 2006. NU captured the 1996 tournament title, defeating St. Joseph's in Madison Square Garden.

NCAA Tournament– The Huskers have earned six bids to the "Big Dance," including five bids in the 1990s with the last coming in 1998.

Nee, Danny– Winningest coach in Nebraska history, who posted a 254-190 record in 14 seasons from 1986 to 2000 and led NU to 11 postseason appearances.

Overtime– The Huskers are 54-34 all-time in OT games.

Parsons, Robert– Two-time first-team All-Big Six performer who earned All-America honors in 1937.

Phillips 66– Title sponsor for the Big 12 Tournament.

Polish Rifle– Nickname of two-time All-Big Eight pick and 1994 Big Eight Tournament MVP Eric Piatkowski, Nebraska's second all-time leading scorer. Currently a member of the NBA's Phoenix Suns, Piatkowski spent nine years with the Los Angeles Clippers, one with the Houston Rockets and two with the Chicago Bulls. He was inducted to the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame in 2006, the same year he had his jersey (No. 52) retired.

Postseason– Nebraska has made 20 all-time appearances.

Quadruple– Nebraska and UAB played four overtimes on Dec. 22, 1979, (NU won 92-84), in the school's longest game ever.

Rankings– Nebraska posted its highest year-end national rankings ever in 1990-91, finishing at No. 9 in UPI and No. 11 in AP.

Rebounder's Club– Booster organization for NU basketball.

Retherford, Claude– Leading scorer on NU's 1949 Big Seven championship team and a two-time first-team all-conference selection.

Sauer, George– The only Husker football All-American to earn a basketball letter, he was an All-America fullback in 1933 and lettered on the hardwood in 1932 and 1933.

Simmons, Grant– First-team All-Big Eight pick in 1966 and the school's first first-team academic All-Big Eight selection.

Smith, Andre– 1981 Big Eight Player of the Year, and NU's last conference player of the year before Venson Hamilton in 1999.

Stewart, Marvin– The only player in school history to reach the 1,000-point plateau in fewer than 70 career games.

Stiehm, E.O.– NU's first full-time basketball coach (1912-15) and the only man in conference history to win league titles in football (1912, 1913, 1914) and basketball (1912, 1913, 1914) in the same year.

Strickland, Erick– A three-year starter for Nebraska who is second on the Huskers' steals list and sixth in scoring. Strickland played in the NBA for nine seasons, including his final two with the Milwaukee Bucks.

Three-Pointers–Nebraska hit a school-record 267 3-pointers during the 2001-02 campaign, crushing the previous mark of 194 set in 1993-94. Brian Carr hit the first 3-pointer in school history in a game at Cal-Irvine during the 1986-87 season.

Titles– Nebraska won or shared seven league titles, all prior to 1951. NU also captured the 1994 Phillips 66 Big Eight Tournament title.

Turner, Herschell– All-American player who was first Husker to score 1,000 career points.

Upset– NU has knocked off three No. 1 teams, handing Kansas a 43-41 loss in 1958, Michigan a 74-73 loss in 1964-65 and Missouri a 67-51 loss at Columbia during the 1981-82 campaign. Nebraska nearly added a top-ranked victim in 1996-97 when it took Kansas to overtime before losing 82-77, and another in 2001-02 when it fell to Kansas by just one point, 88-87, in Lincoln as NU hit a school-record 18 3-pointers.

van Poelgeest, Richard– Born in The Netherlands, van Poelgeest was a four-year letterwinner from 1987 through 1990.

Volz, "Mutt"– First-team All-Missouri Valley Conference guard in 1925.

Wahlquist, George– All-America guard on NU's 1936 Big Six championship team.

Walsh, W.W.– Was the first first-team all-conference performer in school history (1909).

Whitehead, Bus– Two-time first-team All-Big Seven pick and the catalyst of the Huskers' 1949 and 1950 league title teams. Named as the captain of NU's all-time basketball team and earned the first Distinguished Hall of Fame Alumni award in 2003.

Xavier– Ended Nebraska's most successful basketball season ever by handing the No. 3-seed Huskers an 89-84 loss in the first round of the 1991 NCAA Tournament at Minneapolis, Minn. NU finished with a school-record 26 victories against just eight losses.

YMCA– Nebraska's first basketball game was played against a team from the Lincoln YMCA, Feb. 1, 1897. NU won 11-8.

Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame

Eric Piatkowski, a 13-year veteran of the NBA and one of only two former Huskers to play in four straight NCAA Tournaments, was the most recent inductee into the Nebraska Basketball Hall of Fame as he was enshrined at ceremonies on Feb. 18, 2006, at halftime of the Nebraska-Texas Tech game. Piatkowski is the fourth player from the 1990-91 squad that won a school-record 26 games to be inducted into the hall, joining Rich King (inducted in 2001), Clifford Scales (2002) and Beau Reid (2003).

A native of Rapid City, S.D., Piatkowski lettered from 1991 to 1994 while helping the Huskers to four straight NCAA Tournament appearances and an 85-39 career record including three 20-win seasons. He finished his career with 1,934 points to rank second in school history and is one of only two Huskers with at least 200 3-pointers in a career.

NU finished the 1990-91 season with its highest ranking ever at No. 9 by UPI and No. 11 by the Associated Press while gaining a 26-8 record. Piatkowski was the Most Valuable Player of the 1994 Big Eight Tournament as a senior and set the school single-game record in the first round by scoring 42 points in a 105-88 win over Oklahoma.

Following his senior season, Piatkowski was the second player in program history to be taken in the first round of the NBA Draft, going to the Indiana Pacers with the No. 15 selection. After being traded on draft day to the Los Angeles Clippers, Piatkowski has also played with the Houston Rockets, Chicago Bulls and is now with the Phoenix Suns for 2006-07. He has played in more than 740 career games in the NBA while averaging 7.8 points and 2.3 rebounds per contest. He is the Clippers' all-time leader in 3-pointers (738) and 3-point percentage (40.2) and is second in games played with 616.

The Nebraska Men's Basketball Hall of Fame was the brainchild of longtime Husker athletic supporter Jerry Solomon, who first approached the University about the project in the fall of 1988. Solomon, along with Jack Bock, Dale Herman and Dale Jensen, provided financial support for the Hall of Fame.

The Hall is co-sponsored by the Nebraska Athletic Department and the Rebounders Club. Memorabilia on nearly every Husker Hall of Famer is on display at the Walk of Fame on the upper concourse at the Devaney Center.

The first class was inducted in 1989 with 11 members. Since then, 59 players and coaches have been inducted into the Hall of Fame, including 10 classes with at least three members. The largest class since the initial induction was in 1996 when six players and one former coach were inducted into the Hall.

Eighteen people who have played supporting roles in shaping the Nebraska basketball program have also been enshrined by earning the Bug Cuca Special Merit Award. The award was renamed in honor of Cuca in 2003 after he passed away following a battle with cancer. Cuca and Ed Childress were the first-ever recipients of the award in 1989.

In 2003, the first Distinguished Hall of Fame Alumni Award was given, honoring a former player and Hall of Fame member who has been a positive force in the state and local community since his playing days ended.



Media Information and Policies

The 2006-07 Nebraska media guide is designed to assist the media in its coverage of Husker men's basketball. Additional information, including releases, photographs and videotape may be obtained by contacting the Media Relations Office at (402) 472-2263, or in many cases can be found on Huskers.com.

Please take a moment to review the following policies and services, which are intended to assist media members in their coverage of Nebraska basketball this season.

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All requests for press, broadcast, photo and parking credentials for Nebraska basketball home games should be directed to Vicki Cartwright, One Memorial Stadium, PO Box 880123, Lincoln, NE, 68588-0123. Requests can be made in writing on company letterhead or sent via email to jtrickie@huskers.com at least one week before the game.

As a general rule, working space is allocated on the following basis:

- 1) daily newspaper and wire-service writers covering for next-day publication;
- 2) radio and television personnel for broadcast origination;
- 3) sports editors of Nebraska daily newspapers;
- 4) official school student daily newspaper, one seat only;
- 5) approved special coverage;
- 6) press and TV working photographers.

Generally, weekly representatives, Internet news services and non-originating radio representatives cannot be accommodated because of space limitations. Internet writers for sites affiliated with established, nationally recognized media outlets will be considered on a game-by-game basis as space allows. *Credentials will not be granted for writers or photographers for Internet sites that are not affiliated with an accredited news organization.*

>>> Media Will Call

Media passes that are not mailed may be picked up at the will-call window, located under the south ramp of the Devaney Center. The will-call window opens 90 minutes before tipoff. Photo identification is required to pick up credentials or tickets.

>>> Media Parking

Parking for the media is located adjacent to and across the street from the Devaney Center on the south side. Both lots are accessible from Court Street, between 14th and 17th streets. Additional media parking may also be available on the North side of the Devaney Center.

>>> Coach Sadler Interview Time

The best time for local media to reach Coach Doc Sadler for an interview is immediately following practice. All interviews with Coach Sadler must be scheduled through the Media Relations Office.

Out-of-town media are encouraged to participate in the Big 12 weekly teleconference. Coach Sadler will participate in the telephonic press conferences (see schedule at right) each week beginning at 11:30 a.m. (CST). The teleconferences begin Dec. 12 and continue throughout the season. Contact the Big 12 Conference communications staff at (469) 524-1000 for more information on joining the conference call.

>>> Postgame Interviews

Nebraska's locker room is closed to the media at home and on the road. For home games, NU's postgame news conference will be held following a brief cooling off period in the designated postgame interview room off the southeast corner of the Devaney Center court.

The opposing team is housed in the visitor's locker room, located off the hallway at the northwest corner of the playing floor and will be available following the cooling off period. Make requests for opposing players and coaches through the visiting SID.

On the road, Coach Sadler and select players will be available upon request after the cooling off period.

>>> Player Interviews

All media requests for interviews with Nebraska basketball players should be directed to Assistant Media Relations Director Jerry Trickle [office phone: (402) 472-7779, cell phone: (402) 540-0269] at least one day in advance. The best time for in-season interviews is following practice.

Players are usually available for telephone interviews following practice, except on game days when no interviews are allowed. Nebraska is tentatively scheduled to practice from 2-5:30 p.m. during the season, with practices alternating by week between the Devaney Center and Mabel Lee Hall. With advance notice, interviews can be arranged for other times during the day at the Devaney Center or in the Media Relations Office during the day if the players' class schedule allows.

>>> Press Box Location

The press box for Nebraska basketball games is located in the lower portion of section C-12 (upper level) on the south side of the playing floor (opposite the team benches).

Television and radio crews originating an officially sanctioned broadcast of the game (see Broadcast Rights below) will be seated on the floor, with the visiting radio adjacent to the visiting team's bench when there is a TV telecast (east side of the scorer's table) and the home radio and television broadcasting teams positioned at midcourt opposite the team benches.

The camera deck is located at the top of the arena, directly behind the press box. Television crews telecasting live may shoot from either floor level (northeast or southwest baselines) or the camera deck in marked areas, but may not occupy space in the press box.

>>> Big 12 Weekly Teleconference

The Big 12 Conference men's basketball coaches will participate in a weekly media-only teleconference during the 2006-07 season. The calls begin in December, followed by weekly teleconferences beginning in January. The schedule is as follows:

The media work room is located on the south side of the lower level, across from the Ticket Office will-call. Media can use the room prior to, during and after the game to write and transmit stories. Phone and Ethernet lines will be available in the media work room. Ethernet lines are also available in the photography area on the southwest concourse level, and wireless Internet service will be available at the Devaney Center again in 2006-07.

>>> Media Services

Notes, programs and media guides will be provided before each game. Final statistics, play-by-play sheets and quotes from each locker room will be distributed following the game. Refreshments will be available to the media in a designated area before the game.

>>> Radio/Television Broadcast Space

Requests for live radio and television broadcast space and credentials should be made to Assistant Media Relations Director Jerry Trickie at jtrickie@huskers.com. If statisticians are needed, contact Trickie at least three days in advance.

>>> Broadcast Rights

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln and Host Communications own exclusive radio broadcast rights to all of the University's men's basketball games. Other than the Husker Sports Network and the University of Nebraska student station (KRNU), the only stations or networks allowed to broadcast Nebraska games from the Devaney Center are those that have rights to broadcast games played by the opposing team.

All radio stations and networks broadcasting from the Bob Devaney Sports Center must receive prior permission from the University. Any representative of a radio station or network that has not purchased such rights shall not air live game action or description of any game while it is in progress, nor shall such representatives air tape-recorded or live commentary of Nebraska coaches or players from the premises for one hour before or 20 minutes after a game.

Only stations that have purchased broadcast rights may install telephones on press row, or use telephones on press row for reporting on games. By accepting media credentials, representatives of stations and networks that have not purchased broadcast rights signify their agreement to all stipulations.

>>> Telephones

Nebraska provides six modular telephones and five Ethernet lines in the Bob Devaney Sports Center media work room. All long distance calls must be credit card, collect or billed to a third number. Any media wishing to place a phone in the press box should contact University Telecommunications at (402) 472-2000 at least two weeks before the game.

>>> Broadcast Telephone Lines

The Husker Sports Network installs additional telephone lines for visiting official broadcasts and charges a fee for the use of those lines for non-conference games. Big 12 official stations receive the use of the lines free of charge as part of a cooperative. Those interested in using the lines should contact Mike Elliott of Husker Sports Network at (402) 332-4000.

Official visiting radio stations are welcome to have their own telephone lines installed at the visiting radio position and may do so by contacting University Telecommunications at (402) 472-2000. Visiting teams should contact Assistant Media Relations Director Jerry Trickie before the game to find out where the broadcast position is located.

>>> Pro Scouting Passes

Per Big 12 Conference rules, the University of Nebraska provides press box access to scouts of professional basketball teams based on availability. If no space is available in the press box, scouts may arrange through the Media Relations Office (402-472-2263) to purchase tickets for Nebraska home games.

>>> Devaney Center Directions

The Bob Devaney Sports Center is located on the west edge of the Nebraska State Fairgrounds. Due to road construction around the Devaney Center, please check Huskers.com for the most up-to-date traffic information or call the Media Relations Office at 402-472-2263 for additional directions.

To reach the Devaney Center from the Lincoln Municipal Airport, turn right on Northwest 12th Street as you drive out of the airport. Northwest 12th Street becomes Cornhusker Highway, which intersects with 10th Street. Turn south (right) on 10th Street off Cornhusker Highway. Travel to Military Avenue, turn left and go two blocks east to 14th Street. Cross through the intersection. The Devaney Center will be on the right (south) side of the road.

From Omaha's Eppley Airfield, follow the signs to downtown Omaha and I-480. Take I-480 west to I-80, then take I-80 west approximately 60 miles to I-180. Exit South on I-180, then exit east to Cornhusker Highway and follow the instructions above.

>>> Media Relations Office

The University of Nebraska Media Relations Office is located on the third floor of the Osborne Athletic Complex, which is at the north end of Memorial Stadium. The building address is One Memorial Drive and is located approximately one mile away from the Devaney Center.

>>> Postgame Services

Following games, a PDF and .html version of the box score and game notes will be sent to state, regional and national media via e-mail. All statistics, game notes, game stories and other materials promoting the Nebraska Cornhuskers will also be available on Huskers.com during the week and following games. Game stats and season statistic recaps can be sent to additional media outlets as requested. Please give an e-mail list to a Media Relations representative before the game.

>>> Huskers Sports Network

The Husker Sports Network came under new ownership in the fall of 2006, as Host Communications acquired the former Pinnacle Sports Network.

A well-known entity throughout college athletic marketing circles, Host Communications Inc. has marketing agreements with seven universities as well as the Southeastern Conference and NCAA Football. The Lexington, Ky.-based company also manages five associations, more than 30 web sites and has a printing and publishing division that produces more than 700 publications annually, including all of the NCAA championship game-day programs.

HOST is a subsidiary of Triple Crown Media, Inc. TCMI owns and operates six daily newspapers with a total daily circulation of approximately 120,000 and owns and operates GrayLink, a wireless communications company based in Tallahassee, Fla. TCMI is a public company traded on NASDAQ and based in Lexington, Ky.

The Husker Sports Network will continue the strong tradition of broadcasting excellence established by the Pinnacle Sports Network, which had produced and marketed live broadcasts of University of Nebraska football, men's and women's basketball, volleyball, baseball and softball games for the past 10 years. Pinnacle was first awarded the rights on Feb. 9, 1996 and the University renewed the contract on Aug. 9, 2003, for an additional five-year term that runs until July 31, 2011.

All regular-season men's basketball games and any postseason contests will be broadcast by the network. A 25-station basketball network is in place for the 2006-07 season, with KFAB (1110 AM) serving as the Omaha affiliate, KLIN (1400 AM) as the Lincoln affiliate and KRVN (880 AM) serving as a third affiliate in the state.

Kent Pavelka makes a return behind the microphone to call Husker contests in 2006-07. Pavelka previously served as play-by-play announcer for Nebraska basketball for nearly 20 years, starting in 1974. He also handled color analyst duties on NU football broadcasts from 1974 to 1983, and was the play-by-play announcer from 1983 to 1996.

Alongside Pavelka for his fourth season as color analyst will be Matt Davison. A former Nebraska student-athlete, Davison lettered for the Husker basketball team in 2000 and was a four-year letterman for NU on the gridiron.

The Husker Sports Network will also carry a weekly radio show with Coach Doc Sadler, which can be heard statewide on the network on Monday nights at 7 p.m. during the season. All Nebraska games and coaches shows can also be heard on the Internet at Huskers.com.

>>> Huskers Set for At Least 18 Games on TV in 2006-07

The Nebraska men's basketball team will be seen on television a minimum of 18 times during the 2006-07 season. As part of an agreement with FSN Midwest, 10 Husker games will air on the network, while at least eight others will air on the ESPN family of networks as part of the Big 12 Conference television package. The partnership with FSN marks the third straight season the Huskers have aired on the network.

The current television package allows Husker fans the chance to see their team in action throughout conference play, as 15 of the 16 league games will be televised this season.

The Huskers will be seen on national television at least twice in 2006-07. NU will face Oregon in the Rose Garden in Portland, Ore., on Dec. 9 in a game carried nationally by FSN, while a conference matchup against Kansas on Jan. 29 will be the Huskers' first Big Monday contest at home since Feb. 14, 2000. It will be the second straight season the Huskers and Jayhawks face off on ESPN.

A veteran sportscaster, Greg Sharpe returns to handle play-by-play duties for the men's telecast package for the third consecutive season. Sharpe is a two-time Kansas Sportscaster of the Year who has extensive experience calling basketball games over the past decade. He was the voice of the Kansas State Wildcats from 1996 to 2002 and called the 2001 and 2002 NCAA Tournament for Westwood One Radio. He is currently the host of a sports talk show in Topeka, Kan., on WIBW radio.

Joining Sharpe on men's basketball telecasts as color analyst will be Matt Davison, who is also entering his fourth year handling color commentary on radio broadcasts of NU men's basketball games on the Husker Sports Network.

Husker games telecast on FSN Midwest will be regional telecasts available on cable and satellite only in the state of Nebraska, per Big 12 Conference rules.

FSN Midwest reaches 4.2 million cable and satellite television homes in six states. It carries more than 2,000 hours of local programming each year, including professional basketball (Indiana Pacers), baseball (St. Louis Cardinals, Kansas City Royals) and hockey (St. Louis Blues), along with Big 12 football, Big 12 women's basketball and several other collegiate athletic contests. FSN's 20 regional sports channels reach more than 82 million homes in the United States.

Compliance Guidelines for Boosters

The University of Nebraska Athletic Department takes great pride in abiding by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and the Big 12 Conference rules and guidelines that govern Division I competition. For the benefit of the many alumni, fans and booster club members who are so active in supporting and assisting the Huskers throughout the year, we would like to remind everyone of a few definitions and rules that apply to all athletic representatives and boosters.

>>> NCAA Principles

Institutional Control

It is the responsibility of the University of Nebraska to control its intercollegiate athletic program in compliance with the rules and regulations of the NCAA.

Responsibility

The University of Nebraska's responsibility for the conduct of its program includes responsibility for the actions of its staff members and for the actions of any other individual, booster or organization engaged in activities promoting the athletic interests of the institution.

Compliance

The University of Nebraska must monitor its program to assure compliance and to identify and report to the NCAA instances in which compliance has not been achieved. An institution found to have violated NCAA rules is subject to disciplinary and corrective actions as determined by the NCAA.

>>> NCAA Definitions

Athletic Representative/Booster

You are considered to be a University of Nebraska athletic representative if you:

- Are a present or past member of a University of Nebraska booster club or agency that promotes the Huskers' intercollegiate athletic program;
- Have made financial contributions to the athletic department or to an athletic booster organization of the University of Nebraska;
- Are, or have been, providing benefits (e.g., summer jobs, meals etc.) to enrolled student-athletes, their family members or friends;
- Are, or have been involved in any manner of promoting the University of Nebraska intercollegiate athletic program.

Please note: Once an individual is identified as an athletic representative, that person retains that identity indefinitely. The University of Nebraska is ultimately responsible for the acts of all "representatives of athletic interests" in relation to NCAA rules and regulations.

Prospective Student-Athlete

A prospective student-athlete is a student who has started classes for the ninth grade or above, including students in prep schools and junior colleges as well as students who have officially withdrawn from a four-year institution and plan to transfer to another institution. In addition, a student who has not started classes for the ninth grade becomes a prospective student-athlete if the institution or a Nebraska booster provides the individual or the individual's relatives or friends with any financial assistance or benefits that the institution does not provide to prospective students in general. A good rule of thumb is to treat ALL STUDENTS as prospects.

Student-Athlete

A student-athlete is a student whose enrollment was solicited by a member of the Nebraska athletic staff or other representative of athletic interests with a view toward the student's ultimate participation in the intercollegiate athletic program.

Contact

A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect, or the prospect's parent or legal guardian, and a Nebraska staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs.

Recruiting

Recruiting is any solicitation of a prospect or a prospect's family member (or guardian) by an institutional staff member or by athletic representative of the institution, for the purpose of securing the prospect's enrollment and ultimate participation in Nebraska's intercollegiate athletic program.

>>> Guidelines and Reminders for Boosters

- A booster may not contact the prospect, prospect's coach, principal or counselor in an attempt to evaluate or recruit the prospect.
- A booster may not expend funds to entertain or provide transportation for a prospective student-athlete, the prospect's family members or friends.
- A booster may not become directly or indirectly involved in making arrangements for a prospect, or the prospect's relative or friends to receive money or financial aid of any kind.
- A booster may not contact a prospective student-athlete through letter writing, e-mail, telephone calling, text messaging, other forms of communication, etc.

However, here are a few ways that a Husker *booster may be involved*:

- You may discuss summer employment opportunities with a prospect after he/she has signed a National Letter of Intent with the University of Nebraska.
- You may attend high school athletic events without contacting prospective student-athletes.
- You may continue existing friendships with families and friends of prospective student-athletes.
- You may send recommendation letters, newspaper clippings or similar information about prospective student-athletes to Husker coaches.

>>> Extra Benefit Guidelines and Reminders for Boosters

Extra Benefit

An extra benefit is any special arrangement by a Nebraska employee or an athletic representative to provide a student-athlete or the student-athlete's relative or friend a benefit not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation.

Boosters may not provide any special arrangement considered to be an extra benefit by NCAA definition. Examples of extra benefits include but are not limited to:

- Providing cash or loans of any amount;
- Signing or co-signing for a loan or other forms of financial assistance;
- Providing use of a telephone or calling card to make local or long distance calls;
- Transporting a student-athlete or providing the use of a vehicle;
- Providing free or reduced rent housing;
- Giving gifts of any kind (i.e. birthday, Christmas, Valentine's Day);
- Promising a student-athlete postgraduate education or employment;
- Offering free services (i.e. clothing, airline tickets, laundry, car repair, haircuts, restaurant meals);
- Providing payment to a student-athlete for a booster club speaking engagement;
- Providing employment for a prospect's relatives or friends.

Here are a few ways that a Husker *booster may help*:

- Do invite a student-athlete to participate in non-profit, charitable or educational events, but make sure to contact the compliance office for approval before the event.
- Do invite a student-athlete into your home for an occasional meal.
- Do pay a student-athlete the commensurate rate for actual and legitimate employment.

If you choose to assist in any of the ways described above, please contact the compliance office to receive prior approval.

Legend of the Cornhuskers

Before 1900, Nebraska football teams were known by such names as the Old Gold Knights, Antelopes, Rattlesnake Boys and the Bugeaters. In its first two seasons (1890-91), Nebraska competed as the Old Gold Knights, but beginning in 1892, Nebraska adopted Scarlet and Cream as its colors and accepted the Bugeaters as its most popular nickname until the turn of the century. Named after the insect-devouring bull bats that hovered over the plains, the Bugeaters also found their prey in the Midwest, enjoying winning campaigns in every year of the 1890s until a disappointing season in 1899.

After its first losing season in a decade, it must have seemed only fitting that Nebraska move in a new direction, and Lincoln sportswriter Charles S. (Cy) Sherman, who was to gain national renown as the sports editor of the Lincoln Star and helped to originate the Associated Press poll, provided the nickname that has gained fame for more than a century. Sherman tired of referring to the Nebraska teams with such an unglamorous term as Bugeaters. Iowa had, from time to time, been called the Cornhuskers, and the name appealed to Sherman. Iowa partisans seemed to prefer Hawkeyes, so Sherman started referring to the Nebraska team as Cornhuskers, and the 1900 team was first to bear that label.

Of course, the name caught on and became a Nebraska byword, eventually becoming the official nickname for the state.

There is no official symbol of a Cornhusker, and various cartoonists have caricatured the mystical something that typifies Nebraska football—some winning fan approval and others arousing fan ire.

The cartoon character, "Herbie Husker," evolved out of Nebraska's trip to the 1974 Cotton Bowl in Dallas. Artist Dirk West of Lubbock, Texas, designed a Cornhusker cartoon for the Cotton Bowl press headquarters that caught the eye of former Husker SID Don Bryant. Later, Bryant contacted West for permission to use the cartoon, and West expressed a desire to refine his original cartoon and improve some of the character's

features. As a result, West was commissioned to draw an original Cornhusker cartoon character that served as a mascot for all Husker athletic teams.

Herbie is the registered logo of the Cornhusker Athletic Department, which controls its use. West's concept of Nebraska football is appropriate—a burly, rugged and confident fellow who is proud of both the athletic and the agricultural traditions of the University of Nebraska.

In 2003, Herbie enjoyed a resurgence in the spotlight as he underwent a makeover, helping him better portray Nebraska's "image of strength and power," according to Athletic Director Steve Pederson. A new and improved Herbie was unveiled Aug. 30, 2003.

Along with Herbie, the athletic department unveiled Lil' Red, the Cornhuskers' contemporary mascot, in 1994. Lil' Red has been commonly seen on the sideline of all Nebraska athletic teams in recent years and remains NU's official mascot along with Herbie.

Also in recent years, the University has used the Cornhuskers' football helmet superimposed on a script "Huskers" for a football logo, a registered trademark of the Athletic Department.

The newest addition to the athletic department's logo sheet is the Husker Nation mark. This stylized Husker design is currently only licensed for use by adidas, the team's official on-field apparel supplier. Adidas offers a full line of Husker Nation apparel that is available at retailers across the country. The scarlet and cream logo celebrates the passionate support given by Husker fans since the school's first year in 1869.

Nebraska continues to make improvements and changes at the start of the new century, but it also takes great pride in its history. Quite fittingly, "Bugeaters" has also been registered for exclusive use by the University of Nebraska.

>>>University of Nebraska Licensing

In 1981, the University of Nebraska began a licensing program to protect the use of its name and symbols and ensure that NU logos are properly identified and associated on products bearing the institution's marks. The licensing department has helped Nebraska become one of the nation's largest revenue-producing universities, and Husker products are licensed around the world. The licensing department, considered one of the most innovative in the United States, is committed to building cooperative relationships with licensees and developing markets for "Officially licensed products of the University of Nebraska."

The Big 12 Conference

Fresh off its 10th anniversary season, the Big 12 Conference begins its second decade of competition in 2006-07. While there have been many proud accomplishments through the first 10 years, the conference and its members anticipate continued success.

Through its first 10 years, the Big 12 claimed 28 team and 310 individual NCAA titles. Last year, conference programs captured national championships in football (Texas), women's indoor track & field (Texas), wrestling (Oklahoma State) and men's golf (Oklahoma State). In addition, 12 individual event titles were also won by student-athletes that compete in the Big 12.

The previous season marked the most successful in conference history with six NCAA championships. Baylor won the crown for women's basketball, becoming the first Big 12 squad to win in that sport. Colorado won both the men's and women's cross country trophies, just the fourth school in NCAA annals to win both in the same year. Oklahoma State regained the top spot in wrestling, winning the national title for the 33rd time. Texas captured its fourth women's outdoor track & field crown, along with its sixth national championship in baseball.

The Big 12 leads all conferences with five appearances in the BCS National Championship game. A Big 12 team has played for the football national championship five of the last six years, and each of the last three. In basketball, an unprecedented eight men's and women's basketball teams have advanced to their respective Final Fours in the past five seasons as the Big 12 continues its place among the elite intercollegiate athletic conferences.

The Big 12 and its member institutions are committed to a competitive environment where sportsmanship and fair play take center stage. Whether on the field, in the

classroom, or within the community the student-athletes, administrators, coaches and game officials of the Big 12 support the highest ideals in sportsmanship.

Competitive excellence, scholarships and sportsmanship are all equal components of the Big 12's philosophy. All-Big 12 teams and All-Big 12 Academic squads are recognized for each sport at the end of their respective seasons.

At the end of each academic year, the Conference honors its top male and female student-athletes with the Big 12 Athlete of the Year and Big 12 Sportsman of the Year awards. Institutions can also nominate student-athletes for the prestigious Dr. Prentice Gault Postgraduate Scholarships at the end of each academic year. A total of 153 scholars have received more than \$845,000 in postgraduate financial aid through the first nine years of the program.

The Big 12 sponsors 21 sports with men's squads in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, swimming & diving, tennis and wrestling. Women's teams are fielded in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor track & field, outdoor track & field, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

The conference consists of 12 institutions that have shared many traditional rivalries throughout their histories, including Baylor, Colorado, Iowa State, Kansas, Kansas State, Missouri, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas, Texas A&M and Texas Tech.

The institutions created a league that encompasses seven states, over 42 million people and more than 18 million television households within its geographic footprint.

The conference conducts championships for 20 of its 21 sports. Each championship helps to determine teams and/or individuals that will represent the Conference in national postseason competition. The winner of the Big 12 football championship game earns the league's berth into the prestigious Bowl Championship Series.

The Big 12 is under the direction of its third commissioner, Kevin L. Weiberg, who took over the reins in December 1998. Weiberg has led the Big 12 into additional football bowl agreements and expanded television opportunities for all sports through contracts with ABC/ESPN, FSN, TBS and CSTV.

In its 10-year history, the conference has distributed \$807.2 million to its 12 member institutions.

The Big 12 staff administers to over 4,600 student-athletes in 21 sports. The conference headquarters will move to Irving, Texas, from Dallas in August 2006.


